Family And Friends Seek To Raise Money For Life-Saving Bone Marrow Drive

Kyle Fitzpatrick, the son of Bobby and Cindy (Venezia) Fitzpatrick, has leukemia. Kyle just turned a year old last month, and his only hope for survival is to find a compatible donor who can give him a small amount of healthy marrow, the "Living Gift Of Life."

The recruiting and testing of potential donors for Kyle is being organized by Friends of Baby Kyle in conjunction with the HLA Registry Foundation Inc., a not-for-profit organization and member of the National Marrow Donor Program. All test results from Friends of Baby Kyle donor drives will be entered into the

HLA Registry data base and made available to Kyle and the other 9,000 victims of blood disease in search of a "miracle match."

Though each donor drive builds hope, it also creates bills. Initial blood tests for potential donors are expensive, costing \$50 each. The total cost for this drive could run as high as \$100,000. The Friends need to raise money to cover the cost of the drive through fund raisers and donations. The momentum and spirit of this effort has been wonderful to date and it is hoped that the effort can be kept going.

Reduce, Reuse & Recycle Campaign Launched In Charlestown

MASSPIRG (Mass. Public Interest Research Group) has kicked off an effort to build support for the Reduce, Reuse & Recycle Campaign in Charlestown. As part of a statewide campaign drive, MASSPIRG is working to increase waste reduction and recycling in Mass. by expanding the Bottle Bill, boycotting wasteful packaging and by urging the state to "Buy Recycled."

"Mass. is producing over 13 billion pounds of trash every year and disposing of it in a system that was created decades ago, when raw materials were cheap and environmental dangers poorly understood. We've got to reduce, reuse and recycle to protect the environment and the public health," said Mark Graham, MASSPIRG coordinator for Charlestown.

The Reduce, Reuse & Recycle Campaign in Charlestown will educate the public while generating support for pressing the legislature, waste-making corporations and state government to solve our solid waste problems.

Among the reforms MASSPIRG endorses are: passing legislation to expand the Bottle Bill to cover juice, wine coolers and oth-

er drinks; boycotting Kool-Aid KoolBursts, an over-packaged product which is produced by Philip Morris, one of the largest contributors to anti-recycling lobbying in the state; and urging the governor to issue a "Buy Recycled" Executive Order for Mass. to increase the demand for products made out of recycled materials.

"Citizens in town can play a critical role in reducing our waste stream and making recycling work by joining the MASSPIRG Reduce, Reuse & Recycle Campaign. In addition, they are encouraged to sign a postcard to Michael Miles, CEO of Philip Morris, urging him to take Kool-Aid Koolbursts off the shelves," said Graham.

"Our goal is to generate public pressure statewide to send Mass. further down the road toward safe solid waste management. We'll be bringing our message door-to-door in Charlestown, and in towns statewide, making it easy for citizens to get involved."

MASSPIRG is a statewide, non-profit, not-partisan consumer and environmental advocacy organization. For more information, call 292-4810.

Charlestown's state Rep. Richard Voke, the Majority Leader of the Mass. House of Representatives, hosted a meeting in his State House office this week with several legislators and one of the nation's foremost water rate experts. The meeting was a part of the ongoing work of the Legislature's MWRA Caucus, whose primary purpose is seeking rate relief for those families and businesses within the MWRA zone.

Jonathan Kaledin, the executive director of the Na-

tional Water Funding Council, spoke to the caucus at the request of Voke. Kaledin's non-profit organization is made up of businesses, municipalities and environmentalists, and is working toward establishing a better federal funding system for federally mandated public clean water projects, including sewage treatment plants, drinking water facilities and combined sewer overflow controls.

"It was interesting to hear Kaledin's perspective on the issue of rate relief. As someone familiar with this

issue not only in the MWRA district but other areas across the country, his views and experiences were quite enlightening. He made it crystal clear: the federal government must be prodded into offering additional assistance for projects they mandate. The MWRA has a federal judge telling them to follow federal standards to clean Boston Harbor. Though grateful for the feds' promise of \$100 million, he makes perfect sense when he suggests more must be done at the federal level," said Voke.

Kaledin said that while cities like New York and Los Angeles face more costly clean water projects than the Boston Harbor program, MWRA ratepayers have larger bills because their population is smaller.

He agreed with the legislators that the burden is too great for ratepayers and that more must be done by Washington.

"I was encouraged to hear that the National Water Funding Council was pleased with the state legislature's initiative to come up with \$30 million in new funds for water rate relief, along with several other ways to protect ratepayers. Kaledin said that he has carried this news to the highest levels of Washington to demonstrate that state government is greatly contributing to downsizing MWRA rates," commented Voke.

Voke said the meeting ended with an agreement by his colleagues to work with the National Water Funding Council for any and all methods of rate relief.

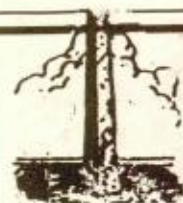

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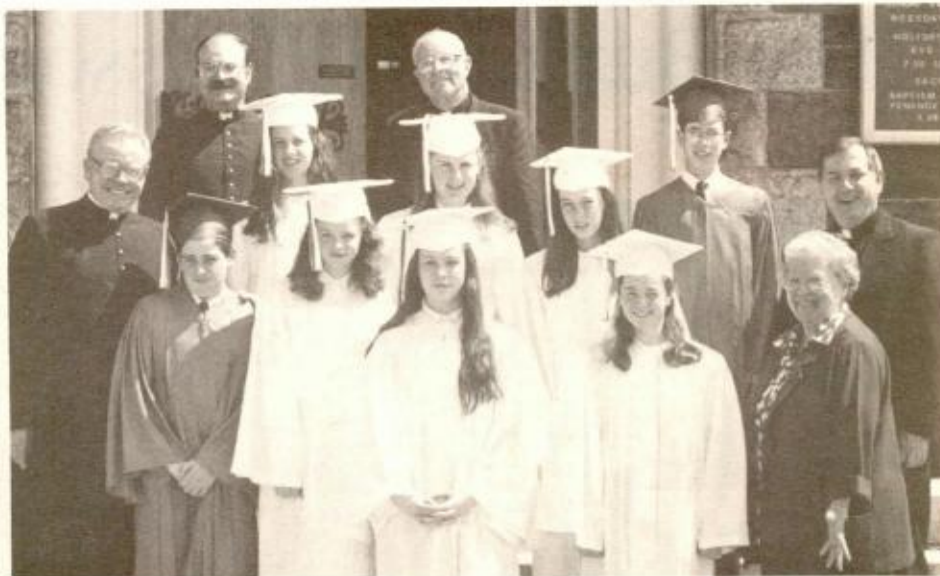

At-Large City Council Race

Wallace Announces Candidacy For Boston City Council At-Large

Brian Wallace of South Boston recently announced his candidacy for a city-wide seat on the Boston City Council before 900 supporters at the Boston Teachers Union Hall.

Wallace, an aide to Mayor Raymond Flynn, has worked as a probation officer in the Brighton District Court and was the executive director of the South Boston Boys & Girls Club, as well as an aide to Flynn in the state House of Representatives and the Boston City Council.

Wallace talked about what he called "common sense" issues. He stated: "I'm sick and tired of living in a society where our elderly are becoming prisoners in their own homes, where human lives are senselessly taken without any regard or remorse and where our schools have become armed camps that students are afraid to attend and in which teachers are afraid to teach. So far this year the Boston School Police have recorded 1557 incidents within the Boston Public Schools. By incidents I mean robbery, assault and battery, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon and other violent crimes.

"The school department does not even attempt to record or document the number of incidents that happen outside of the school property that has a very negative impact on the residents of that community," he stated.

"We live in a city that has a residency law, but 61 percent of the city workforce, by statute, are not required to live in the city.

"We live in a city that is paying the highest water bills in the entire country.

The governor proposes that we alleviate the problem by making the people of Boston pay even more because of the water that people coming into our city use each day. And here is how the MWRA relates to the problem, and this is a direct quote from the MWRA Plan of Operation: 'Some federal and state money is available but most of the costs will be borne by the consumers who live in, or do business in, the service area.' Federal assistance will end in 1995 when construction is at its peak.

We have a city where 51 percent of the property is tax exempt. We can't receive any taxes from Boston University, which owns half of Commonwealth Avenue, or from Boston College which owns the other half. We can't get any tax money from Harvard, one of the richest institutions in the world, even though they own most of Mission Hill."

Wallace concluded: "All these are facts, as unbelievable as that might seem, and are what our system has become. I had a choice of continuing to do high school and college sports on TV and on the radio or to run for the Boston City Council. After really looking at what our elderly, our kids and our neighborhoods are faced with, I had no choice.

"When I finish doing a basketball or football game and the lights and the cameras are shut off, it's still just a game. Life is hard but it's no game. It's time to stop the games. It's time to get serious and stop the nonsense. That is why Brian Wallace is running for the Boston City Council." (political announcement)

Fresh from a full week of conference committee negotiations on the state budget, Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham announced that Boston is expected to receive an estimated \$1.98 million this year in new local aid from the state. In addition, Boston is slated to receive roughly \$7.8 million above last year's education aid under the education re-

form law, and the Life Focus Center of Charlestown is slated to receive \$75,000.

"The 7.3 percent increase in local aid from lottery revenue and the dramatic increase in education aid should give Boston a much-needed shot in the arm," said Birmingham.

The final budget plan also includes significant

MWRA rate relief, with \$30 million in state aid for water and sewer rate relief, as well as a proposal to allow homeowners to shift a portion of water and sewer bills onto the property tax, at local option, in order to permit homeowners to deduct that amount from their federal income taxes. The rate relief plan also includes nearly \$4 million in new

sewer-related tax abatements for low income senior homeowners.

"We met our commitments to fully fund education reform and to provide significant relief for overburdened MWRA ratepayers," said Birmingham. "We also significantly increased local aid. These items do not come without a price tag, however. We paid for these items, not with new taxes, but by reducing other programs."

Birmingham's announcement came as he completed negotiations as co-chairman of a conference committee charged with ironing out differences between House and Senate versions of the state budget for the fiscal year that began July 1. The conference committee's bill will face a final, typically routine, vote in both the House and the Senate before heading to Gov. Weld for his signature and vetoes of particular items.

Bio-Med Engineering Part Of BHCC's Electronics Technology Program

Intro to Bio-Med Engineering, a grant-funded program at Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC), will become a regular course in the Electronics Technology program in the fall.

Close to 50 percent of the 1993 BHCC graduates of the program will transfer to four-year institutions in the fall. Most of them will attend Northeastern University, Wentworth Institute or U/Mass-Lowell to major in Engineering Technology.

In addition, most of the BHCC 1992 graduates are now working in industry or

government in electronics or communications positions.

The electronics program is designed to prepare students to become electronic technicians or field service technicians in computers, digital or optical electronics areas.

Extensive laboratory work using state-of-the-art equipment readies the students through hands-on experience for the field of electronics. A thorough background in the theory of electronics technology enables the student to move

ahead in the field.

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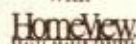
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
