St. John's Episcopal Church celebrates the installation of its newly restored 19th-century Odell organ in its sanctuary at the church, 27 Devens St., Charlestown. The dedicatory recital will be given on Sunday, Nov. 24 at 7:30 p.m. by acclaimed Boston-based organist Peter Sykes, head of the Longy Early Music Department and organist at First Church Congregational in Cambridge.

Syke's program will include masterworks for the organ by J.S. Bach, Felix Mendelssohn and Jules Vieme.

The suggested donation for admission is \$10, with

proceeds to benefit the Organ Restoration Fund at St. John's Church.

St. John's music director, Douglas Witte, headed the organ committee and reports that the parish is thrilled to have this beautiful 1873 instrument for services and worship in St. John's 19th-century-styled interior. 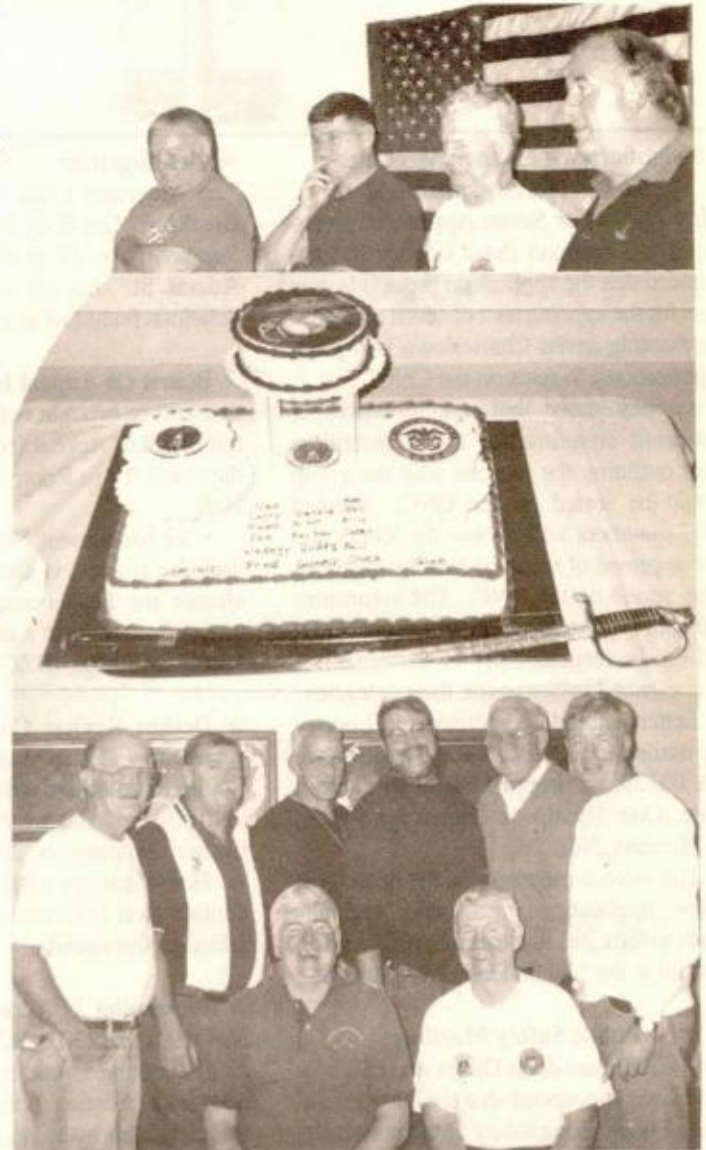

WHAT'S NEW FOR IRAS IN 1997?

Congress has been busy again changing the tax laws, and several new provisions affect IRAs. The changes discussed below all take effect in 1997.

• Under current law, you are generally subject to a 10% penalty if you withdraw money from your IRA before age 59 1/2. Under the new law, you will be allowed to make penalty-free withdrawals from your IRA at any age to cover family medical bills, if total medical expenses exceed 7.5% of your adjusted gross income. If you have been receiving unemployment compensation for at least 12 weeks, and you meet certain minor timing requirements, you also qualify to make penalty-free IRA withdrawals at any age to pay for medical insurance.

• Currently, a husband and wife are limited to a combined IRA contribution of \$2,250 if only one spouse has employment income. Under the new law, a spouse who isn't employed outside the home will be eligible for a full \$2,000 IRA contribution. This brings the maximum combined IRA contribution for a married couple to \$4,000.

• The new law establishes a simplified retirement plan for small businesses, to be known by the acronym SIMPLE. A SIMPLE plan can be established as an IRA for each employee, or as part of a 401(k) plan. If a SIMPLE plan is established as an IRA, each employee may contribute a stated percentage of compensation, up to a current maximum of \$6,000. The employer also must contribute, according to formulas provided in the law. Under a SIMPLE 401(k) plan, employee contribution rules will be somewhat less flexible. Carefully examine the pros and cons of the SIMPLE 401(k) before replacing an existing plan.

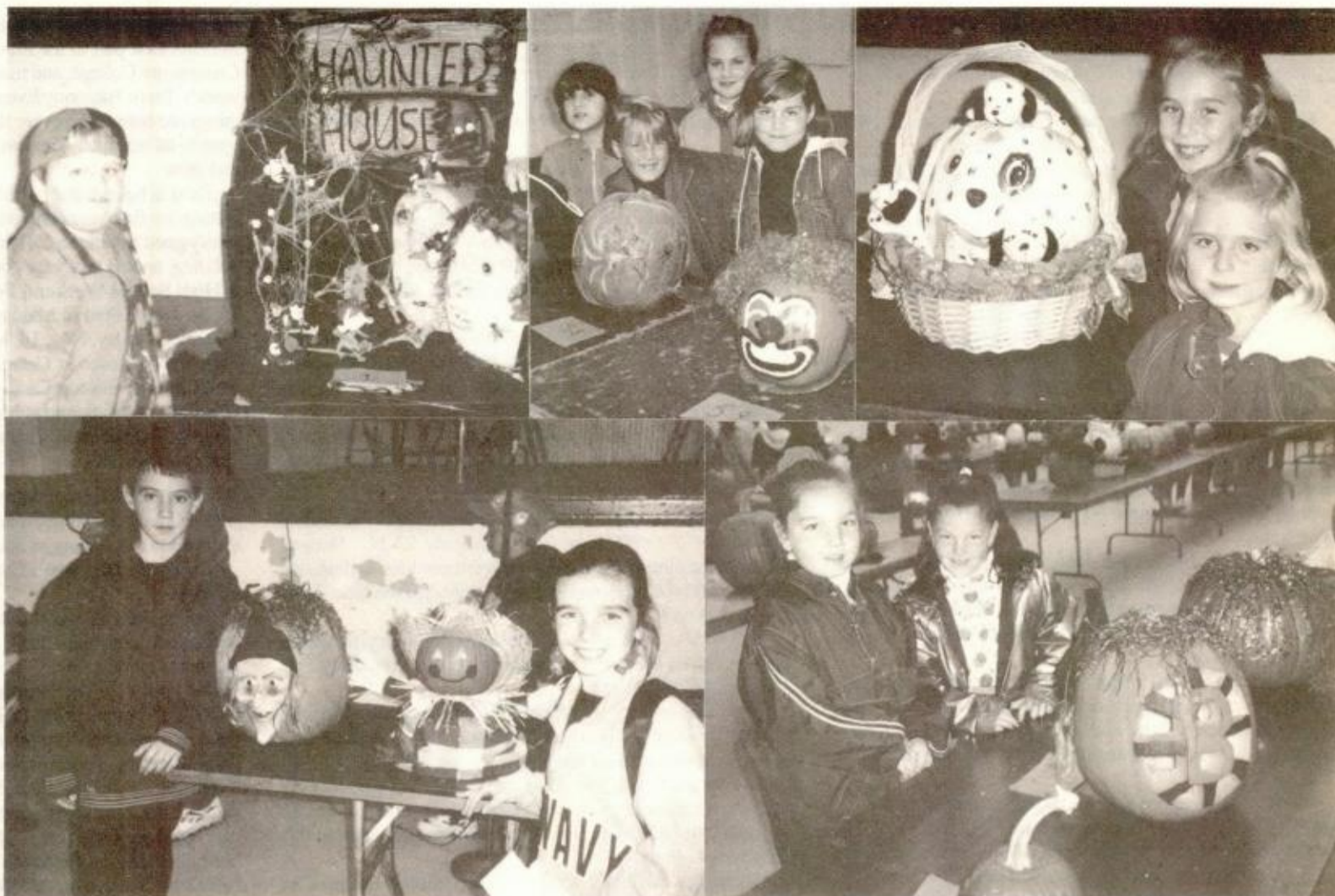
News From Charlestown Catholic Elementary School

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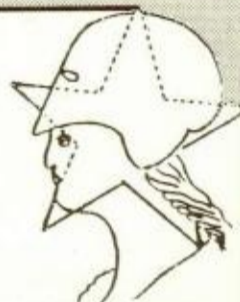
