



Bunker Hill Housing Development Residents Aid Attack Victims

by Kathleen Giordano Channel 7 newswoman Robin Young and her cameraman John Baynard were assaulted and knocked to the ground on Monday, October 8th while taping a story in the Bunker Hill Housing Project. Ms. Young's pocketbook was also snatched during the attack. According to Sergeant Detective Gottschalk of the Boston Police Department, Area A Division, "Only through the terrific detective work of Detective Charles Gleason and Officers Paul Hutchings and Herbert Langlois, of Area A, was the suspected perpetrator of the incident convinced to surrender himself at the Charlestown Court

District Court obtaining warrants for the arrest of Timothy D. Connors of Chestnut Street, Charlestown, Connors called the Court House after hearing that he was suspect in the incident.

' Detective Gleason, after speaking to Connors, convinced him to give himself up at the Charlestown Court House: which he did. He was then brought to Area A of the Boston Police Department and booked on Assault and Battery with a Dangerous Weapon, Assault and Battery, Larceny, Attempted Larceny and two counts of Willful and Malicious Destruction of Property. Connors, who pleaded innocent to the

9th at which time a cash bail of \$1000 was set and the case was set for trial on October 17th. Police are seeking also an unidentified accomplice.

IMs. Young, contacted at her WNEV-TV office, stated that she was in the Project doing an update on a story concerning the development's efforts to improve it's image. Mayor Announces \$1.9 Million Federal Grant For Elderly Housing In Navy Yard

Boston Mayor Raymond L. Flynn announced the awarding of a \$1.9 million Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) for the construction of 112 units of elderly housing at the Charlestown Naval Shipyard.

This award was made in conjunction with the efforts of U.S. Senator Edward Kennedy. It represents one of the largest UDAG awards for elderly housing in the city's history. The site, at Building 103 at the Charlestown Naval Shipyard will commence construction of the housing units in the near future, possibly in late 1984 or early 1985.

Mayor Flynn termed "the addition of these 112 units a great help in meeting the housing means of Boston's elderly residents. However, the need for elderly housing remains great. Statistics released by the Boston Housing Authority only last month show that there are over 2,000 elderly Bostonians on their waiting list for subsidized housing. That waiting list is more than four times the number of openings per year.'

Flynn emphasized that "given the reality that Boston has an elderly population that is increasing and is also one of the poorest elderly population of any city in America more



Facts About Drugs -F.A.D.

Kids seem to be relieved when they know that the drug they use does not cause physical dependency. For some reason physical dependence draws up mental images of the D.T.'s, hallucinations, thrashing, and screaming. Most of us think of heroin withdrawl when the user needs to be held down. "Cold turkey" gives us the image of the sweats, bugs crawling, etc. Actually, withdrawl from dependence may often be set off by another drug which makes withdrawl painless. Doctors are trained to do this for the abuser in detox facilities and in most hospitals.

Physical dependence occurs with certain drugs after prolonged use. Morphine, barbituates, sedatives, minor tranquilizers, and alcohol can produce physical despendence.

Psychic (or psychological) dependence is not as feared by drug takers. In fact it is denied and not admitted in most cases, but it is a very dangerous dependence and promotes the obsession with a drug. Psychic dependence is a craving for the pleasureable effects produced by the drug, such as euphoria, elation, stimulation. A user begins to prefer the drugged state to the normal state. Withdrawl from these drugs, while it produces no specific physical symptoms, may result in mild to serious depression. Sudden withdrawl from marijuana generally produces neither mental nor physical symptoms but heavy use may be followed by vague anxiety upon stopping use. Some drug users are strongly preoccupied with a drug, seeking to repeat its mental state. They may even drop their former lifestyles in order to live their lives around the drug. Yet he/she may stop the drug without discomfort. Yet these changes in a person are important. Any obsession with a drug, where it becomes too important, prevents a person from living his life in the truest sense. Drugs producing psychic dependence; but no physical dependence: cocaine, marijuana, hashish, amphetamines, LSD, PCP, mescaline and morning glory seeds.

"Harborpark" - A Plan For Boston's Waterfront

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and Boston Redevelopment Authority Director Stephen Coyle announced a com-prehensive plan for promoting economic growth on Boston's waterfront while increasing the public access and open space along the harbor.

The project, which is

named Harborpark, was revealed at a press conference held on Tuesday at the Charlestown Naval Shipyard

According to the Mayor, this plan "represents a balanced, multi-faceted approach to harbor development."

has snown a rapid decline in the past 20 years, but now that the economy is on an upswing, the harbor project will reflect this change.

The first phase of the project will provide an uninterrupted pedestrian walkway covering the seven miles between the Charlestown Navy Yard and the South Boston waterfront. According to Flynn, the walkway will "link the waterfront with the 250,000 Boston residents who live within walking distance of the harbor.'

By providing the walkway, the Mayor stated that this is a "start of a coordinated program to provide public access to the waterfront.'

Coyle stated that it is hoped that more people will utilize the harbor for transportation as well.

Among the plans outlined by the BRA Director was an interim waterfront. zoning amendment for the Boston Harbor which would delay construction planned on the harbor for 15 months, during which time the BRA along with a citizen advisory committee could review the plans. According to Coyle, the advisory committee would consist of a representative from each of the surrounding neighborhoods

adajacent to the harbor. The plan also stated that of the 8,000 units of housing to be built along the harbor, 30% would be set aside for low and moderate income families.

Coyle also stated in order to generate the waterbased transportation system, commuter boats, water taxis, and private boats would have access at terminals located along the harbor, including the Navy Yard.

The Mayor stated the "city waterfront development could provide 1/3rd of the city's anticipated growth in jobs, investment and tax revenues for the rest of the decade."

More than \$2 billion in private investment is targeted for the waterfront area over the next six years, with some \$1 billion in public investment scheduled for the same area.

The total cost for creating the pedestrian walkway and open space will cost somewhere in the area of \$80 million. Of this, \$40 million has been funded or is in the process of funding. The remainder of the money, stated the Mayor, would come from a combination of private developers, or funding from state or federal grants.





Applicants may apply at any one of the 35 intake agencies between October 15, 1984 and April 30, 1985. Constance Carey, ABCD Energy Director, advises all prospective applicants to provide the following information, in order to qualify for this year's program and receive assistance as soon as possible:

- 1) Proof of all sources of income for at least the 90-day period preceding the application for all household members aged 18 years and over. (Include letters from appropriate schools or colleges if household members are full time students.);
- 2) Social Security numbers for all household members aged 18 years and over:
- 3) A copy of the most recent bill for the primary source of heat. (If the heat has been shut off prior to application, a copy of the final bill will suffice);
- 4) Either a current mortgage statement (if home is owned), or a current rent receipt (if applicant rents their home or apartment).

In some cases, applicants whose heat is included in their rent can receive assistance. They should provide at least 90 days worth of rent receipts or a letter from the landlord stating the monthly rent for the apartment.

Since no application can be processed without all of this information, applicants are urged to bring these records with them when they apply. Anyone with questions or problems concerning their application should contact the local agency where they apply, or the ABCD central office, 178 Tremont Street, Boston at 357-6012.

Charlestown residents may apply at the Kennedy Center, 27 Winthrop Street, (telephone 241-8866), Monday through Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and evenings by appointment only.

The boy just said, 'I don't want any money, but please say something nice about us. Not everyone that lives in the Project is bad.' "

Young had only praise for the residents of the Project and their outpouring of concern and assistance following the attack.

The Boston Housing Authority today announced plans to install smoke detectors in all of its occupied apartments within the next forty-five (45) days.

"The Authority is immediately hiring a crew of carpenters to install the detectors." said BHA Receiver/ Acting Adminstrator John The Stainton smoke detectors will be battery operated, and can be installed quickly and at a reasonable cost. We still intend to proceed with install plans to electrically - powered smoke detectors in BHA

units but that will take longer. The installation of battery-operated detectors responds to an immediate need which we feel is appropriate given recent arriving at the scene, the officers spoke to the victim who stated that person(s) unknown broke into her house via the front door and ransacked it. 
Report Drug Activity
