Elizabeth Delnickas received her Masters degree in Speech and Language Pathology from the University of Kansas. Beginning with her clinical fellowship in the Kansas City Public School system, she has accrued extensive experience in treating children with delays in speech and language. Locally, she has worked at the North Shore Children's Hospital as well as the United Cerebral Palsy Association.
Since speech and language development problems can begin when a child is very young, Elizabeth suggests that parents not only monitor their child's language development, but urges them to talk and read to their children from the time they are babies. It is important for parents to find the time to play with their children, as play gives them the opportunity to learn. Allowing children to "lead" the play will ensure that they will continue wanting to learn.
Elizabeth recommends that if, as a parent, "you feel that something is wrong, go with your gut instinct and get some help." Some early "red flags" to watch for indicating speech and language
 problems are: 1. children who have lots of ear infections; 2 children who are unable to engage in "imitation" games; 3 . children who have difficulty following directions; 4 . children who are not talking by 18 months of age. Take them for an evaluation. The earlier speech and language problems are detected, the better the prognosis. If children do not get the basic foundation skills, problems will start to build. "Children who have language and learning difficulties in school, most likely had some problems when they were much younger," says Elizabeth. "Early intervention can really help."
Elizabeth, as a senior therapist at MGH Charlestown welcomes questions regarding speech and language development issues. She would like to pursue her goal of increasing awareness through education of parents, professionals and other members of the Charlestown community about normal and problematic speech development in an effort to promote early intervention. Sasha Yampolsky
As a recent recipient of a Masters degree in Speech and Language Pathology from the MGH Institute for Health Professions, Sasha Yampolsky is looking forward to helping patients with various forms of commurications disorders. This might include stuttering, developmental disorders such as dyslexia and other written language disorders, learning disabilities and acquired disorders such as speech and language difficulties following a stroke or a head injury.
Sasha's undergraduate degree is in Electrical Engineering and Mathematics. She has worked at the Raytheon Company prior to entering the graduate program of Speech-Language Pathology. One of her clinical rotations was at an augmentative communication company (CAST) where she One or her clinical rotations was at an augmentative communication company ( CAST) wher
received extensive training in computer-aided communication used by patients with MS or Cerebral Palsy. Because of her mathematical background, Sasha is especially skilled at helping cerebral Palsy. Because of her ma the afcal background, Sasha s especally skiled at helping those with spectifc problems in math. Of special interest to Sasha is the disorder "acalculia,
which is a math/calculation deficit acquired after a stroke or other neurological diseases.


Having come to the United States when she was 9 year old from Russia, Sasha is fluent in Russian and speaks French as well. Part of her internship was spent in an elementary school of bilingual Russian children who had written and spoken language difficulties.
In her treatment of patients, she łeels it is very important for the family to be involved. She will teach the skills to family members so that they can "carry-over" the therapy at home. Sasha believes in "functional" therapy, which means teaching a patient the skills to enable them to get along in "real life," in school or at a job. She advises that parents watch for early signs of written language problems, such as children having much trouble "rhyming," which can be noticed well before they start to learn to read.
In her spare time, Sasha enjoys tennis, skiing, traveling and is a published poet.

## A LOOK AT

THE NEW ADOPTION TAX CHANGES
If you are planning to adopt a child, you may be eligible for some new tax breaks. Beginning in 1997, you'll be able to claim a tax credit for certain "qualified adoption expenses." And if your employer helps out with adoption expenses, the value of this benefit may be excluded from your income.
For purposes of both the tax credit and the income exclusion, qualified adoption expenses include such items as adoption fees, court costs and attorney fees. Both new tax breaks apply only to adoptions of children under the age of 18 or individuals who are physically or mentally incapable of taking care of themselves.
As you might expect, these tax breaks come with some fine print. For example, you can't benefit from the credit and the exclusion for the same expenses, foreign adoptions are subject to certain limitations, and adoption of a spouse's child isn't covered at all. Any payments made by your employer must be part of an "adoption assistance program," and this program must meet a number of technical requirements.
The credit and the exclusion are both limited to $\$ 5,000$ of qualified adoption expenses per child, except for adoptions of children with "special needs," in which case the limit generally increases to $\$ 6,000$. Both tax breaks are phased out beginning at $\$ 75,000$ of adjusted gross income, and they are completely eliminated at $\$ 115,000$ of income. Only the credit for adoption of special needs children is scheduled to continue indefinitely. The other adoption breaks expire at the end of 2001.
Many people will welcome these new tax provisions. But to make the most of them, you'll proba-

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CNC Looks To Plans For The Future As The Community Moves Toward The 21st Century
(continued from page I) and members Marty O'Brien, Peg Bradley, Ken Stone, David Whelan, Bill McCabe, Edna Kelly, John Dillon, Bill Galvin, Judy Brennan, Don Haska, John Iacoi, Dan Kovacevic, Danny Ryan and Kate McDonough.

Representatives of AT\&T Wireless Services presented the company's intention to locate its technology atop 30 Monument Square, formerly Charlestown High School, now condominiums. AT\&T currently has nine antennae at the Schrafft Center.

Six antennae, placed in two sets of three 2 -feet tall, 3 -inch-deep and 4 -inchwide boxes, are proposed for the Monument Square site to serve as one of AT\&T's initial 40 Bostonarea wireless sites. Representatives described AT\&T's product as advanced intelli-
gence which has text- and voice-message abilities.

Council members expressed concerns about how AT\&T Wireless Services would impact on Charlestown, including the affect of the antennae on the historical and residential Monument Square and the precedent set for competing companies looking for other Charlestown sites in the future.

The issue was referred to the Basic Services Committee Chairman Bill Galvin who will hold a meeting to discuss abutters' concems with AT\&T representatives tonight, Thursday, Jan. 16 at the American Legion Hall, 23 Adams St., at 7 p.m.

Representatives of the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club staff and board of directors requested the council's support in working with the community on the
upcoming \$4 million-renovation of its High Street facility.

According to Clubhouse Director Jerry Steimel, the Charlestown building has had no major renovations since its 1918 reconstruction. Abutters and community organizations have already expressed concerns for the Boys \& Girls Club intentions for the site. The council is expected to assist in the community discussion and design process through public meetings with abutters, neighbors and club representatives.

While Attorney Pat Sweeney explained that they have the footprint for construction plans and the program space that must fit into it, they have not yet hired an architect. CNC members asked for specific timelines as quickly as possible. The issue was refer-
red to the Development Committee which will host a Tuesday, Jan. 21 public meeting at the club's High Street building at 7 p.m.

In committee reports, Public Safety Committee Co-Chairman John Dillon reported that 242 calls were made to police in December. There were 24 arrests, six of which were drug-related.

Cunha reported that the Development Committee will hold a Thursday, Jan. 23 meeting on the latest delay of the redevelopment of Parcel R-87, which borders Tremont and Prospect streets and Lowney Way.

The original Jan. 9 meeting was cancelled, Cunha said, by the Public Facilities Department which was expected to redevelop the site beginning this year. However, the Boston Redevelopment Authority has regained
responsibility for Parcel R87, and plans are once aggin uncertain. The Jan. 23 meeting will be held at the American Legion Hall at 7 p.m.
Basic Service Committee Chairman Galvin reported the committee's recommendation to oppose the location of a takeout pizza and sub shop at 219 Bunker Hill St. This was based on the concerns of abutters as to cooking odors blowing into their homes, it becoming a high school and teen hangout, and not being compatible with new residences and business neighbors. The council approved the committee's recommendation. Council Chairman Peter Looney announced that members are encouraged to participate on any of the council's 14 existing committees. Danny Ryan was appointed to chair the

In old business, Billboard Chairman Ken Stone reported that Murphy Communications had resubmitted a request to present its plans to locate a billboard in the Sullivan Square area of Charlestown to the council. In December, that request was not supported by the members. Council members pheld their decision not to consider locating any new billboards in any part of the community.

Looney was also asked to follow up on any development on the reconstruction of Bunker Hill Street by the city. The communiy has been asking the city for an update since last summer.
