## MWRA Looking At Sites For Sewer Project

The Massachusetts Re sources Authority (MWRA) is currently evaluating two areas in Charlestown as sites for its Combined Sewer Overflow project. MWRA representative David Cupiak presented the
preliminary site findings for two areas, one near the Schrafft Center in Sullivan Square, another near the Tobin Bridge and the Navy Yard's Gate 5. The presentation was made at a Jan. 30 public meeting facilitated by the Charlestown Neigh-
borhood Council Environmental Committee.
Two screening and disinfection facilities, typically one-story 40 -by-40-foot structures, will treat Charlestown's two sewer overflows at two different local (continued on page 11)

## Voke And Birmingham Meet With MDC Regarding Skating Rink

State officials and hockey advocates held several discussions last week relative to the status of the shut-down MDC Rink in Charlestown. Confirming the fears of many, the MDC has announced that the local rink will remain closed for the rest of this skating season.

After meeting with Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Thomas Birmingham, MDC Commissioner David Balfour told Charlestown Youth Hockey Association (CYHA ) officials, including Dan McGoff, John Tobin and Tim O'Connell, that the record level of snow that has fallen, and subsequently accumulated on the rink roof, caused the supporting rafters to buckle.
While the MDC tried to make temporary accommodations, the stress caused the wood beams to de-
teriorate to a condition beyond repair. With the safety of kids skating underneath foremost on his mind, Balfour said the shut-down was necessary.
Talks, however, between the MDC and Voke and Birmingham did produce some encouraging news. The state will allow the MDC to proceed under emergency rules, thereby saving months on the process of repaining the rink. Be cause of this, Voke and Birmingham have been assured that the rink can again be operational in September.

Concerned, however, that some other rink failure could preclude such an opening, Voke and Birmingham have been assured that the rink's structure and operating systems will be inspected for repair and if necessary, replaced. Balfour has also pledged to
look at the possibility of building a new rink, if conditions, financing and available land warrant such a project. He will be working closely with Voke and Birmingham to do an indepth and timely review on all of the options.
In the meantime, the MDC is continuing to work to make the temporary relocation of Charlestown's hockey programs more workable. In addition to getting the CYHA program into the Steriti Rink in the North End, the MDC has opened that rink's snack bar for operation by the CYHA, which uses the proceeds to help subsidize the program. Additionally, the MDC will allow the tennis courts next to Steriti to be used to alleviate parking problems.

Voke promised to continue to update residents on the rink renovations.

## USS Constitution Museum Announces <br> 'Kids Free’ Program

Kids 16 and under can now swing in hammocks, hoist sails and engage in video battle at the helm of "Old Ironsides" for FREE, when accompanied by an adult, every school vacation week as well as on weekends year-round at the USS Constitution Museum.

Thanks to generous grants from the William E. and Bertha E. Schrafft Charitable Trust, the Mass. Society of the Cincinnati and the Yawkey Foundation, the museum's "Kids Free" program, in place for weekends since 1991, has now been expanded to include school vacations in 1996.

The museum, located in the Boston National Historical Park at the Charles-
town Navy Yard, and just yards away from USS Constitution, is dedicated to interpreting and preserving the heritage of the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. Interctive exhibits allow visitors to enjoy such experiences as loading and firing a cannon and reliving The Great Chase, Old Ironsides' first encounter with the British in the War of 1812.
Exhibitions also detail the restoration and preservation work now almost completed on Constitution. A video tour of Old Ironsides gives visitors a chance to see how the ship looks when fully-rigged and to explore her decks.
"Around the World Aboard 'Old Ironsides' 1844-1846'" chronicles

Constitution's diplomatic voyage. Artifacts representative of what the captain and crew encountered during the ship's 852 -day, 52,321 -mile world cruise are on display as well as original joumals kept by an officer and three crew members describing their trip and their colorful mates.

(continued from page 8) man, served as master of ceremonies.
In his invocation, Rev, Daniel J. Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, praised Birmingham and spoke of the blessings that have been received from the activities of the LFC staff, administration, volunteers and parents, noting "all of us have been touched by the labor of love extended to God's special people."

The Boston City Council was represented by its president, James Kelly, AtLarge Councillor Francis "Mickey" Roache and District One Councillor Diane J. Modica. Roache related a personal story of his cousin who is retarded, and the "great work of LFC." Kelly and Modica both praised LFC and congratulated Birmingham, presenting him with a citation.
Mayor Thomas M. Menino thanked "Jack [Millerick] and the rest of the staff at LFC for the job you do for God's special children." He referred to Birmingham as being "part of compassionate government," adding that "we have to have people who think about statistics," but "you need people like Tom Birmingham to step up to the plate to help." Menino also praised Bunker Hill Council No. $62, \mathrm{~K}$. of C. for its service to this community.
Mon O'Shea, acting president of Bunker Hill Community College, congratulated Bimingham from the college. He stated that it was "fitting that LFC honor Birmingham," a caring person who "has the right values and whose decisions will reflect these values."
A welcome was extended by LFC Executive Director John D. "Jack" Millerick. He reflected on himself and Birmingham coming from the same generation - "the generation that went to college . . which was something beyond the dreams of their parents who sent them there - parents who worked
with their hands in the 40 's and 50 's to build what has become known as 'the middle class.' ... This generation, called the baby boomers, is supposed to be the best educated and the most affluent generation in American history.

Millerick went on to say that a portion of this generation has turned away from corporate America to "creating a better society." He said that Birmingham was chosen as LFC's "Man of the Year" last July, long before there was even a rumor that he would be President of the Senate. He noted that Birmingham is "going to do an enormous amount of good in the position that he now holds."

It was Birmingham and his able staff, said Millerick, who worked cooperatively with LFC "to make our prototype program for high quality early childhood education at Bunker Hill Community College a realty. His selection for the honor was "based on his unique approach and very real ability to hammer through things . . . with the intellect and ability to address the very problems of our internal society . . . He is a man who has eamed respect."

Millerick then presented Birmingham with an engraving of the State House created by local artist Tom Gorsuch.

Birmingham, in expressing his thanks for the award, stated that he was "truly honored and humbled . . . it is truly meaningful to me." He noted that some of the honors given to him are more in his "institutional capacity" rather than in his "personal capacity" and this particular award was "a great honor."

He , as did Millerick spoke about the "American dream." "Hard-working people work with their hands to achieve a middle class standard of living, to buy a house, send the kids to college and look forward to retire with dignity. Birmingham went on to say

that the "dream is becoming a dream only in the worse sense of an untenable fantasy."

Birmingham told the gathering that "another element of our American tradition is that of caring for one another, and this is becoming lost in this era." He spoke of "community spirit - caring for one another and for the most needy amongst us - as having been the hallmark of what makes Charlestown such a unique community."

Calling the people of LFC "shining lights" for the opportunities they have afforded the youngsters and adults who are their clients, Birmingham stated that "it is absolutely impossible for us to put a dollar value on what it is worth to give a human being a sense of dignity, a sense of selfworth, a sense of being a participant in society." He praised the leadership and
creativity of Millerick, especially in breaking down barriers and prejudices. He also spoke of the efforts of Kevin O'Halloran, LFC deputy director, and Conway for contributing to the community.

Birmingham called LFC "a family" with himself "a distant relation" and told of his pride in the honor, following his colleague Rep. Richard A. Voke, House Majority Leader, who was the recipient of the first LFC "Man of the Year"
award.
Voke reflected on his receiving the award as "a night I'll never forget because it meant so very much to me that you would accept me into your family of friends." He spoke of Cardinal Cushing who would visit St. Coletta's School and work with "God's special children" whenever he felt he needed to be rejuvenated.

Voke called Birmingham a "unique guy someone who has convic-
tions . . . someone who feels deeply about his views . . someone who is willing to work for them and really willing to be there for the working person and, in particular, for children."
He concluded by stating: "I think you have made a wonderful choice here tonight. Tom is someone I enjoy working with. someone I consider a friend and someone who'l be serving you in the district in the future for many years to come."

## MWRA Looking At Sites For Sewer Project

continued from page 1) fions. The facilities are designed to handle the overflow of home and business sanitary sewage and storm-water runoffs during wet weather. Currently, combined sewage and rainwater back up and flow into the Boston Harbor. The facilities will reduce harbor pollution by treating the sewer's "floatable materials" to Charlesown's Mystic River and Little Mystic Channel.

According to Cupiak, approximately $\$ 2$ million of an estimated $\$ 370$-million Combined Sewer Overflow project will be spent in Charlestown by 2008. Every Boston neighborhood will be affected by the program, Cupiak said, helping to relieve the city's more-than 100 -year-old single-pipe sewers.
Charlestown's facilities will likely include screens, disinfection and dechlorination equipment and dewatering pumps. The MWRA is studying seven sites on either side of the Tobin Bridge, from the Barry Playground to inside the Navy Yard, and six in the area of the Schrafft Center and Bunker Hill Street.

Cupiak said the areas being studied over the last six months were ranked based on each site's potential for neighborhood impacts, including engineering environmental, community and economic concerns. Three of the seven sites evaluated near the Tobin Bridge and two of the six studied near the Schrafft Center were identified as "more favorable" than others.

We identified the top sites as those we will continue to look at," Cupiak said, "but that doesn't eliminate any of the sites completely."

Near the Tobin Bridge, the top four sites considered to have fewer impacts are the William J. Barry Playground on Medford Street, a vacant lot on Massport property under the bridge, a vacant 2.25 acre site accessed from Fifth and 16th streets in the Navy Yard and a second vacant lot accessible from 16th and Chelsea streets

Near the Schrafft Center, the two morefavorable sites are a vacant lot along Charles and Main streets with a parking lot behind the former Bunker Hill School and a partially vacant industrial site on

Medford Street.
The facilities would require at least a half acre to house the building and provide a buffer area. The buildings would sit atop the overflow pipe treating floatables with chlorine and the chlorine with sodium bisulfate. Cupiak said that little would happen outside of the structures, with flows contained inside, except for trucks similar to garbage trucks coming in to pick up screenings after wet storms and delivery rucks with the treating solutions.

According to Cupiak, odors and leaks would be contained inside the fenced, alarmed and locked buildings. The faciities would probably be used approximately 15 to 20 days during the year, depending on the number and size of storms.

No sites have been officially selected, however, residents at the Jan. 30 meeting commented on their concerns about how environmentally safe the facilities would be, that certain places, such as parks, will be off-limits, that MWRA compensate Charlestown for the impacts and that the buildings add architecturally to the neigh-
borhood.
Cupiak said the project is in the earliest stages. The MWRA filed its "Interim Assessment of Facility Siting" report to the Mass. Environmental Protection Agency last month. Further site evaluation would include public review through October, with final recommendations for the particular sites to come in April 1997. Design would be ongoing until construction, expected near 2005, Cupiak said.
Hundreds of Charlestown property owners who could be affected by the project were notified in writing. Cupiak said that questions about future plans for property and whether an owner would consider selling are standard practice in order to identify all possible constraints surrounding particular sites the MWRA might consider for the facilities.
Ongoing community meetings will be scheduled for residents to ask questions and make comments. Committee Chairperson 'Judy Brennan said she will arrange an April meeting to receive answers from the MWRA on residents' current concerns.
