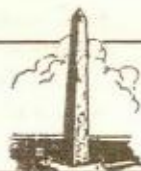

★ **Traffic Tied Up . . .** A truck leaking fuel spread its hazardous material from the Austin Street underpass on Rutherford Avenue over the North Washington Street Bridge into the North Station area shortly after 10 a.m. on July 15. The resulting traffic tangle and environmental concerns haunted the city, and particularly the town, until almost 2:30 p.m.

The spill from the truck, which is yet unidentified, was rated a Level Three hazardous materials situation because of the length of the spill, said David

Walsh, Boston Fire Department spokesperson. It was later noted that there appeared to be no damage to the environment, however, the major concern was the safety of the public as the leak was said to be the cause of several minor accidents.

'The Red Shirts Are Back!

Boston Youth Clean-Up Corps (BYCC) "Red Shirts" are back in action for the 11th consecutive summer. Equipped with the simple tools of their trade - rakes, shovels, brooms and trash bags - a virtual army of Boston teens are on the streets with a mission to spruce up neighborhood parks, playgrounds and vacant lots by clearing away tons of refuse and overgrown vegetation.

The first official day of the BYCC program was on July 8. After one day of training, on what the

BYCC crews call "Super Tuesday," they began their clean-up tasks. That's good news for the many citizens across the city who look forward to the arrival of Red Shirts in their neighborhood to clean up local areas.

"It's satisfying to see the progress these crews accomplish in just one day as they fan out across the city," said Mayor Thomas M. Menino. "People can see the environmental improvements right away," the mayor added.

Thanks to record-level support from Menino and

his "Hire A Kid This Summer" campaign, this summer the BYCC will employ more youths than ever - 3,700. Of those, some 2,100 are a part of the 112 clean-up crews that are based in each city neighborhood. Last year the Red Shirts removed 850 tons of trash from 3,722 sites.

Another 1,600 are working at community-based non-profit organizations in professions such as photography, video production, marketing, data entry, bookkeeping, equine care and day care. Most of

the youths are between 14 and 17 years old and work 25 hours per week at \$5 per hour.

Menino calls the BYCC "a model program that provides not only valuable work experience for youth, but also a tremendous service to the city of Boston."

The Mayor's Office "Trash Attack Hotline" will be in service throughout the summer. City residents who wish to voice concerns about vacant lots and other sites that need cleaning can call the Hotline at 635-4500, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Menino said, "When we launched ReadBoston last October, our mission was to unite the entire community to help our young children learn to read. Today, this Storymobile series represents the best of what our ReadBoston literacy campaign is all about - public and private groups and individual citizens coming together to promote and support reading among our children."

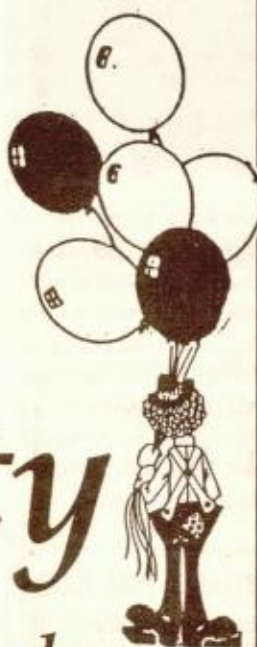

Money matters

EMPLOYEE THEFT: HOW TO SPOT IT

We all want to believe the best of people, especially those we work with. But employee theft happens, and more frequently than you hear or read about. It's believed that only a small percentage of cases of employee dishonesty are reported and prosecuted. Too often, the employee is just dismissed and moves on to steal from someone else. In other cases, especially where financial controls are weak, the employee may steal small amounts for years without being detected.

There are many things you can do to spot employee theft in your business. Have an inquiring mind, ask lots of questions, and never accept answers that don't make sense. Spend time each month monitoring your financial results. Look for inconsistencies, such as inventory declining in a slow sales month or excessive customer returns. Listen to customer complaints about late deliveries or missing items, and don't accept "computer problems" as an excuse. If you know your business, you don't have to be an accounting expert to sense when something is wrong.

You could also spot-check your accounting records by reviewing one category each month. For example, you might scan the check register to see just what payments are being made. Look for missing check numbers and ask to see any voided checks. Another month you might review the payroll log or look over the records of returned items. Look for multiple entries of similar items or suspicious customer names.

Finally, watch your employees for changes in behavior or spending that seems to be beyond their means. And beware of an employee who insists on doing all the detail work and never takes a vacation. It could be the sign of someone with something to hide.

In my next column, I'll discuss ways to prevent employee theft.
