St. John's Episcopal Church Welcomes New Rector

After a number of years of working with interim rectors and supply priests, St. John's Episcopal Church finally has a permanent rector, the Rev. Laurie Rofinot of Somerville.

Rofinot most recently served as the assistant rector of St. Anne's-in-the-Fields in Lincoln, and as clergy associate at St. James' Church in Cambridge. A native of Seattle, she attended college in Minneapolis, where she met her husband, Patrick Michaels, who serves as music director and organist at St. James Church. They

Rofinot's selection was the culmination of a search process that took almost a year. St. John's has, in the past five years, seen its congregation grow to a regular attendance of almost 50 throughout the winter. This number includes some 20 children, nearly half of whom have been born to members of the congregation in the last five years.

Three separate Sunday School classes are planned for the coming year; a nursery, a class for 3- to 5-year olds, and one for 6-yearolds and up.

"I'm hoping to be a spiritual resource for the community, someone who can help the parish articulate its own dreams and visions and desire to follow God's calling," Rofinot said. "The congregation seems as though it's poised for growth at this point, and people are eager and excited about that possibility. So I hope to help the parish to be a warm, welcoming and inviting community."

Rofinot, who attended the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, and the congregation plan to extend that hospitality in part through community service.

"All the parishes that I have served have been focused around service," said Rofinot. "Some of those services centered on the (continued on page 5)

'Boston: The Way It Was' - The City In 1930-50

"Boston: The Way It Was" tells the story of a dynamic but divided city, at a time when the Custom House tower was the tallest building in town, foot-long hot dogs cost a nickel and trolleys cost a dime, and Mayor Curley was running the city from a jail cell.

In this companion to public broadcaster WGBH Boston's Emmy Award-winning series of the same name, author and producer Lorie Conway takes us to the famous hot-spots of Scollay Square, the smoke-filled but swank jazz clubs of the South End, Braves Field (better known as The Wig-Wam), and the once magical, romantic world of a place called Revere Beach.

In the 1930s and 40s. the lifestyle of Boston's community was being shaped by the effects of immigration, the Great Depression, and World War II. The streets were safer then, and the pleasures simpler. These defining decades are portrayed in "Boston: The Way It Was" through over 160 rare archival photos and stories about some of the most colorful Bostonians, including Lolly Hopkins, avid fan and Tootsie Roll supplier to the Boston Braves; Big Band drummer William "Baggy" Grant; and Emmett Kelly, famed Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey circus clown. "You learn so much by looking back,"

Conway explains. "'Boston: The Way It Was' evokes not only memories and nostalgia for the people who lived through it, but it also helps younger generations understand this period."

"Boston: The Way It Was" brings the past to life in an overview of The City, c. 1930-50; a tour through The Old Neighborhood; rarely seen photos of The People's Mayor - James Michael Curley; a look at Boston during wartime; a portrait of the lost streets of Scollay Square; a trip back to the nightclub era of That Big Band Sound; and me-

morable views of The Boston Garden, Revere Beach and The Braves. With a forward by Boston College History Professor Thomas O'Connor and photos from the Leslie Jones collection of the Boston Public Library and street photographer Jules Aarons. "Boston: The Way It Was" provides a wealth of memories of the city during one of its richest and most vital eras.


BNN To Air Dunny Cup Finals And Skills Competition

GIVE YOURSELF AN INSURANCE CHECKUP

An annual insurance checkup makes good financial sense, and you can do much of it yourself. The goal is for you, with the assistance of your insurance advisor, to identify and obtain adequate coverage without paying premiums for unnecessary protection.

- Life Insurance: Most insurance professionals recommend coverage of five to ten times annual earnings. If both spouses work, you may need two policies. Whole, variable and universal life policies combine insurance coverage with an investment component. If you only want insurance, consider term life. Business owners may need life insurance to fund buy-sell agreements with partners or other shareholders, and to pay estate taxes.
- Disability Insurance: This is important coverage during your working years, but it's often overlooked. Insurers often limit coverage to 60% of earnings. The best rates can often be found through professional associations, trade groups, and similar organizations.
- Auto Insurance: Take a close look at your liability coverage. For example, if your limit for property damage is only \$25,000, and you accidentally destroy expensive property, your personal assets may be at risk. If an accident results in personal injuries, your financial exposure could be even greater. If premium dollars are tight, consider increasing the deductible so that you can afford higher liability limits.
- Homeowner's Insurance: With recent fluctuations in the real estate market, it's possible that your home is now under - or over - insured. You generally want coverage equal to the current replacement cost of your property, not its original cost.
- Unnecessary Insurance: Generally, mortgage insurance and credit life insurance are very expensive. If you're worried about how your debts will be paid after your death, consider increasing your existing life insurance coverage. You might also purchase a low-cost term policy specifically for this purpose.

But to us growing up, the parish was very much the center of our lives. I'm sure the parish youth will miss Father Coyne's Christian enthusiasm for serving both his God and People of God.

However, even as people say goodbye to such a good and decent priest, St. Catherine's is being blessed with one great replacement as the parish's new pastor in Father Jim DiPerri. Father DiPerri just left the Sacred Heart Parish in North Quincy. He's another priest in the mode of Father Coyne, full of energy and ready to serve. He grew up in Southie and back during the anti-busing era, I remember his parents Mary and Jim fighting for the rights of their neighborhood. Jim was a kid back then but he obviously learned well from his parents that we must stand up for our beliefs and be ready to fight for them. Father DiPerri will

be missed at the Sacred Heart and I think Charlestown is in for a real treat.

I can remember last year during the height of the controversy over the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Southie when Father DiPerri gave a strong sermon on the right of the people of South Boston to stand up for their Catholic beliefs and organize their own parade. If those who disagreed didn't like it, they could always go over to the Cambridge parade. Normally, most of us forget the Sunday sermons too fast, but that one had people buzzing for days. One neighbor of mine said he was too political talking about the parade, but I disagreed. He was talking about Catholics standing up for their values and the pulpit was the most appropriate site to say so.

Father DiPerri also has Townie roots. His paternal grandmother came to America over 70 years ago and settled in St. Catherine's Parish. He has pride in his roots and pride in his faith. He stands up and speaks out. He will be good for St. Catherine's and good for Charlestown. One good man leaves and another takes his place. All things in their times, eh?
