

Come On Along And Give A Helping Hand To The Bunker Hill Day Celebration!

Residents, business persons and representatives of community organizations are invited to attend the meeting of the Bunker Hill Day Parade/Commemorative Committee at 3 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 9. Chief Marshal of the 1997 Bunker Hill Day Parade, CDR. Michael C. Beck, USN, commanding officer of USS Constitution, will host the meeting in his conference room on the second floor of Building 5 (rear), Boston National Historical Park, Charlestown Navy Yard.

This year's Bunker Hill Day celebration, which commemorates the 222nd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, is dedicated both in honor of the 200th birthday of "Old Ironsides" and the centennial of Charlestown being her homeport, and is Charlestown's kick off for **Constitution**'s Bicentennial.

The committee is reaching out to you and your friends for your assistance and cooperation in planning and organizing this significant celebration, the highlight of which will be the parade, which is hoped will be doubled in size.

Image Engineering Co. of Somerville will be producing a Laser Show to be shown in the Charlestown Navy Yard, based on the history of "old Ironsides," and capped off with fireworks. Ryan Fieldhouse Robbed And Vandalized – Charlestown Children Are The Victims

The board of the Charlestown Little League worked with the Boston Parks and Recreation Department for over two years to plan for and renovate the fieldhouse at Ryan Park, located at Sullivan Square. Two years ago those renovations were completed and sparkling new bathrooms, an area for a concession stand and storage facilities were provided, and this gave the impetus to the board to move on to expand the Little League program.



Sometime this fall, persons, as yet unknown, broke into the fieldhouse and stole brass fittings, faucets, copper tubing and the water meter from the bathrooms.

They also smashed the toilets and sinks. In addition, Little League equipment, valued at over \$3,000, was taken from the site where it had been placed in storage for the winter.



Tommy Makem To Appear In Concert In Charlestown On Feb. 14

Tommy Makem, also known as The Bard of Armagh, is regarded by many as the "Godfather" of Irish Music.

Armed with his banjo, tin whistle, poetry, stagecraft and his magnificent baritone voice, Makem has been mesmerizing audiences for more than three decades. He has expanded and reshaped the boundaries of Irish Culture and infused a pride in that culture in the Irish and a quest for knowledge of that culture in countless others.

As the son of legendary folk singer and folk-lorist Sarah Makern, he grew up surrounded by musical tradition stretching back through the early mists of Irish civilization. From those rich beginnings he drew lore, inspiration and strong ambition which has carried him to international fame.

Like many young Irish men and women. Makem

saw his future in America and so he emigrated in 1956. He settled in Dover, N.H., and Dover is still home.

Makem's ambition to perform took him to New York where, after a brief, but rewarding career in live television, summer stock and off Broadway plays, he teamed up with Liam, Paddy and Tom Clancy. Together with The Clancy Brothers, he appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show and they soon became the four most famous Irish men in the world.

In 1969, Makem left the Clancy Brothers to pursue a solo career and immediately sold out The Felt Forum in Madison Square Garden in New York. His popularity soared and he went on to sell-out concert tours throughout the world.

Makem continued with his concert career on a solo basis until July of 1975, when he was at a festival

Theft And Vandalism At Ryan Fieldhouse Impacts Little League

Board President Ed Greatorex and Commissioner Wayne Davis were obviously heartbroken as they spoke of the theft and vandalism. Both said that this could not have been the work of youngsters as sledgehammers and tools would have been needed to go after the plumbing supplies and equipment. They felt that the vandalism may have been a cover-up for the theft, and they noted that only the "good stuff" had been stolen.

The two men could not comprehend how anyone could do such damage to the facility and then steal equipment belonging to the league that serves several hundred Charlestown youngsters, and this year will include a Senior League for 13- to 15-year-olds.

According to Jim "Stretch" Walsh, regional administrator for the Parks Department, they will do everything they can to see that the league will have use of the fieldhouse by the opening of the season at the end of April. He said it is being handled as an emergency and would try to see that at least one toilet was made available for each sex.

In the meantime, Little League is faced

with considerable expense before the season even gets underway. Among the items stolen were 10-dozen new balls, 12 new aluminum bats, four catcher's mitts and four catcher's masks, umpire equipment including chest protectors, shin pads and masks, three sets of bases, and the generator used to power the pitching machine - just to name some of the items lost.

In addition, the concession stand, the income from which went to the league, was badly hit. The gas grill, crock pots, a coffee maker and new paper products were taken. An investment of funds will have to be made to make the stand operational.

Also, hockey sticks and nets, goalie gloves and equipment belonging to the Bryan McGonagle Memorial Tournament Committee were stolen.

Bunker Hill Street Reconstruction Scheduled To Begin In Early Summer

In a letter to Peter Looney, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, Joseph F. Casazza, commissioner of the city's Public Works Department, (PWD), provided an update of the reconstruction progress on Bunker Hill Street.

Casazza wrote: "The selection of the street lighting system had been the final issue to be resolved and the PWD is proceeding with the advertisement of that contract.

"Following my attendance at a Neighborhood council forum, it was agreed that the PWD would consult with independent lighting engineers to determine the adequacy of the gas lamps, electrified colonial lanterns and acorn fixtures. The consultants were in agreement with our initial assessment that electrified colonial and acorn fixtures provided acceptable illumination on both the sidewalk and roadway. However, gas fixtures are grossly inadequate in illuminating to the center of the roadway, even with reduced spacing.

"Therefore, in the interest of public safety, the city is proceeding with plans for the installaion of electrified decorative lamps as part of the reconstruction effort.

Mayor Thomas Menino has directed the use of the "Victorian" style luminear, a distinctive light which is found only on the

(continued from page 1) draulic wheelchair lift and all the appropriate accessories for safely carrying at-risk people with physical disabilities.

clusively to provide transportation for the 15 people at LFC. It transported them to work, social events, job interviews, medical appointments, etc. This also affects their social programming, leaving them unable to attend functions, restaurants, movies, malls, etc.

According to Jack Millerick, LFC's executive director, the young people will be without transportation for at least six weeks. He went on to say that it takes 30 days for the insurance company to deter-

mine that the van won't be recovered and to issue payment. Then time will be needed to purchase another van and outfit it for wheelchair accessibility.

This theft has created several serious problems. For the 15 individuals in wheelchairs, the inability to be transported to work has left them isolated and their primary care families have had to stay home to care for these people or find other means to care

one of finances. Millerick said that renting a van for the six weeks is "out of the question," as the cost of renting such a van is hundreds of dollars each day. As it is, LFC is facing


approximately a \$25,000 shortfall between what the insurance company will probably settle on for the stolen van and the cost to purchase and equip a new one.







Commissioner Paul Alconada stated that this is the result of six communities who are threatening to leave the South Shore Midget Football Conference (SSMFC) because of the Charlestown Pop Warner program. The primary reason of their threat is the unwillingness to travel to the Charlestown football facility, "as it is located in the housing project." The six communities who have petitioned the SSMFC for release from the league believe that the Charlestown High School football facility is not a safe environment to play football and fear the threat of vandalism to their vehicles. The stigma imposed on this community for many a year continues to be a problem in suburbia,

Representing the Charlestown Pop Warner Board of Directors at this meeting were members Edward Grace and John Taglilatela. Speaking on behalf of the Charlestown Pop Warner program, Taglilatela stated that he was appalled by the statements and conduct exhibited by the Commissioner and league officials. He continued that this was not only an attack on the Charlestown Pop Warner program, but an attack on the entire Charlestown community. Furthermore, he warned that this program will do whatever is necessary within the law, to allow Charlestown Pop Warner the right to participate in the SSMFC and the right to host football games at Charlestown High School.

EMPLOYEE BUSINESS EXPENSES – WHAT'S DEDUCTIBLE?

As an employee, you may be able to deduct certain expenses if they are necessary for your job. Expenses that may be deductible include travel and entertainment expenses, costs of using your car for business, employee education expenses, union and professional dues, and costs of trade or professional publications. These expenses are only deductible if you itemize deductions and then only to the extent that they exceed 2% of your adjusted gross income.

Generally, you can only deduct travel, meals and entertainment, and automobile expenses if you're not reimbursed by your employer, or if you receive a flat rate reimbursement that your employer includes in your W-2 income. If you're required to provide your employer with documentation and receipts as you would for the IRS, the reimbursements you receive will not be included in your W-2 income and you cannot deduct them. Expenses that may qualify for the deduction include those for business travel away from home overnight, transportation between different work locations in the general area of your home, and business meals and entertainment. Only 50% of the cost of meals and entertainment is deductible. whether you're entertaining business clients or dining alone while traveling on business. You can also claim a deduction for unreimbursed employee education expenses if they meet certain tests. The education must be required by your employer or by law in order to keep your current salary or position, or it must maintain and improve the skills needed in your present job. However, education expenses are not deductible if they help to qualify you for a new trade or business, even if you don't intend to enter that business. Deductible expenses include costs for tuition, books, supplies and certain related transportation expenses.
