Harborpark Day Celebration In The Navy Yard On Sunday

The ninth annual Harborpark Day Celebration, sponsored by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, will be held on Sunday, Sept. 19 from noon to 6 p.m. at Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

As in past years, the Harborpark Day Celebration will be held in conjunction with the annual "Chowdafest," sponsored by Horizons For Youth, a nonprofit organization that provides outdoor education, counseling and camping programs for inner-city children in need. Twenty Boston area restaurants will

The admission fee for visitors is \$6 for adults and \$3 for senior citizens and children under 12. All proceeds will be used to support Horizons For Youth.



HOMEOWNERS SHOULD KEEP AN EYE ON THEIR ESCROW ACCOUNT

Most mortgage lenders require homeowners to pay into mortgage escrow accounts to ensure that payments for real estate taxes, insurances and other costs are made. Lenders often require a cushion in the accounts in case a mortgage payment arrives late or a bill is larger than expected. But under a 1975 federal law, a lender can't keep a cushion larger than one-sixth of the homeowner's annual bills. Some mortgage documents stipulate smaller cushions.

Many mortgage companies still ask homeowners to place more money than necessary in escrow accounts. There is no reason, however, why cushions in escrows should carry excessive padding. Escrows are only intended to be a safety device for both you and your lender.

Figuring your correct escrow payment can be confusing because money goes into escrow each month and leaves as bills come due. The best way: Total annual property tax and insurance bills, then divide by 6. That's the maximum allowed by law.

To make sure everything is on the up and up, grab your calculator and sit down with your annual summary of escrow account activity. Your lender should provide you with a statement every year. It will show how much money you are putting in per month and how much is going out in insurance, tax and other payments.

Unfortunately, these statements can be difficult to understand. However, if the numbers don't seem to add up, and the explanation you receive from your lender still leaves you puzzled, for a fee, there are a number of mortgage monitoring firms that will examine your escrow account for you. Charges can range from \$75 to more than \$300 depending on the complexity of the case. Some firms will provide a free consultation. Others offer the option of being paid a percentage of any recouped money; typically charging around 35 percent.

To register, girls must be accompanied by a parent or guardian and should bring the annual membership dues of \$6 and checks are acceptable.



Designation of the Edward "Gus" Whelan Park in Thompson Square took place on Sept. 7. Over 75 friends and dignitaries joined members of the Whelan family for the occasion at which a presentation of a plaque was made to Mr. Whelan's widow, Kay.

The ceremony followed a unanimous vote by the Parks Commission designating the island outside One Thompson Square in honor of Mr. Whelan. The two islands in the square are scheduled to be transformed into parks as part of a project begun by the Charlestown Preservation Society over seven years ago. Construction is sche-

duled to begin in early spring 1994, with completion in October.

Mr. Whelan is being honored by the city for an act of heroism that took place on Nov. 9, 1960. While intervening in an assault on a young woman at the Thompson Square train station on that date, he pursued the assailants, apprehended them and brought them to the former police station in City Square where he suffered a heart attack and died. He was 42 years of age.

In recognition of this act of courage, former Mayor Raymond Flynn in 1990 allocated the island, site of the former train station, to be named for Whelan. Acting Mayor Thomas Menino has personally taken on the task of ensuring that the park be completed. Among those in atten-





Ribbon Cutting Ceremony Marks The Opening Of The Northbound Central Artery/North Area Tunnel

A gathering of residents, elected officials and highway and transportation representatives stood at the entrance to the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) tunnel on Rutherford Avenue on Sept. 13 to mark the opening of the northbound tunnel carrying traffic onto the Tobin Bridge.

It represented the culmination of 15 years of planning by the state with significant input from Charlestown residents who united under the name of the North Area Task Force (NATF). This group has worked countless hours to see that the community had a strong voice in the planning and execution of the highway system in the City Square area that was carried out to remove one of the most dangerous intersections in the country on the ramps above the square.

James J. Kerasiotes, secretary of Transportation and Construction for the state acted as master of ceremonies. He and the speakers on the program praised the tremendous input of the NATF members along with the support of House Majority Leader Rep. Richard A. Voke, working together with project head Ed Barr to solve the problems that arose.

Lt. Gov. A. Paul Cellucci, who also praised Voke, spoke of the project as a tribute to the people of the community and those in the transportation sector. He said that all are pleased with the changes taking place - the newly opened space, the prospects of development, the temporary loop ramps under construction and the demolition of the ramps at City Square late next year that will connect Charlestown with its waterfront and the City Square Park which will be started in the spring.

At the outset, Voke thanked his colleagues in government and then, looking out into the audience, stated that there was a story on each person's face of their participation in the process. He added that the group was tenacious, they did their research and they fought for every aspect of the project. He noted that "the frosting on the cake" is the great park planned for City Square, adding that the residents are responsible for the design.

Voke went on to say that being their representative was only expressing their will. He told the gathering: "This is your day — this is your success," adding that "participatory government is the way it works."

Boston City Councillor and state Sen. Robert Travaglini noted that "this project is a classic example of what good government is all about." He noted that the people of Charlestown work very hard to make the town a better place to live.

Also on the speaking program was Laurinda T. Bedingfield, commissioner of the Mass. Highway Department. She thanked the team who "brought the project in under budget and on time."

Speaking on behalf of the NATF was Charlestown resident Ken Stone, the group's co-chairman.

After welcoming the officials, Stone stated: "Charlestown has waited a long time for this day! What we see here today with the northbound opening is the result of a successful, long relationship between a community and a state agency. The NATF has worked with the Mass. Highway Department during the last 15 years to maintain a public participation process in order to find solutions to issues that provide benefits to all. While we have had our differences of opinion now and then,





compel a billboard to be removed in the general vicinity of any new billboards. The petition for the change to the Boston Zoning Code will be taken up at a public hearing by the Zoning Commission of the city of Boston on Wednesday, Sept. 22 at 1:30 p.m. in Room 900 on the ninth floor of Boston City Hall.

For a number of years, groups in Dorchester and other Boston neighborhoods have been seeking more stringent action at the state level regarding billboards. More than three years ago, neighborhood groups working with the city identified more than 200 Boston billboards, both along major thoroughfares and in residential and commercial districts, which appear out of compliance with state regulations administered by the Commonwealth's Outdoor Advertising Board.

However, the Board has not taken significant action on these 200 billboards. Recently, it approved seven new billboard faces along I-93 and the Southeast Expressway in Charlestown and Dorchester, despite opposition from the city of Boston and neighborhood groups.

"For too long, community groups like the Dorchester Allied Neighborhood Associations have been essentially ignored by the Commonwealth. This amendment is an essential step in empowering the city and its neighborhoods in this important quality of life issue," said BRA Director Paul L. Barrett.


The proposed amendment to the Zoning Code will require neighborhood review and Board of Appeal approval for any new billboard to be constructed within 660 feet of a federally-assisted highway. Additionally, one board will have to be removed for each new board, and billboard companies will have to waive compensation fees that have been associated with billboard removals under the Federal Highway Beautification Act.

Currently, there are over 900 billboards in Boston. Community groups and others have often expressed concerns about billboards, both for their diminishing effect on the urban landscape and the alcohol and cigarette advertisements they frequently carry.

Ken Stone, Charlestown Neighborhood Council Billboard Committee chairman, and Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, are collecting signatures in support of the new zoning and will present them at the hearing.

Acting Mayor Thomas M. Menino has moved to crack down on illegal gun ownership in the city's public housing developments.

Flanked by tenant activists and Judge E. George Daher, Chief of the Boston Housing Court, Menino announced that he is filing a Home Rule Petition that will allow the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) or the Boston Housing Court to evict any resident who is arrested for carrying or possessing a firearm on BHA property.

"Removing people who spread violence from a community is good, com-mon sense," Menino said, "and the action we are taking today is long past due."



would also have been subject to eviction," Menino said. "Including firearms in the statute will put one more crime-fighting weapon in Judge Daher's arsenal.

Further, Menino ordered the Boston Police Department to regularly inform the BHA about any arrests that occur on or near BHA property. He said this will allow BHA officials to seek restraining orders against non-residents to keep troublemakers out of the city's housing developments. In 1992 and so far into 1993, more non-residents have been arrested for drug offenses on BHA property than residents. Those who violate a restraining order will face up to two years in jail or a \$3,000 fine.

"In this case," Menino said, "one strike, and you're out."

Would you please make my note of thanks to them public by printing this in your newspaper?



My maternal family ties to Charlestown have always been strong. My grandparents, both born in Bere Island, Cork, met here in Charlestown. One of my uncles, Neal Harrington, used to be a streetcar conductor for the Boston Elevated Railway Co., operating the Chelsea-North Station route. I mention all this in reaction to Dave Flanagan's letter to the editor in the Sept. 2 edition of "The Charlestown Patriot." I lived in Charlestown for over a dozen years. I was only 20 when my parents moved to an apartment on Pearl Street, and I was 36 when I left town in 1984 after getting married at St. Mary's Church. I always considered myself an almost Townie, but always considered myself a full-time Charlestown resident. I didn't just live in town. I was active and involved in many civic, community and

Nearly 10 years ago I physically left town, but a part of me will always belong to Charlestown. My maternal roots are planted quite deep in Townie soil. Wherever I go, I take my Charlestown attitude with me. I've never let anyone bash Charlestown. I didn't do it when I lived there and I remain the same, right to this day. However, I do understand Dave Flanagan's feelings when someone suggests only folks living in Charlestown have a right to be involved with Charlestown.

Back in 1977, one of my uncles, Joe Harrington who settled in Puerto Rico following his Navy days during World War II, came to visit my mom and I remember his counseling me to get the hell out of town to make something of myself. He told me Charlestown was too narrow-minded and restrictive from his experiences growing up there. I listened to him, but declined to accept his understanding of Charlestown in 1977. Perhaps his understanding of Charlestown was correct in his eyes, but my eyes viewed a Charlestown that was open and honest, a Charlestown where people were accepted for who they were and not where their parents or grandparents came from. It was your deeds that counted.

Charlestown has changed a lot since 1977. The Yuppies weren't even here yet and homes were still fairly inexpensive. Many folks outside Charlestown still saw us as Archie Bunkerville. I've made a lot of friends in Charlestown. Some of them knew my mother and all my uncles. Some even knew my grandfather when he worked at the sugar refinery on Medford Street - people like the late Joe Kent or Dennis McLaughlin or Benny Nice, people still alive and kicking like Margie Kent, Dave Flanagan, Bobby and Anne Wallace, Jim and Gloria Conway, Kay Whalen, Sheila Brown and Brian Hickey - to name just a handful.

Does Dave have a right to involve himself in Charlestown's future? Does living in Scituate bar him? Am I barred from doing the same thing because I crossed over the Neponset bridge into North Quincy? Was my Uncle Joe right about Charlestown being self-centered? Or was I right in believing that Charlestown was small enough to know each other, but large enough to allow everyone to lend a helping hand?
