Charlestown Awaits The Arrival Of The Tall Ships



Excitement has been mounting in many quarters as preparations are finalized for the arrival of the Tall Ships on Saturday, July 11. Charlestown's pride, the USS Constitution will make her way out into Boston Harbor, leaving her berth at Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard at 7 a.m. on Saturday, July 11 to lead the parade of Tall Ships into the inner harbor.

Parade Of Sail

The Parade of Sail will consist of 19 flotillas with a Class A Tall Ship, which is over 170 feet in length, acting as guide vessel with up to nine smaller vessels behind. The Parade will begin at Buoy # 2 in the North Channel of the harbor and sail into the harbor, turning around adjacent to the U.S. Coast Guard Base Support Center on Commercial Street in the North End which is just off the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The USS Constitution and the USCGB Eagle will lead the first flotilla and should cross the starting point at 9 a.m., pass Deer Island at 9:30 a.m., Castle Island at 10:05 a.m., the official reviewing stand at the Boston Fish Pier at 10:20 a.m., make the turnaround maneuver off the Charlestown Navy Yard at 10:30 a.m. and be berthed by 11:05 a.m. Each flotilla guide vessel will follow at 15 minute intervals.

The crews should be their busiest when the vessels are off the Charlestown Navy Yard as they turn the ships around and head toward their respective berths.

The nearly 200 vessels in the Parade will stretch for almost two miles with the Parade expected to last six to seven hours.

Two of the magnificent Tall Ships will be berthed along with "Old Ironsides" on Pier 1 until their departure on July 16.

The Esmeralda from Chile is expected to dock at the west side of Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard at approximately 2 p.m. on Saturday. The ship, a four-mast topsail schooner is 370 feet 8 inches long. She carries a crew of 328. Built in 1952, she was named fro a Chilean warship that won victories in wars with Peru and Bolivia.

The Amerigo Vespucci from Italy is a 331-foot full-rigged ship built in 1930. She is expected to dock at the east side of Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard at 4 p.m. Carrying a crew of 450, she is the oldest ship on duty in the Italian Navy. Observers should take note of the bright red geraniums in flower boxes off her stern and the gilded carvings on her bow and stern.

Both of these ships will be open to the public from noon to 5 p.m. each day from Sunday, July 12 through Wednesday, July 15.

The 204-foot USS Constitution will also be open for daily visitation. Launched on Oct. 21, 1797, she is the oldest commissioned warship still afloat in the world. She has a crew of 58. Deck tours will be conducted on July 11 from 5 p.m. to sunset; July 12, 14 and 15 from 9:30 a.m. to sunset; July 13 from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to sunset; and July 16 from 5:30 p.m. to

The USS Cassin Young, which is temporarily docked at the Hoosac Pier adjacent to Pier 1, will have tours every hour from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. from July 11 through July 16, and the top deck will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

Also, 11 Class B Tall Ships, ranging in length from 100 to 170 feet, are scheduled to be berthed in the vicinity of Pier 1.

Viewing Sites In Charlestown

Viewing of the Parade of Sail will be from the east lane of the North Washington Street Bridge and from the following areas in the Charlestown Navy Yard:

- · Piers 1 and 2 National Historical Park
- Area surrounding Dry Dock 2;
- Pier 3 the portion of the pier nearest the head of Dry Dock 2 will be open to the public while the end of the pier will be
- Pier 4 a portion of the pier will be open to the public while the remainder is utilized for a fund-raising activity;
- · Pier 5 the pier will be utilized as a benefit for Camp Bunker Hill and admission to the pier between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. is \$10;
- · Piers 6, 7 and 8 these piers will be open to the public, although Pier 7 has limited space because of the housing on the site.

Piers 9, 10 and 11 will be closed to the public because of danger due to their decay.

The Harborwalk around the perimeter of the waterfront will be open to the public.

Charlestown Neighborhood Council Endorses Whydah Pirate Museum

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council voted to endorse the proposed development of Parcel 5/Dry Dock 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard by the Pirate Complex Development and Management Inc. The vote took place at the council's monthly meeting on July 7. The 17-member vote, with one abstention, now clears the way for the developer to appear before the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board of Directors

for a tentative designation to develop the site.

The Whydah Pirate Complex (WPC) held four public meetings before the council's Development Committee, outlining the proposal to build a \$70 million pirate museum in the Yard's End section of the Navy Yard. The meetings included discussions on traffic, parking, landscaping, open space and community benefits. The council will now work with the developer to establish a

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that would include issues addressed at the public meetings. Representation by the BRA will be present at these discus-

The final committee meeting on the WPC museum took place on July 6. Community benefits that could be realized if the museum is built in the Navy Yard were outlined. Among the benefits offered by the developer were:

• 300 construction jobs;

· 350 new permanent jobs at the facility, including seasonal and part-time posi-

- tions: · Housing and Job linkage
- money; · Related business activity for goods and services to the museum by community businesses/vendors;
- · Education programs with Charlestown public and parochial schools;
- · Charlestown community involvement -

- Special education programs Use of function facili-
- ties by community non-profit organizations - Sponsorship of local events, such as the Bunker

William McKeon Dies At 47

William T. "Bill" Mc-Keon died on July 5 at the New England Medical Center, Boston, after a short illness. He was 47 years old.

Mr. McKeon was born and raised in Charlestown. He graduated from St. Mary's Grammar School in 1959 and Boston College High School in 1963. He continued his education at Bentley College. At the time of his death he was a pension analyst at The New England, formerly the New England Mutual Insurance Company, where he worked for the past 26 years.

He will be warmly remembered by more than a generation of Charlestown youngsters as "The Ump" for his years of dedication as Chief Umpire behind home plate for all Charlestown Little League games. He was active in the organization for 14 years, and also served on the Board for the league.







Neighborhood Council Clears Plate For Summer Break

The monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council on July 7 covered an array of issues that have appeared before the council committees in recent months.

The anticipated council vote on the proposal to develop a pirate museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard took place with an overwhelming vote of approval from all but one council member.

Success on community input into a landscaping scheme along Medford Street at the former Revere Sugar Refinery was reported, with an increase in the amount of money allocated for the project from \$10,000 to well over \$60,000.

The Ackerley-owned billboard in City Square, situated on top of the Roughan building, will be the topic of another public meeting of the Billboard Committee.

The Community Benefits Committee will evaluate the 25 applications for a portion of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) grant for this year. The decision will be made at a special council meeting on July 14.

Council members who were present included: Chairman Peter Looney, First Vice Chairman Tom Cunha, Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, Treasurer Nancy Keyes, Marty O'Brien Sr., Kay Whelan, Kevin Roche, Bill Galvin, Dan Kovacevic, Bob Wallace, Jim Conway, Jeanne Davis, Tom Pitts, Judy Brennan, Moe Gillen, Ken Stone and Kate McDonough. Absent were Matt O'Neil, Bob Scalli and Ed Callahan.

Development Committee Chairman Cunha reported to the council on the presentations made to the committee by the Whydah Pirate Complex principals to construct a pirate museum on Parcel 5/Dry Dock 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. He stated that an average of 80 to 85 residents attended each of the four public meetings that included discussions on traffic, parking, open space, landscaping and community benefits.

Cunha outlined each aspect of the development proposal and explained the community concerns relative to each issue, suggesting to the council that it consider a vote of endorsement on the proposal, understanding that "it is far from over, a long way to go" before final designation.

Conway's motion on the report read that the CNC endorse the recommendation of the Development Committee that the Whydah Pirate Complex be given a tentative designation by the BRA to develop a museum on Parcel 5/Dry Dock 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard and that a committee be formed by CNC to work on a Memorandum of Under-

standing (MOU) which would include points brought up during the several community meetings, during the planning process prior to any approval for final designation. This motion was approved by the CNC by a 17-member vote and one abstention.

ber vote and one abstention. Mitigation Committee Chairman Gillen reported, with additional remarks by the vice chairman and committee members, that MWRA and Massport will work cooperatively to beautify the former Revere Sugar area. MWRA will increase its contribution from \$10,000 to \$30,000 and Massport will take the lead as the landlord with an anticipated contribution of well over an additional \$30,000 to develop a landscaping/ buffer zone for the Medford Street Massport properties. They will hold meetings for community input.

Billboard Committee Chairman Stone reported that a public meeting held to discuss the Ackerley billboard on Roughan's Hall in City Square resulted in a committee vote to have the sign removed as soon as possible. The vote was taken after residents in attendance at the meeting overwhelmingly requested its removal.

Since that June meeting, Stone reported, Ackerley has requested that the sign be allowed to remain for one year (1993) instead of the previously requested two years. The company, who has been financing summer jobs for Charlestown youths in return for the community's allowance of the sign, increased the number of jobs from five to 10 for next summer.

Council members asked Stone to hold another public meeting on the issue. stating that the need for summer jobs for Charlestown youths is an important issue. Some members expressed their feelings that 10 summer jobs was not an adequate return for a billboard that generates a lot of revenue for the outdoor advertising company, and requested that more than 10 summer jobs be funded for an additional year's extension on the agreement between the community and Ackerley.

Stone stated that he will schedule a public meeting on the issue, inviting residents and representatives from the advertising company to return to further discuss the billboard. No date has been set for this meeting.

Community Benefits Chairperson Keyes informed the council that 25 nonprofit community organizations had applied for the MWRA's \$50,000 in grant

The Benefits Committee will meet on Tuesday, July 14 at 6:30 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St. to review the applications. A special meeting of the CNC will follow at 8 p.m. that same evening to vote on the committee's recommendations. Keyes announced that representatives of all organizations that had submitted applications as well as community residents are welcome to attend these meet-

The council will not hold its regular monthly meeting in August. Also, there are presently no committee meetings scheduled for this time period.

When the council returns in September, the members will discuss the October election for seven at-large council seats, as well as outstanding development proposals, community input into future harbor/ waterfront events and will make a decision on the Ackerley billboard in City Square.

* Fires . . . The Boston Fire Department reports two minor blazes recently in Charlestown.

The first occurred on June 30 at 8:22 p.m. when a plastic barrel behind the Charlestown District Court caught fire. It was quickly put out and resulted in an estimated \$250 in damage to the rear of the City Square building.

The second fire took place on Medford Street at 3:26 a.m. on July 5. An automobile was found fully engulfed in flames. The fire, which is under investigation due to its suspicious origin, resulted in an estimated \$500 in damage.

* Blackout . . . Boston Edison reports that a cable fault on 9th Street in the Charlestown Navy Yard caused an estimated 320 customers to loose their electricity on July 2.


Residents reported hearing a loud explosion shortly after 7 p.m. last Thursday night, followed by a loss of electricity. The affected areas included homes and businesses on Warren, Medford, Chelsea and Cambridge streets, as well as Old Rutherford Avenue and in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Mike Monahan, Boston Edison spokesman, stated the the cause of the blackout was a cable failure in a manhole on 9th Street. The failure occurred when a "tie switch" failed, causing the loud explosive-type noise. There were no injuries reported, Monahan said.

At 8:01 p.m., Edison crews thought they had the problem corrected and turned the power back on. This effort failed, causing additional customers to lose power. At 8:15 p.m., another attempt brought power back to some of these customers, Monahan stated. The circuit was retried again at 10:15 p.m. and failed for a second time. By 10:21 p.m., however, over 300 customers had their power returned. According to Monahan, all remaining outages were back on by 11:30 p.m.

* CANA Project . . . The sprinkler system in the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) tunnels in City Square backfired last Wednesday night. The July 1 incident presented no hazard to the community, but did bring chuckles to those who were witness to the unusual event.

According to Lt. Richard Powers, public relations officer for the Boston Fire Department, the system was tested on June 30, combining the non-toxic chemicals with water. The pretest is standard procedure in order to assure that the fire-

(photo by Michael Tognarelli) fighting system is in working order prior to the tunnel opening. On July 1, however, during another test, the piping system overflowed due to a high tide in the harbor.

Powers stated that the incoming high tide caused the system to back up into the tunnel and ultimately forced the foam up through any opening in the ground. Eyewitnesses stated that foam could be seen coming from the sewer covers and manholes in the City Square area. It was estimated that at some locations, foam reached 10 to 15 feet in the air, resembling long, slender fingers.

Ed Barr, CANA coordinator, stated that there was no hazard from the foam. "The only problem that was created was that the foam was slippery," he stated.

Fire Department crews hosed the slippery substance down and the area was clear of all evidence of the mishap by the time the tide receded.

* Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . According to Ralph Cunningham, resident engineer with Bryand Associates, the contractor, Middlesex Paving Company, and the Boston Redevelopment Authority have completed their negotiations on the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights), and work should be starting again this week. Residents with concerns on this project should contact Community Liaison Peter Looney at 722-4300 ext. 5674.

The street contractor, the John Mahoney Construction Company, continued working in the Devens and Washington streets and Old Rutherford Avenue area installing and relocating lights and light bases, installing new and resetting old curb and installing roof drains. This work is being done around the gas company, which is installing new mains in the area, as well as the telephone compny that is also doing work so that the new streets won't have to be dug up when the project is completed.

Another major work site is Concord Street where the new water main is in and tied into Concord Avenue as well. One sidewalk was stripped, the known lead water services replaced and some of the new roof drains were installed.

On Russell Street, most of the roof drain tie-ins were completed, more grading to the sub-base was done and the gas company was installing new mains, as well.

The gas company was also working on Ellwood Street. Some of the new drainage was installed and a new storm drain is scheduled for installation within the next week.

Adams Street draws closer to completion of the phase one work with the installation of the brick paver strip along the sidewalk adjacent to the Training Field.



National Park Service Goes All Out To Support 'Sail Boston'

One of the best free viewing sites for the Tall Ships visiting during Sail Boston will be right here in Charlestown at Pier 1 in the Boston National Historical Park (BNHP) section of the Charlestown Navy Yard, according to BNHP Acting Superintendent John Benja-

Pier 1 will have unrestricted viewing of the Parade of Sail on Saturday, July 11. Two Class A vessels, Esmeralda and the Amerigo Vespucci, will be berthed at Pier 1 near USS Constitution from July 11 to 16. They will be open for free public viewing from approximately noon to 5 p.m., July 12 through 15. However, the exact visiting hours are at each captain's discretion.

To prepare for Sail Boston, the National Park Service has temporarily moved the World War II destroyer USS Cassin Young to the Hoosac Pier in the Navy Yard to make room for the Chilean ship Esmeralda. The Hoosac Pier is steps away from Pier 1, and USS Cassin Young will be open for free tours from 9 a.m. to sunset each day. The Italian vessel Amerigo Vespucci will berth next to USS Constitution.

"After months of planning, we are prepared for just about anything," Benjamin said. "We expect to host hundreds of thousands of people during the week, and we will do our best to make sure that everybody

gets to tour at least one of the Tall Ships here. Of course, with this many people, we will be working extra hard to ensure public safety as well," he added.

The BNHP will have more than 100 employees and uniformed rangers in direct contact with the public to assist people and ensure their safety. The National Park Service has made arrangements with other agencies and organizations to offer a variety of public services. As a result, the BNHP will be a selfcontained visitor area, prepared to handle any eventuality. For example, Boston City Hospital will have an Emergency Medical Unit on hand and the Boston Police Department will have a strong presence onsite.

The National Park Service has requested assistance from MBTA officials to direct pedestrians as they come through Gate 1, the main access point into the Navy Yard.

Inside the Navy Yard, the National Park Service will offer many visitor services, including its regular Visitor Information Center and an information kiosk. The U.S. Postal Service will be set up to offer special cancellations commemorating Sail Boston.

For life's necessities, the National Park Service has arranged for Belmont Springs to offer free water on Saturday and Sunday. Expanded food service will be provided by the Shipyard

Galley, under contract to the National Park Service. Also, 20 extra telephones have been installed by AT&T, 20 portable toilets will be in place and additional trash removal service will help make sure people have a pleasant day.

Chief of Interpretation Bill Foley stated: "Sail Boston is a great opportunity for us to showcase the many programs we always have underway for visitors." The Visitor Information Center is currently featuring a special exhibit of drawings by Vernon Howe Bailey. Rangers will lead 90-minute walking tours of the Navy Yard each day, beginning at 2 p.m. The BNHP regularly offers historic encampments for the public to visit, and the 47th Regiment of

Foot Encampment will be in place on July 11 and 12.

Also in the BNHP, the U.S. Navy will continue to offer free tours of the USS Constitution during much of Sail Boston, and the USS Constitution Museum, featuring two new exhibits, will be open to the public.

The USS Constitution will go into Boston Harbor twice during Sail Boston, to lead the Parade of Sail on July 11, and to bid the Tall Ships farewell on July 16.

The National Park Service will also host additional special programs for Sail Boston, including a major exhibit by the American Sail Training Association, and woodworking demonstrations by high school students from the museum's apprenticeship program.

the previous week learning about disabilities - what causes them, how disabilities affect people's everyday lives and the equipment used to help them cope. After that, they were ready to help.


Each child secured pled-





A Report On Sail Boston '92

After three years of planning and with the involvement of more than 20 city of Boston departments, the Tall Ships are finally set to parade into Boston Harbor on Saturday, July 11.

This will be the culmination of an intercontinental voyage which began in Genoa, Italy this past April 19. Along the way, the ships have stopped in Lisbon, Portugal: Cadiz, Spain; San Juan, Puerto Rico; and New York City. The journey is part of the Grand Regatta Columbus '92 Quincentenary, which commemorates the 500th anniversary of the voyage of Christopher Columbus to the New World.

More than 200 vessels, three times as many as the 1976 Bicentennial Celebration, will take part in this event. Approximately 3.5 million people are expected to attend the week-long event. According to Rosemarie Sansone, coordinator of the Tall ship's visit for the city of Boston, "this is the biggest such event ever staged in the region."

To ensure public safety and maximize public enjoyment, a number of measures and programs will be implemented. The focus here will be Charlestown and the adjacent neighborhoods, with telephone numbers to secure information on other areas.


Passenger Automobile Restrictions

In order to maintain pub-

lic safety and eliminate vehicular gridlock on neighborhood streets, the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) has a transportation plan that will close Boston's waterfront neighborhoods to private passenger automobiles. In Charlestown, these restrictions will be in place on Saturday, July 11 from 5:30 a.m. until approximately 7 p.m. and on Sunday, July 12 from 5:30 a.m. to midnight when these restrictions will be lifted. Access into and out of Charlestown will not be limited on July 13 through July 16.

The transportation plan will stop all vehicles from entering Charlestown during these hours with only the following exceptions: tour buses, high occupancy vehicles (10 or more passengers), MBTA shuttle buses, public safety vehicles, credentialed Sail Boston and/or media vehicles and some delivery and commercial vehicles. Commercial vehicles, bearing proper commercial identification, will be allowed into Charlestown for timesensitive deliveries only.

The BTD has offered no guarantee that residents, employers or employees outside Charlestown when the 5:30 a.m. blockade takes effect on July 11 and 12 will be allowed to enter the community. Although proper identification, such as a driver's license or car registration, showing a

blocked off. These restrictions will apply from 5:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, July 11 and from 5:30 a.m. to midnight on Sunday, July 12.

Charlestown address might gain the vehicle's entry, motorists must be advised that they will most likely be sitting in bumper-to-bumper traffic on streets leading into Charlestown before they reach a police officer to request entry.

Vehicles Within The Community

Residential vehicles already within the boundaries of the neighborhood at 5:30 a.m. on July and 11 and 12 will have complete access within the community with the exception of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Residents with vehicles wishing to leave the neighborhood will have to exit through a designated checkpoint where a resident placard will be issued to them. Re-entry must be through a designated checkpoint and the placard must be returned.

Exiting And Entering The Community

The Charlestown checkpoints where vehicles will be allowed to exit or enter the community will be located at:

- City Square
- Sullivan Square (at The Schrafft Center) and
- Rutherford Avenue at Austin Street (the Gilmore Bridge).

No traffic will be allowed to enter or exit the Tobin Bridge in Charlestown during the blockade.

Refer to the map on page 10 for the roadway closings and the exit and entry checkpoints in the commu-

Navy Yard Residents

A separate pass will be distributed to residents of the Charlestown Navy Yard who wish to drive out of that area. The pass would have to be produced to gain re-entry into the Yard. All other private vehicles, including those belonging to Charlestown residents, will not be allowed to drive into the Navy Yard on Saturday or Sunday.

In addition, Gate 4 of the Navy Yard will be closed to vehicular traffic from Monday, July 13 through Thursday, July 16. Traffic into the Navy Yard will be directed through Gate 5.

Streets Closed To Traffic

Streets Closed to Traffic ed to traffic to prevent outside vehicles from entering the community are all located off New Rutherford Avenue. They are: Mishawum Street (across from the Sullivan Square fire station), Baldwin, Essex and West School streets, Old Rutherford Avenue and City Square.

Traffic outside the Charlestown boundaries will be allowed to use New Rutherford Avenue, two lanes on the North Washington Street Bridge and the streets round the rotary in Sullivan Square.

Public Transportation

The use of public transportation is strongly advised to anyone wishing to take advantage of the splendor of the visit by the Tall Ships, but this is especially important for residents, their guests, employers and employees trying to enter the community on July 11 and 12.

Increased bus service on Main and Bunker Hill streets will depart and return to Sullivan Square throughout the weekend. Bus routes 92 and 93 will not take passengers downtown, but will transport them to Sullivan Square to make connections on the Orange Line. The 92 and 93 buses will make a "loop" through Charlestown that will include a bus stop at the Charlestown (continued on page 12)


'Heavy Metal Horns' Concert At Charlestown Navy Yard Tonight

with a crew of 60, from Germany. The barque was originally built in 1906 and rebuilt in 1986-88.

— Concordia, 185 feet long with a crew of 63, from Canada. The barquetine was built in 1991 as a classroom for a privately operated Canadian co-educational boarding school.

— Gloria, 250 feet long with a crew of 132, from Columbia. The three-masted barque is reminiscent of the medium clipper ships of the 19th century and has an on-board museem of Columbian artifacts.

— Shabab Oman, 171 feet long with a crew of 57, from Oman. This three-masted barquetine was commissioned in 1971 by the Sultan of Oman as his navy's sail-training ship. She is one of the world's newest sailtraining vessels.

Black Falcon Cruise Terminal, Summer Street, South Boston

— Capitan Miranda, 198 feet long with a crew of 102, from Uruguay. This threemasted staysail schooner was built in 1930 and was used as a hydrographic relieving ship until 1977.

— Christian Radich, 240 feet long with a crew of 93, from Norway. She was built in 1937 and visited the New York World's Fair in 1939. She was seized by the Germans during World War II and served as a submarine depot ship until 1945. This three-masted fullrigged ship was featured in the 1957 film "Windjammer."

— Danmark, 252 feet long with a crew of 97, from Denmark. She was visiting the New York's World's Fair when war broke out in 1939 and she and her crew were offered to the U.S. Coast Guard by the Danish government. This full-rigged ship was built in 1933.

 Dar Mlodziezy, 358 feet long with a crew of 167, from Poland. She was built as a "Gift of Youth." This full-rigged ship was built in 1982.

— USCGB Eagle, 296 feet long with a crew of 212, from the United States. Built in Germany in 1936, this barque was taken as a war prize following World War II. She now serves as a seagoing classroom for 175 cadets and instructors at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn.

— Gorch Fock II, 216 feet long with a crew of 216, from Germany. Built in 1958, this barque is the second oldest of the post-war windjammers and a sail training ship of the German Navy.

— Juan Sebastian de Elcano, 370 feet long with a crew of 163, from Spain. Built in 1927, this four-masted topsail schooner was named for the first Spaniard to sail around the world and has sailed on seven successful circumnavigations of the globe.

— Kruzenshtern, 376 feet long with a crew of 232, from the Commonwealth of Independent States. She is one of the largest square riggers in the world and is one of the last of the legendary "Flying Pliners." Originally christened Padua, her name was changed to Kruzenshtern in honor of the famous Russian geographer and navigator after becoming the property of the Soviet Union in 1946. She was built in 1926.

Libertad, 340 feet long with a crew of 262, from Argentina. This three-masted full rigged vessel is not only a training ship but one of the world's largest sailing vessels. Built in 1956, she has a sail area covering 28,546 square feet and a displacement of 3.765 tons.

— Sagres II, 294 feet long with a crew of 218, from Portugal. This three-masted barque, built in 1938, is distinguished by Portuguese Crosses of Christ on her sails.

— Sedov, 385 feet long with a crew of 193, from the Commonwealth of Independent States. Built in 1921, this four-masted barque is the world's largest square-rig sailing ship.

— Simon Bolivar, 270 feet long with a crew of 201, from Venezuela. This barque is one of the modern generation of windjammers being used by navies around the world. She was built in 1979.

Boston Harbor Hotel, Rowes Wharf

- Fryderyk Chopin, 182 feet long with a crew of 60, from Poland. This brig, built this year in Gdansk, is a training ship and this is her maiden voyage.

— Gazela of Phildelphia, 178 feet long with a crew of 44, from the United States. Built in 1883, this three-masted barquetine is the oldest square-rigged vessel still in operation and sails as a good-will ambassador from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

U.S. Coast Guard Support Base, Pier 3, Commerical Street, North End

 Kaiwo Maru, 361 feet long with a crew of 155, from Japan. This four-masted barque was built in 1989 and is used for sea training.

— Tovarisch, 204 feet long with a crew of 190, from the Ukraine. This barque was built in 1933 and is the sister ship to the United State's Eagle.

Coastal Cement Corp., Adjacent to Black Falcon Terminal, Summer Street

— Mir, 361 feet long with a crew of 198, owned by the State Academy in St. Petersburg, Russia. This full-rigged ship was built in 1987 and she is used as a sail training vessel.

Boston Fish Pier, Northern Avenue

Niagara, 198 feet long with a crew of 36, from the United States. Built in 1813 and competely restored in 1900, this brig is the flagship of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The original vessel was one of the ships which helped destroy British sea power during the War of 1812.

Bay Point Marina, Quincy

— Rose, 179 feet long with a crew of 36, from the United States. This full-rigged ship, which was built in 1970 and restored in 1985, has the distinction of being the largest operational wooden Tall Ship in the world with a 130-foot mainmast as tall as a 14-story building.

Other Vessels In The Charlestown Navy Yard

In addition to the three Tall Ships on Pier 1, over 50 other sailing vessels will be docked in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Maxi-Class yachts will be berthed at Piers 4 and 5 where the public will be able to view them following the Parade of Sail on Saturday. These boats are generally about 80-feet long and have a rig that is 100 feet above the deck. They each carry a crew of about 23.

The Maxi-Class yachts arrived in Boston yesterday (Wednesday) finishing a race that began on April 19 and went from Genoa, Italy to Cadiz, Spain. The final leg of the race was from New York City to off Castle Island. They will be competing in regattas in the outer harbor on Monday, July 13 and Tuesday, July 14.

Also docked at the Charlestown Navy Yard will be several 12-meter sailboats which will also compete in a regatta.

Elsewhere In Charlestown

The guided missile frigate USS Kauffman (FFG-59) is scheduled to visit Charlestown in conjunction with Sail Boston '92. The ship will be berthed at Mystic Pier 1. The public is invited to tour the ship as guests of the commanding officer on July 12, 13 and 14 from noon to 5 p.m. each day.

The Oliver Hazard Perry class ship is 445 feet long and 45 feet wide, and carries a crew of 200. Cmdr. James H. Chapman Jr. is the commanding officer.

Visitors can gain access to the **Kauffman** by traveling down Chelsea Street and crossing the Little Mystic Bridge. Mystic Pier 1

will be on the right.

At the other end of town, over 100 Class C Tall Ships will be berthing at the Mystic Marina at The Schrafft Center in Sullivan Square. These ships are under 100 feet in length and will be available for viewing by the public.

Sail Boston '92 Events

As the final port destination in the United States, Boston's celebration is expected to be spectacular. Along with the sheer spectacle of the Tall Ships, there will be a series of events which include concerts, arts festivals, special parades, cultural exhibits and fireworks. 



Health Gap To Provide Homecare Services

Health Gap is a new and innovative homecare program designed by the Kennedy Center and funded by an EDIC Community Development Block Grant. Homemakers will provide cleaning, shopping, laundry, meal preparation and accompaniment. Charlestown seniors, age 60 and older, will qualify for the services if they fall within certain income guidelines and are not currently receiving and/or do not qualify for services through other homecare agencies.

Health Gap has the ability to provide emergency services when a person is discharged from the hospital or at home with an illness. Interim care will be provided while assisting the client with the referral process to the most appropriate agency for the services that will best enhance their well being. Storm Drain Stencilling Project Gets Underway In Charlestown

Recycling Drop-Off Closed For July

Volunteers from the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club hit the streets of Charlestown on July 7 to stencil signs reading: "Don't Dump: Drains To Boston Harbor" next to storm drain catch basins.

The stencilling project, sponsored by the Boston Water & Sewer Commission, the U.S Environmental Protection Agency and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority, is designed to discourage the dumping of toxins into storm drain catch basins. This project includes public education about safe disposal of oil and other household hazardous wastes which pose a threat to the environment.

Most storm drains lead directly to local waterways such as the Charles and Mystic rivers, and eventually to Boston Harbor where the contaminants have a severe impact on the environment. Hazardous wastes such as oil and antifreeze can affect water quality and impair the ability of surface waters to sustain aquatic life.

Used motor oil in particular is a significant contributor to the pollution of Boston Harbor. Petroleum hydrocarbons and heavy metals found in used motor oil pose a direct threat to the delicate marine ecosystem and kill microorganisms which form the base of the marine food chain. Each year, Americans carelessly dispose of over 200 million gallons of used motor oil, which is equal to 19 Exxon Valdez oil spills. In Massachusetts, it is estimated that 3.6 million gallons of used motor oil are disposed of improperly each

Even in areas served by combined sewers, hazardous materials dumped down storm drain catch basins end up at the MWRA's Deer or Nut Island treatment plants where toxic chemicals and heavy metals are either released into the harbor through treated water and/or become part of the primary by-product, sludge, which will later be used as fertilizer.

The Boston Water and Sewer Commission plans to work with the Mayor's Office and with neighborhood groups during the summer and into the fall. If your group would like to participate in the program, please contact Charlie-Jewell at 330-9400.



tantly, I miss Gus Charbonnier. Gus wasn't a politician but he certainly told politicians a thing or three. He didn't just live in Charlestown, he lived and acted to make Charlestown the very best it could be. He was a true example of what a community activist should be.

Many of us have Gus Charbonnier stories. Mine is one from 1977 when I was a young upstart trying to attain ballot status for the old five-member Boston School Committee. I had been collecting nomination signatures all day in Brighton and in the evening started walking around Charlestown, going door-to-door in search of 2,000 qualified voter signatures. I arrived at Baldwin Street and got to his address. I was invited up and we chatted in his kitchen. Even then most folks knew my name and we talked of Charlestown issues. I respected his opinions and he did mine. We agreed more than not, and it was the best stop I had in that brief political campaign.

Gus is gone now but surely not his spirit. Every generation has a responsibility to the next. Gus understood that as do most of today's community leaders. Hopefully, I understood it. And as long as there are people who remember Gus, he will live forever in spirit. Having a street named after you is just an extra bonus.

Gus Charbonnier was never ambiguous when it came to community issues. He took firm stands come hell or high water. He took the heat along with the praise. The Charlestown motto is a reflection of a belief that each of us is accorded his or her time to be used wisely and for the benefit of all. Gus may be gone but surely not forgotten!
