



The CNC meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

★ Informational Meeting On Sullivan Square Ambulance... The Charlestown Neighborhood Council will hold an information meeting at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, March 22 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

Representatives from the city Department of Health and Hospitals EMS services will update the community on the status of the ambulance at Sullivan Square.

★ Board Of Appeal . . . The Board of Appeal held a hearing on March 7 to hear the petition of Gunwyn/Charlestown Limited Partnership to increase the parking lot capacity at 28 Cedar St. from 17 to 22 vehicles. It is used as ancillary parking for residents of 30 Monument Square.

Joe Bagley of 30 Monument Square asked for a deferral until there could be a meeting of the abutters.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, told the board that some issues of the abutters need to be addressed. She said: "Hopefully these concerns can be resolved before the next Board of Appeal hearing." She asked for a deferral as did City Councillor Albert O'Neil.

The petition was deferred until May 9.

★ Mayor's Cabinet Meeting... Mayor Thomas M. Menino will hold an open forum cabinet meeting in Charlestown on Thursday, March 23 at 6:30 p.m. at Charlestown High School, 240 Medford St. The cabinet meeting is part of Menino's effort to open up local government by holding monthly cabinet meetings in the city's neighborhoods.

The mayor will be joined by the 10 members of his cabinet who are responsible for the primary functions of city government. These functions include public safety, education, economic development, finance, health and human services, basic services and environmental services.

★ Stricter Enforcement Of Pet Ordinances... Mayor Thomas M. Menino has implemented a stricter enforcement procedure for the city's pet ordinances. Under the new procedure, people violating pet ordinances will be issued fines rather than given a verbal warning for the first offense. The stricter enforcement will be overseen by the Chief of Basic Services Michael Galvin as part of the ongoing effort to improve the quality of life in the city through better basic services.

The new procedure is aimed at preventing unsightly public thoroughfares and possible public health hazards that are the result of pet owners who fail to obey the ordinances, ignoring the ordinances presents a problem each spring as people are starting to enjoy more outdoor activities. The enforcement will be carried out by Code Enforcement and the Inspectional Services Department's Animal Control Unit.

Fines will be as high as \$50 and will be issued to those caught in violation or reported by neighbors for being in violation. An education campaign has been launched to make people aware of their responsibilities as pet owners. Anyone who knows of consistent or blatant offenders should call Animal Control at 635-5348 or Code Enforcement at 635-4896. Pet owners who still may have questions about their responsibilities under the ordinances can also call.



I was suddenly horrified to observe through their eyes the amount of dog excrement we had to dodge on our short walk. How could I justify my love of living in this neighborhood when their lasting impression would certainly be the incredible amount of filth covering the sidewalks of Charlestown! Of course, this is an old problem, but one to which I am particularly sensitive for I AM A DOG

As a dog owner, out of necessity I am out and about the streets of Charlestown every day and have to be constantly vigilant for myself and my dog to avoid the piles of excrement which are seemingly EVERYWHERE. Even though I faithfully pick up after my dog (something I never thought I would be doing, but a small price to pay for owning a dog in the city), I know that people look at

Parents Beware!

Dear Gloria,

I would like the parents of children in the Mishawum Park area to be made aware of a potentially dangerous situation.

As some of you may know, 5-year-old Matthew Mc-Laughlin of Tibbetts Town Way was viciously attacked by a pit bull terrier while playing near his home on Feb. 1.

Matthew was taken to the doctor and placed on antibiotics. Due to the depth of the wound on Matthew's leg, the doctor made a decision to leave the wound open because of the possibility of infection. After a week on medications and daily doctor visits, Matthew was admitted to the Mass. General Hospital for medicines to be given intravenously four times a day and for testing.

The results of one of the tests showed that the bone in Matthew's leg had become infected and it also showed what appeared to be an impression of a tooth mark on the bone. Matthew was released from hospital with medications to be given intravenously four times a day, together with daily visits from a nurse to keep a close watch on the wound. At a recent doctor's visit, it was discovered that one of Matthew's medications had brought his white blood cell count down to a level way below normal. The medicine was removed and replaced with another medi-

Matthew is presently, and for the next several months, taking medications three times a day intravenously and one medication orally once a day.

Matthew, his family and friends have been through a lot of pain and worry over the last month and the same will be true for at least another couple of months before it will be known if Matthew will come out of this horrible ordeal 100 percent healthy.

I have been told that this dog cannot be removed from the neighborhood unless it bites again. I have also been told that this dog has bitten at least twice already.

This letter is being written in the hope that if this dog cannot be removed from the neighborhood at this time, then the owner be made to muzzle the dog when it is out in public. A leash is not enough, the dog was leashed at time of its unprovoked attack on Matthew.

Your testimonial will come in its own way and you will recognize it as you grow. So be strong, be proud, but most of all, be honest not only


to yourselves, but to others. One of the definitions of testimonial states, "A written affirmation of ones character or worth."

ARE YOU LIKELY TO BE AUDITED BY THE IRS?

What triggers a tax audit? Several factors come into play. For one, an audit is more likely if your tax return stands out from the crowd.

Large deductions attract attention, but the IRS is especially interested in write-offs that seem out of line with the rest of your return. For example, if you claim \$30,000 of mortgage interest and report only \$40,000 of income, you'll probably raise some eyebrows at the IRS. But don't let the possibility of an audit keep you from taking every legitimate deduction.

A red flag may go up if you claim a relatively large casualty loss, or if you make a large non-cash charitable contribution. To support these deductions, keep good records. In the appropriate case, consider documenting your deduction with a photograph, or obtain a written report from an expert

Being in business can trigger an audit, especially if you're a sole proprietor who files IRS "Schedule C." Your return is more likely to stand out if you claim large write-offs for business travel and entertainment, take a home office deduction, or show a large, overall loss.

You'll almost certainly receive an IRS "matching" notice if you don't properly report the income from your W-2 and 1099 forms. Be sure to include all such income, no matter how small, and make the description on your tax return as clear and accurate as possible.

One of the better defenses against audits is to have your tax returns prepared by a well-qualified accountant. The headache you save may be your



The columns by Howie Carr and Peter Gelzinis do a disservice to the good people of Charlestown, who like any other community in the United States, struggles with the pervasive evils of guns, drugs and violence. The small criminal "sub-culture" that subscribes to this lifestyle does not reflect this proud neighborhood that cherishes positive community and family life.

There are thousands of residents who are making great efforts to reach the youth of the community through such organizations as CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD). the Healthy Charlestown Coalition, the Boys & Girls Club, CYO and Charlestown Community Centers, to name but a few. By portraying the community in a negative light, the media is undermining the efforts of countless numbers of residents.

I often wonder why the media does not cover any of the positive events that happen in Charlestown. Maybe you should give it a try, the writing will come just as easy.

O'Brien, a junior, is also majoring in Business Administration and is the daughter of Roy and Sherry O'Brien of Oak Street.



Caterers, the festivities began. Peter Looney acted as master of ceremonies for this portion of the program, introducing elected officials or their representatives.

Sen. Tom Birmingham, chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways & Means, presented Terry with a citation, stating that "Terry is a Townie - that says it all." He was followed by House Majority Leader Rep. Richard A. Voke who had a citation for the honored guest. He told her "you personify Charlestown - taking care of your own."

Several Boston City Councillors took the stage, including President Jim Kelly, Albert "Dapper" O'Neil, Peggy Davis-Mullen and Diane Modica.

Kelly praised Terry as "being a lady, being a woman of courage, a woman of determination and a woman to stand up for friends," concluding with "the people of South Boston love Terry as much as you do."

Dapper had some fun with Terry and the women City Councillors. He teased them and said to Terry, "How about a kiss?" adding, "Put that in the Globe!" On a serious note, he praised Terry for being a great mother and a great human being.

Modica spoke of Terry's caring for others. She told of a cold day in 1993 when they were doing a pre-election standout. She said Terry went into her house and came out with sweaters and gloves so they could ward off the cold. She told Terry, "You continue to show caring each and every day...you are loved!"

Davis-Mullen then brought forth a gift from the councillors - a Terry Ring Way street sign with the official city seal. Terry, who was obviously thrilled, said "a city seal, too? I might even run against Menino next time!"

Two Townies, former aide to Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy Jim Walsh and present aide Matt O'Neil, were on hand to represent Kennedy at the event. As they presented Terry with a certificate of appreciation, O'Neil praised Terry for the love and affection she has for her community and Walsh told her the award was for a lifetime of service to the people of Charlestown.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Public Service, presented a plaque to Terry on behalf of Mayor Thomas Menino, praising her for her dedication to the community.

Boston Municipal Police (BMP) Lt. Frank De-Rosa, Lt. Paul Hamilton and Officer Danny Ring, Terry's son, came forward with a plaque for Terry from the BMP and the McGrath Scholarship Committee for all her efforts in "helping to continue the memory of Bobby McGrath." Terry said that the presentation is "closest to my heart as Bobby McGrath was like a son and anything that was done was from the bottom of my heart."

Looney took a few minutes to speak about Terry. He said that "there are two reasons people are here tonight - one to have a good time, and the second to say 'a job well done and thank you."

He asked: "How many here tonight in this hall when running a fund raiser or helping someone in need got a phone call? Hi, it's Terry. What can I do to help?" Looney added, "Terry is always there when someone needs help or support. She is a giver, not a taker."

Looney went on to tell of Terry bringing the Meat

Raffle to Charlestown five years ago and, although they were primarily for Camp Bunker Hill, she would organize a raffle for any group that asked - K. of C., Daughters of Isabella, St. Catherine's CYO Color Guard, the Bunker Hill Day Parade and many others. He noted: "Let me say, when Terry is in charge, there is only one boss . . . and each and every event that Terry organizes is first class."

Beside her love for organizations in the town, Looney stated, Terry also has strong Irish ties to County Donegal and her father's roots are in County Cork. Terry belongs to several Irish groups including the Friends of John Boyle O'Reilly, Friends of Irish Freedom, Charlestown's Bobby Sands Unit and the Irish Immigration Reform Movement. He added: "Too bad Terry didn't meet Margaret Thatcher and the two be put in a room for one hour" - the Northern Ireland problem would have been solved.

Looney read some of the praise for Terry and her involvement with the town over the years. He recalled some of the words and letters of praise and stated: ""Terry is an outstanding individual who cares a great deal about others and does everything to make their lives better. She is a true Townie whose ideals and values are what this great neighborhood is all about. Terry, thank you for what you do and who you are. Your family, your friends and everybody in this hall would like to say to you 'Thank you and God bless you."

Looney called for the committee to come forward to be recognized and presented Terry with a replica of the Easter Lily designed by Tom Gorsuch.

Terry was obviously thrilled with the flower which she said "may be small but is big and meaningful." She told of going to St. James Church every Easter Sunday, a tradition shared by Raymond Flynn and William Bulger and their families, and watching the children grow year after year.

She told of purchasing paper Irish lilies each year at the service and their meaning to her. A new pastor came to the church and the lilies were there no more and so she went down to the chapel on Northern Avenue for the Eas-

ter service which was dedicated to the Irish uprising.
The dollar she paid for the Easter Lily each year went for peace in Northern Ireland - to help people who were hungry, had no clothes or had loved ones in jail.

Terry said she recently asked John Hurley if anyone sold the lily and, now displaying her very own, said, "I am grateful from the bottom of my heart."

Terry then became the object of a history report by her brother Jack Ring. He went back into many aspects of her life, calling it "the dark side of my sister," which sent Terry into

gales of laughter.

It was then Terry's turn, and she started by saying "I'm so overwhelmed I hardly know what to say but of course, that never stopped me before!"

She thanked many who planned and carried out the event. Terry went on to say that Kahlil Gibran is one of her favorite writers. She read the quote that is on the first page, saying that it "tells me that whenever I give to my community or to others, I also give to myself."

Terry said that "as the years go by, not many of us stop what we are doing ... and just look around at people, places and things."

She said that she had started doing just that when she first went to work as a meter maid in 1983. One day she got lost on her route and panicked because she could not find her supervisor, Marguerite Fox. When she did find her, she calmed her down and said, "Terry, no matter where you are, just stop and look around you and see if you can find something beautiful, like a flower, a tree or people, and then you will find yourself." Terry said that she would always be grateful to that woman because "that's when I did

find, not only myself, but many other beautiful things."

She looked around the room noting that people at every table bring back memories - some pleasant, some funny and some sad. Terry said: "I hold each and everyone of you deep in my heart and that's one thing no one can take away from me - my memories."

Terry spoke of the people who had come to the event, some from Charlestown and others who came a long way to be with her. She gave her heartfelt thanks to her family, "Danny and Marion and Jack and Pat, and also to

Seamus Patrick Ring," her son and his wife's boxer, "who is always at my side."

She went on to say: "I do not know what I would do without my two best friends - Linda Donovan and Ann McCarron - who do my shopping, take me to the hospital or just sit and chat."

Terry closed with one more quote from Gibran: "For what is a friend that you should look for him with hours to kill, look for him with hours to live" and as the gathering took to their feet in thunderous applause, Terry said "Let's Party!"

Menino Appoints Charlestown Residents To Housing Advisory Panel

To make sure that Boston residents have a roof over their heads, Mayor Thomas M. Menino has appointed members to serve on the Mayor's Advisory Panel on Housing. Among the members are Gerard Doherty, Esquire, a private developer, and David Dow, executive secretary and treasurer of the Boston District Council of Carpenters and vice president of the Mass. Council of Carpenters, both of Charlestown.

The panel will advise the Menino Administration on developing a comprehensive housing policy for the city of Boston. They also will work with city officials to shape the policies being developed by the "re-invented" Housing of Urban Development

(HUD). In addition, panel members will provide advice and counsel on housing issues and help to transform the city's public housing authority.

"My charge to the Advisory Panel is to throw all the old assumptions out the window. Give me fresh ideas for encouraging housing construction in our city," said Menino. "This is not a time for feeling sorry for ourselves, but a time for work. If we work together now, we can plan a housing future that improves the lives of public housing tenants, private tenants, homeowners and those who want to be homeowners."

The Mayor's Advisory Panel on Housing will be chaired by Marvin Siflinger, a nationally known housing expert and former executive director of the Mass. Housing Finance Agency. The Advisory Panel consists of a diverse group of housing academics, practitioners and financiers who have each made their mark in the field of affordable hous-

"The results of last November's elections were a wake-up call to all of us in Boston who care about affordable housing," noted Menino. "No longer can we assume that Congress will support the idea of federally subsidized housing. Times have changed and the city must change with them."

The Advisory Panel will deliver its recommendations to Menino in the fall of 1995.

"The Ugly Duckling," the classic tale of an ugly duck who turns into a swan, will be shown only at 3:30 p.m.

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
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NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR FIFTH ANNUAL COMMUNITY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its fifth annual Community Appreciation Awards Banquet on Friday, April 21 at the Knights of Columbus Hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases, unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Residents, non-residents, businesspersons and employees are urged to take the time to nominate a person, business or organization deserving of recognition.

Persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.

Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations in the past are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, improve chances of being selected.

AWARD CATEGORIES

- Youth A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1995 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Elderly A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older as of Jan. 1, 1995 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Organization An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.
- Public Servant A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)
- New Resident A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.
- Unsung Hero A Charlestown resident whose deed/deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.
