

Students' Safety Still Major Issue At The High School

The Charlestown High School Parents Council met on Jan. 22 with the school's administration to discuss safety issues at the school. The meeting was held at Bunker Hill Community College to facilitate access to the meeting for parents traveling from outside the community. This effort resulted in an increase in the council's attendance and the inclusion of minority parents.

CHS Headmaster Stacey Johnson, Assistant Headmaster Marilyn Corsini and Discipline Officer Val Shelly met with the parents. Also on hand were Boston Police Officer Jim McNamara; Mayor's Office of

Neighborhood Services Charlestown Liaison Judy Evers; Father Ron Coyne, CYO Director; and Neighborhood Council members Peter Looney, Mel Stillman, Bob Scalli and Bob Wallace. Edward Pitts from the Citywide Parents Council added his expertise to the meeting.

Parents repeated their requests to have a dress code enforced at the school and metal detectors installed at each entrance to the building. The dress code, they stated, would eliminate the intimidation resulting from students wearing oversized coats that could conceal a weapon. According to the parents, metal detectors placed at each door would

prevent weapons from being carried into the school.

Johnson admitted that wearing coats in school is not only unhealthy but also deters the student's academic performance. He stated that imposing a dress code is up to each individual school and that he would continue to consider its enforcement at the high school.

He also informed the parents that all school lockers are in the process of being repaired and new locks installed. He was also agreeable to considering designating a room in the school with adequate locks that could be used to store these coats during the day.

It was also reported to the members of the parents council that the faculty voted 67 to 33 percent against the placing of metal detectors in the school. Johnson stated that beepers have been installed at each door to signal an alarm if a stu-(continued on page 3)

The Charlestown community paused last Sunday to gather at St. Mary's Church on Warren Street to pray for the servicemen and women serving in the Persian Gulf and for peace to come to that area of the world.

The USS Constitution Color Guard and Park Rangers from the National Park Service stationed in the National Historical Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard, led the procession of clergy, religious, political and community representatives to the altar before an estimated crowd of 300 participants. The hour-long service was sponsored by St. Catherine of Siena, St. Francis de Sales and St. Mary's churches, whose parishioners joined the congregations from St. John's Episcopal Church, the First Baptist Church and the First Church in Charlestown in common prayer.

Kneeling, elbow to elbow throughout the church were veterans and parents of servicemen, children and senior citizens, community activists and teen-agers, and many families, friends and neighbors of Charlestown servicemen taking part in Operation Desert Storm.

Rev. Robert Burns, parochial vicar of St. Mary's parish, organized and led the service. Sen. Tom Birmingham and Capt. David Cashman, commanding officer of the USS Constitution, read scriptural verses. Spiritual hymns and patriotic songs led by Stephen Lee, musical director, and Theresa Roberts, soloist from St. Mary's parish, were interspersed between the readings and the recitation of the Rosary.

The deliberate and graceful manner in which Sister Ann Marie O'Malley, C.S.J., read the list of 19 names of Charlestown servicemen who represent each branch of the military serving in the Gulf, emotionally touched each person in attendance.

Participants in the service also included Rev. Daniel Mahoney, pastor of St. (continued on page 8)



Bunker Hill To Hold 'Evening At The Hampshire House'

Bunker Hill Community College will hold its second annual "Evening at the Hampshire House" on Thursday, Feb. 7 to raise funds for the scholarship endowment program.

that the Department of Youth Services has five clients at the school.

Johnson told the parents that a DYS social worker would go to the School Department at Court Street for a school assignment for a client and the first available seat would be given to that client. If that seat is at Charlestown High School, he stated, the student would be assigned to this school. He added that the school administration takes all the steps they can if these students are assigned to CHS.

Officers said that their attempts to get other parents involved in the council has not worked. Notices to Tuesday night's meeting were sent out in English, Spanish and Chinese, and the location of the meeting was moved to the college, adjacent to the Community College stop on the MBTA's Orange Line.

The council voted unanimously to enforce a dress code at the school and to have metal detectors installed at the entrances to the building. They also said they would continue to meet on the second Tuesday of each month and notices of these meetings would be placed in The Charlestown Patriot and newspapers in other neighborhoods represented by the student body.





Charlestown Recycling Committee News

A group of Charlestown residents are working to make recycling easier for the neighborhood. At its Jan. 7 meeting, the committee reviewed steps already taken and discussed plans for future activity.

The Charlestown Recycling Committee manned a table at the Christmas Walk to distribute information and collect signatures for a petition of concerned citizens who support the efforts of the city of Boston to encourage recycling and make it easier for the neighborhoods. The committee hopes to work with the city in establishing a collection station for recyclables in Charlestown and eventually curbside separation of recyclables. Already the city has begun a pilot curbside program in Jamaica Plain. Over 100 signatures have been collected on the petition so far. If you would like to sign, there are copies of the petition at the Charlestown Branch Library and at the three locations of Tuttles Cleaners in Charlestown.

The first step in making recycling easier for Charlestown has been taken already. A car-pool has been




set up to aid citizens in taking recyclables to existing city collection centers in other areas. This makes the trips easier for all concerned and it makes recycling possible for those without cars. If Charlestown citizens show their willingness to participate in car-pools. it demonstrates to the city that residents will be likely to use a collection site or participate in curbside recycling. This can help encourage the city to establish such programs here. Anyone interested in joining the car-pooling effort should contact Janet Shea at 242-1620.

The committee would also like to encourage business recycling. Farshad Sayan of Tuttles Cleaners spoke at the meeting about their recycling efforts. Tuttles has joined with Environmental Resins Ltd. to collect and reprocess plastic garment bags. Customers can return garment bags after removing pins, tags and hangers. The plastic will be used in manufacturing more bags. Other environmentally responsible practices at Tuttles and some other cleaners are the use of closed cleaning machines which do not vent fumes to the outside and non-petroleum-based cleaning fluid.

The city of Boston has recently passed an ordinance requiring that 20 percent of all garbage be recycled citywide by fiscal year 1992. John McCarthy, recycling coordinator, will speak on the impact of this new ordinance and on other city recycling programs at the next committee meeting on Monday, Feb. 4 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at the Mary Colbert Apartments, 20 Devens St. (side entrance). If you'd like to join the committee or just find out more about what you can do to recycle, please come.
