$\star$ Neighborhood Council Meetings. . Meeting On Rezoning Charlestown

Chairman Tom Cunha has announced that a meeting on the rezoning of Charlestown will be held at 7 p.m. on Monday, June 30 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss how to most efficiently plan meetings relative to zoning issues in Charlestown's seven precincts. The Neighborhood Council will eventually recommend a zoning plan to the Boston Redevelopment Authority. The committee will establish guidelines at this meeting.

The monthly meetings of the council, chaired by Peter Looney, will not be
held during July and August. The next scheduled meeting will be on Tuesday, Sept. 9.


All CNC meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend.

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## Neighborhood Council Breaks For The Summer

by Lynn Peters Thirteen of the Charlestown Neighborthood Council's 21 members met before the group's traditional summer break for a relatively fast-paced June monthly meeting, chaired by Second Vice Chairman Mel Stillman. Attending were: Secretary Jim Mansfield, Treasurer Jim Conway, and members Bob Scalli, Peg Bradley, Dan Kovacevic, Don Haska, John Dillon, Bill Galvin, Judy Brennan, David Whelan, Edna Kelly and Marty O'Brien.

The Charlestown Preservation Society's council representative Peg Bradley was selected to oversee Charlestown's participation in Boston 400, Mayor Thomas Menino's commu-nity-based planning process to celebrate the city's 400th birthday in 2030. Charlie Euchner of Boston 400 , who invited residents at the council's May meeting to work with the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) planners to discuss the public spaces and urban amenities, was advised that a neighborhood process with wide community participation could not happen until the fall.
The continuation of planning Charlestown's rezoning will become part of the council's fall agenda as well, according to BRA's Rick Shackley. Most discussions will focus on residential and light industrial zones, Shackley said. A draft of the proposed zoning will be sent to council members ahead of time so that they might become familiar with the information before community working sessions begin. "We will look at uses so
that industry will be compatible with Charlestown," Shackley said, "and performance standards will be included to address any possible negative impacts." Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha had announced that the committee will meet at 7 p.m. on Monday, June 30 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.
Council members, including Bradley and Haska, spoke of the importance of historic sites being treated as such and not as open space for park use. They also raised the need to integrate Rutherford Avenue and Sullivan Square. Council member Galvin expressed his concern that to date, BRA plans do not reflect Charlestown's adoption of two parking spaces per new housing unit in local review of developers proposals.
Resident Diane Christopher raised her concerns about whether the Domino Sugar Refinery demolition was being implemented as presented to the neighborhood by the Flatley Co. last fall. Christopher asked the council to determine whether only the structures designated for demolition, such as the towers, stacks and powerhouse building, were being removed.

- Public Safety Committee: Co-chairman Dillon reported that in May there were 33 arrests, nine of which were drug-related. There were 121 motor vehicle violations and 190 parking tickets issued. At the committee's May 13 meeting, Dillon said that residents expressed concern about young people hanging out at Main and Sullivan streets and harass-
ing people.
- Development Committee: Mansfield, in Chairman Tom Cunha's absence, reported that the committee's May 30 meeting with direct abutters to and representatives of the proposed Admiralty rental development on the Navy Yard's Parcel 4 marked the first in a series of meetings. Mansfield said neighbors made suggestions to lower the development's proposed height and density and increase the number of parking spaces.

The property, which is located at the Yard's End area between First Avenue and 16th Street, is owned by Constitution Quarters and the Shipyard Quarters Marina, and was originally proposed to support a large hotel in the Navy Yard's master plan of the late 1980s.

- Old Business: Galvin reminded council members that Charlestown's portion of the Freedom Trail seems to be permanently located by the city along a temporary route designed to accommodate earlier construction in the neighborhood. Public hearings reflected the community's recommendation to return the historic Freedom Trail to its original placement.
Council member Kovacevic added that no final design for the Freedom Trail had ever been submitted, and Jim Conway made the suggestion to send the proper officials a letter that the reconstruction work had not been properly implemented.

Haska updated the council on design and pedestrian access issues for the Charles River improvements, recommending that the

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council meet with East Cambridge residents to discuss similar concerns for the area's redevelopment. Particularly, Haska noted the substantial North Point residential construction and its impact on traffic on the Gilmore Bridge and McGrath Highway.

Council member Brennan raised concerns that upcoming toll increases on the Tobin Bridge will divert commuters into Charlestown to avoid paying the dollar. Brennan said that Charlestown will indeed feel even more traffic impacts and that Massport, while reducing residents' toll-crossing fees to 30 cents, should let Charlestown residents travel for free.

The next monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council is scheduled for Tuesday, Sept. 9 at 7 p.m. at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St. The public is encouraged to participate.

## Judicial Youth Corps Students Welcomed By SJC Chief Justice Wilkins

Lawrence Pennucci of Charlestown, a student at Charlestown High School, was among 40 high school students from area high schools selected as the 1997 Judicial Youth Corps participants. They recently met with Supreme Judicial Court Chief Justice Herbert P. Wilkins in the SJC courtroom as part of their 16 week orientation to the Mass. court system. Chief Justice Wilkins welcomed the young people, gave them a brief overview of the history and workings of the state's highest court, and answered questions.

The Judicial Youth Corps, established in 1990 by then Chief Justice Paul J. Liacos, offers Boston area high school students a
rare opportunity to leam how the court system operates through weekly educational sessions and paid summer internships in courthouses throughout Suffolk County.
Working with a program leader and a volunteer faculty of judges, lawyers and court employees from every department in the court system, the students leam about the courts and the law as it affects their lives.
Juvenile justice, criminal law, domestic violence, landlord-tenant disputes, custody and paternity issues, small claims court and alternative dispute resolution are some of the topics the students explore through class discussion,
mock hearings and other group activities.
Following the first eight weeks of classes, the students are ready for their summer assignments. Under the supervision of court employees, students work for eight weeks in various courts with judges, clerks, probation officers and others to leam how the system operates.
They are paid for their full-time work performing clerical duties, answering phones, working at counters, word processing and filing. They are also provided opportunities to observe the courtrooms in action. Some judges allow students to sit alongside them on the bench for a unique learning experi-
ence. Students generally earn about $\$ 1200$ for their summer work. Educational sessions on Fridays, which often include field trips to law firms, law schools, the State House, and the county jail, are part of their required regimen.
At the end of August, the SJC sponsors an Appreciation Day to award the students on the completion of the program, and to recognize the many judges, lawyers and court employees who devote hundreds of hours to the Ju dicial Youth Corps program. The SJC's Public Information Office administers the program as part of a continuing effort to educate the public about the Mass. court system.

## CHECK THIS 'NEW' TAX CREDIT

If you are an employer, you can reduce your 1997 tax liability if you act fast. Each employee you hire between now and September 30, 1997, can save you up to $\$ 2,100$ in taxes.

The 1996 Small Business Tax Act created a new incentive exclusively for employers, a tax break known as the Work Opportunity Tax Credit. For every qualified employee you hire between October 1, 1996 and September 30, 1997, you may take a tax credit of 35 percent of that employee's first year wages, up to a maximum wage of $\$ 6,000$. For qualified summer youth employees you hire, the first year wage maximum is $\$ 3,000$. Since a tax credit reduces your tax by one dollar for every dollar of credit, this incentive is much more beneficial to you than a tax deduction.

To be a qualified employee, and entitle you to the credit, the individual you hire must be a member of one of the targeted groups of employees defined in the tax act. The qualifying groups are:

- Qualified recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
- Qualified veterans.
- Qualified ex-felons
- High-risk youths.
- Vocational rehabilitation referrals.
- Qualified summer youth employees.
- Qualified food stamp recipients.

This is a great time to benefit by hiring qualified summer youth employees. The credit for qualified summer youth employees generally applies to individuals ages 16 or 17 years old who live in an empowerment zone or enterprise community.
