A problem occurred this week with trash collection being delayed a day when the rub-
bish truck was unable to access the street, narrowed by automobiles parked on both sides. Concerns have also been expressed as to the access of emergency vehicles to the neighborhood.
$\star$ Post Office Extends Hours Dec. 19 . . . The Postal Service is extending its business hours' on Saturday, Dec. 19 to help make this holiday mailing season more convenient. The Charlestown Post Office at Thompson Square will be open until 5 p.m. on Saturday.

To ensure holiday mail arrives at its destination in a timely manner, the Postal Service urges customers to mail early, properly address cards and packages, use correct ZIP Codes, and include a return address on all mail.
$\star$ Snow Removal . . . According to Richard Iannella, director of Code Enforcement for the city, the division will be enforcing the city's snow removal ordinances.

Iannella stated that the regulations require that within three hours of a snowstorm (between sunrise and sunset), all property owners, residential and commercial, must remove the snow from the sidewalks abutting their property. If the sidewalk is covered with ice, then salt, sand, sawdust or ashes must be placed down to prevent slipping. While this law does require a three-hour deadline for compliance, Iannella stated that the division will allow a reasonable amount of time before issuing violation notices which carry a $\$ 15$ fine.
Iannella warned chronic offenders that in addition to issuing the violation notices, his division is also prepared to take action in the Housing Court.
Since there are 715 miles of roadways in
the city, Jannella states that it is difficult to locate every violation, so he encourages the public to report uncleared sidewalks to the Code Enforcement office at 635-4896.

* Public Safety/Police Community Rela tions Meeting $\qquad$ The Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee, chaired by Mel Stillman, and Community Service Officer Joe McNulty of Area A of the Boston Police Department met with council members and residents on Dec. 8.
Drugs, stolen cars, speeding and parking problems were the main topics of discussion According to McNulty, three drug-related arrests were made the previous week, including one at Washington and Union streets and another at Bunker Hill and Vine streets.
McNulty reported on the large number of cars stolen in the town, some taken by very young kids. He said that stolen cars in Mish awum was an issue, adding that the Auto Theft Task Force has been in the town.
Council members related complaints about automobiles speeding, particularly on Warren, Main and Bunker Hill streets. Stillman stated that a police presence is needed to deter speeders, and John Dillon added that if a few speeders are issued citations, it will send a message to other motorists. McNulty said the police would make Bunker Hill and Main streets a priority for moving violations. The double parking of buses at the Har-vard-Kent School was raised as a problem by one resident. Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, stated that her office has asked the city to install signs for limited parking in'front of the school.

Another area of concern was the parking of automobiles on the corners of the newly constructed streets, especially at Monument Square and Chestnut Street. This illegal parking hampers the traffic flow on these streets.
The next scheduled meeting of the committee will be on Tuesday, Jan. 12 at 7 p.m at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St.
$\star$ Street Reconstruction Update . . . Susi closed up Mt. Vernon Street this past week with base and binder courses of pavement. This was the last of the past summer's reconstruction streets.
Efforts are now being concentrated on installing the gas street light poles which have been arriving from the manufacturer. Shipments of the gas light pole heads are expected in about two weeks, after which their installations will begin. Susi is also evaluating material requirements for the roof drain connections.
On the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) proect, the Middlesex Corp. installed the drainage on upper Mead Street and plans to strip and grade the street and sidewalk, install curb, and pave base and binder by the end of the week. Because of the weather and the snowstorm, sidewalks may have to be done in temporary asphalt. The Middlesex Corp. still intends to plant the trees this week. Once this is complete, Middlesex will probably shut down for the winter, with the exception of the stair railing installations.

Professor Al Hoose, a member of the faculty in the Fine and Creative Arts Department at Bunker Hill Community College in Charlestown, is visiting Katowice, Poland to oversec the recording of his composition "Gestures and Imitations" by the Silesian Philharmonic Orchestra which is conducted by Robert Black, an American.
