Housing Rehabilitation Programs Still Available

The Mayor's Office of Housing has announced that funding is still available in Charlestown for the Cash Back and Home Loan programs, respectively. The announcement comes as part of a major drive by the office to encourage eligible residents in particular Boston neighborhoods to participate during this construction season.

Director of the Mayor's Office of Housing, Joseph M. Courtney, said, "Every year at this time the number of people applying for our housing programs increases substantially. This year we are doing something a little different. We are targeting our attention on those neighborhoods with a great

deal of potential, but which have not been as active in the programs as have others. We want homeowners in these neighborhoods to know that the City is ready and able to help them realize more benefit from their housing investment."

Highlights of these housing programs include free energy audits to all program participants, as well as free technical assistance by housing rehabilitation and financial packaging specialists from the Mayor's Office of Housing.

Homeowners eligible for the Cash Back Program receive a full grant on attic insulation or storm windows, and rebates of 20 to 40 percent on the cost of

home repairs and other energy time.

The Home Loan Program offers long-term financing of up to 15 years with interest rates between 3 and 12 percent, well

below market rates.

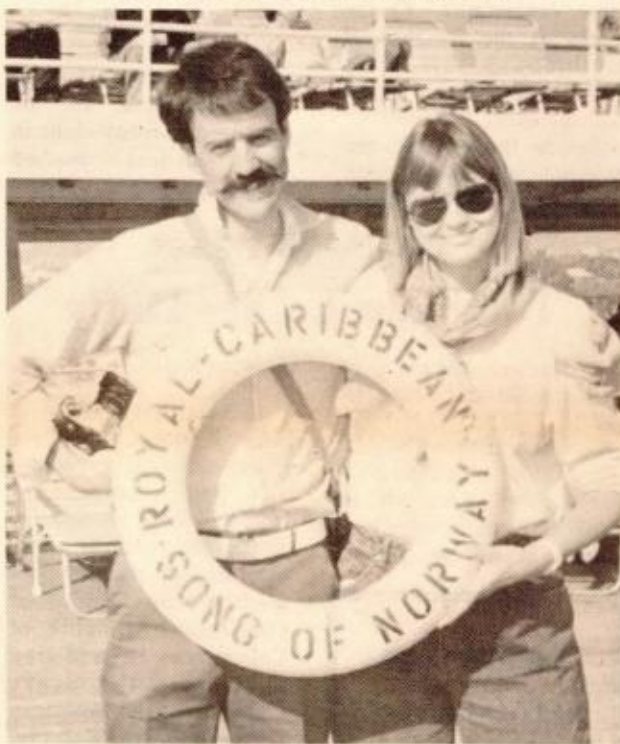

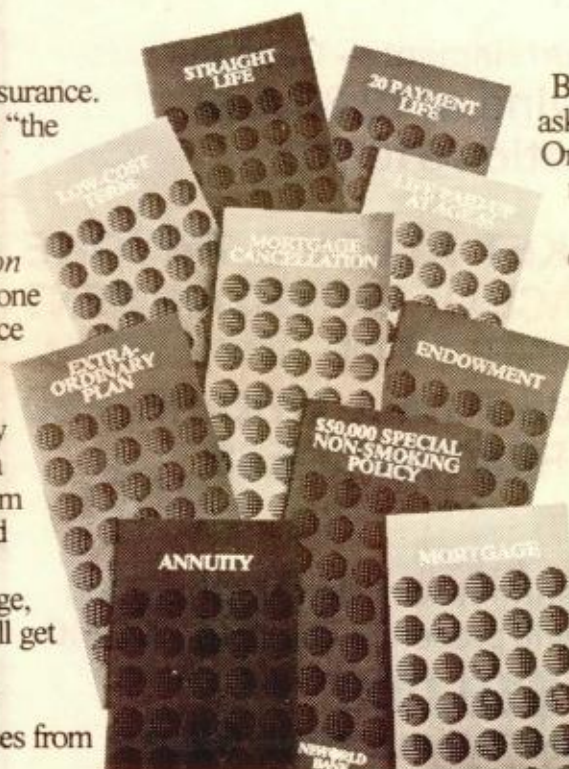

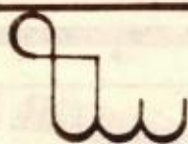

"The Dubliners" Return To America For Irish Folk Festival



THE DUBLINERS

In the backroom of a Dublin Bar - O'Donoghues - a little over twenty-one years ago, the Dubliners were distilled.

Initially they were known as the Ronnie Drew Group but Joycean Luke Kelly persuaded the rest of the lads that the Group should be called the "Dubliners".

The Dubliners will return to America as one of the features of the First Annual Berkshires Irish Folk Festival to be held at the Great Barrington Fairgrounds in Great Barrington, Mass. on June 24, 25 and 26th.

It will feature an extravaganza of musical talent, kiddie rides, pipe bands, jugglers, clowns, animal exhibits and the most natural thing in the world for an Irish festival, horse racing from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. daily.

In 1963, after the Edinburgh Festival, the group became the "new wave" of British Folk. Tours of folk clubs, concert halls and festivals throughout England took the group out of the folk world and into the mainstream of popular music. In 1967 their record "Seven Drunken Nights" reached No. 2 in the English Hit Parade and later in the same year their follow-up "Black Velvet Band" was equally successful. In 1971 the group made a debut at the Sports Hall Berlin after which their popularity was established throughout mainland Europe.

The group has appeared in most major concert halls in Britain, Germany, Holland, Sweden, Den-

mark, Australia, Finland, Belgium, Switzerland and even Iceland. They have appeared on every major British and European Television music show.

In 1978, they had a successful tour of Australia and New Zealand and returned there in 1980. In the early seventies, they toured the U.S. and Canada and next year, 1984, they intend to return there for an extensive tour.

While the success of the group throughout the world is undisputed, the Dubliners have had a few tragedies along the way. In 1974, Ciaran Burke suffered a brain hemorrhage and no longer plays with the group. In the same year, Jim McCann joined the group while Ronnie Drew took off to pursue a solo career. In 1979, the position was reversed and Ronnie rejoined the group and Jim McCann returned to his solo career. In 1980, Luke Kelly had a successful operation for the removal of a brain tumor in Cork. Luke, however, made an amazing recovery and still sings occasionally with the group.

In Autumn 1982, Sean Cannon deputized for Luke on a tour of Germany. Sean, who comes originally from Galway, but now lives in Yorkshire, has had

a very successful career on the English Folk Club Circuit for over a dozen years, earlier this year he was invited to join the English tour of the group and is now a permanent member of the Dubliners. The Dubliners are: Ronnie Drew, John Sheahan, Barney McKenna and Sean Cannon, with special "permanent guest" Luke Kelly and special guest Nigel Warren Green.

The Dubliners' popularity throughout the world is unquestionable and their contribution to folk music is unparalleled. After twenty-one years of globe-trotting, the Dubliners have never compromised through changing musical fads, making their position in world folk music unique.

The Dubliners are probably the best accident that ever happened to the music world, and contributed to it not only with their superb voices but also their extraordinary talent as musicians.

"We have not had a chance to see Washington row this year, but we know all about Dartmouth and Wisconsin," said MacDonald. "We beat Wisconsin at the Sprints and kept them out of the finals so they'll be psyched for the weekend. Plus, we beat Dartmouth twice - once during the regular season and then in the Sprint's finals. So, they'll be sky high."

"I think one major factor working on our side will be pride," concluded MacDonald. "Our kids have gone through an undefeated season and won the Easterns. Everyone wants

to end the season as national champions.

Kathy O'Neil is Coxswain for the Crew. A senior from Charlestown, she came out for rowing her freshman year with her roommate. The roommate quit soon after, but Kathy has remained. She never rowed before as her hometown is more famous for its hockey program than its rowing. "She's the best in the business," said MacDonald, who, himself was a coxswain during his collegiate rowing days. "She's very smart on the water. She thinks very

quickly, and knows how to get the most out of the people in the boat. She is definitely worth a length-and-a-half in each race for us."

Last year, she tried out for the National boat and passed up the trip to Henley that the Boston U. women's fours made. Unfortunately, she missed out on making the National team, but she will be leaving from Madison for the Pre-Elites in Indiana. That will be the first step toward hopefully making the National team.

Completes Outstanding Season

Cornelia R. Woodworth, the daughter of Mrs. Ivey St. John of Wallace Court in Charlestown and Kennard Woodworth of Orinda, California, completed an outstanding season as a member of the Sweet Briar College lacrosse team. 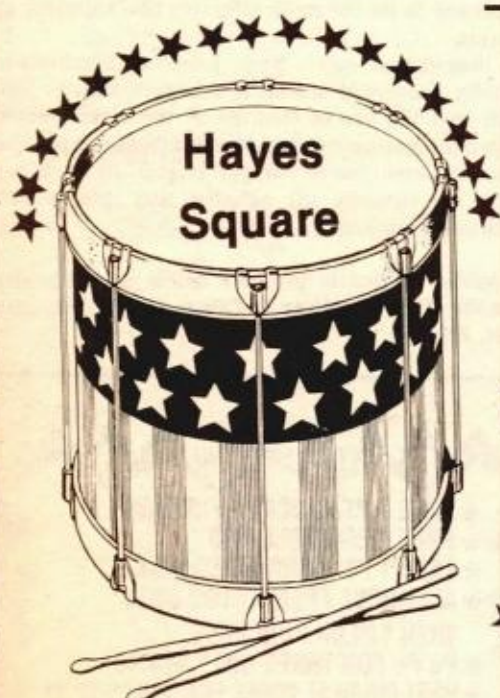

Holden Academy students in grades 6 through 12 have been learning Basic programming to create graphics programs on the school's Apple II Computer.

Although this is their first experience with computers, the students have created several innovative graphic displays. Designs include geometric shapes, houses, flags and a fountain that appears to have running water.

The commands used to create these programs are in Applesoft, a computer language which is a variation of Basic. Students are able to use the commands to run existing software as well as to create their own programs.

Ms. Sally Jeffery, who

has been teaching the computer classes is very pleased with the students' success. She credits this to their motivation and creativity as well as the challenging nature of the work.

The Academy is planning to continue instruction in programming next year. Computer-assisted teaching in math, science and other subjects is also planned. "PROMISES ARE LIKE PIE CRUST, MADE TO BE BROKEN"

So said V.I. Ulyanov, AKA Vladimir Ilyich LENIN, who also stated (among other things) that "We must practice co-existence with other nations, until we are strong enough to take over by world revolution ... We are not pacifists. Conflict is inevitable. Great political questions can only be settled by violence ... It is inconceivable that Communism and Democracy can exist side by side in the world. Inevitably, one must perish."

Abortion. As a former military careerist, we seriously question the recent pronouncement of Archbishop John R. Quinn of San Francisco who advised that "Catholic personnel should disobey the president rather than launch a nuclear weapon against an enemy's population." Don't you wonder what Harry S. We prefer to leave the matter of our nation's necessary defenses to the wisdom of our President and other responsible government officials who are constantly privy to classified information enabling them to make and effect the proper decisions.

Canadian Ships To Visit Charlestown Navy Yard

Three Royal Canadian ships out of Halifax, Canada, will visit Boston National Historical Park's Charlestown Navy Yard this week. The HMCS AS-SINIBOINE, a 366 foot long, 42 foot beam Destroyer Escort of the Anti-Submarine Frigate

Type, will be tied up June 3 through 6 astern of the USS CONSTITUTION at Pier 1 in the Navy Yard. The ship, which visited last December along with its sister ship HMCS FRASER, will be in Charlestown to work on general upkeep and to

provide crew liberty. The ship carries 13 officers and 237 seamen.

HMCS PORTE ST. JEAN and HMCS PORTE ST. LOUIS, two 125 foot long, 27 foot beam Reserve Training Ships will also be tied up at the yard for a port visit. Each carries 3

officers and 20 seamen, and were built as Auxiliary Mine Sweepers and Net Tenders.

U.S. Navy Harbormaster Scott Kavanaugh and the National Park Service Maintenance Division, headed by Dave Rose, will arrange for necessities.

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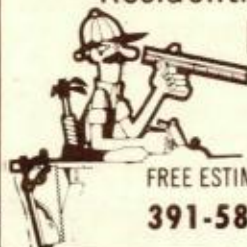
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Gardens For Charlestown
