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## Operation Watersense Offers Charlestown Home Water Conservation Materials

At a Charlestown home recently, Rep. Richard Voke and Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini were joined by Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) Executive Director Douglas MacDonald and Associate Director Elisa Speranza to launch Operation Watersense, a program which will assist Charlestown households in obtaining free water-saving fixtures through direct installation by trained crews.

Renie Murphy-Walsh welcomed an Operation Watersense crew into her home where conservation fixtures such as water-saving showerheads, faucet aerators and toilet tank dams were installed.

"Our efforts to conserve water must be ongoing and aggressive and I am glad to see the MWRA introduce programs to help conserve and control water usage," said Voke. "Water conservation has to be part of our daily routine — it makes sense and will benefit all of us."

Travaglini also advocated water conservation and participation in the MWRA program. "Operation Watersense makes good sense. From the point of view of conserving water — which we all should do — Operation Watersense is an environmental priority. And from the point of view of

cutting costs, especially in light of the rising water bills, Operation Watersense should be a household priority."

MacDonald stressed the importance of water conservation to reach the long-term goals of the MWRA. "Conservation is working," he said. "In May, water use in the MWRA system averaged 230 million gallons a day, well below our safe yield of 300 MGD. If we can preserve the precious resources of the Quabbin and Wachusett reservoirs, there will be no need, in the

future, to search for new, more costly sources of water."

In 1986, the MWRA's Board of Directors chose conservation and protection of local and existing sources as a cost-effective alternative to taking on expensive searches for new water supplies.

The MWRA long-range water supply plans include leak detection and repair of pipes and public education for commercial, industrial and domestic water users.

Operation Watersense, a joint program of the MWRA and the city of Boston is a unique partnership formed to provide and install water-saving devices directly to residential ratepayers.

As of May 1, the MWRA had completed 246,281 installations. As the program is extended, it will be offered to 730,000 households in the MWRA service area.

MacDonald said that the completed program is expected to conserve close to 6.5 million gallons of water per day, systemwide.

Operation Watersense crews will be clearly identified as they carry photo-identification cards and wear Operation Watersense caps. Along with conservation devices, the crews will offer residents literature on the subject.

Susi is expected to start work on Ludlow Street this week. There are no new water-mains planned for Ludlow Street and the new gas main is already installed. With no utility work, Susi will be able to start rebuilding the street right away. Ludlow Street is the last street in the contract for reconstruction. The remaining work will be pavement completion, finishing gas light installations, fall tree planting, signs, pavement markings and punchlist work.

On the 40 Flights project, the Middlesex Corp. has been working on its punchlist items and will be doing the finish work items such as signs to complete its contract. Some of the agencies have made their final inspection and the project is expected to be ready for acceptance within the next month.

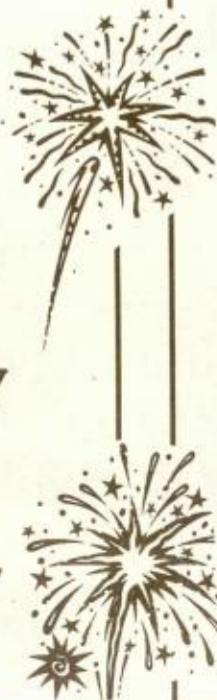

## Birmingham's MWRA Rate Relief Plan, Other Budget Proposals Pass Senate

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham's plan to provide nearly \$34 million in state aid and a property tax deduction for water and sewer rate relief passed the Senate last week, along with other Birmingham budget proposals for the next fiscal year. The budget is now before a joint House-Senate Conference Committee, co-chaired by Birmingham.

Birmingham, who, as chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee crafted the budget, said: "The Senate has passed a sound, balanced budget. We were able to fund education reform and significant MWRA rate relief without new taxes. The Senate held the line on spending, making very few changes to the original proposal."

The Senate backed both the \$30 million in state aid for water and sewer rate

relief, as well as a proposal to allow homeowners to shift a portion of water and sewer bills onto the property tax, at local option, in order to permit homeowners to deduct that amount from their personal income taxes. The Senate rate relief proposal also includes nearly \$4 million in new sewer-related tax abatements for low-income senior homeowners.

The Senate budget also fully funds education reform for the coming year.

Under the education funding plan, Boston will receive \$7.8 million more than last year. The budget also provides \$75,000 for the Life Focus Center of Charlestown, which provides job training for people with disabilities.

The Conference Committee is charged with working out differences between the House and Senate versions of the budget. The Committee is expected to complete action within the next couple of weeks.

The children spent the previous week learning about disabilities, what causes them, how disabilities affect people's everyday lives and the equipment used to cope. After that, they were ready to help.

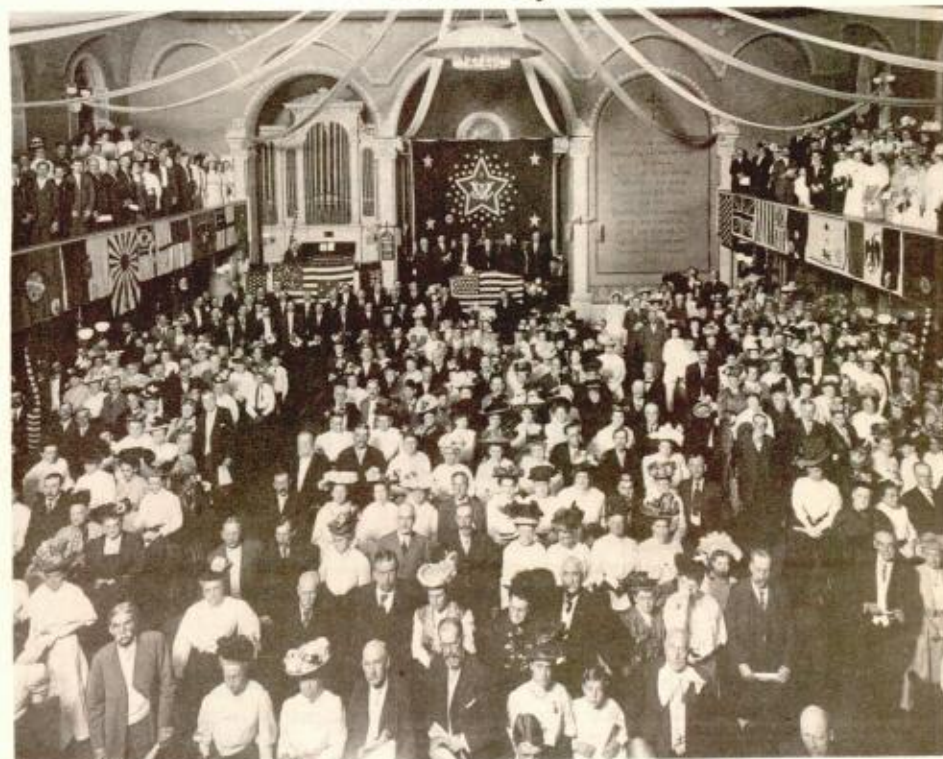

## Massport Sponsors Summer Jobs For Local Students

The Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport) committed \$810,000 to its Summer Jobs Program this season, putting 362 students to work, including 31 from Charlestown, at Massport facilities and at nearly three dozen agencies in local communities. According to Massport Executive Director Alden S. Raine, Massport increased its number of jobs by 20 percent this summer in response to the great need in the Boston area for summer employment op-

portunities.

"While many businesses were forced by the economy to reduce summer job slots, Massport was able to help fill the void by increasing our program for the third year in a row," Raine said. With this summer jobs program, Massport is the single largest funding source of summer jobs in the greater Boston area.

This year Massport provided \$810,000 for 205 positions at 34 social service agencies in communities impacted by Massport's operations (the Community Summer Jobs Program); and an additional 157 positions at Massport facilities (the Massport Summer Jobs Program). The unique

Community Summer Jobs program is in its third year, while the Massport Summer Jobs Program is in its 13th year.

The Community Summer Jobs Program, which funded positions for community agencies in Charlestown, is truly more than just a summer employment program. In some cases, Massport's financial support enabled agencies to remain open and provide staff for summer recreation, day care, social service and clean-up programs despite local budget cuts. Overall, 60 different programs will have student workers paid by Massport.

To be eligible, an agency provided proof of financial

need and verification that its programs were in demand within the community it serves. Students, on the other hand, must live in the community where they work.

The following agencies will have Charlestown students working for them: Bunker Hill Health Center, John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, Elderly and Adolescent Head Start Program at the Kennedy Center, Camp Bunker Hill, Boys & Girls Club Summer Camp, Charlestown Community Center Summer Camp, Bunker Hill Teen Council and the Courageous Sailing Center Program.

The primary goal of the Massport Summer Jobs Program is to help students finance their education through a valuable work and learning experience. Whenever possible, students are placed in jobs related to their majors in school. Students in marketing, finance, aviation, computer science, business administration and human resource management found quality placements at Massport this summer.

"Many of our students are self-supporting and from our neediest impacted communities," added Raine. "These two programs are a great way to fund jobs while supporting valuable community programs. The students, agencies, Massport and the thousands of local kids who will have supervised recreation this summer, all benefit. It's a program that works."

### District One City Council Race

#### Pizzi Candidate For District One Boston City Council

This past week at Boston City Hall, Tom Pizzi signed up to become a candidate for District One Boston City Council. Pizzi said he would focus the campaign on the number one issue, the water and sewer rates.

Pizzi is a homeowner and resident of East Boston for almost 50 years. He became outraged at the increase in the water and sewer bill for his home and concluded there were many other people who shared his anger and frustration over the water and sewer rates.

Several weeks ago, Pizzi distributed flyers throughout the district and had the first water bill protest for East Boston at the stadium. He sent letters to Senators Kennedy and Kerry asking them to attend. On that day almost 95 people came to give their water bills to the senators. The newspapers, and radio and television stations came to record the protest. Unfortunately, Kennedy and Kerry did not come to the protest. Pizzi told the crowd, "We will withhold our support for the senators until they fulfill our demands."

The demands include a roll back of the water and sewer rates to the level before the creation of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) and federal funding of the MWRA.

At the rally, Pizzi was asked where the federal government would get the money to fund the MWRA. He said, "The money would come from the federal space program." Further Pizzi said, "Reasonably priced water and sewer rates is the most basic function of the government. Everyone of us should expect our elected government officials to understand this number-one issue. The elected officials who do not understand this basic function of government do not deserve to stay in office."

To date, Pizzi has distributed over 10,000 flyers. He has received a few hundred water bills and many calls of support. He has had many conversations with average people about the hardship caused by the water and sewer bill. One of

## Birmingham And Wetmore Support The Korean War Memorial

Construction is underway at the site of the Massachusetts Korean War Memorial in the Shipyard Park of the Charlestown Navy Yard, according to Senators Thomas F. Birmingham and Robert D. Wetmore, the chairman and vice-chairman, respectively, of the Senate Ways and Means Committee. The Ways and Means Committee's proposed state budget for next year includes \$175,000 to help support construction of the memorial.

"It's the least we can do to honor those who served," said Birmingham.

Wetmore, a Korean War veteran, said, "The dedication of the Korean War Memorial is planned for July 27, the 40th anniversary of

the cease-fire agreement that ended active combat in Korea."

Sculptor Robert Shure of Woburn is nearing completion on the centerpiece, a nine-foot high, two-ton bronze statue of a Korean War foot soldier standing watch in cold weather gear.

"The statue will bear the names of the seven Massachusetts residents who received the Medal of Honor for service during the Korean War," said Birmingham, "and columns around the statue will include the names of the 1500 Korean War casualties and persons listed as 'missing in action' from Massachusetts."

The list of casualties and MIAs is being revised

has a shortfall of approximately \$5,000 with a promise of \$1,500 from a prior commitment that was not fulfilled.

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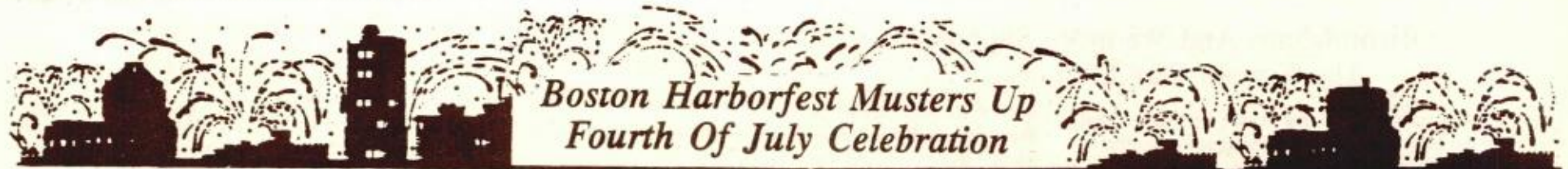

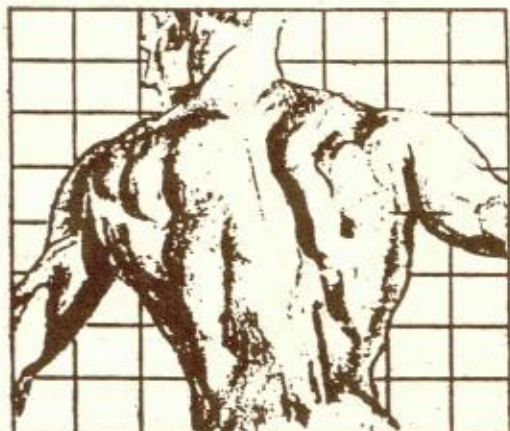

Officially, Bunker Hill Day wasn't really celebrated in Boston and Suffolk County until Thursday, June 17 the actual holiday. Kids don't have school in Boston on the 17th and never have had. The annual parade once was held on the 17th of June no matter where it fell in the week. But in more recent years, it has been moved to the Sunday prior to the 17th to allow more folks the pleasure of either watching or marching in this annual community rite.

years and though I have lived on the South Shore since marrying, a part of me will always be connected back to my mother's family "home."

My thoughts on Charlestown always come to the forefront in June because of Bunker Hill Day and the parade. In recent years I have missed more than a few of them but make the most of the ones I get to. As a child, I remember lining up across from old Station 15 in City Square. I remember

Over the years I have watched — God knows — how many parades in Charlestown. I didn't grow up here but my mother did and her Townie spirit brought us back each year to renew her neighborhood ties. She grew up in St. Mary's parish over near the Mary Colbert Apartments when it was still the old Harvard School. Her childhood in Charlestown left her with many good memories. I can remember back in the late 50s attending house parties and meeting my mother's old friends and neighbors, the Harkins, the McLaughlins, the Devlins, etc.

Little did I know that eventually my mother would come back to Charlestown when she convinced my father to return here in the late 60s. Charlestown has changed much over the years. Old families have either died out or moved out. My mother and father have both passed away. All my Irish uncles from Charlestown are also gone. Often as I drive over the Gilmore, or Prison Point bridge as I still call it, I can remember my uncle Jim's potato shed. I can sometimes still smell the smoke from the terrible fire at the sheds back in 1964 that filled the skies over Charlestown.

My mother was a Townie. She was born, raised, educated and spent most of her life in St. Mary's parish. She was baptized there in 1909 and buried from there in 1992. My maternal grandparents were married there in 1907 and I did likewise in 1984. I am not a Townie and never will be but I was handed respect for this community as a child and became a part of it as a young adult. I enjoyed my Charlestown

watching James Michael Curley riding by in a big old Caddy. He'd be waving, and folks like my mother would hand him a rose. He wasn't just an old politician. He was a living legend, a symbol that Irish-Americans had finally made it in the city of Boston's power structure. Usually, when I think of Charlestown, I think of my mother who was very Charlestown Irish. I can still smile as I remember her one year chasing after her father as he tried unsuccessfully to make it unnoticed into a City Square watering hole. My mother was as spunky as they come and must have inherited that from poor Grandpa Harrington. However, my father, originally from the Sacred Heart parish over in the North End, came to appreciate my mother's love for Charlestown. Once during a Bunker Hill Day Parade, he spotted then-Gov. John Volpe marching and introduced me to him. My father also praised to the hilt former Lt. Gov. Frank Kelly who would push his idea for a N.H.-like Sweepstakes for the Bay State. He was the forerunner and prophet for the eventual state Lottery pushed by Bob Crane. My father would always root for both Gabe Piemonte and Fred Langone as they marched by him. Overall, I saw the trend there. My mother tended to go with Irish names and my father with Italian ones.

Over the years I've even marched in the parade and saw first-hand how my parents involved themselves with passing marchers. In 1981, I marched with the Peoples Firehouse

It is hard to block out Charlestown. There isn't a sunblock made that can do that. I get back here as often as I can. I keep up friendships just as my mother did before me. Charlestown isn't just a piece of geography, it's a state of mind. You can travel thousands of miles and never leave it. Charlestown has a drawing force uniquely its own. I personally feel it the strongest around Bunker Hill Day and the Parade but there's always a low-level feel for the place. I got to the parade this year and hopefully so did you. As the old town seal once said, "A Trust to be transmitted to Posterity." What more than that can you say?

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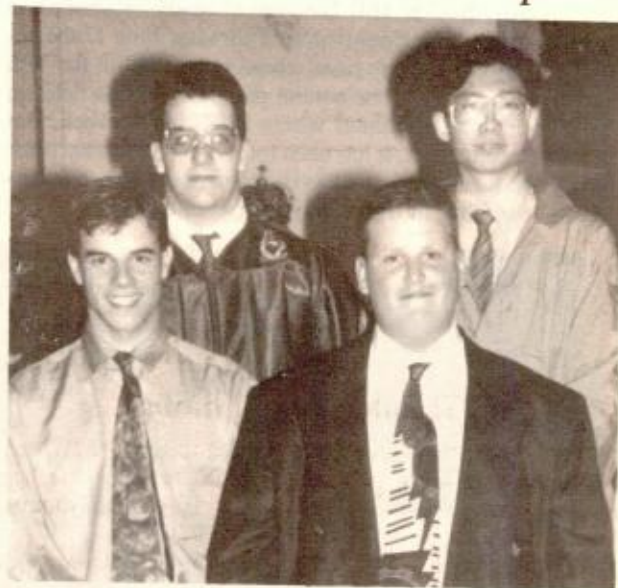

We are writing this letter on the behalf of the more than 65 girls from our town who are members of the St. Catherine's Townies and Little Townies Color Guards.

As most of you know, the color guard program was started by Father Ronald Coyne and hard working management, staff and parents. We started out in 1990 with one guard which had 24 members, last year we had two guards with 48 members. We now have over 65 girls!!

As you can see, this program has been very successful and it is one of the few activities in Charlestown designed and run specifically for our young girls. This program runs throughout the whole year. We are looking forward to the future and the possibility of adding a third color guard next year!!

Our main concern (besides our financial needs) is a practice facility for these young ladies. We need a full-size gym three times per week, and have been running into obstacles every step of the way. We currently have limited use of the Kent Gym on Monday nights and are grateful to the Community Centers and their support, and also to Kevin Smith who volunteers his time during the winter to provide a place for the girls to practice. But with the growing numbers, the time is split in half for two guards and this became insufficient.

What concerns us is that we have been trying to get an answer from the Executive Director of the new YMCA located in the Charlestown Navy Yard for just one day per week practice time. After numerous phone calls and visits to the YMCA over the past several months, we have not even had the decency of a returned phone call.

our community. When we run into road blocks like this we become very discouraged as the future of the color guard activity in Charlestown becomes jeopardized if we are not able to secure enough practice time for our girls.

**Maciejewski Receives 'Terrific Teachers' Award**

Barbara Maciejewski, an elementary teacher at the Harvard-Kent School, is a recipient of the 1993 "Terrific Teachers Making A Difference" Award from The Edward F. Calesa Foundation. Maciejewski, who has been a teacher for

over 25 years, is one of 48 teachers in Massachusetts to receive the distinguished award.

The Edward F. Calesa Foundation has developed an innovative recognition award program to address the problems facing children in the 1990's, an approach called Terrific Teachers Making a Difference. It is designed to recognize and celebrate the power teachers have to positively influence the lives of children. The goal of Terrific Teachers Making a Difference is to recognize and motivate teachers by expressing respect and appreciation for their contributions in the classroom.
