

Charlestown Crime Prevention Program Underway

On Tuesday, March 13th, the first "get together" of the Charlestown Crime Prevention Program was held at the Elderly Lounge, 55 Bunker Hill Street, (Housing Project Ad-ministration Building). At this meeting area residents discussed crimes against the elderly and met the anti-crime team which consists of Charlestown residents Pauline Davis, Judy McCarthy, Maude Campbell, Rita Carroll, Kay Rooney, and Charles Clabaugh. The anti-crime team will be responsible for implementing the crime prevention program which has been funded by the State's Department of Elder Affairs through the Kennedy Center's Elderly Lounge. Throughout the spring mem-

bers of the anti-crime team will be visiting the elderly of Charlestown; primarily in the Housing Project and CharlesNewTown. During these visits the elderly will discuss

their experiences with crime and will be asked how they feel it might be prevented. The elderly will then be encouraged to join a "block watch": a group of neigbors organized to protect and look out for one another. The organizing of "block watches" will be the primary goal of the program because they have been proven so successful in New York City and other parts of the country. Once "block watches" are organized, they will be invited to meet monthly at the Elderly Lounge in order to continue to develop as an effective unit. Monthly "gettogethers", such as the one held on Tuesday, will be held for all participants to share ideas and discuss common problems.

Representatives of the police and social service agencies will be invited to these meetings to provide information on security and other topics participants in the program would like to know about.

So far members of the anticrime team have met with individual elderly and members of local groups, such as the Tenants Task Force of the Housing Project and the Advisory Board of the Elderly Lounge. The program has met with the approval of these people but to succeed it will require the support of a much wider range of people. Crime prevention is possible but we must combat the problem as a group and not as individuals. Please welcome the members of the anti-crime team into your homes and give them as much help as you can. They will carry letters of introduction from the Kennedy Center's Elderly Lounge and their pictures are appearing in the Patriot so that you will be better able to identify them.

Although the program is dir-

ected primarily at the elderly in the Housing Project and CharlesNewTown, all concerned residents of any age or neighborhood are urged to participate. The "block watch" concept would work well in any part of Charlestown. If you are in-

An important notice to our customers in Ward 2.

The Boston Water and Sewer Commission has launched a pilot metering program in which 5,000 new water meters with outside reading devices (ORD's) will be installed, free of charge, in specially-selected homes across the City. The ORD enables the Commission to read a meter whether or not a customer is at home, decreasing the number of bills based on estimated readings.

The homes selected to receive the new meters are those where the Commission has in the past been unable to read the meter or where readings simply cannot be obtained.

Several hundred homes in Ward 2 are scheduled to receive these new meters over the next few weeks. These customers should be aware of three important points:

> The meters will be installed by the Central Installation Company of Frasier, Michigan. Some of the Central Installation staff will be driving vehicles with out-of-state license plates and all staff will carry cards identifying themselves as company staff.

Water will be shut off for a few minutes in each home during meter installation, which takes about one hour.

A tiny hole (about 5/6") must be drilled through the wall of each house through which to connect the meter wiring.

If you would like to have one of these new meters installed, please contact Central Installation at 244-1165. There is no charge for the meter or its installation.

C.H.S. Students Taking Photography Course

Six budding young photographers, all students at Charlestown High School, are learning the basics of 35millimeter photography in a unique course being given at the Mutual Insurance Liberty Company

The Photography course has been meeting on a weekly basis since early January in the Audio-Visual Department at Liberty Mutual's Home Office in downtown Boston. The course is a continuing part of the C.H.S./ Liberty Mutual Partnership Program, and has been offered to interested students every year since the program was begun in 1974.

Those C.H.S. students who are participating in the Photography course this year are Sheila Hamilton, William Killoran, John Passalacqua, Gayle Sweeney, John Wallace, and Patricia Ward. The students use 35millimeter cameras that are provided to them for the duration of the course by the Audio-Visual

Department.

Company photographers William Garnier and George DiSario are teaching the course, which initially concentrates on introducing the students to the 35millimeter camera and its usage. As the course progresses, the development of skills and efficiency in the printing of blackand-white film in the darkroom is also stressed.

'Our aim is to have the students understand the technical, compositional and creative aspects of the photographic medium," said Garnier. "We want to familiarize them totally with the camera,' he added, "so they can have fun taking pictures.'

The Photography course will conclude in mid-April with a showing of students' black-andwhite and color prints outside Liberty Mutual's cafeteria. The exhibit will also be displayed at Charlestown High School in late April

Juvenile Problems Object Of Study

Commissioner Joseph Jordan and Captain William MacDonald of District 15 today announced that the Charlestown District of the Boston Police Department is one of two departments participating in an effort to identify improved methods for dealing with juvenile problems. The Boston Department will participate in this study, which is supported by a grant from the National Institute for Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (U.S. Department of

Justice), in conjunction with the Boston University Center for Criminal Justice.

According to Professor Sheldon Krantz, Director of the Center, the Center's staff will work with the Boston Police Department in Charlestown and the Stamford, Connecticut Police Department to identify the nature of the juvenile problem in the community, to analyze how police and other local agencies currently respond to particular criminal and non-criminal

juvenile problems and how they might improve the ways in which they handle these problems. "Although juvenile problems constitute a large percentage of police work," Krantz stated, "there have been few efforts to address these probems in a comprehensive fashion.' "Boston and Stamford were selected as the cities in which to examine new possibilities," he added, "because the police executives in each of the communities expressed a willingness to commit time and resources to studying juvenile problems and considering alternative ways of responding to them." A task force, composed of

representatives of the police and other public and private agencies, will be formed in each community to provide guidance on an ongoing basis to the project. In addition, the project intends to solicit the views and participation of Charlestown residents, -- adults and juveniles -- through discussions, interviews

Many remember the glory years of the late fifties and early sixties when, in a single calendar year, the "Townies" captured the District League Championship in all five major sports, hockey, basketball, baseball, track, and football.

It was during these years that a very strong organization was formed by parents, friends, and concerned citizens of the town. The organization, the BOOSTER CLUB, raised a great deal of money to support high school activities and athletic programs. As the founders of this highly successful group began to meet other obligations and go their separate ways, the organization ceased to exist.

For too many years now, the Charlestown youngsters attending the local high school have been forced to indulge in various fund-raising endeavors in order to support activities which were once funded by the BOOSTER CLUB. Chances, raffles, cake sales, pop corn sales, etc., have long plagued the families and close associates of C.H.S. students. Finally, somebody has decided to attempt to do something about the situation.

Frank Perreault of the Youth Activities Commission and Leo Carey of the Neighborhood Youth Corps are investigating avenues which they eventually hope will lead to the formation of the CHARLESTOWN HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

They stated, "The primary purpose of the organization will be to make available funds to those students and programs the group feels can best benefit from financial support. We have in mind such things as annual scholarships, financial assistance to needy students, financial support to educational and athletic programs, and any other worthwhile endeavor not subsidized through city funding. For example, the hockey team is allowed two hours of ice time each week for practice sessions.

Day Care Task Force Organized In Charlestown

A Task Force with representatives from Charlestown agencies who provide day care or whose users need day care has been meeting at the Community Center since January. The task force was formed to follow up on the need for day care expressed by many visitors to the Women's Van when it came to Charlestown in the fall.

The day care requests on the Van indicated a need for more low income day care slots in Charlestown, a sliding scale and full fee day care center for those ineligible for low income slots, child care for children under 3, and for children of Community College students. Some people also sought family day care which is provided in the babysitter's home.

Before trying to set up a program to meet these needs, the committee needs further information. Any other practice sessions are paid for by the players or the coaching staff. I know for a fact that Coach John Morris personally paid hundreds of dollars for ice time over the past few seasons. It is not right for him or the players to support the team financially. It would be foolish to suppose that Charlestown High School, or any school for that matter, could compete with teams whose practice time doubles and even triples their own. This is only one reason why I feel the school needs the support of an Alumni Organization." Frank Perreault oozed with enthusiasm and optimism last week as he spoke of the proposed group. Continuing, he reminded those of us with him that, "Every year Charlestown kids graduate from the school with hopes of furthering their education. Many times they possess the necessary ability, but the lack of financial assistance prevents them from achieving their goals. We hope the organization of an alumni fund can accomplish this end."

In order to get this project off the launching pad, Frank is asking assistance from former Charlestown High School students, especially class officers.

"It's true that there are not that many Charlestown kids currently attending C.H.S., but I think the kids who are there deserve to be recognized, maybe more now than ever before," Frank stated.

By meeting with class officers and other interested alumni, Frank feels he will be able to convey his message, and with their assistance, drum up enough interest to make the CHARLESTOWN HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION a successful organization.

"We have other things in mind as well." He went on. "We envision an annual C.H.S. Reunion. Not a reunion to bring a single class together for an evening, but rather one that will bring the alumni of Charlestown High School, any graduate from any class, together for an evening of socializing. If the response is as great as I hope it might be, we will find a place big enough to accommodate everybody."
