

Charlestown Squirt B Team Wins State Championship!

Charlestown Youth Hockey's Squirt B team travelled to Fitchburg last weekend to compete in the Mass. Hockey State Tournament. Charlestown qualified for the tournament by winning the District 1 championship earlier this month.

Four divisions with four teams each began round robin play on Friday and Charlestown opened with a 5-3 win over Cape Cod. The team came out a little flat on Saturday morning, but managed to rally from a twogoal deficit to tie Duxbury 2-2. The Townies clinched a berth in the semi-finals with a 5-3 win over Milton on Saturday night.

In Sunday morning's semi-final game against Arlington, Charlestown scored 30 seconds into the game and never looked back, going cn to a 9-3 victory to set up the Sunday evening showdown with the defending state champions from Medford.

Charlestown scored first, but after two periods found themselves trailing 3-2. Coach Steve "Bimba" Brennan inspired the team in the short break between periods, and they responded with



Flatley Hosts St. Patrick's Day Party For Senior Citizens



Further issues regarding the level of tolls, the surface restoration above the depressed Central Artery and property losses to the city's tax base because new facilities will occupy previously taxable Boston properties also raise significant concerns to Boston residents.


Charlestown Is Filled With Good People!

BORROWING FROM YOUR CORPORATION

An advantage of owning a successful corporation is the ability to borrow money from it - perhaps when it would be difficult to obtain a loan from other sources.

However, the IRS scrutinizes transactions between shareholders and corporations. When the IRS is successful in re-characterizing purported loans as something else, the tax results can be nasty. The IRS may say a loan from a corporation to a shareholder is really a disguised dividend. That's very unfavorable for C corporations - because the "dividend" is income to the shareholder, but the corporation gets no deduction.

S corporation shareholders are taxed on corporate income whether it is paid out to them or retained in the corporation. Therefore, the IRS may argue that a loan between an S corporation and its shareholder-employee is actually additional compensation - that is, wages subject to payroll taxes. The corporation will then owe FICA (social security and Medicare) taxes on the "loan" amount. This can happen to a C corporation too, but the IRS will usually try the more damaging disguised-dividend approach first. How are problems like this avoided? The short answer is that loan transactions should be conducted as if the owner were a third party. Loans should be documented by written, interest-bearing notes, and the financial records of the corporation and the shareholder should reflect loans receivable and loans payable, respectively. The shareholder's net worth should indicate an ability to repay the loans when they are made. The borrower should make payments of interest and principal as the terms dictate; doing so indicates a genuine creditor/borrower relationship. A little paperwork can head off major tax problems in the area of shareholder loans.

WIC PROGRAM TO HOLD EVENING HOURS

The MGH Bunker Hill Health Center WIC Program are holding evening appointments one Wednesday evening each month. The WIC office will be open for appointments until 6 p.m. for people who work or attend school and are unable to attend a daytime appointment.

WIC is the supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children. The program provides special foods and nutrition education for pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children under age 5. To become eligible, a person must have a low or moderate income, and may need a referral from their doctor if they don't see a BHHC doctor or nurse already.

WIC participants are seen individually by a nutritionist where risk factors (like low iron blood) are addressed, and ways to correct the problems are suggested. Checks are then given which allows the participant to buy infant formula, milk, juice, beans, peanut butter, eggs, cheese and cereal. Advice on breast feeding can provide welcome support for the first time mother.

Currently, WIC appointments are being scheduled on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8:45 a.m. to 4 p.m., as well as one evening per month. Interested people can call the WIC office Monday through Friday at 724-8198 for general information and income guidelines. All pregnant women and newcomers to Charlestown with children under age 5 are encouraged to inquire.

The good news is that 176,00 Bay State families already receive the Earned Income Credit (EIC). The bad news is that tens of thousands of additional Bay State workers may be eligible, but don't claim the EIC.

The EIC is now available to more families than ever and the maximum benefit is now worth as much as \$2,528 for some. Even those who owe nothing in federal taxes can receive a check for the amount due.

You're eligible if, in 1994:

 you had more than one child in your home and earned less than \$25,296;

you had one child in your home and earned less that
 \$23,755;

 you had no children in your home, but were between the ages of 25 and 64, and earned less than \$9,000.

This is a rare win-win situation. Increased usage of the EIC not only puts money in the pockets of families who are struggling to make ends meet, but they in turn will spend those dollars, giving a boost to the local economy.


Kennedy Center Taking Applications For Building Trades Apprenticeships Program


Assisting in the transportation were Teamsters Local 25, the Flatley Co., the Boys & Girls Club and the city's Elderly Commission.

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Voke And Birmingham Urge Prompt U. Plan Participation

Senate's Ways and Means Committee, has previously served as Chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

opportunity, Voke and Birmingham said the program does more than provide a college financing option. In fact, it is part of a long term strategy by the legislature to ensure the future economic environment of the commonwealth. NPS Free Exhibit Chronicles First African World War II Combat Ship

The Boston National Historical Park has opened a special exhibit on the World War II ship USS Mason and her crew at the Charlestown Navy Yard, announced Superintendent John J. Burchill. The exhibit is part of the park's ongoing commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of World War II.

At a time when most African Americans in the U.S. Navy were relegated to duty as cooks and stewards, one ship made history. USS Mason, a destroyer escort, built and commissioned at the Charlestown Navy Yard in 1944, was the only American warship carrying a black crew to see combat. Her exploits in the Atlantic are only now being widely known and recognized.

* Massport And Boston Signs New Pilot Agreement . . . Mayor Thomas M. Menino and Mass. Port Authority Executive Director/CEO Stephen P. Tocco have signed a new agreement that dramatically boosts Massport's payments in lieu of taxes ("PILOT") to the city of Boston. Beginning this July, Massport's PILOT payment will increase from \$6 million to \$10 million a year, with annual adjustments based on the increase in the consumer price index. In signing the 10-year agreement, Menino and Tocco resolved a five-year impasse in negotiations between the city of Boston and Massport over PILOT.

"The success of both the city of Boston and Massport requires a positive working relationship," said Menino. "The new PI-LOT agreement is a major step in building trust and cooperation."

"This historic PILOT agreement is a further demonstration of Massport's commitment to a new partnership with the city of Boston," said Tocco. "This is an important milestone to developing the kind of airport and seaport that will boost the stature of Boston and Mass. within the global economy."

The new PILOT agreement reflects the increase in value of Massport's properties and Massport's acquisition of additional property since the first PILOT agreement was signed in 1978. It also takes into account current and planned Massport

projects, such as the \$1.2 billion *Logan* 2000 airport modernization program. Mass. law prescribes four factors for determining the level of PILOT payments: 1) property taxes elsewhere in Boston; 2) Massport's impact on Boston; 3) Massport's needs to maintain or improve its facilities; and 4) general economic conditions.

One key element of the PILOT agreement creates a process for Massport to make additional annual payments of up to \$1.5 million with CPI-based adjustments, once the Authority works out a new mitigation agreement with community groups in East Boston, the community most directly affected by Massport's projects. Once this mitigation agreement is in place, the new PILOT annual payments will amount to \$11.5 million, almost double the current \$6 million per year payments.

The new PILOT agreement follows the Jan. 30 launching of a new Massport-Boston Redevelopment Authority partnership to create a Seaport Economic Development Plan, which would utilize the waterfront property owned by the two agencies to promote maritime-related industries, tourism and overall revitalization. This partnership, which calls for both agencies to contribute \$350,000 each to fund the effort, marks the first time Massport and the BRA have worked together on a joint economic development project.

Massport's Board approved both items at a special board session on March 10.

"Initiatives of this kind put into place a means for maintaining ongoing communication between Massport and the city of Boston, and a process to work together to resolve problems as they arise," said Tocco. "We are very pleased in that we have established a new and more positive Massport-Boston relationship."

★ Do You Have Migranes? ... Volunteers Sought . . . The Headache Management Program at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital in Boston is seeking volunteers for a study of a new, experimental oral medication for moderate to severe migraine headaches.


To be eligible for the study, volunteers must be between the ages of 12 and 65 and have any type of headaches no more than 10 days a month. Parental or guardian consent is required for subjects ages 12 to 17. There is no cost to study participants, and a small stipend will be paid to those who complete the study.

The study will require two visits to Spaulding for blood and urine tests, an electrocardiogram, interview and neurological examination. Participants will be asked to treat one moderate to severe headache with the study medicine or placebo and to record any reactions and changes in their headaches. Participants also may become eligible to participate in a year-long follow-up study.

Business Praises Voke

Having made job creation and the economy one of his top priorities, Rep. Richard Voke was pleased to accept the recognition of islature," wrote John Gould, president and CEO of the 3,400 member Associated Industries of Mass. in thanking Voke for his to insurance experts, the legislature's reform measure enacted in 1991.

Beyond the workers' compensation rate victory,

business leaders who recently praised the legislature's work to stimulate economic activity in the commonwealth. Specifically mentioned was the recent announcement of a 16.5 percent decrease in worker's compensation rates. The decrease translates into a savings of \$200 million for Mass. employers.

"The 1994 and 1995 reductions represent the only decreases in workers' compensation insurance rates in the past 20 years. This development is a major step forward in the reform of the workers' compensation system in Mass. A significant amount of the credit for this accomplishment belongs to the legwork on this issue.

Acknowledging the kudos, Voke said, "In order to provide the opportunity for all Mass. residents to hold down a job, we must remove impediments for business to expand and locate here. A 16 1/2 percent decrease, on the heels of a 10 percent decrease last year, in workers' compensation rates certainly is a substantial move in the proper direction."

Back in January, Voke had advocated for a double digit rate decrease and expressed his satisfaction with having had an impact in the record setting decrease. An even more noteworthy effort in this reduction was, according Mass. businesses have benefitted from legislative initiatives which served to freeze the unemployment insurance rates for two straight years, increase the investment tax credit and establish creative loan programs for small companies. "As competition for job

creating businesses becomes more intense on a state and national level, we must market Mass. as a viable and strong setting for business. While its reassuring to know business leaders feel we are proceeding on the proper course I will, in no way, let our past successes lighten my resolve to provide a strong Mass. economy," concluded Voke.

NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR FIFTH ANNUAL COMMUNITY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its fifth annual Community Appreciation Awards Banquet on Friday, April 21 at the Knights of Columbus Hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases, unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Residents, non-residents, businesspersons and employees are urged to take the time to nominate a person, business or organization deserving of recognition.

Persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.

Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations in the past are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, improve chances of being selected.

AWARD CATEGORIES

· Youth - A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1995 whose deeds have gone unheralded.

· Elderly - A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older as of Jan. 1, 1995 whose deeds have gone unheralded.

· Organization - An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.

· Business - A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.

· Public Servant - A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)

· New Resident - A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.

· Unsung Hero - A Charlestown resident whose deed/deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.




