$\star$ Main Street . . . Once again Main Street is the site of yet another bicyclemotor vehicle accident.

The accident occurred at approximately 5 p.m. on June 12 in the vicinity of 300 Main St. According to the police report, a 1993 Nissan was being operated by a man from Groton, Mass, in a northerly direction on Main Street when a 13-year-old Tewksbury boy came out of Tibbetts Town Way onto Main Street on a bicycle without stopping or slowing down.
The report went on to say that the driver stated he was driving 20 to 25 miles per hour and attempted to stop when contact was made.
The vehicle reportedly had left front fender, hood and windshield damage, and the bike was totaled.
The boy was taken to Mass. General Hospital by a Health and Hospitals ambulance for leg, back and head injuries.

* Street Reconstruction Update Mario Susi \& Son continued street construction work this week on Prescott and Prospect streets while the landscape sub-
> contractor, Schumacher, continued planting and bricking in the tree wells on Mt. Vernon, Russell and Bunker Hill streets and Old Rutherford Avenue. Susi also did a good job picking up and getting things ready for the Bunker Hill Day Parade, Road Race and other festivities on the streets within the project limits.
> On Prescott Street, the roadway was compacted and fine graded in preparation for paving and the new sidewalk was completed.
> On Prospect Street, Susi continued to excavate the roadway and put in a new gravel subbase. He also started the preparation and pouring of the new concrete sidewalks. The new fire alarm box was installed at old Edgeworth Street as well. The Boston Gas Company was on site to install the service feeds to the new gas lights as Susi excavated the trenches.
> Susi started the new gas light work on Monument Square this week with the cutting of the pavement and the installation of many of the new gas light bases. The gas company is working with Susi on this street also to install the gas service connections to the new lights.

As the job approaches the last couple of streets, the Boston Redevelopment Authority, city agencies having authority over the various portions of the work and Bryant Associates are working on the develpoment of punchlist items of work. This work listing is for the clean-up and repair of deficiencies found in the contract work, such as repair of a sidewalk that has cracked or connecting roof drains, etc. It is anticipated that this type of work will be on-going as construction winds down on the last couple of streets on the project. There are still gas light installations and paving to be done on several streets as well as the fall planting of trees. New street signs and pavement markings like crosswalks and stop lines have yet to come, but probably will within the month.
On the Mead Street stairs project, the contractor has been doing punchlist work and we are waiting for city agency inspections before the project can be closed out and accepted. The signs and internal crosswalks should be done shortly.

Voke indicated that he looked forward to debating the merits of the bill when it reaches the full body of the House.
"While auto insurance rates continue to skyrocket, 1 am pleased the Insurance Committee has offered a blue print for auto insurance reform. I particularly like their demands for a strong crackdown on insurance fraud. Honest folks should not have to pay for those individuals who use deceptive practices to make

a buck," said Voke. According to the proponents of the insurance reform plan, basic insurance policies for automobiles will be less expensive under their initiative. The measure will benefit working families, senior citizens and new drivers. Those with poor driving records, however, will be required to pay more.

Voke said other reforms include the establishment of an Auto Insurance Trust Fund which will provide $\$ 400,000$ to Boston to fight a high incidence of insurance fraud and car theft, a five year suspension of a driver's license for anyone convicted of auto theft, the election of an insurance commissioner rather than a gubernatorial appointment and several medical and legal reforms aimed at reducing insurance costs.
"By enacting sorely needed reforms, the legislature's goal of making auto insurance more affordable for consumers is one step closer to fruition. As the dialogue continues on ways to reach this goal, I will remain vigilant in my efforts to reduce insurance premiums," concluded Voke.
