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The city crews had worked to clear and salt the roadways and this annual undertaking, to bring a little Christmas cheer to Charlestown's elderly, needy shutins was underway.

Last minute packing of fruit, juice, milk and a Christmas ornament made by Charlestown's Girl Scouts was taken on by a crew at the Mary Colbert Apartments. A last minute check of the names and addresses of the recipients and

the assigning of delivery teams was completed and "Townie Santa" was on his or her way.

Aquarium Proposal Met With Skepticism In Community

New England Aquarium officials' plans for a new home in the Charlestown Navy Yard were met with mixed reviews when presented to townspeople officially for the first time on December 19. Residents seemed concerned about preliminary design and traffic and parking schemes, while aquarium, Charlestown Neighborhood Council and Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) representatives seemed to feel good about the results of Monday night's meeting.

Residents understood traffic and parking studies presented to them were in the infancy stages but had questions and criticisms for the experts. TAMS and Linea 5 traffic and parking study spokesmen maintained that their analyses were not definitive and done purely to suggest that solutions to accommodate the influx of aquarium visitors were possible.

Linea 5's parking studies suggested five possible sites, including a Massport property under the Tobin Bridge and National Park Service (NPS) land. Questions were raised whether either agency was willing to have their site used for the aquarium's parking.

John Burchill, NPS superintendent, was on vacation until next month, but his deputy Wendell Simpson said NPS "had not been a part of any specific planning process." Simpson added that NPS is "interested in ways to encourage additional visitors to the park."

Massport, however, despite aquarium Executive Director John Prescott claiming this state agency expressed interest, may not have been approached at all. Teresa Alpine, Massport spokeswoman, stated that after investigation and to the best of her knowledge, Massport has not discussed any parking possibilities with aquarium officials.

Residents also questioned how the soon-to-be world's largest aquarium could be talked about in isolation from the Navy Yard's master plan presented last summer and why the traffic alternatives were presented but could not be discussed specifically.

Pat Ward, one angry resident, was skeptical about how much community concern was in mind, accusing aquarium officials of taking the 175-year-old Dry Dock 2 from Charlestown for greed. "Hasn't anyone said anything about (the dry dock) being an historical architectural site?" she asked.

Her son, Michael Ward, had similar skepticism for




It was not an easy task, but as the volunteers returned to the Mary Colbert Apartments to enjoy a sand-


When life provides a person with the opportunity to share special times with both his parents and his children, he has received a very special gift.

Powers Stationed In Turkey – A Land Of Contrasts

by Lewis K. Parson ADANA, Turkey — The vast land of Turkey, stretching across two continents, operates like a car engine in perpetual idle. Occasionally it'll shift, with hesitation, into the 20th century for a brief look at the sights. Then not wanting to chance consuming too much, too quickly, shift back to a much smoother ride.

U.S. Air Force Staff Sergeant Michael F. Powers is aboard for the ride, trying to maneuver his way through a maze of social customs, religious beliefs and laws that can seem awkward at times, if not downright stifling.

Powers, 25, son of Francis J. and Carol A. Powers of 278A Main Street, Charlestown, is stationed at Turkish-owned and controlled Incirlik Air Base.

"I think the language barrier is probably the biggest cultural difference we have to cope with," Powers said.

A country of more than 50 million devout Moslems, Turkey covers 296,000 square miles between Europe and Asia Minor, roughly the same area from Washington, D.C. to Kansas City. That area includes everything from sandy beaches on the Mediterranean to mountains bordering the Soviet Union.

Incirlik Air Base hosts the 39th Tactical Group,




which provides training support to other flying units from all over the world.

Powers is a structural repair supervisor assigned to the Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron. He is accompanied by his wife, Lilia, and daughter, Liedy, age 6.

"I supervise and assist in the repair of aircraft and honeycomb structures, manufacture aircraft cables for flight controls and fashion sheetmetal parts," Powers explained. The base sits on the outskirts of Adana, the country's fourth largest city, a dusty yet fruitful agricultural and industrial community in a semitropical climate, barely more than a stone's throw from the banks of the Mediterranean.

Adana is a city of contradictions and contrasts, where high-rises are only minutes away from the tented camps of migrant workers. Where automobiles share the highway with (continued on page 17)







(continued from page 16) pushcarts, horse-drawn wagons and an occasional flock of sheep.

The strategic importance of the republic is evident in its history. As a crossroads between Europe and Asia, they were conquered in turn by such notables as the Hittites, Alexander the Great, the Romans, the Byzantine empire, the Ottomans . . .

Cleopatra is reputed to have met Marc Anthony at Tarsus and to this day the nation is an archeologist's dream come true, where some digs are abandoned simply because the artifacts uncovered are old - but not old enough.

If the combination of religion, custom and tradition make these people hesitant to pursue progress with the intensity of Western cultures, there are benefits to be realized as well.

"I think one of the best things about this assignment is that you're able to save money, due to the favorable monetary exchange rate," Powers said.

Popular among service members are the handmade rugs, gold, brass and meerschaum pipes available for a fraction of their cost in the United States. As one of the main terminals in Europe, Incirlik is also a good jumping off point for travel to

other lands.

"When I'm off-duty, I coach one of the little league teams, attend school and like to travel," Powers said.

Mustafa Ataturk, consid-

ered the savior of Turkey, is credited with being in the driver's seat when Turkey turned its future toward Western civilization. U.S. service members like Powers might say it's time to pull out of the slow lane.


Under the program, citi-
