On November 3, the people of Boston will be required to vote on referenda questions 1 and 2 which have to do with the proposal for district representation vs. the present at large systems of electing the City Council and the shool Committee.
This will be a major decision which will decide whether or not e continue with the present at large system or change to ystem whereby nine represen tatives of each body will be elected by districts and four will un at large.
It must be pointed out, prior to 1950, Boston had district representation, and so disenchanted were the people of that era, they voted to abolish the system in favor of the present atlarge system
The proponents of district representation are the same social planning liberals who adocated forced integration of our schools which we all know led to the complete destruction of our once proud school system.

These same social planners, frustrated at not being able to break the strong will of the people as they resisted all efforts at forced integration of the schools, are now advocating a geographical restructuring of the neighborhoods under the guise of district representation in the hope of breaking down the structure of the neighborhoods and the great pride the people take in maintaining the livability of their neighborhood.

District Representation will cost the tax payers millions of dollars in added expenses (additional staff, renovating existing facilities, office furniture, etc.) money that could be better used to rehire layed-off police and firemen.

- A court case could result if minority organizations did not approve of the Districts as drawn up by the City Council. The result could be that a Federal Court Judge would make the final decision on the make-up of the proposed districts.

Finally, under Distric Representation, Boston would be divided into nine districts Neighborhoods would be paired to form these districts. Distric lines would not be drawn up unti AFTER the voters go to the polls.
It is totally unacceptable to the people of Boston to vote for a plan before they see the finished product.
Boston's neighborhoods are unique. To pair them with different sections of the city to form dis tricts would be a step in dissolving the neighborhood concept.
