Bunker Hill Day Parade, June 19th

Charlestown To Commemorate The 213th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill

The 213th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be highlighted by the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade to be held on Sunday afternoon, June 19th. This parade is sponsored by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the City of Bos-

ton. Giving the command "Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Richard P. Charbonnier. Charbonnier, a life-long resident of Charlestown, is a World War II United States Navy veteran

and Past Commander of the David M. Cleary Chapter 109, Disabled American Veterans.

The Chief Marshal's Band, leading off the parade, will be the crowd pleasing Waltham American Legion Band under the direction of Dot Slamin Hill. Other stellar attractions in

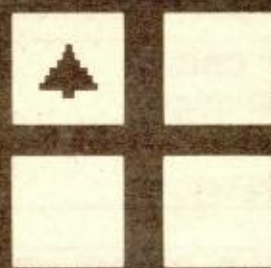

A question and answer period will follow the discussion and CANA staff members will be present to answer questions and listen to comments and suggestions concerning the CANA project.

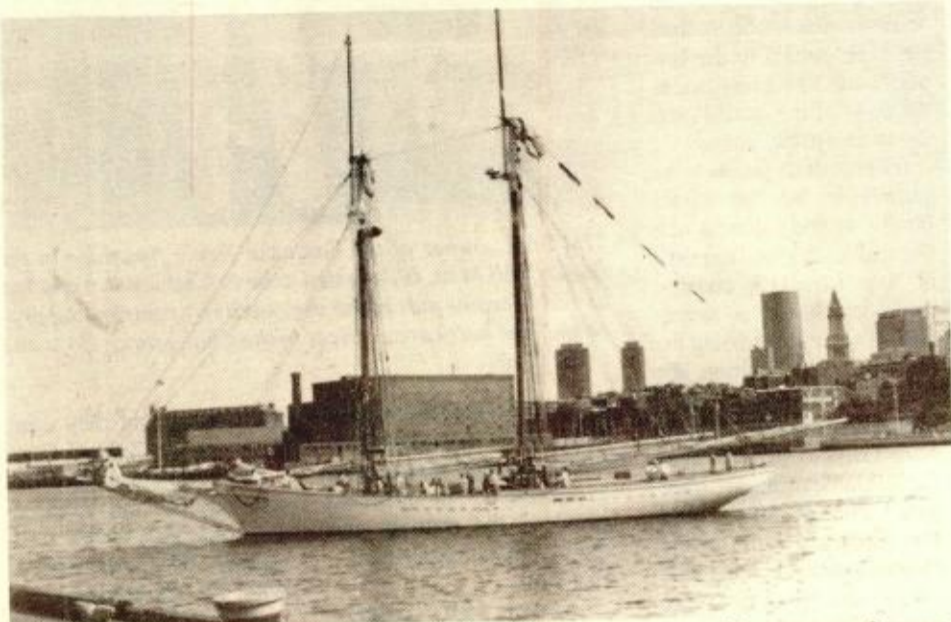

From Football To Fantastic Sam's — A Career Change For Tim Fox

From professional football to hair care — perhaps this seems an unlikely career move. But the owner of the newly-installed Fantastic

Sam's made just such an unexpected job/switch when he opened a salon in the Bunker Hill Mall last month.

Tim Fox, formerly a free

safety with the New England Patriots, said age was his main impetus for leaving the NFL.

"I just got too old," explained Fox, who is 34.

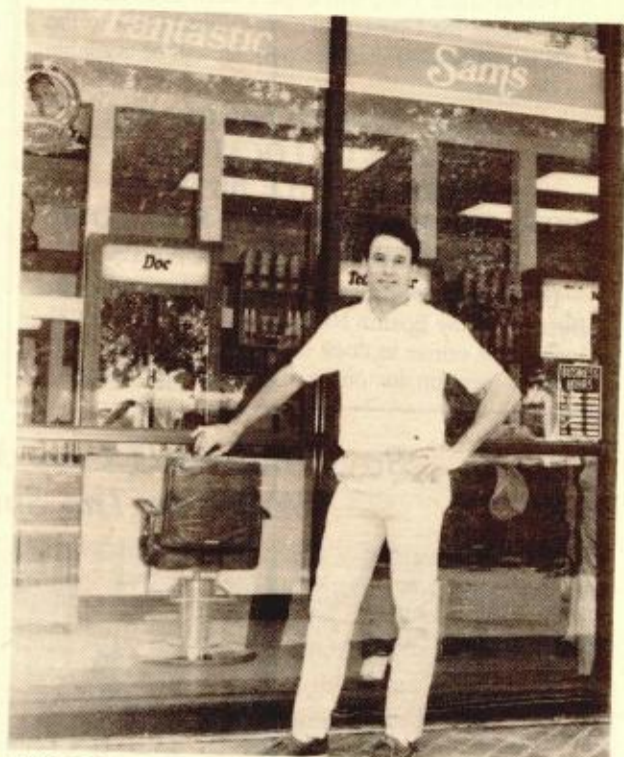
Fox, who played with the Patriots from 1976 to 1981, also spent two years with the San Diego Chargers, and more recently he played for the Los Angeles Rams. Fox now owns and operates Fantastic Sam's with his wife Debbie, whom he met in high school in Canton, Ohio.

Although there are already six hair care shops in Charlestown, Tim Fox seems certain Fantastic Sam's will find a clientele. "We don't pay attention to the competition," says Fox with confidence he no doubt earned on the football field. He points to the low prices and the family-oriented style of the business as its main selling points.

Indeed, there seems to be something for the whole family at the salon which Fox calls "the McDonald's of hair care." A colored television keeps a steady stream of cartoons going for kids who are waiting for their parents and a fresh-brewed pot of coffee is positioned next to the television for adults waiting for their kids. The ex-athlete said that Fantastic Sam's caters to both genders and his wife concurred. "Men feel more comfortable here," she said.

Fantastic Sam's offers no-nonsense prices — \$8 for a hair cut for adults, \$5 for kids, and \$24 for a perm. (Wash, style and blow dry will cost you \$95 extra.) And, if the walk-in service causes you to wait for more than a half an hour, you get \$2 off your next cut.

Fox explained that the Fantastic Sam's franchise

allowed he and his wife to start up in a business in which they had no previous experience. "The franchise provided the training and the so-called 'expertise,'" Fox said.

Fantastic Sam's is part of a nationwide franchise with 2,000 salons currently operating in the country, 30 of which are in the New England area, according to Fox.

Fox said that business so far has been "good," but said he hoped to eventually see more customers. "Charlestown is a real close knit community and residents like to go to people

they know, and they don't know us yet," noted Fox.

The franchise provides training for the management and also for the hair-stylists. The hair stylists, who are all certified, receive continuing education in the latest innovations in hair dressing at Fantastic Sam's training centers in Brockton and Wrentham.

What's the main difference between playing professional football and owning your own hair salon? According to Tim Fox, it's the lack of physical contact. "You can't hit people in the hair business," Fox said.

dable Housing Coalition and the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation will join the committee in helping the community better understand the current situation and future needs for affordable housing. A presentation will be made by staff members of the Boston Redevelopment Authority. The public is welcome to attend.

Lecture On Ironclads To Be Presented At Charlestown Navy Yard

The public is invited to attend a free illustrated lecture by Maritime Historian George Frazee Amadon entitled "The Rise of the Ironclads," from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 21, at the Boston National Historical Park Visitor Center of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Amadon's lecture is based on his book, "The Rise of the Ironclads," which encompasses the construction, the engagements and the early demise of the **USS Monitor** and the **USS Merrimack/CSS Virginia**.

The **Merrimack**, originally a three masted frigate built at the Charlestown Navy Yard, was burned by the United States Naval forces at the Norfolk Navy Yard and taken over by the Confederates. Her masts and gun-deck gone, the Confederates proceeded to clad her in iron to make her invulnerable to Northern shelling. Her name was then changed to the **CSS Virginia**.

At the insistence of the naval establishment, Federal Secretary of the Navy Gideon Wells authorized a contract with John Ericsson to construct the ironclad

Monitor. The eventual confrontation of the two ships was a stand-off with neither ship truly the victor. The **Virginia** was ultimately blown up by the Confederate forces themselves and the **Monitor**, while under tow, was beset by a severe storm and sunk off Cape Hatteras.

The lecture also covers the recognition of the **Monitor's** designer, John Ericsson, by the United States Government and by Sweden and finally, comments on the possible retrieval of the **Monitor** today.

The Boston Redevelopment Authority Board of Directors voted on nine agenda items concerning the Charlestown community at their June 9 meeting. The votes were as follows:

- **Parcel R-17G** - Tentative designation was given to Mr. and Mrs. Allan Kueny to develop a 1,818 square foot parcel at 43-45 Park Street to create exterior yard space.
- **Parcel R-17H** - Tentative designation was given to Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Howley to develop a 1,300 square foot parcel at 43-45 Park Street to create exterior yard space.

**BRA Board Votes On
 Nine Charlestown Items At Meeting**

- **30 Park Street** - A partial Certificate of Completion was issued to Tontine Crescent Associates, Inc. for the Henley Office Building, consisting of 4,700 square feet.
- **34-42 Warren Street** - A partial Certificate of Completion was issued to Tontine Crescent Associates, Inc. for a 60 space parking structure and 12,000 square feet of office space.
- **Parcel P-2A** - Tentative designation was given to Gate Five Associates to develop this parcel. Included will be the construction of 28 units of housing, 50 percent of which will be sold

at affordable prices and three units will be handicapped accessible. The developer must continue to present design reviews to abutters and the BRA.

- **Parcel R-87** - 10,500 square feet of this parcel was conveyed to The Boston Housing Authority to create two units of Chapter 689 housing for people with special needs. This housing will be built to the specifications of the Executive Office of Communities and Development and will be managed by the Department of Mental Health. The development is subject to future design review.

- **John Boyle O'Reilly Park** - The authorization was given to John Boyle O'Reilly Inc. to erect a memorial plaque and dedicate parcel C-1C, located at Main and Austin Streets, as the John Boyle O'Reilly Memorial Park. This project will be subject to the Authority's continuing design review procedure.
- A request for authorization to execute a Transfer Agreement with the City of Boston, an amendment to the Shipyard Park UDAG Grant Agreement and other documents that may be required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to effectuate the release of the UDAG Grant Funds was approved. This authorizes an amendment to the building lease of Building 36 in the Charlestown Navy Yard to free funds to complete construction of Shipyard Park.
- **Vietnam Veterans Memorial** - The authority rescinded its permission for the Massachusetts Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, Inc. to submit a proposal for the Authority's consideration. This action in no way reflects upon the overall validity of the concept, or of a Memorial to be placed on Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard. If at some time in the future, a feasible proposal emerges, the Authority staff will encourage its adoption. Any such action would be approved by the Board.

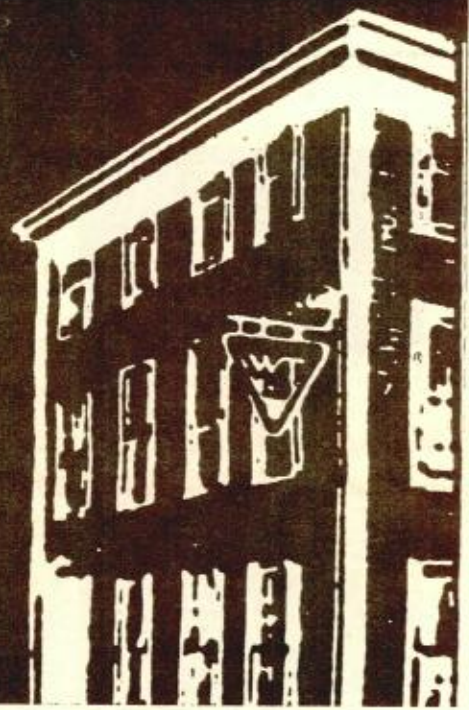

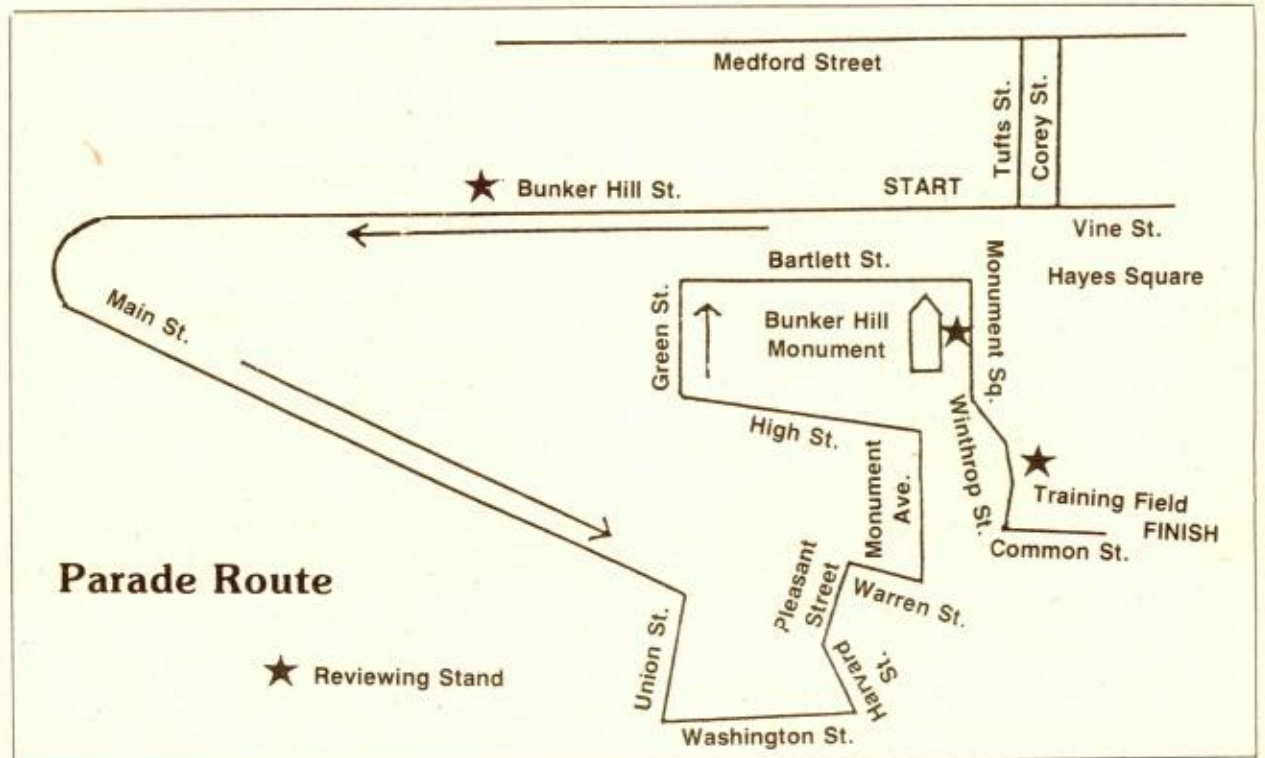
Through their hard work

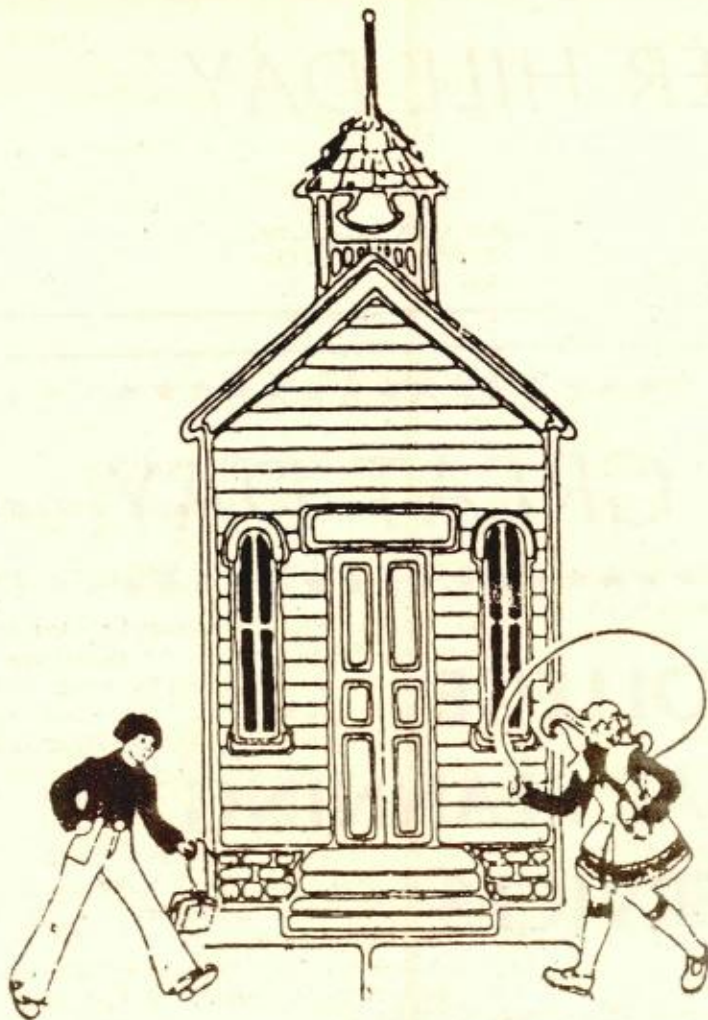

Quinn Inducted Into Boston Latin Hall Of Fame

Michael Patrick Quinn was recently inducted into the Boston Latin School Hall of Fame. The eldest child of Mary V. and the late Leo F. Quinn, Mike attended Saint Francis de

Sales Grammar School from which he transferred to Boston Latin School in 1960.

Quinn was All-City in football and hockey in 1963-64. He was the reci-

ipient of the Dr. J. H. Burnett Award for excellence in scholarship, leadership and football prowess in 1963 which was awarded by the Gridiron Club. In 1964, Quinn was the winner of the Patrick Thomas Campbell Award for excellence in scholarship. In September 1964, he entered Holy Cross on a four-year scholarship. His athletic prowess, once again, was evident with success in both football and hockey, co-captaining the 1968 hockey team. While at Holy Cross, Quinn enrolled in the ROTC, receiving his com-

mission in the US Marine Corps with a Bachelor's Degree at graduation in May, 1968.

Advancing to Quantico, Virginia, Quinn was first in his class, becoming the Honors man. On a patrol, 29 miles south of DaNang on August 29, 1969, Quinn was killed in combat while serving with Company H, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division. A Purple Heart was awarded to Quinn posthumously and presented to his parents in 1970 at Marine Barracks in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

On September 8, 1969 a scholarship was established in Quinn's name. To date, \$21,125 has been awarded to the fine youths of Charlestown as they embarked upon their college careers.

On November 12, 1979, the Lieutenant Michael Patrick Quinn U.S.M.C. Athletic Complex at 255 Medford Street was dedicated as a tribute to a heroic Marine, a Crusader, a fellow "Townie" and a great friend.

Mary Quinn, his mother, Mary Quinn Doherty, his sister, his brother Robert Quinn and the late Leo

Quinn, former Park Department Foreman at Columbia Park, South Boston, were proud to have such a son and brother.

We perpetuate Mike and constantly think of him.

A special thanks goes to Boston Latin School Headmaster, Michael Contompasis and to Athletic Director Paul F. Costello for making the evening a great success.

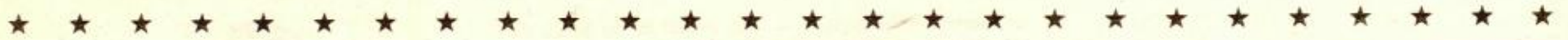

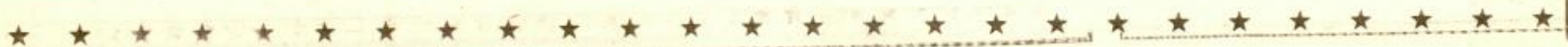

The Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises, sponsored by Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion under the auspices of the City of Boston, will be held on Friday morning, June 17.

The program, according

Prescott is married to Barbara Stockman Curley of Westford and they have two children and one granddaughter. They have residences in both Westford and Bound Brook, New Jersey.

Prescott is a long time member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society. He is presently engaged in compiling de-

tailed data on Prescott forebearers in Groton, Westford and Chelmsford. He is also developing genealogies of all persons in the first Westford Tax Lists in 1730.

Charlestown Militia Company Readies For The Historical Demonstration Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill



The Charlestown Militia Company 1775, in cooperation with the National Park Service, will present an historical demonstration of the Battle of Bunker Hill on the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds on Saturday, June 18 starting at 12:30 p.m.

Participating in this year's event with the Charlestown Militia will be minutemen from Acton, Bedford, Hingham, Lexington,

the Menotomy Minutemen of Arlington, Sons of the American Revolution, Captain Nathaniel Warner Company of Gloucester, First Foot Company and the Second Suffolk Regiment.

The demonstration will include the three assaults made by the British on the colonists during the battle of June 17, 1775, a battle

that proved to be a moral victory in the fight for independence from England, as the untrained colonists repelled the first two assaults by the British, considered the best trained forces in the world at that time, only to be forced to retreat following the third attack as the ammunition of the colonists was exhausted.

According to Charlestown Militia Captain Dan MacDonald, the weekend activities will begin on Friday evening, June 17th as an 18th century encampment, complete with marquis (officers' tents), tents, kitchen and a medical tent, are set up in the National Park Service portion of the Charlestown Navy Yard, near Gate Four. The Militia plans to recreate the normal routine of an 18th century campsite with officers' call, inspections and drills. The campsite will be open to visitors on Saturday, June 18 between 9 and 11 a.m.

The Militia companies will depart for the Monument Grounds at 11 a.m. on Saturday. MacDonald noted that the procession to the Monument will travel from Chelsea Street to Vine Street to Bunker Hill Street, then travel up Lexington Street to the Monument

Grounds.

MacDonald stated that upon arrival at the Monument, weapons will be inspected and final preparations will be made for the Battle, with the first assault by the British slated to approach the colonists on the hill at 1:00 p.m.

The Battle will be narrated by Paul Hogman, an officer with the Menotomy Minutemen, so that visitors may have some sense of the intensity of this battle

scene. Cannon blasts will also be heard coming from the decks of the **Glad Tidings**, a replica of an 18th century vessel, berthed in the Charlestown Navy Yard. These firings will simulate the firing on Charlestown by British vessels 213 years ago.

Following the battle, the troops will pass in review, returning to their encampment in the Navy Yard.

MacDonald noted that

the Monument Grounds will be secured by Park Service personnel and that no one will be allowed on the Grounds Saturday until after the battle. He also pointed out that parking will be prohibited during the day on Saturday on the Monument Avenue side of the Monument.

The Charlestown Militia extends a welcome to all to view this historical demonstration of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

Philadelphia's Champion Greater Kensington String Band To Perform In Concert On Monument Square



THE GREATER KENSINGTON STRING BAND, 1988 Champions of the Annual New Year's Day Mummers Parade in Philadelphia, will appear in concert, under the direc-

tion of Captain Joseph Lippincott, on Monument Square in front of the Bunker Hill Museum on Saturday afternoon, June 18th at 5:00 p.m. The band will also be in the line

of march in the Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 19th.

A foot tapping, hand clapping good time is in store for residents on Saturday afternoon, June 18 at 5:00 p.m. as the Greater Kensington String Band from Philadelphia presents a concert on Monument Square, in front of the Bunker Hill Museum.

This concert, sponsored by the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, will feature the colorful costumes and award-winning music of the famous Greater Kensington String Band — the first place winner in the 1988 New Year's Day Mummers Parade in Philadelphia.

"Mummer" is a word of German derivation. "Mum-

me" means disguise. "Mummenkied" is a fancy dress and "Mummspiel" is a masquerade. Mumming plays were introduced by the early immigrants who arrived in this country in the 1680s. The plays they performed usually depicted dragons, devils and hero knights who either slew or drove the invader back to Hades. These plays were performed for friends or neighbors and the players were often rewarded for their efforts with a bowl of pepper pot, cookies and an occasional spot of hard beverage.

The Mummers Parade is unique to the City of Philadelphia and this non-com-

mercial parade has been held continuously since the turn of the century. This parade, which ushers in the New Year, takes approximately eight hours to pass a given point and is viewed by millions, live and via television. The 35,000 participants parade as an avocation and the only compensation for their efforts is the prize money awarded by the City. The parade is categorized into four divisions, namely, Comic-Fancy, Dress-Fancy, Brigade and String Bands.

In compliance with parade rules set forth by the City of Philadelphia, each New Year's Day Parade requires new costumes for all

String Bands participating in the event with an average cost to each band approximating \$56,000.

The Greater Kensington String Band was organized in 1946 and the year 1988 marked the Band's 42nd consecutive appearance in the Mummers Parade. In competition with as many as 27 String Bands, Greater Kensington has finished in the top-ten prize category over 30 times. Band members master such instruments as the banjo, saxophone, bass, accordion, glockenspiel and drums — there is no brass.

After much planning and rehearsing in an effort to present a different and uni-

que appearance, Greater Kensington threw caution to the wind and this year presented a "classics" theme entitled "Go For Baroque." This earned them first place in music and costume plus second place in presentation with the result being that Greater Kensington was named String Band Champions of 1988.

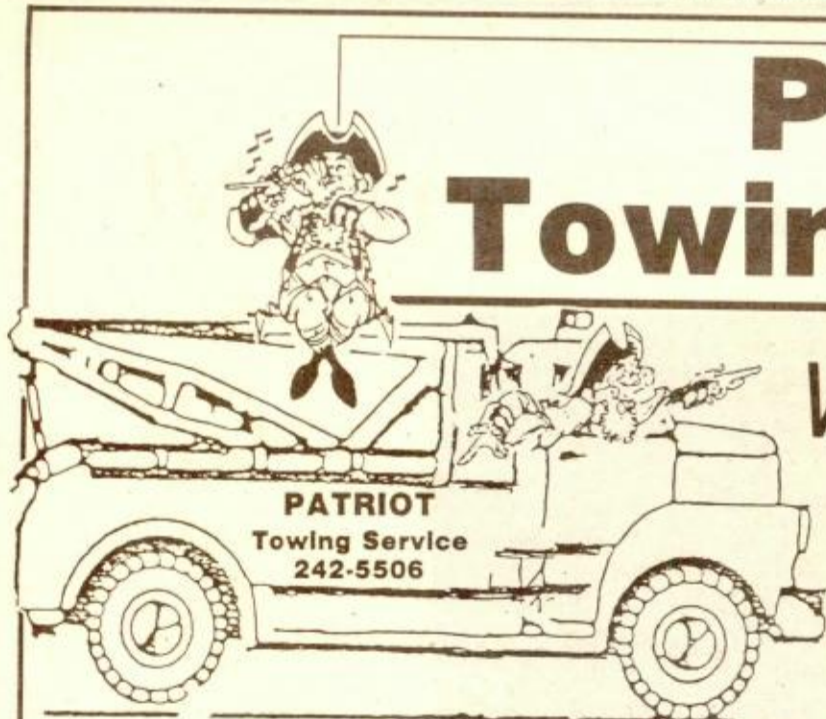
The Greater Kensington String Band has, in addition to performing throughout the Eastern section of the United States, appeared in Colorado in the preliminary to the Olympics, as well as in Nebraska and Illinois. Visits outside the contiguous states have included Havana, Cuba and Quebec,

Canada. Among their most notable engagements were appearances in Colorado Springs, at ceremonies marking the Re-Dedication of the Brooklyn Bridge, Celebrate the Seasons in Pittsburgh, City of Festivals Parade in Milwaukee and the Thanksgiving Day Parade sponsored by Macy's in New York City.

The Greater Kensington String Band was Philadelphia's champions in 1979 and have been in the top four spots on four occasions since then.

This year, under Captain Joseph Lippincott, who placed second in the Captain's competition in the an-

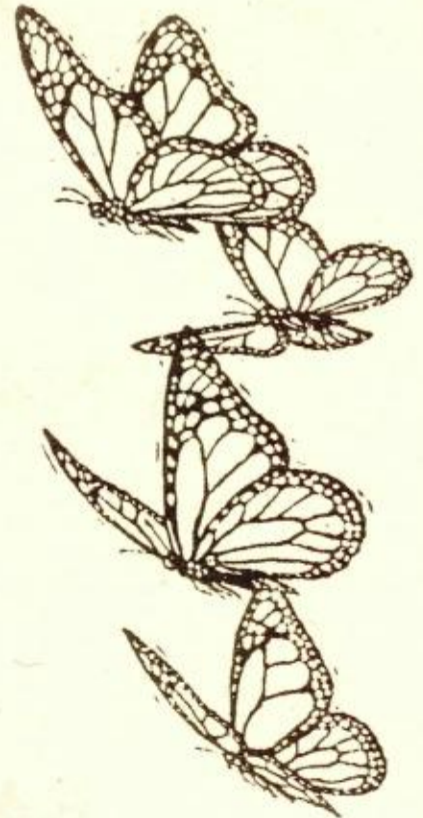

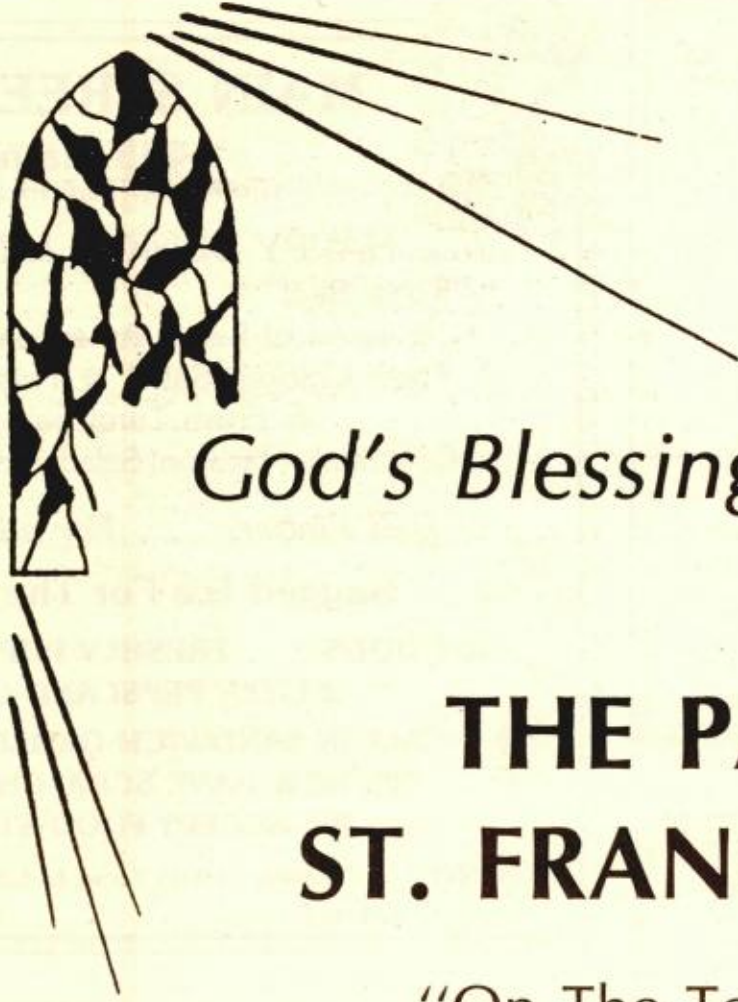

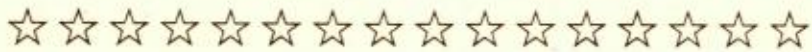

Mount Rushmore Flag To Wave Next To The "USS Constitution"

"Boston's Second Annual Tribute to Old Glory" will be presented free to the public from 5 to 5:45 p.m. on Sunday, June 19 on Pier One in the Boston National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The focus will be on the flying of the Mount Rushmore Flag, measuring 85 x 45 feet, which was dedica-

ted and flown first a year ago and has traveled thousands of miles across the United States. It returns to the Charlestown Navy Yard on June 19 to be unfurled and flown alongside the USS Constitution at Pier One.

This will be the first step of its 1988 journey to arrive at Gettysburg on July 3 in celebration of the 125th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg where the flag will unveil the Eternal Light Peace Memorial.

In addition to the Mount Rushmore Flag, the ceremony will include the pre-

sentation and flying of nine Gettysburg peace flags representing the nine major New England regiments that were at the Battle of Gettysburg.

The State of Rhode Island will send its historic Gettysburg Gun, used during the battle in 1863, from the State House in Providence to the Charlestown Navy Yard to be on display for the day.

Weather conditions permitting, the flag will fly until 7 p.m. at which time it will be lowered, folded and placed back into a chest.

An 18th century encamp-

ment depicting costumes, historic weapons, musket drills and other activities will take place on the lawn of the Commandant's House.

As part of the Visiting Ships Program, the Canadian ship **Blue Nose II** will be in port at Pier One from now to June 19 and open free to the public. For schedule information, call 242-5601.

A Descendant of Colonel William Prescott Returns To Breed's Hill

 Debate persists as to who issued the famous command, "Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes," to colonial troops at Breed's Hill. The quote has been attributed to both Israel Putnam and Colonel William Prescott. Yet, it is not the words, but the deeds of these heroes that are honored through Prescott's statue at the base of the Bunker Hill Monument.

Descendant William B. Prescott insists that the identity of the man who issued the order cannot be determined. Prescott, who

is scheduled to speak at tomorrow's exercises commemorating the 213th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, states that his only comment on the debate will be his refusal to mention it.

"I'm not going to get into the controversy," Prescott says. "My speech does not even refer to those words."

The subject of Prescott's speech tomorrow on the Monument grounds at 11 a.m. is his ancestors, "those illustrious Prescotts," who settled in New England in the mid-1600s. Prescott says eight genera-

tions separate him from the Colonel.

Prescott, who is a retired research director of American Cyanamid Company, an agricultural chemicals producer in New Jersey, stresses that Colonel Prescott was not the only family member to participate in the Revolutionary War.

"They all attained at least the rank of Colonel," Prescott says, referring to brothers Oliver and James. Oliver Prescott (1731-1804), for example, was appointed

brigadier-general of the militia in Middlesex County, and later in the war, the Massachusetts Revolutionary Government made him major-general of militia throughout the Commonwealth, according to the "Dictionary of American Biographies." Before the war he held various commissions under King George III.

Another member of the Prescott family whose participation in the war for independence is worth noting

is Samuel Prescott (1751-1777). An able horseman, he completed the midnight ride, which Paul Revere began and to whom history has given most of the credit. Prescott later died in a British jail in Halifax after the battle of Ticonderoga.

Will little known facts about the Colonel be revealed tomorrow?

Prescott does say that history books do not often mention that the Colonel owned a slave. According to

Prescott, slavery was outlawed in the North by 1790.

Prescott began studying the history of his family 46 years ago when an elderly relative gave him a copy of a published Prescott genealogy and he recognized some errors. "My grandfather was listed as a twin, and I knew he wasn't."

Prescott lives in New Jersey but grew up in Westford near his ancestors' birthplace. He still owns a house there.

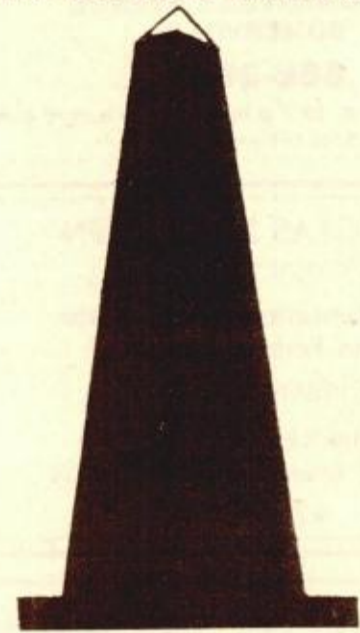

**Developer Must Redesign
127 Main Street Project**

Dick Held and Paul Kelly, developers of 127 Main Street, were told by the Board of Appeal to redesign their entire project at the hearing held on Tuesday, June 14th. Although one board member approved the concept of the developer, another called it "shoddy" and stated that "Charlestown deserved better."

The Transportation Department voiced their concern with the mechanical elevator included in the proposed design that would facilitate the underground parking garage, but the

Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) granted their conditional approval to the development. Abutters were also on hand at the hearing in opposition to the plan.

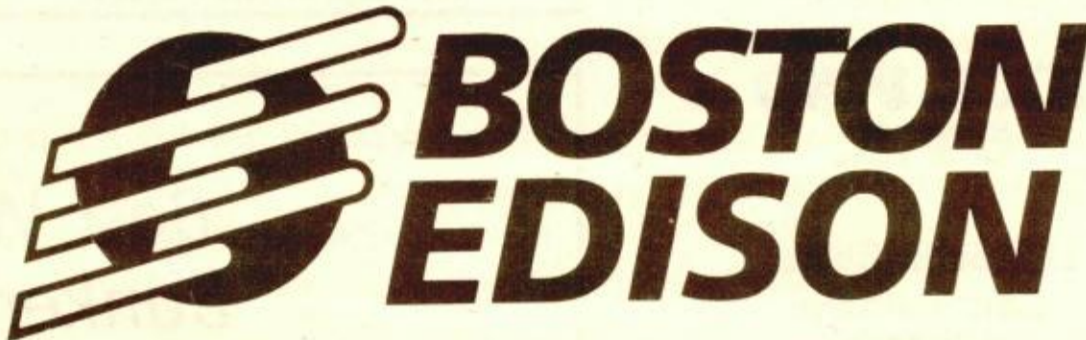
Jim English, director of Harbor Planning and Development for the BRA, stated that the conditional approval given by the Authority derived from its Board of Director's vote on April 7. This vote recommended approval of the variance which was a conditional approval on an LDA (land disposition agreement) including three issues: design and scale be

more appropriate to the planned objectives of the area; the developer be required to submit plans for affordable housing; and must work closely with both the abutters and the Neighborhood Council.

English stated, "We feel that the amendment to the LDA is the most powerful instrument and best mechanism to develop this project — more powerful than the Zoning Board of Appeal's method. Through this LDA amendment, the Authority will ensure that the concerns of the abutters and residents will be addressed."

The Board of Appeal granted a deferral until July 26. The developer must meet with the neighborhood before that date to present the new design.

Performance Stimulus For Formation Of Committee Against Substance Abuse

 After the Improbable Players, a four-person drug and alcohol awareness performance team, brought their production to Charlestown, nearly 30 residents signed up to form a committee against substance abuse in town.

"The turn out was encouraging," said Joe Travis, coordinator of development at Charlestown Community Schools. "This is a good way for 'Townies' to band

together and put their energy into making positive changes."

The Improbable Players, a theater company based in Watertown and made up of recovering alcohol and drug abusers, gave a commendable performance on June 13 at Charlestown High School.

In entertaining skits that were both thought-provoking and comical for adults and children, the actors

captured the audience's attention with their creative approach to tough subject matter. Using masks, puppets and limited lighting techniques, the group playfully focused on clearing up misconceptions of what alcoholics look like, how negative peer pressure affects people and how substance abuse pervades a person's life.

Tracing one family through 20 years of progressive deterioration caused by an alcoholic mother, the Players were able to effectively dramatize how the disease affected individual family members. This nonsense performance proved to be a pleasant twist on the "Just say 'No'" theme by animating the alternatives to alcoholism and drug abuse.

Two discussion groups were formed following the act for children and adults. Travis said the major goal of the evening was to enlist

support from local business people and residents to form a continuing alliance against substance abuse in Charlestown. Tim Fox, Fantastic Sam's owner and a new face in town, spoke to both groups about drug and alcohol issues.

Although establishing a comparable children's committee is still in the works, adults scheduled their first meeting for June 29.

The Improbable Players' "I'll Never Do That:" An Evening of Drug and Alcohol Awareness was sponsored by Bunker Hill Associates, the Charlestown Adolescent Task Force and Mayor Raymond L. Flynn as one in a series of "Charlestown Pride Week" activities.

Testimony Presented At Hearing On Neighborhood Stabilization Bill

Supporters and opponents of Mayor Raymond L. Flynn's widely-publicized bid to regulate condominium conversions in Boston met Tuesday night in City Hall to voice their opinions on the Neighborhood Stabilization Bill.

The bill would call for private owners of single-family buildings currently rent controlled to seek the support of existing tenants to convert with issuance of a "removal permit" by the city. According to statistics

from the Mayor's Office, roughly 80 percent of rental buildings in the city were converted to condominiums within the last year.

According to Judy Evers, neighborhood coordinator in the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, Charlestown was represented in a "strong show of support."

Another public hearing will be held at City Hall on June 23 at 10 a.m. before the City Council brings the bill to a full vote on June 29.

Three Charlestown Schools Receive Grants For 1988-89 Academic Year

Charlestown High, Harvard-Kent Elementary and Clarence R. Edwards Middle Schools received a total of nearly \$10,000 in grants from the Boston Plan For Excellence. They were pre-

sented at ceremonies on May 26 at the Hubert Humphrey Occupational Resource Center in Roxbury. Sponsored by the city's business community, the Plan provided \$383,061 to cover

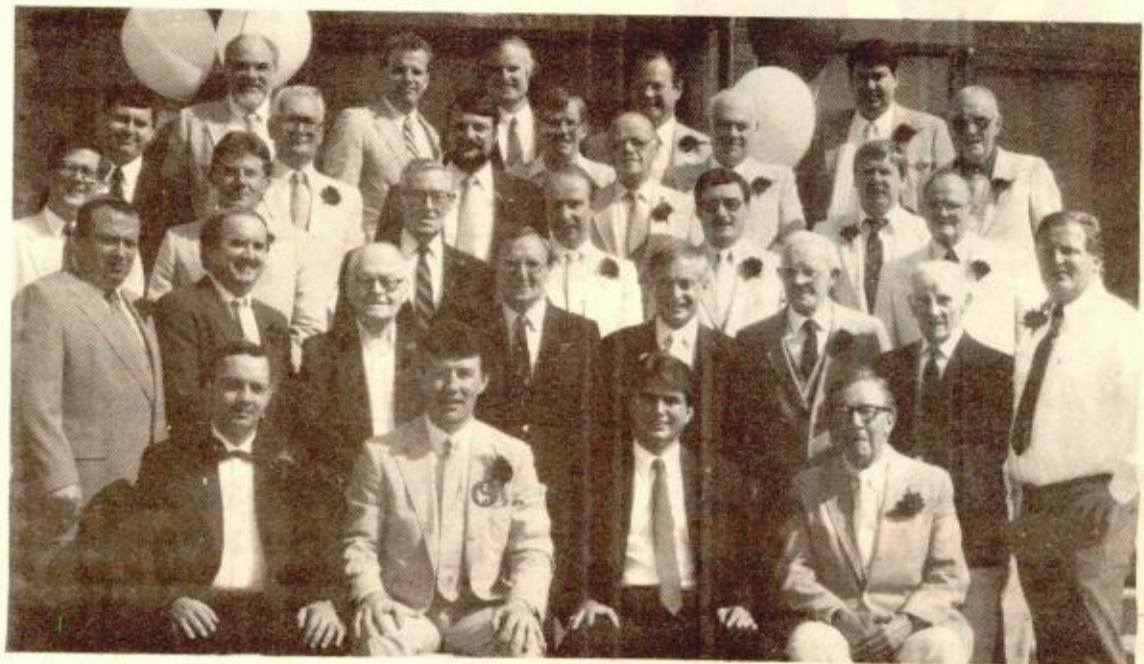

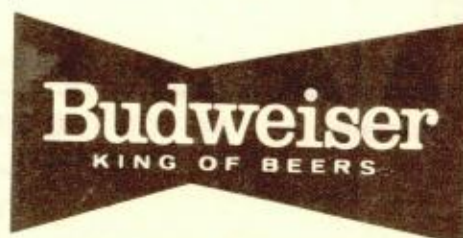
