# Charlestown To Commemorate The 213th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill 

The 213th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be highlighted by the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade to be held on Sunday afternoon, June 19th. This parade is sponsored by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the City of Bos-
ton. Giving the command "Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Richard P. Charbonnier. Charbonnier, a life-long resident of Charlestown, is a World War II United States Navy veteran
and Past Commander of the David M. Cleary Chapter 109, Disabled American Veterans.

TIM FOX, owner and manager of FANTASTIC SAM'S and former PATRIOT and ALL-PRO, will be on hand Saturday, June 18th between 10 a.m. and noon joining MOSI TATUPU and LAWRENCE McGREW as part of Neworld Bank's Bunker Hill Day Celebration.

Fox, who played with the Patriots from 1976 to 1981 . also spent two years with the San Diego Chargers, and more recently he playe for the Los Angeles Rams. Fox now owns and operates Fantastic Sam's with his wife Debbie, whom he met in high school in Canton. Ohio.
Although there are already six hair care shops in Charlestown, Tim Fox seems certain Fantastic Sam's will find a clientele. "We don't pay attention to the competition," says Fox with confidence he no doubt earned on the football field. He points to the low prices and the family-oriented style of the business as its main selling points.

Indeed, there seems to be something for the whole family at the salon which Fox calls "the McDonald's of hair care." A colored television keeps a steady stream of cartoons going for kids who are waiting for their parents and a freshbrewed pot of coffee is positioned next to the television for adults waiting for their kids. The ex-athlete said that Fantastic Sam's caters to both genders and his wife concurred. "Men feel more comfortable here," she said. Fantastic Sam's offers nononsense prices - $\$ 8$ for a hair cut for adults, $\$ 5$ for kids, and $\$ 24$ for a perm. (Wash, style and blow dry will cost you $\$ .95$ extra.) And, if the walk-in service causes you to wait for more than a half an hour, you get $\$ 2$ off your next cut.
Fox explained that the Fantastic Sam's franchise

allowed he and his wife to start up in a business in which they had no previous experience. "The franchise provided the training and the so-called 'expertise,' " Fox said.
Fantastic Sam's is part of a nation-wide franchise with 2,000 salons y operating in the $y$ operating in the country, 30 of which are in the New England area, according to Fox.
Fox said that business so far has been "good," but said he hoped to eventually see more customers "Charlestown is a real close knit community and residents like to go to people
they know, and they don' know us yet," noted Fox. The franchise provides training for the management and also for the hairstylists. The hair stylists, who are all certified, receive continuing education in the latest innovations in hair dressing at Fantastic Sam's training centers in Brockton and Wrentham.

What's the main difference between playing professional football and owning your own hair salon? According to Tim Fox, it's the lack of physical contact. "You can't hit people in the hair business," Fox said.

Lecture On Ironclads To Be Presented At Charlestown Navy Yard

The public is invited to attend a free illustrated lec－ ture by Maritime Historian George Frazee Amadon en－ titled＂The Rise of the Ironclads，＂from 7 to $8: 30$ p．m．on Tuesday，June 21， at the Boston National His－ torical Park Visitor Center torical Park Visitor Center
of the Charlestown Navy of the
Yard．

Amadon＇s lecture is bas－ ed on his book，＂The Rise of the Ironclads，＂which en－ compasses the construc－ tion，the engagements and the early demise of the USS Monitor and the USS Mer－ rimack／CSS Virginia．

The Merrimack，origi－ nally a three masted frigate built at the Charlestown Navy Yard，was burned by the United States Naval for－ ces at the Norfolk Navy Yard and taken over by the Confederates．Her masts and gun－deck gone，the Confederates proceeded to clad her in iron to make her invulnerable to Northern shelling．Her name was then changed to the CSS Virginia．
At the insistence of the naval establishment，Feder－ al Secretary of the Navy Gi－ deon Wells authorized a contract with John Ericsson to construct the ironclad

Monitor．The eventual con－ frontation of the two ships was a stand－off with neither ship truly the victor．The Virginia was ultimately blown up by the Confeder－ ate forces themselves and the Monitor，while under tow，was beset by a severe storm and sunk off Cape Hatteras．
The lecture also covers the recognition of the Mon－ itor＇s designer，John Eric－ sson，by the United State Government and by Sweden and finally，comments on the possible retrieval of the Monitor today．

pient of the Dr. J. H. Bur nett Award for excellence ir scholarship. leadership and football prowess in 1963 which was awarded by the Gridiron Club. In 1964 Quinn was the winner of the Patrick Thomas Campbell Award for excellence in Awholarship. In September scholarship. In September
1964. he entered Holy 1964, he entered Holy
Cross on a four-year scholarship. His athletic prowess, once again. was evident with success in both football and hockey, cocaptaining the 1968 hockey team. While at Holy Cross, Quinn enrolled in the ROTC, receiving his com-
mission in the US Marine Corps with a Bachelor's Degree at graduation in May. 1968.
Advancing to Quantico, Virginia, Quinn was first in his class, becoming the Honors man. On a patrol. 29 miles south of DaNang on August 29, 1969, Quinn was killed in combat while serving with Company H. 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, lst Marine Division. A Purple Heart was awarded to Quinn posthumously and presented to his parents in 1970 at Marine Barracks in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

On September 8, 1969 a scholarship was established in Quinn's name. To date, $\$ 21.125$ has been awarded to the fine youths of Charlesthe fine youths of Charles-
town as they embarked upon their college careers.
On November 12. 1979. the Lieutenant Michael Patrick Quinn U.S.M.C Athletic Complex at 255 Medford Street was dedicated as a tribute to a heroic Marine, a Crusader, a fellow "Townie" and a great friend.
Mary Quinn, his mother, Mary Quinn Doherty, his sister, his brother Robert Quinn and the late Leo

Quinn, former Park Department Foreman at Columbia Park. South Boston, were proud to have such a son and brother.

The Charlestown Militia Company 1775, in cooperation with the National Park Service, will present an historical demonstration of the Battle of Bunker Hill on the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds on Saturday, June 18 starting at 12:30 p.m. Participating in this year's event with the Charlestown Militia will be minutemen from Acton, Bed-
ford, Hingham, Lexington, the Menotomy Minutemen of Arlington, Sons of the American Revolution, Captain Nathaniel Warner Company of Gloucester, First Foot Company and the Second Suffolk Regiment. The demonstration will include the three assaults made by the British on the colonists during the battle of June 17, 1775, a battle

that proved to be a moral victory in the fight for independence from England, as the untrained colonists repelled the first two assaults by the British, considered the best trained forces in the world at that time, only to be forced to retreat following the third attack as the ammunition of the colonists was exhausted.

According to Charlestown Militia Captain Dan MacDonald, the weekend activities will begin on Friday evening, June 17th as an 18th century encampment. complete with marquis (officers' tents), tents, kitchen and a medical tent, are set up in the National Park Service portion of the Charlestown Navy Yard, near Gate Four. The Militia plans to recreate the normal routine of an 18th century campsite with officers' call, inspections and drills. The campsite will be open to visitors on Saturday, June 18 between 9 and 11 a.m.

The Militia companies will depart for the Monument Grounds at 11 a.m. on Saturday. MacDonald noted that the procession to the Monument will travel from Chelsea Street to Vine Street to Bunker Hill Street, then travel up Lexington then travel up Lexington

Grounds.
MacDonald stated that upon arrival at the Monument, weapons will be inspected and final preparations will be made for the Battle, with the first assault by the British slated to approach the colonists on the hill at 1:00 p.m.

The Battle will be narrated by Paul Hogman, an officer with the Menotomy Minutemen, so that visitors may have some sense of the intensity of this battle
scene. Cannon blasts will also be heard coming from the decks of the Glad Tidings, a replica of an 18th century vessel, berthed in the Charlestown Navy Yard. These firings will simulate the firing on Charlestown by British vessels 213 years ago.

Following the battle, the troops will pass in review. returning to their encampment in the Navy Yard.
MacDonald noted that
the Monument Grounds will be secured by Park Service personnel and that no one will be allowed on the Grounds Saturday until af ter the battle. He also pointed out that parking will be prohibited during the day on Saturday on the Monument Avenue side of the Monument.

The Charlestown Militia extends a welcome to all to view this historical demonstration of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

This concert, sponsored by the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, will feature the colorful costumes and awardwinning music of the famous Greater Kensington String Band - the first place winner in the 1988 New Year's Day Mummers Parade in Philadelphia.
"Mummer" is a word of German derivation. "Mum-
me" means disguise, "Mummenklied" is a fancy dress and "Mummenspiel" is a masquerade. Mumming plays were introduced by plays were introduced by
the early immigrants who the early immigrants who
arrived in this country in arrived in this country in
the 1680 s . The plays they performed usually depicted dragons, devils and hero knights who either slew or drove the invader back to Hades. These plays were Hades. These plays were
performed for friends or performed for friends or
neighbors and the players were often rewarded for their efforts with a bowl of pepper pot, cookies and an occasional spot of hard bev erage.
The Mummers Parade is unique to the City of Philadelphia and this non-com-

The parade is categorized into four divisions, namely, Comic-Fancy, Dress-Fancy, Brigade and String Bands.

In competition with as many as 27 String Bands, Greater Kensington has finished in the top-ten prize category over 30 times. "Boston's Second Annual Tribute to Old Glory" will be presented free to the public from 5 to $5: 45$ p.m. on Sunday, June 19 on Pier One in the Boston National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.
The focus will be on the flying of the Mount Rushmore Flag, measuring 85 x 45 feet, which was dedica-

ted and flown first a year ago and has traveled thousands of miles across the United States. It returns to the Charlestown Navy Yard the Charlest 10 Navy Yard on June 19 to be unfurled and flown alongside the USS Constitution at Pier One.
This will be the first step of its 1988 journey to arrive at Gettysburg on July 3 in celebration of the 125 th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg where the flag will unveil the Eternal Light Peace Memorial.
In addition to the Mount Rushmore Flag, the ceremony will include the pre-
sentation and flying of nine Gettysburg peace flags representing the nine major New England regiments that were at the Battle of Gettysburg.
The State of Rhode Island will send its historic Gettysburg Gun, used during the battle in 1863 , from the State House in Providence to the Charlestown Navy Yard to be on display for the day.
Weather conditions permitting, the flag will fly until 7 p.m. at which time it will be lowered, folded and placed back into a chest. An 18 th century encamp-
ment depicting costumes historic weapons, -muske drills and other activities will take place on the lawn of the Commandant's House.
As part of the Visiting Ships Program, the Canadian ship Blue Nose II will be in port at Pier One from now to June 19 and open free to the public. For schedule information, call 242 5601.

## A Descendant of Colonel William Prescott Returns To Breed's Hill

by Jessica Goodheart Debate persists as to who ssued the famous command, "Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes," to colonial troops at Breed's Hill. The quote has been attributed to both Israel Putnam and Colonel Wil liam Prescott. Yet, it is not the words, but the deeds of these heroes that are honored through Prescott's statue at the base of the Bunker Hill Monument.

Descendant William B. Prescott insists that the identity of the man who issued the order cannot be determined. Prescott, who
is scheduled to speak at tomorrow's exercises commemorating the 213 th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, states that his only comment on the debate will be his refusal to mention it.
"I'm not going to get into the controversy," Prescott says. "My speech does not even refer to those words." The subject of Prescott's speech tomorrow on the Monument grounds at 11 a.m. is his ancestors, "those illustrious Prescotts," who settled in New England in the mid-1600s Prescott says eight genera

"They all attained at least the rank of Colonel," Prescott says, referring to brothers Oliver and James. Oliver Prescott (1731-1804), for example, was appointed
brigadier-general of the militia in Middlesex County, and later in the war, the Massachusetts Revolutionary Government made him major-general of militia throughout the Commonwealth, according to the "Dictionary of American Biographies." Before the war he held various commissions under King George III.
