## EDUCATION EXPENSES

Workers who continue their education undoubtedly enhance their employment opportunities. An added bonus: Work-related educational expenses may provide a tax deduction as well.

Work-related educational expenses are tax deductible if they are incurred:

- to maintain or improve skills required in your current job, or
- to meet the express requirements of your employer or of applicable law as a condition of retaining your job, salary or status.

Deductible educational expenses include amounts paid for tuition, books, fees and incidental expenses such as photocopies and typing. Transportation and travel expenses connected with the education are also deductible. However, travel as a form of education is not deductible.

To be deductible, educational expenses must relate to your current job or trade or business. Expenses cannot be deducted if the education qualifies you for a new occupation, or is to meet minimum educational requirements for your present job.

If you're an employee, only part of your educational expenses are deductible. Your educational expenses are combined with your other miscellaneous itemized deductions, and the total amount is deductible only to the extent it exceeds $2 \%$ of your adjusted gross income.

## Camp Bunker Hill Celebrates Summer

The staff and campers from Camp Bunker Hill gathered at Charlestown High School recently to celebrate summer and share its program and activities with members of the community.

Camp Bunker Hill is a therapeutic summer day camp program and afterschool program run by the MGH Bunker Hill Health Center. The summer program is able to serve up to 50 boys and girls ages 4 to 16. The after school program can serve up to 20 elementary school-aged children and is held at St. Catherine's Rectory.
"Home base" for Camp Bunker Hill this summer has been Charlestown High School. Here, campers enjoyed indoor activities such as arts and crafts, cooking, computer activities and academic enrichment. Athletic activities took place in the fullsize gym, indoor pool and playing field. The camp's "home away from home" was Hale Reservation in Westwood.

Camp Bunker Hill hit the road too! Frequently, groups traveled to find their fun. Past excursions

have included overnight camping trips to Hale, sailing on the Charles River, hiking, boating, beachcombing, museum trips, roller skating and fishing.

Dr. Michael Cauley, the director of Camp Bunker Hill, has worked with the camp for 17 years. He is a psychologist whose specialties include cognitive behavioral and group psychotherapy.

The camp accepts children of all races, religions and ethnic backgrounds. It serves children who can
benefit from the small groups and structure that a therapeutic day camp can provide. These children typically require special attention to their learning style, behavioral difficulties and social skills.

The areas of special focus include social skills, impulsive behaviors, physical skills and coordination, management of anger, math and reading skills and self-confidence.

Camp Bunker Hill is partially funded by the Mass. General Hospital,
however, "The Friends of Camp Bunker Hill" also offer generous financial and personal support. The friends work year-round by running raffles, hosting charity sporting events, cruises and other ingenious ways to support the camp. In fact, an auction is being planned for Sept. 30 in Building 149 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

## The Needed Hug <br> by Dessa Weisz Hardin

It seems to rain every Tuesday, my day for going to Charlestown to work with the school children. I volunteer in a reading program in a public school. Goals are to encourage the children to enjoy reading, teach vocabulary and precepts from the stories, be a role model and what I think is the most important, to be one more adult to love them in this world of fractured families. I go each time with anticipation of filling a need.
I travel by car, subway and bus and often there are many raindrops. But when I run down the first steps to catch the Orange Line, my spirits lift; after all, I am on my way to work with these beloved children; all ages, from many different ethnic groups, but each one is special in their own way. Today I wait a long time for the bus. I myself, spent a difficult week with many projects; one becomes vulnerable when one steps forward to do something publicly, whatever it be. There was criticism of my Thanksgiving decorations for the church. I thought it tumed out well or why didn't they do it? The
remarks still hurt a bit. I pull out my book from my bag to read and transport myself away from that problem and to ignore the dampness all around me as the rain continues to fall.

Finally at the school, I run quickly up the steps and immediately turn on a smile. This is my third year here and many children know me. I may not know their names, but they remember me. I would not deprive any child of a wanted or needed smile.

Today the librarian is sponsoring a book sale and things are a little crowded and confused. My third grade class finds a free spot and settle themselves comfortably on the floor. I pull up my chair to begin. Little Alex, a charming African-American boy, attired in purple sweats, sits in the front row. He looks up at me and a big grin crosses his face as he says, "Hey, it's you again." Thank you Alex, for a warm welcome.
I read the story of the "Secret of the Match Box." I tried to explain the principle of secrets to them; simple, if you have a secret and you tell it to one person, it is not a secret any-
more. There was time too, for one poem and I read a funny one about a boy and his dream of chickens. He dreams all night long about them being here, there and everywhere. The boy wakes up and finds eggs all over his bed. Now what else would he find? Alex laughs heartily with the other children
It is time for them to return to their classroom. I wish them a Happy Thanksgiving. They wave politely and call goodbye. Alex dawdles at the end of the line. Quickly he turns and comes back to me. He puts his hand in mine and looks into my eyes and wishes me a Happy Thanksgiving again. Suddenly he throws his arms around me and hugs me tight. And I hug him back. We walk to the door and say goodbye again. He goes to join his class.
Alex, you made my day! You in your pretty purple sweats and charming smile, and more important, you with your big hug. I was glad I was there for you when you needed a hug. But how did you know that, I too, needed one today?
