

Water Transportation To Navy Yard Topic Of Public Meeting

A public meeting to discuss alternatives and possibilities in creating a water shuttle between units of the Boston National Historical Park is scheduled for the Charlestown Navy Yard Wednesday, April 18, at 7 p.m. Hugh Gurney, Superintendent of Boston National Historical

Park (BNHP) said that the meeting, to be held in the Hull Room of building 5, is designed to give groups and individuals a forum to express ideas, locations, and frequency of a pilot shuttle program which may be initiated on a trial basis this summer. From a undetermined location

on Boston's Waterfront, the National Park Service may offer water transportation to the Charlestown Navy Yard, site of the U.S.S. Constitution, and other historic structures.

A federal law passed last August, authorizes the National Park Service to develop plans and projects to improve access to units of the system.

All interested persons are invited to the meeting and are encouraged to participate in the discussion. The public may also address comments in writing to Superintendent, Boston National Historical Park, 15 State at Boston, Mass., 02109.

The Federal Energy Act of 1978 provides that expenditures for reducing energy consumption qualify a tax payer for a tax credit up to \$300 (15% of expenditures, up to \$2000).

The credit covers expenditures since 4/19/1977. Money spent on energy saving after that date in 1977 and in 1978 can lower your Federal taxes for 1978.

If you installed insulation, furnace replacement burners, a device to modify a flue opening, automatic furnace ignition system, storm windows and doors, automatic set back thermostats, caulking and weatherstripping, you qualify for the credit.

Don't pass up a tax savings that could help you pay next winter's heat bill. There's still time to get Form 5695 and instructions at the IRS Office at the JFK Building. (The amount of the credit goes in line 46 of the 1040.)

The Charlestown Preservation Society will present HOUSE TOUR 1979 "Historic Charlestown - Today and Tomorrow" on Saturday, May 5th from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

Spend the day walking through centuries exploring our quaint alleys, hidden passageways and courtyards. Visit some of our oldest homes dating from as early as post-revolutionary

times. Listen to a piano recital in a 19th century music room. See apartments and duplexes, exposed beams and winding staircases. See a beautifully renovated townhouse that was up until recently a rooming house and the source of inspiration for the best selling 1952 novel **Rooms To Let**. 



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

Herb Hodge, we salute you for a job well done for your fellow veterans.





DID YOU KNOW?????

The City of Boston's Assessors Department offers an Elderly Tax Abatement that can totally alleviate the real estate tax on property of the elderly. However, before the abatement can be awarded certain eligibility requirements must be met.

Eligibility Requirements

- 1) Applicants must be 70 years of age as of June 1, 1979
- 2) Applicant must reside at the address to which the abatement is to be applied
- 3) Applicant must own and occupy the home for 5 years (not necessarily consecutive)
- 4) Applicant's income may not exceed \$6,000 for a single person.
- 5) Income for a husband and wife combined should not exceed \$7,000. Income includes all gross income, wages, pensions, social security, bank interest, rents, etc.
- 6) Combined whole estate and personal property of a single person should not exceed \$40,000.
- 7) Combined whole estate and personal property of husband and wife should not exceed \$45,000.

What You Need To Apply

Applicants who feel they are eligible for this abatement should supply the following information when applying for abatement:

- 1) Tax bill
- 2) Proof of age
- 3) Gross income verification for the previous year
- 4) Full amount of savings (if any) as well as name of banks
- 5) Stocks, bonds, shares, etc.

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Boys' Club News

I had been home only an hour when the phone rang. The last game of the Nate Hurwitz Tournament had been completed just sixty minutes earlier, writing another chapter in the long and illustrious history of this Amateur Basketball Classic.

A month of whistles, buzzers and other related sounds still echoed in my mind as I reached to answer the ringing phone.

"Hello, Charlie?"

The voice was not immediately familiar, and he recognized my hesitance.

"It's Lorne Murphy, your Dad's friend."

Although I had spoken to Mr. Murphy on several occasions throughout the Hurwitz Tourney, his telephone voice was foreign to me. I was grateful he did not ask that age old embarrassing question "You don't know who this is do you?"

Anybody asking that question always knows the answer, only adding to your discomfort.

'Murph' was, for many years, a co-worker of my father's at the Navy Yard. There were many

occasions when he would come to my home to visit.

The many years that passed since last I saw him dimmed my memory. During the early stages of the Hurwitz Tourney he recognized me and introduced himself. Almost immediately the face became familiar. He was, he told me, helping out a team of Somerville ballplayers.

"I'm no coach," he said, "But maybe I can keep them from becoming disorganized. I'll make substitutions, and call time out when I think they need it."

In the weeks that followed I saw an intensity in 'Murph' that I never recognized as a youngster. That intensity, I learned, was based, not on a compulsion to win, but on a genuine love for the boys on his team. They called him 'Mr. Murph', and I thought it quite appropriate. The 'Mr.' reflected their respect for the man, the 'Murph', their closeness.

The team was made up primarily of Somerville High School players, and for six years 'Murph' had been the squad's

statistician. The Hurwitz gave him an opportunity to be more directly involved with them, more personal.

Although they did not possess great size, it was a disciplined and talented group which battled its way into last Saturday's final game.

Behind the superb play of Tommy Bullock and the Tourney's M.V.P., Wayne Hanscomb, the Somerville Team took the Championship Game down to its final seconds before bowing out, 66-63, to the Mission Club. But that wasn't the story.

"I know how much hard work goes into making something like the Hurwitz a successful happening — the paper work, the phone calls, getting officials to volunteer their time, it's a lot of work, and I want you to express my gratitude to Joe McGonagle and his staff for doing such an outstanding job.

"But what happened to me as a result of the Tournament goes well beyond the realm of basketball. When the game was over, the boys presented their

runner-up trophy to me. Now, that small gesture may not mean much to most people, but I can't begin to tell you what it means to me. The feeling I had at that moment, that I still have now, can't be described in mere words.

"People tell me kids aren't the same today as they used to be. That may be true as far as some kids are concerned, but not most of them."

I felt real good for 'Murph' as he recalled the afternoon's happenings.

"The reason I called, Charlie, was to let Joe and all the other people at the Boys' Club know what the Nate Hurwitz Basketball Tournament has done for me. That trophy will stand in a place where I'll be able to see it every day. It will remind me of this feeling I have right now. It will remind me of the past month, and all of the people at the Boys' Club. Thanks."

And he hung up the phone.

Three of the four final games were down to the wire Nail biters

with Stoneham downing South Boston 42-36 with a last quarter surge. Ed Fiorello led the winners with twenty-six points.

The Junior Division Champions, The Mission Club, led by 6 foot 9 inch Rudy Rennick, topped St. Catherine's of Somerville, 66-63.

In the intermediate final, the Hayes Club of Somerville, minus a couple of key performers, was soundly drubbed by the very talented Talismen, 92-56.

In the Senior Division, the Cabral Club avenged a final round defeat from last year's tourney, by topping the Christy Club 76-74. The game ended when last year's M.V.P., Eire Farangue, missed a jump shot at the buzzer.

Wayne Hanscomb, who spearhead two teams, St. Catherine's of Somerville in the Junior Division, and the Hayes Club in the Intermediate Division, into the finals, was selected M.V.P. of this Tourney.

Judicial Tyranny

You have only to flip through the pages of "Integratededucation" to see how the appeals courts "play ball" with the lower circuit courts, relegating the people to the losing side of "busing."

Boston learned, as have other cities, that appeals of school desegregation cases (to end them) usually go for naught. Lawyers have a "field" day and we, the victims, pay the piper while the "persecuted" plaintiffs ride toll free.

On January 29, 1979, Congressman Frank Annunzio (D-Ill.) spoke before the House in reference to an anti-busing resolution (H.J. Res. 20) he had

filed earlier in the month.

He began by saying, "I wish to address the issue of unwarranted intrusion by the Federal courts into the day to day administration of the public schools to enforce student busing orders.

Public school systems all across the country have become the virtual captives of Federal judges who, in the name of educational equality, have assumed the role of self appointed school superintendents. Instead of law, these unelected officials of the people are seeking their own brand of social justice by imposing a costly and educationally self-defeating regime of racial quotas in the public schools."

Congressman Annunzio said "it is all to apparent that a Constitutional Amendment is necessary if we are to succeed in ending judicial tyranny in the matter of forced busing. Recently, the Supreme Court has itself attempted to restrain the zeal of the lower Federal courts by placing stringent limits on judicial authority to formulate

busing remedies."

He cited the Dayton, Ohio case where almost 3 years ago the Supreme Court vacated a busing plan ordered by the sixth circuit which required a racial balance in every school in the Dayton system. The Supreme Court declared that the lower Federal Courts may act only where it is proven that school officials are guilty of intentional discrimination, and that remedial decrees must be specifically tailored to eliminate the "incremental segregative effects" of those past discriminatory actions. Subsequently the court remanded the Omaha and Milwaukee cases for additional proceedings in light of Dayton. Congressman Annunzio said, "nonetheless, the sixth circuit in Dayton proceeded at its first opportunity to ignore and distort the Supreme Court's ruling and reinstated its original racial balance decree."

The (Nov.-Dec. 1978) issue of "Integratededucation" gives the version of remarks made following the U.S. Court of Ap-

peals' (sixth circuit) decision.

School board chairman, William E. Goodwin, called the appeals judges "worms" and their ruling "inept and gutless." The court, he said, was "bigoted, prejudiced (and) racist"... Nathaniel Jones, NAACP general counsel, hailed the decision for having "lifted a cloud that had descended over school desegregation. It restored perspective to the whole effort to eliminate segregation." (enough version to get the picture?)

The Supreme Court this term, agreed to review this latest Dayton ruling and a companion sixth circuit decision out of Columbus. Hopefully, the Court will again correct these instances of judicial abuse.

Experiences such as these and the courts' consistent disregard of Congressionally legislated limits on student busing decrees, leaves us only one alternative — a Constitutional Amendment to stop forced busing.



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


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
