



Introduction

As we come back to Kyoto for the second time after two years, we bring with us great hope and inspiration:

hope that the artworks we created may bring inspiration to everyone; inspiration that may hasten the culture for peace and peace that may radiate from our Art Quake Exhibitons to the whole world!

The idea of the ART Quake Project came in 2012 when a I decided to gather a group of friends to donate our works to public hospitals to lighten otherwise drab places for the sick and the dying. We hoped to bring inspration to people with maladies as well as to those who serve them believing in the power of inspiration to heal. Inspiration is very important for healing the body and more importantly the human spirit. Echoing this to the world, the 21st century is marred with wars and terrorism. Our world is infested with a malady-that is lack of peace Can we inspire the whole world with our art works? Can we heal hearts and spirits, that we may, despite of and inspite of the deluge of hatred and anger amongst men, still could hope for an everlasting Peace? Thus the Art Quake Project is born. It is an advocacy

to create and inspire, and inspire to create peace.

The first Art Quake Exhibition was held in Istanbul at the Beylerbeyi Palace in 2014. This brought international artists to Turkey, the country that bridges two continents, Asia and Europe, and a country that has

seen wars not only within but among its naighbors. It is a country that has suffered countless terrorist attacks. The exhibition which highlighted the necessecity for World Peace attracted thousands of visitors and provided everyone a platform to express their solidarity towards this end. An art installation composed of two long strips of black and white cloths were unrolled. Artists and visitors signed side by side on the white cloth to affirm their advocacy for peace and walked on the black cloth to protest against war. This art installation provided an opportunity for everyone to participate in the struggle for peace, meanwhile derive inspiration from the artworks of local and visiting artists.

In 2015, the second Art Quake Exhibition was held in Kyoto, the city which once upon a time called Hei-an-kyo, meaning the capital of peace. Once again the peace cloths were installed as hundreds of art works from local and international artists inspired everyone. With a very rich cultural heritage and natural beauty, the ancient 'City of Peace', Kyoto, provided an appropriate backdrop to the exhibition.

We come back this year in spring time to Kyoto for the second edition of the event. We hope that the the Art Quake Kyoto 2017 brings us closer to our goal of lasting peace for the next generations to come: so that each and everyone of us may shoot each other with kindness, understanding and love instead of bullets and bombs.

Art Quake Kyoto 2017

The Art Quake Kyoto is a bi-annual juried exhibition with artists invited from diferent parts of the world who share our advocacy for peace through an event meant to inspire everyone. This year the art works of fourty two artists from fifteen countries will adorn the Museum of Kyoto in an array of exquisite and myriad creative expressions that reflect the multi discipline techniques and cultural backgrounds of each artist.

A special section of the exhibition focuses on Spain with the special participation of eighteen digital artists from Sagunto Grupo Fotografico ARSE represented by its President Mr. Juan F Higueras. This section presents three vital aspects of Spanish natural and cultural heritage, an expose of the natural heritage of the country; a look into the multifaceted festival of Spain as epitomized by the Fallas and an insight to the rich theatrical tradition of the country.

In 2015 a special section of the Arab Region featured artists from these countries which are generally under represented in the arts. A collateral activity on calligraphy and other traditional aspects of the region had been presented.

We hope that by dedicating a section of the exhibition to focus on a country or region, we will be able to enrich everyone's knowledge of the diverse world cultures and traditions which may bring a deeper understanding and appreciation of cultures and beliefs other than our own. Hopefully this may hasten our ultimate goal for world peace.

Three international juries from known institutions of the Arts had been invited to Kyoto to make the final selection for the winners. These juries had been chosen for their excellent and scholarly backround as well as for their integrity as reflected in their past professional activities.

Four prizes for artistic excellence are awarded in four different categories. The Art Quake Creativity Prize for Painting, Sculpture, Digital Art and Installation. Three Art Quake Peace Prizes are awarded to artists whose lifetime works in the arts have advocated peace. Winners of previous Art Quake Peace Prize are excluded in the selection for this category.

Kyoto Museum



Dedicated for the lovers of Japanese cultures, especially for Japanese people to treasure and celebrate their own, the Museum of Kyoto is located at the heart of the City. It is housed in a beautiful Meiji era building, (1868-1912) which was deisgnated as an important cultural property. This historical place, attached to a modern building, provides a great space for the permanent exhibits featuring the history and culture of Kyoto from the 10th century to modern day.

The exhibition is divided into three sections:

1) a historical museum introducing history and culture; 2) an art gallery displaying Japanese &Westem paintings and the works of sculptors & artisans associated with Kyoto; and 3) a hall for showing films associated with Kyoto. It is a great place to learn more about Kyoto and Japan's history outside of all the temples and castles.

One very important feature of the museum is a huge exhibition space for traditional and contemporary art. Here, special exhibitions on various topics are held year round, providing colorful and fascinating displays. This space provides platform for contemporary artists to show off their works.



Visitors to the museum may also enjoy the Mercantile Street 'Roji Tempo' where a typical Street scene from Kyoto's Edo era has been reproduced to make shopping and dining in the area more nostalgic and enjoyable.

The Museum of Kyoto is located in Nakagyou-ku, a centrally located district for tourism, shopping and entertainment. This is accessible through the Kawaramachi area, well-known for shopping with subway- and street-level boutiques, retail outlets and traditional craft stores.

Three major festivals in Kyoto take place in the Nakagyou district namely: the Aoi Matsuri, Gion Matsuri and Jidai Matsuri, all of which reflect the rich tradition of this city. Major places of interests around this area includes: Honnoji Temple, the Nijo Palace complex with, the Castle and Temple. Two very unique museums, the Kaleidoscope and International Manga Museum are also located in this district.

Kamogawa Odori is also held in this district at the Ponto-cho Kaburencho Theatre. Ponto-cho is a famous area. It is here where one can catch a glimpse of geishas as they make their way to by-appointment only teahouses in the early evening.




Kyoto, Japan

yoto, which was once the imperial capital of Japan for 1,000 years, is the heart of the country's culture and tradition. It has 17 UNESCO World Cultural Heritage Sites and about 2,000 temples and shrines, palaces and gardens that bear witness to its being the centre of activity throughout the formative years of Japanese culture. Japan's most famous temples found in Kyoto are Kiyomizu-dera, a wooden temple supported by pillars off the slope of a mountain; Kinkakuji, the Golden Pavillion Temple; Ginkaku-ji, the Silver Pavillion Temple; Ryoan-ji famous for its rock garden and the Heian Jingu, a shrine dedicated to the imperial family which commemorates the first and last emperors to reside in Kyoto. Several complexes related to the imperial family such as the Kyoto Imperial Palace, and Sento Imperial Palace, homes of the emperors for many centuries adorn the city. The Katsura Imperial Villa, one of Japan's architectural treasures, Shugaku-in Imperial Villa fashioning one of the best Japanese Gardens of the country as well as the temple of Sennyu-ji housing the tombs of the emperors are all in Kyoto. Like a big open air museum, a walk around the city makes every visitor feel the rich heritage of the country especially, one can personally experience tea ceremony, sake brewing, kimono wearing, and swordsmanship.
























