



According to the city of Boston Legal Department, Rebecca Tepper, hearing officer for the state's Outdoor Advertising Board (OAB), has made a recommended decision to deny Rite Media's application to located a billboard at 50 Brighton St. The decision was based solely on the finding that the Caldwell Street Play Area is within 500 feet and visible from the proposed location.

The recommended decision will be presented to the OAB at its next monthly meeting on April 15. At this time the board may or may not accept the hearing officer's recommendations as a final decision. If the recommended decision is adopted, Rite Media has 30 days in which to seek judicial review of the decision in Suffolk Superior Court.

* City Square Park . . . The Department of Environmental Management (DEM) and the park designer, The Halvorson Company, have begun the schematic design phase for City Square Park. As a part of this phase, a traffic study has been initiated to address pedestrian and vehicular circulation in and around City Square.

A community meeting has been schedul-

ed for Thursday, April 8, at 7 p.m. to discuss traffic issues in City Square and schematic design alternatives for the park. This meeting will be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St., Charlestown.

★ Street Reconstruction Update . . . Susi & Son got to break ground with one crew on Monday, March 29 on Lawrence Street in spite of rain that got heavy enough to wash out the work day before noon. The new drain line for Lawrence Street is being installed first, followed by catch basins etc. The crew will then install the drainage system on Seminary Street. With the potential of snow Thursday and Friday of this week, work could again be delayed another couple of days.

Signs are being posted and leaflets will be distributed on Prospect Street this week for an April 5 work start for the installation of water mains by Susi sub-contractors. It is anticipated at this time that within a week or so the areas will "flip-flop," and the drainage will be installed on Prospect Street and the water work will be done on Lawrence and Seminary streets.

Susi plans on bringing in a second crew next week to start drainage on Common Street between Adams and Park streets. Signs will be going up and leaflets will be distributed there as well. Susi plans on having this area completed by Bunker Hill Day. Susi also plans on completing the roof drains and lights etc., on the nearly completed streets as more crews are added to the work force.

There is still a problem getting all the gas lights lit because of the continuing gas company strike. The strike also has the

potential to impact the street reconstruction itself if it continues for an extended period of time. Bryant Associates and the Boston Redevelopment Authority are discussing the situation with Boston Gas in an effort to avert future problems.

The electrical sub-contractor for the Middlesex Corp. came in to finish hooking up the lights on the 40 Flights so that they will be ready to be lit when the railings are installed. Representatives from Bryant Associates are expected to make a field visit to the railing fabricator this week to see how things are progressing with the factory painting. It is anticipated at this time that the stair project will get going again in the next week or so.





Voke hopes, through a combination of more funding assistance and deeper cuts in the MWRA budget, the need for any further increases next year will be eliminated.







Fire Fighter Exam To Be Held

According to Rep. Richard Voke, time for submitting an application to take the upcoming civil service test for municipal fire fighters is drawing to a close. To be eligible for the test, which will be held on May 22, applications must be received or postmarked by April 16.

"This is an excellent opportunity for young men and women to pursue. While the job of fire fighter is often risky and the demands of the duties under emergency conditions are both physically and mentally challenging, the rewards of public service and the prestige that goes along with being a fire fighter certainly makes the opportunity to serve very worthwhile," commented Voke.

Several minimum qualifications exist to be eligible for appointment. Applicants must be at least 19 years old and no older than 32 as of April 16, 1993, although many municipalities may appoint candidates who are over age 32 but meet certain other medical and fitness standards. Only non-smokers both at the time of and after the appointmentment are accepted. Some municipalities may require the appointee to hold a driver's license and may require successful passage of job-related medical and/or psychological examinations before appointment.
