Menino Announces State Grant For Improvements To Doherty Park

Mayor Thomas M. Menino has announced that a \$291,000 state grant has been awarded to the city of Boston for improvements to the Olmstead landscaping on the backside of Doherty Park in Charlestown. The landscaping improvements, totalling \$455,000, will complement the \$325,000 in improvements already made by the city to other parts of the park.

Menino said, "Step by step we are making improvements to Doherty Park so it can be a place for families to enjoy during the warmer weather. Working with our delegation on Beacon Hill, we have brought state resources to improve the appearance and the accessibility of the park. We all want this neighborhood asset to be enjoyed to its fullest potential."

The \$291,000 state grant will be matched with \$164,000 from Menino's 1996 Capital Plan for a total of \$455,000 in improvements. The state grant was authorized under the Open Space Bond Bill

by the Senate Ways and Means Committee when Sen. Thomas Birmingham was the chairperson.

The Olmstead landscaping improvements will include upgrading the stairs, the pathways and "look out" rest areas. The project will also include general landscaping improvements as well. The projects will complement the other improvements recently completed by the city, including the spray pool and playground.

The work is scheduled to begin in the spring.


North Area (CANA) roadway reconstruction project in the late 1970s and several expressed willingness to take on this new project. It is estimated that the study will be completed in 15-18 months.

The meeting was chaired by Vineet K. Gupta, assistant director for policy and planning for the Boston Transportation De-

partment. Gupta will direct the Rutherford Avenue study on behalf of the city. Also present were representatives of Mass. Highway Department and the Central Artery/Tunnel project.

Gupta told the residents that the state would fund the Rutherford Avenue Corridor Study as a miti-(continued on page 7)

First Meeting Held To Plan For Changes On Rutherford Avenue

(continued from page 1) gation measure relative to the Charles River Crossing, as directed by the state environmental department. He said this would be a tripartnership between the community, city and state and the study would be developed through open public meetings and working groups with a particular focus.

The study will focus on Rutherford Avenue between Sullivan and City squares. It is hoped that there will be a complete redesign of Sullivan Square, the intersecting of the railroad tracks, pedestrian connections, bicycle routes, as well as transit service.

Transportation issues will be examined in the context of environmental, urban design and land-use opportunities, including economic development. The study will coordinate with efforts to plan and construct various public and private projects envisaged for the Rutherford Avenue Corridor.

The final product will include capital improvements recommendations and implementation strate-

Other areas of inclusion will be the Medford Street bypass road, better known as the haul road, for which the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) has appropriated funds for a study; the reconstruction of the Sullivan Square underpass/overpass; the MBTA's proposed Urban Ring tran-

sit service; changes in the operation of Moran Terminal; double-stack rail operations between the Moran Terminal and a new rail yard in Ayer; and the proposed Austin Street enhancement.

Patrick Reffett, community development director for the city of Somerville, brought out shared concerns between Charlestown and Somerville. He said that several issues had not be addressed, including growth plans for the Charlestown Navy Yard and for Assembly Square, as well as the development of the Monsanto Chemical site on the Charlestown-Everett line into a shopping mall. He added that the city would submit questions and comments on the scope of work out-

Questions were raised as to whether representatives from Cambridge and Everett as well as from the BRA and the MBTA should be included in the study groups. Resident Judy Brennan admitted it was a regional issue, but cautioned against losing focus on the local aspects.

Rich Johnston asked what could realistically be expected from this study and could the committee be creative. Mike Lewis of the CA/T project said that he would encourage the committee to be creative. He said that within the \$750,000 request by the city are many options. He added that CA/T is committed to fund this study

Questioned by Tom King as to the long-range potential of the study, Lewis responded that there is an infrastructure (overpass/ underpass) falling down that gives initiative to the project. These funds are for concepts, he said, noting that at present there are no funds in place for the final design or construc-

Resident John Mac-Donald questioned Lewis as to whether the study is being undertaken to deal with an increase in traffic from the CA/T and the change in the ramps. Lewis stated that there should not be significant traffic increase since the CA/T design is to enhance the flow of traffic on the interstate and to keep it off local streets. Lewis added that a study will be done on projected traffic.





AWARD CATEGORIES

- Elderly A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older as of Jan. 1, 1996 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Organization An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.
- Public Servant A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)
- New Resident A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.
- Unsung Hero A Charlestown resident whose deed/deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.





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

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AFTER A DISASTER, PLAN BEFORE YOU REPLACE

If you're unfortunate enough to lose your home in a presidentially designated disaster, you might be tempted to buy replacement property as soon as you receive your insurance settlement. But before you buy, make sure that you understand the basic tax rules.

As a general rule, property lost in a disaster is treated as if it were sold for the insurance proceeds. For example, if you lose a house with a tax basis (cost) of \$250,000 and you receive an insurance settlement of \$300,000, you have a gain of \$50,000 (\$300,00 minus \$250,000).

However, there are exceptions to this general rule when your principal residence is lost in a presidentially declared disaster. For example, if you receive insurance proceeds for personal property that was part of the contents of your home and these items were not separately listed in your insurance policy (referred to as "unscheduled personal property"), you have no gain at all. It doesn't matter how much insurance money you receive or how you spend it. There is never a taxable gain on an insurance settlement for unscheduled personal property that was part of the contents of a home destroyed in a federally designated disaster.

A different rule applies if you receive insurance proceeds for your home or for "scheduled personal property," such as jewelry, that may have been listed separately in your policy. When you receive a settlement for these items, the tax law treats your insurance money as a "common pool of funds." You won't have gain as long as you reinvest your entire pool of funds in any combination of home and personal property, and you do so within four years. In other words, you can avoid gain by spending your entire pool of funds on a new home, on personal property (scheduled or unscheduled), or on any combination of home and personal property.

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





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DEMOCRATS TO CAUCUS STATEWIDE

Registered Democrats in Charlestown will be holding a caucus on Saturday, March 2, 1996 at 12:15 p.m. to elect delegates to the 1996 Massachusetts Democratic Convention. Doors open at 10

Charlestown, Ward 2 will be electing 12 delegates and four alternates, equally divided between men and women, to send to the Convention. The apportioned number of delegates has been allocated on the basis of a formula giving equal weight to the Democratic Party registration and the average vote for Democratic candidates in the last general elections for Governor and President for which figures were available at the time delegate tabulations were prepared.

Thomas S. Cunha will call the caucus at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward or town as of December 31, 1995. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.

Registration shall remain open until all persons presenting themselves have registered, including any in line or outside the meeting place. The doors will close at noon and the caucus will start promptly at 12:15 p.m.

Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present, voting and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomination must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.

All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected. Each candidate will be allowed to make a two-minute speech and to distribute on his/her behalf one sheet of paper listing qualifications and ideas.

Slate-making is allowed, but no special preference shall be given to slates. There is no quorum required for the caucus.

There will be no admission or expense charge at the caucus, although donations may be solicited.

Discrimination on the basis of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, philosophical persuasion or economic status in the conduct of the caucus is strictly prohibited.

Challenges to the delegate selection process can be filed in writing with the Compliance Review Commission, c/o The Massachusetts Democratic Party, 45 Bromfield Street, Boston, Mass. 02108 no later than March 15, 1996.
