Final Distribution Set For ABCD's Surplus Food Program

As a direct result of federal budget cuts, Action for Boston Community Development Inc., (AB-CD) and The Kennedy Center will make the final distribution of Surplus Food amidst controversy over the program's continuance. On Wednesday, April 5, ABCD will make its last Surplus Food distribution in Charlestown, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at St. Catherine's Parish Hall, 10 Tufts St.

"This is a perfect example of the detrimental effects of the federal government's budget cuts," said Robert M. Coard, president and CEO of ABCD. "Congress does not realize the impact of its actions because the legislators on Capitol Hill are so far removed from the people affected. But here on the local level, we see the need and have already heard the outcry over its discontinuance."

ABCD expects to dis-

tribute cans of tuna fish, pork and beans, fruit cocktail, peas and apple sauce, rice, spaghetti, powdered milk, butter, fresh apples and peanut butter. This will be a sizeable distribution, therefore recipients should come prepared with whatever it takes to carry away up to 15 1/2 pounds of food.

D.A. Martin Guest At Charlestown Business Association

Suffolk County District Attorney Ralph C. Martin II was the guest speaker at the Charlestown Business Association luncheon on March 23 at Comella's restaurant.

Martin's topics began on a light note with comments on his post-election beard, which he said he grew for a "sign of entitlement" after his last election victory. It has since been removed by the barber's razor.

He then went on to speak about the verdicts that came forth on Charlestown residents the previous day from a federal court after a 68-day trial. Martin spoke on how their actions affected families, friends and the community. He said that the verdicts "showed these people were not immune from law enforcement." He praised the prosecutors, adding that it is "a challenge for the law enforcement community to keep

such efforts going."

Martin went on to talk about the "big surge in juvenile crime," adding that "no neighborhood is immune." He has made "youth issues one of the highest priorities of his administration" and is bringing programs to the county schools. With the newly instituted community-based juvenile justice program, the DA's office

and school officials meet twice a week to review the many considerations that must be looked at in sentencing juveniles.

As for the business community, Martin said that they could play an important role with juveniles in providing some alternatives to the street, in particular employment, especially as summer vacation approaches.


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Craven Donates \$5,000 To Charlestown High School


DR. THOMAS CRAVEN and Alpha Phi Omega.

Mayor Inspects Conditions At Library Following March 21 Fire



MAYOR THOMAS M. MENINO visited the Charlestown Branch Library early Wednesday morning, March 22, to inspect conditions at the facility following the previous afternoon's fire. He pledged that the library would be open to the public on Friday, which did occur. He also announced at the Cabinet meeting on March 23 that an additional \$450,800 is being recommended to expand the scope of previously authorized improvements. 

CNC Concerned About The Effects Of The New Charles River Crossing

Dear Waterways Program Chief,

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) is concerned about the effects the new Charles River Crossing will have on the community. The CNC hopes under the Chapter 91 license that the negative impacts of this project will be addressed. Issues of our greatest concerns are as follows:

Mass. Highway Department (MHD) proposed access through Paul Revere Park is opposed because of the negative impact on the completion of the entire park. Pedestrian use through the area will be more difficult because of the truck traffic and the loss of full use of our local streets that have just been completed as part of the Central Artery North Area (CANA) Project. We are not convinced that all has been done to relocate this road to a

location that will have less of negative community impact.

2. MHD proposed maintenance facility, located adjacent to Rutherford Avenue and the new Galvin Green, comes as a surprise and is opposed by the CNC. The community is recovering from years of CANA construction and looking forward to new parkland for residents and tourists alike. We are distressed to learn about the size and location of the proposed maintenance facility in the area of the parkland. This facility will be visible from not only Galvin Green, but from Paul Revere Park. In addition, it is not a water-dependent use and should not be allowed under the Chapter 91 license.



FAMILY LIMITED PARTNERSHIPS

Family limited partnerships (FLPs) can reduce estate taxes and save income tax for your family group.

An FLP is formed by the parent who has assets to contribute to the partnership. Then the parent makes gifts of limited partnership interests to the children. The parent functions as general partner, and the children are limited partners. As general partner, the parent makes the FLP management decisions - which is attractive to parents interested in transferring wealth without relinquishing control.

Assets suitable for FLPs include real estate, small businesses and investment property. S corporation stock should <u>not</u> be contributed, nor should the family home or other property not used in business or investment activities.

Benefits and Costs of FLPs

Family wealth transfers at a discount. Parents can make gifts of FLP interests at discounted values (for estate and gift tax purposes), because these interests have limited marketability and are minority ownership stakes. Appropriate discounts may range from 10 percent to as much as 50 percent. Interests in closely held businesses are the best candidates for big valuation discounts.

Family income shifting to reduce taxes. You can use an FLP to shift some of the taxable income from FLP assets from you to your children, who are usually in lower tax brackets.

FLP start-up and maintenance costs. FLP setup expenses and annual expenses to handle paperwork and tax filings can be high. So if you have less than \$1 million in assets, you may want to investigate more basic wealth transfer techniques before looking at FLPs.

One player returning for the Townies is shortstop sophomore Francisco Rodrigues. Originally slated to attend Belmont High School this year, he changed his mind and is now back with Sheeran. "I think Frankie made the right move," Sheeran said. "He's a good kid, and we are glad to have him back." Rodrigues is also scheduled to do some pitching this season, and will start the season opener versus Brighton at The Neck on Monday at 3 p.m.

Also coming back for CHS are Eddie Reynolds, a junior second baseman; Ian Urquhart, a junior left fielder; Angel Lopez, a center fielder; Ricky Evers and Rene Armador. Armador, a junior reliever, who Sheeran says is one of the keys to CHS's success in 1995.

Evers, a sophomore from Charlestown who also stars for John Morris' hockey team, will start the second game of the season on Wednesday afternoon at Dorchester High. "Ricky gave us some good innings last year," Sheeran said. "Hopefully, he will be able to throw a couple of complete games this season."

Another player Sheeran has been impressed by during the tryouts is sophomore southpaw Rafael Garcia. 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
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Good News From The Community Gardens

Gardens for Charlestown Inc., Charlestown's community garden organization, won a unanimous vote from the Board of the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) on March 16 at the board's regularly scheduled meeting in city hall when the board voted to convey title to the slope in Sullivan Square for one dollar.

Kevin Burke, president of Gardens for Charlestown, and Guest Perry, clerk/secretary, presented the garden's case to the BRA Board and presented them with booklets, A Profile of the Sullivan Square Community Garden. City Councillors Diane Modica, Richard Iannella and John Nucci all spoke in favor of the garden which community gardeners have been cultivating for almost 18 years. Also in attendance and ready to speak in their behalf were Valerie Burns, Boston Natural Areas Fund; Eleanor Strong, South End/Lower Roxbury Open Space Land Trust, representatives from other "green hat" organizations in the city, members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and, of course, Charlestown gardeners. Routine legal matters remain to be settled before the garden actually receives their deed.

The community garden was recently awarded a silver medal and blue ribbon for their exhibit at the Mass. Horticultural Society's Flower Show. The exhibit, designed to reflect the show's theme, Magical Moments, included a montage of the garden and many of its features and included the spire of St. Francis de Sales Church and the Monument looming over Bunker Hill (artist's license), photographs of the gardens and gardeners, and even a mock

designed the exhibit, and Lillian MacAlpine.
