

## Involuntary Examinations for Children Reported by Age Groups with a Focus on the Tampa Bay Area

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### I. Introduction

The Baker Act (Chapter 394, Part I, Florida Statutes) is Florida's law governing mental health treatment. The Baker Act Reporting Center at the de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute receives processes and analyzes certain data related to involuntary examinations initiated under the Baker Act. The Baker Act specifies that these data are to be submitted to the Florida Department of Children and Families. The Baker Act Reporting Center receives these data on behalf of the DCF.

The Baker Act Reporting Center has received and entered data from over 2 million paper involuntary examination forms into an electronic database since 1997. These include BA52 forms for involuntary examinations initiated by law enforcement officials and mental health professionals, as well as ex-parte court orders for involuntary examinations based on sworn testimony. It is important to understand that not all involuntary examinations result in admissions. Data in this report only include involuntary Baker Act examinations and do not include counts of involuntary or voluntary admissions and should NOT be construed as admission data but, rather, involuntary examination data.

When interpreting these results it is also important to understand some of the complexities related to the location and availability of Baker Act receiving facilities and the services they offer. This is a complicated issue that is beyond a full discussion in this brief report and that analyses of the Baker Act data alone cannot fully address. Readers of this report are cautioned *not to over interpret* the counts presented and to understand that high versus low counts of involuntary examinations are not in and of themselves representative of "good" or "bad" policy decisions. Often, more information is needed about a particular community, one or more laws/policies/regulations, as well as the funding environment for multiple systems to accurately interpret the numbers in reports from these data.

#### II. Method

Statewide data for involuntary examinations for July 2012 through June 2017 were used for these analyses. County of residence as reported on the Cover Sheet (form MH-3118) was used to categorize involuntary examinations by county. Note that counts in this report are not of *children*, but of *involuntary (Baker Act) examinations* of children.

<u>Redaction</u>: Small cell sizes (25 or less) were redacted from this report. The purpose of this redaction is to prevent identification of people. Redaction should be approached contextually, in that smaller and/or more geographically limited populations need to have counts redacted at higher numbers in order to address concerns about identifying individuals. There is no definitive source on redaction. Baker Act Reporting Center staff will provide additional information about redaction, upon request.

This report was created to address a request from Katie LaGrone, Florida Investigative Correspondent, The E.W. Scrips Company (ABC Action News, WPTV5 and Fox4).

### Results

#### I. Statewide


Counts of involuntary examinations by age groups for five fiscal years are reported in Table 1. The percent change from FY12/13 to FY16/17 is also reported.

The distribution of gender by age group is shown in Figure 1. A small percentage of forms did not report gender, such that percentages of males added to females in each age group do not sum to 100.

# II. Counties in Three Florida Regions

Counts of involuntary examinations for residents aged 2-17 of three areas in Florida are summarized in Tables 2, 3, and 4. Counts are reported for children ages 2-5, 6-9, 10-13 and 14-17, but are not reported for each county for ages under 6 because of low cell sizes. Rather, counts of involuntary examinations for people under 6 are pooled for each group of counties.
