Registered voters of the City of Boston will go to the polls on Tuesday, September 10, 1985 to cast their ballots in the Preliminary Election. Polling sites will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

According to the City of Boston Election Commission, the original primary date was moved up to September 10th out of respect to the Jewish community in their observance of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Voke has been the Demo-

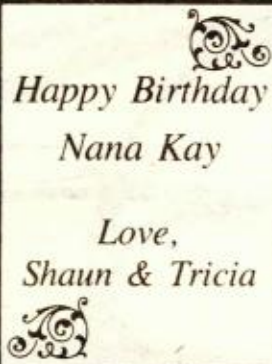

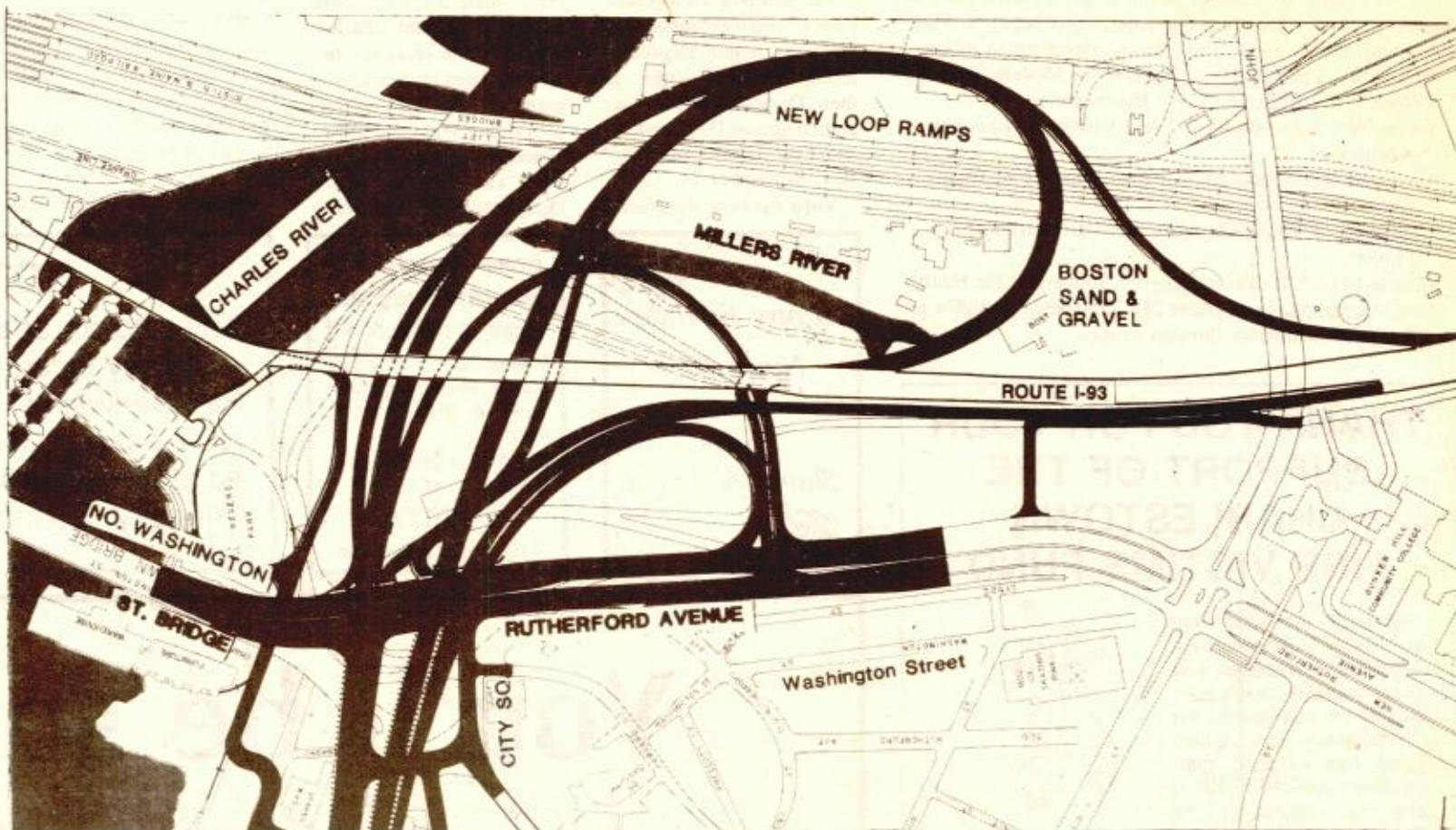

Below is a brief description of some of the issues that will be discussed at the September 10th meeting.

RUTHERFORD AVENUE AREA IMPACT

The majority of the loop ramps will be overhead structures similar to the present I-93 construction with the bulk off the ramps located west of I-93 over the MBTA tracks and Boston Sand and Gravel. The ramps are set so that all possible connections can be made between Route 1, I-93, and local streets. These connections can be made at a greater distance from the Charles River Bridge than the existing ramps. The longer merge and weave distance created by the loop ramps will improve the traffic operation and safety on the bridge.

There have been two modifications made to the alignment of the loop ramps that was shown in the Final Report issued in the 1982. Originally, the ramp that connects from Rutherford Avenue to Route 1 northbound was to be combined with the access to Boston Sand and Gravel. However, the Federal Highway Administration review dictated that the ramp and the access to Boston Sand and Gravel be separate. The solution was to combine Boston Sand and Gravel's access with that for Bunker Hill Community College. Separating Boston Sand and Gravel's access from the ramp has permitted realigning the ramp to avoid Miller's River, which was originally scheduled to be filled and relocated toward Boston Sand and Gravel's property.

In addition to the design of the ramp system, plans are

being prepared for preloading the area of those ramps that will be on fill. The preloading consists of gravel fill placed to a height in excess of the proposed ramp elevation to consolidate the poor quality soil in the area. This will eliminate settlement that might otherwise occur.

CONSTRUCTION IMPACTS

Although the North Area project will greatly improve the City Square area, it will also mean a lot of construction and disruption in the area for several years. Construction impacts that could be the most disruptive include noise, air pollution, dust, removal of excavated material, rodents, and the ef-

fects on building foundations.

Construction specifications will require that contractors take specific measures to lessen the impact of demolition and construction on the community. These requirements will be enforced by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (DPW).

Noise abatement is an important construction issue, and although specific regulations and procedures will not be worked out for several months, the Massachusetts DPW and the consultants will be able to address some basic concerns at the September 10th community meeting. Contractors will be required to comply with City of Boston regulations regarding maximum allowable construction noise levels which restrict noise emis-

sions to 86 dBA at a distance of 50 feet and limit the hours of construction to 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday. In addition to noise level restrictions, efforts can be made to muffle the engines of equipment, properly locate stationary equipment that are noise producers, and install barrier and fences to reduce noise.

Carbon monoxide and dust particles, which are the major causes of air pollution, increase as a result of construction. Carbon monoxide, emitted as tailpipe exhaust, can be reduced in the neighborhoods by keeping through traffic off local streets and making sure that the main through streets are kept at the maximum allowable capacity. For dust control, all trucks carrying dust producing material will be

required to be covered, and hydrated calcium chloride will be sprayed on roads to lessen dust.

Over 10,000 truckloads of earth will have to be excavated during the project. If the excavated material were stored on the site, it could be hazardous. Continuous removal of most of the material will be necessary for the North Area project since there is inadequate storage space available. Most of the material is usable construction material; about 12 percent will be usable only for construction fill.

The contractor will be responsible for hiring an exterminator to follow a plan for rodent extermination on the site. Extermination will be done intensively prior to construction with a "blitz" being conducted by licensed exterminators.

Protection of the foundations and structures of existing residential buildings will also be part of the Central Artery project, and documentation of existing conditions and preconstruction surveys and photography procedures will be required. Slurry wall construction, a technique that is advan-

tageous because it is less disruptive to the surroundings, will be used in the construction of the tunnels and for most other construction near existing building foundations.

Slurry wall trenching minimizes vibration, noise, and traffic disruption, often extensive when pile driving is done. Minimizing pile driving operations means that nearby buildings will require no underpinning and will suffer minimal vibration transfer. Slurry wall construction is advantageous because the walls help to maintain constant water and soil pressure, factors that are important in preventing alterations to the foundations. No blasting is anticipated in the project.

Contractors will be required to provide temporary sidewalks, fencing, and lights in areas under construction. There may be work that involves temporary closing some streets or pedestrian paths. In those cases, alternate routes will be working out. During 1986, there will be a definitive staging plan developed for the entire project which will

One Man Show To Open At Charlestown Working Theater

A freelance actor, director and writer, Cooke has previously portrayed Coolidge in a Cambridge theater production called "Calvin Coolidge Follies", in Metromedia's **Campaign Fever** which won an Emmy, and in a performance piece on National Public Radio.

Charlestown Merchants Association Holds Organizational Meeting

"I hope the purpose here isn't just to run fundraisers. I think this organization has to be willing to address big issues," stated businessman Norbert Lynch at the organizational meeting of the Charlestown Merchants Association held on Tuesday, August 27th at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

At the meeting, which drew not only the attention of local business representatives, but also that of Reverend Brian Murdoch of St. John's Episcopal Church, Representative Richard

Voke and City Councillor Robert Travaglini, several goals for the organization were listed, with the first priority being communication. Murdoch emphasized that communication should be established not only between association members, but also between the association and other community groups so that "we are not pulling against one another."

One businessman told the merchants that in order to be "viable and effective," the organization must first establish a direction which will work to "enhance the quality of life in Charlestown." Both Travaglini and

Voke offered the services of their offices in assisting the organization.

Other concerns which merchants felt must be addressed by the organization, besides fundraising, were police protection, street conditions, and other city services. Bob Rosselli said the merchants association should be "the working force in Charlestown."

The meeting concluded with the selection of a steering committee which will formulate bylaws and goals for the association. At the end of 90 days, the membership will vote on the recommendations of the steering committee.

Finding The Cure Top Priority

Both the Reagan Administration nationally and the Dukakis Administration locally should be securing all the necessary research funds to find the cure before the disease enters fully the mainstream of society.

In the past, strong national efforts, spearheaded by government solved other epidemics. In the 1950s we took on polio and found the cure and we should be able to take on this current epidemic too!

No expert really knows everything about AIDS. What are the ways it is contracted? How does it spread? There are many questions and not enough answers as of yet.

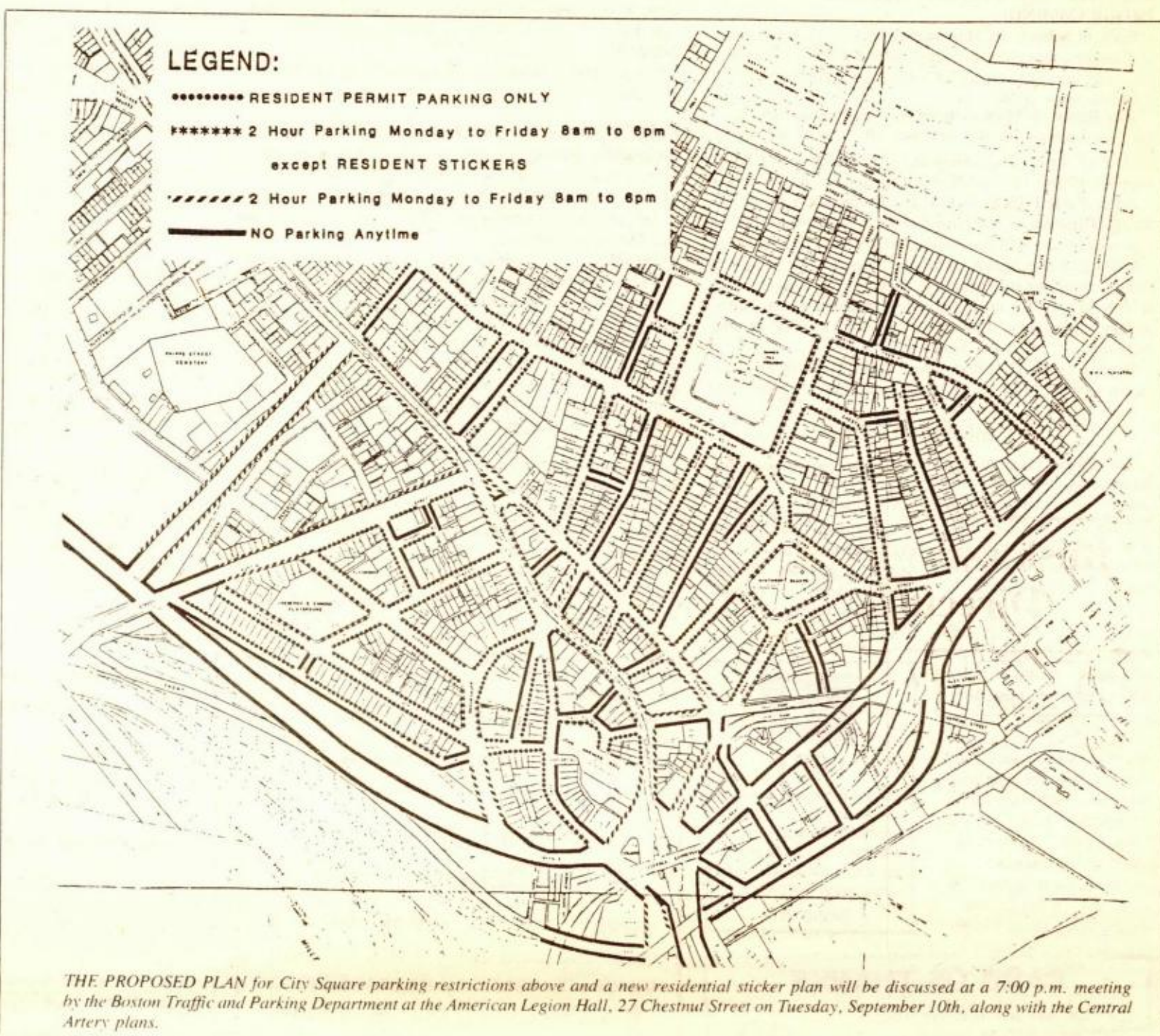

On August 22, 1985 at 12:02 a.m., police officers responded to a radio call relative to a domestic dispute at Dunstable Street. On arrival, the officers found a male and a female involved in a heated dispute. The woman produced a restraining order, which had been issued from Charlestown Court for the man. At this time, the male suspect, a 28 year old Charlestown resident, was placed under arrest for violations of the restraining order.
