## Father Mahoney Sworn In As BFD's Chief Chaplain

Charlestown was well represented by Boston Fire Department officials and guests recently as Rev. Daniel J. Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Parish in Charlestown, assumed the duties as Chief Chaplain of the Boston Fire Department. "Townie" Martin Pierce Jr., commissioner of the BFD, presided at the swearing-in ceremony and presented Father Mahoney with his shield.

On hand for the ceremony was Father Mahoney's sister, Mary E. Mahoney, assistant dean of admissions at UMass/Boston.

Father Mahoney was born in Haverhill, Mass., the son of the late Mary and Daniel Mahoney. He was educated at St. James Grammar and High schools in Haverhill. He studied at St. John's Seminary in Brighton and was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese

★ **Affordable Housing Update** — Affordable housing in Charlestown should be placed on the list of endangered species. When news that two existing units were put up for sale, it immediately drew the attention of affordable housing activists.

The one-bedroom units, located in the Charlestown Navy Yard, were completed in

1989 by the Bricklayers and Laborers Non-Profit Housing Co. Inc. and occupied shortly thereafter. Applicants for the 43 units were obligated to meet certain income requirements in order to be eligible to purchase the below-market rate housing. The same guidelines that established the affordable housing

## Charlestown Scores Victory On Street Contracts

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council held a meeting on Oct. 21 to announce to the community that the long-awaited street reconstruction contracts will begin in the spring and that an additional four streets have been added to the project. Council Chairman Dennis McLaughlin stated that the Mayor's office has agreed to include Tremont, Union and Winthrop streets to the contracts as well as Edgeworth Street because of its proximity to a contracted area.

On hearing the news of the announcement, City Councillor Robert Travaglini stated: "It clearly took longer than I ever would have imagined, but I'm grateful it finally happened. There is no one individual who can take credit for the realization of the reconstruction contracts, rather it was a combination of Neighborhood Council participation, residents and elected officials never giving up and keeping their (BRA) feet to the fire." Travaglini had worked toward including the addi-

tional streets into the contracts after residents requested his assistance.

Attending the meeting to confirm the news were Jack Hanlon, budget analyst from the Mayor's Office of Capital Planning, and Paul Barrett, BRA director of Economic Development. Hanlon stated that the Mayor's office has committed the funds, \$800,000, to include the four additional streets. The BRA, he said, will administer the project.

Barrett stated that the open bidding process for the original contracted streets will be advertised within 30 to 45 days. A design and engineering study must precede the bidding for the four additional streets, he said, but that work will be completed within the life span of the original contracts. Barrett added: "You hear tonight a commitment that they will be done."

According to Paul Reavis, BRA assistant director for Engineering and Design, the contract bids will appear in newspapers and associated contractor's newsletters "around the holidays," the best time of the

year to attract the best companies at competitive prices, he said. The contract to reconstruct the Mead Street stairs (40 Flights) will also be advertised at the same time, he said, but under a separate advertisement. This work, he stated, should also start in the spring.

The \$4.1 million contract will include the replacement of water and sewer lines; catch basins and curbs will be reset; and sidewalks and roadways reconstructed. The streets included in the original contracts are:

- Adams Street between Winthrop Street and Lowney Way;
- Chestnut Street between Mt. Vernon Avenue and Lowney Way;
- Common Street between Winthrop and Adams streets;
- Concord Street between Monument Square and Bunker Hill Street;
- Devens Street between Main Street and Old Rutherford Avenue;
- Essex Street between Rutherford Avenue and Lyndeboro Street;

- Ellwood Street from Putnam Street to end;
- Ferrin Street from Lowney Way to end;
- Lawrence Street between Austin and Union streets;
- Lexington Street between Monument Square and Bunker Hill Street;
- Ludlow Street between Mead and Eden streets;
- Lyndeboro Street between Middlesex and Essex streets;
- Middlesex Street between Lyndeboro and Main streets;
- Monument Court from Winthrop Street to end;
- Mt. Vernon Avenue between Chestnut and Mt. Vernon streets;
- Mt. Vernon Street from Lowney Way to end;
- Nearen Row between Tremont and Ferrin streets;
- Old Rutherford Avenue between Union Street and City Square;
- Park Street between Common and Warren streets;
- Prescott Street between Devens and Washington streets;
- Prospect Street between Lowney Way and Tremont Street;
- Russell Street between Auburn and Eden streets;
- Seminary Street between Austin and Lawrence streets; and

### BPL Begins Restoration At Copley — Charlestown Branch Slated For Repairs

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn and Senate President William M. Bulger, president of the Boston Public Library's Board of Trustees, recently announced the start of Phase I of the planned \$50 million restoration and renovation of the BPL's historical McKim Building in Copley Square. Mayor Flynn said: "The McKim Library has provided critical educational and cultural resources to the people of Boston for decades. The restoration of this magnificent landmark will not only preserve these

essential resources for generations of future Bostonians, the beautification will embellish our city."

No major work has been done on the building since its completion almost 100 years ago in 1894. The initial phase of the project is already underway and is expected to take about two years.

Flynn added: "This project complements the extensive renovations of the neighborhood branch libraries in Boston which the city has had underway since

1985."

The Charlestown Branch Library is included in the capital improvement plan. A new security system has already been installed and additional improvements are scheduled at the local library for the November

1991 to May 1991 construction season. They include: the replacement of the heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems; a new roof; enclosure of the interior mezzanine; replacement of lighting; and some painting.

# Father Mahoney Sworn In As BFD's Chief Chaplain

Father Mahoney has a long history of serving with and for the men of the BFD. He has been on hand at the major conflagrations in the city since he was appointed Assistant Chaplain to the

BFD in 1964, offering comfort to the victims and counseling the firefighters on a personal level. He rose to Senior Assistant Chaplain in 1972, a position he has held until this month when he was appointed Chief Chaplain.

In 1983, Father Mahoney was awarded the BFD's Distinguished Service Award for saving the Torahs from destruction at a seven-alarm fire at Temple Tiferith in Everett in August of 1982.

In addition to his BFD

duties, Father Mahoney has served as Chaplain to the Professional Firefighters of Massachusetts and to Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus.

As Father Mahoney thanked his parishoners for

their support and well wishes at Mass on the weekend following his assuming the duties of Chief Chaplain, he spoke of his induction ceremony. He told of Commissioner Pierce wondering how long it would be for his "baptism of fire." Father

Mahoney said that it was just 52 hours before a multiple-alarm fire broke out in the city and that was at the JF Kennedy Building in Government Center.

cost also placed restrictions on the ownership, including the procedure that must be followed when the unit is resold.

This affordable housing complex, known as the Charlestown Navy Yard Rowhouses, states in its master deed that the resale of any unit must first be offered to persons within the same income bracket established for the original owner and that the sale price must be kept in the affordable price range.

The first advertisement for the \$89,000 unit asked for \$125,000, well above the annual 5 percent allowed in the master deed. The price of the unit dropped to \$110,000 when the real estate agent was notified by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA). The second unit was also placed on the market for \$106,000.

According to BRA Deputy Director Bob Rush, the maximum price that can be requested for the units is \$97,000. "If higher," he stated, "the deed cannot be cleared when the property is to be sold."

BRA Neighborhood Housing and Development Specialist Joan Smith added: "The units cannot be put beyond the affordable reach. Limitations are stated in the deed as to increases allowed from the original price." She added that both the homeowner and the real estate agent should be aware of these limitations.

Smith said that anyone interested in obtaining additional information on these units can call her at 722-4300, ext. 4280.

The number of affordable units available to the community is and will remain limited. Both the BRA and members of the community who have been involved in bringing these units to the neighborhood have voiced their determination to keep a watchful eye on the disposition of each and every unit to ensure their continued existence.

**★ Charlestown Navy Yard** — The Massachusetts Executive Office of Environmental Affairs has granted final approval to the supplemental environmental impact report for the Charlestown Navy Yard master plan.


The updated master plan, which has the support of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the city's Harborpark Advisory Committee, paves the way for development of a biomedical research complex of up to 1.1 million square feet and the proposed relocation of the New England Aquarium on Piers 10 and 11 of the Navy Yard.

Completion of the Navy Yard as proposed in the master plan will produce the following public benefits in the decade ahead:

- Over 4,300 construction and 4,000 permanent jobs.
- Over \$7.3 million and \$1.4 million in housing and jobs linkage payments, respectively.
- Approximately \$15.5 million in new, recurring annual property tax revenues.
- Over \$7.5 million in one-time construction state income tax.
- Nearly \$6.5 million in annual permanent state income taxes from newly created jobs.
- Over 10 acres of additional public open space in the Navy Yard and 6,500 lineal feet of new publicly accessible waterfront incorporated into the Harborwalk system.
- Strengthened vocational training for community residents through Bunker Hill Community College.

**★ Constitution Museum** — The U.S. House of Representatives and Senate conferees have approved significant funds for Massachusetts historical sites and natural resources and a continued moratorium on offshore oil and natural gas development on George's Bank.

On the list of organizations in the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriation Bill is the USS Constitution Museum which will receive \$266,000 for planning and design of an auditorium to show films on "Old Ironsides." This facility will be especially needed to accommodate tourists while the USS Constitution is in dry-dock (1992-94) for restoration work to prepare for the 200th anniversary of the vessel's first launching in 1797.

### Bobick Awarded Commendation Medal

Tech. Sgt. William J. Bobick, U.S. Air Force, was recently awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal, Third Oak Leaf Cluster, and a citation for distinguishing himself while assigned to Kadena Air Base

in Japan as a Team Leader Pararescueman in the 33rd Air Rescue Squadron. On Oct. 27, 1989, Bobick, through the use of his exceptional medical skills and knowledge, helped save the life of a severely injured

seaman on the tanker **Capricorn**. With complete wet gear, medical kit and another pararescueman, Bobick rode the hoist 100 feet to the deck of the ship which was pitching wildly in 30-foot swells and 40-

knot winds. Once aboard, the ship's crew notified Bobick that the injured seaman was three decks above the hoisting location. Bobick immediately notified the flight crew and requested the stokes litter.

After stabilizing the patient, Bobick, aided by the ship's crew, carefully carried the patient down three narrow stairways to the hoisting area. His ability to perform in an extremely stressful situation limited the exposure of the flight crew to the hazardous hovering conditions. Back on board the helicopter, Bobick continued to care for the patient by checking vital signs and administering intravenous fluid.

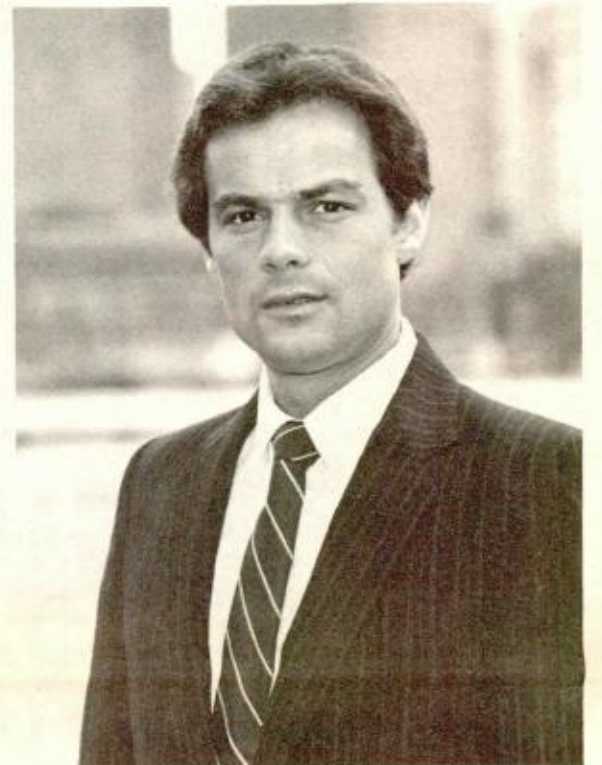

Washington Street between Austin Street and Old Rutherford Avenue.

The portion of Mead Street located between Russell and Bunker Hill streets will be included in the Mead Street Stairs reconstruction contract.

All streets will receive new gas street light fixtures with the exception of Ferrin, Mead and Russell streets, which will have rectilinear electric light fixtures. Brick sidewalks will be replaced on Monument Court and will also be laid on a four-foot portion of the sidewalk surrounding the Training Field. All other

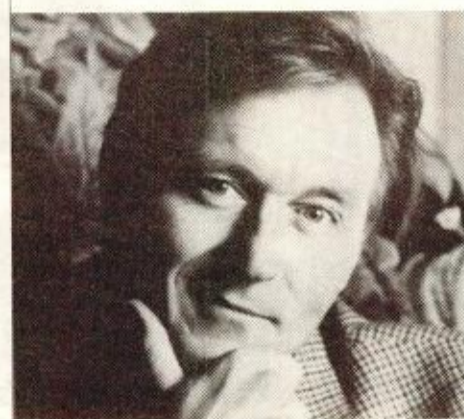

#### FLU SHOTS

The flu season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins. We will start giving flu shots the week of Oct. 28.

Influenza or flu is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days.

Everyone feels sick with influenza but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that as many as 10,000 Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older.

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza that is expected to be around in a given year. The vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza. Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot have gotten an unrelated illness not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reaction to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot. There is no risk of getting Guillain-Barre syndrome, the illness sometimes associated with the 1976 swine flu vaccine.

If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should seriously consider getting a flu shot. FREE flu shots are available by calling the Bunker Hill Health Center at 242-5758 for an appointment.
