## Charlestown Scores Victory On Street Contracts

by Kathy Giordano The Charlestown Neigh borhood Council held a meeting on Oct. 21 to announce to the community that the long-awaited street reconstruction contracts will begin in the spring and that an additional four streets have been added to the project. Council Chairman Dennis McLaughlin stated that the Mayor's office has agreed to include Tremont, Union and Winthrop streets to the contracts as well as Edgeworth Street because of its proximity to a contracted area.
On hearing the news of the announcement, City Councillor Robert Travaglini stated: "It clearly took longer than I ever would have imagined, but I'm grateful it finally happened. There is no one individual who can take credit for the realization of the reconstruction contracts, rather it was a combination of Neighborhood Council participation, residents and elected officials never giving up and keeping their (BRA) feet to the fire:" Travaglini had worked toward including the addi-
tional streets into the contracts after residents requested his assistance.

Attending the meeting to confirm the news were Jack Hanlon, budget analyst from the Mayor's Office of Capital Planning, and Paul Barrett, BRA director of Economic Development. Hanlon stated that the Mayor's office has committed the funds, $\$ 800,000$, to include the four additional streets. The BRA, he said, will administer the project. Barrett stated that the open bidding process for the original contracted streets will be advertised within 30 to 45 days. A design and engineering study must precede the bidding for the four additional streets, he said, but that work will be completed within the life span of the original contracts. Barrett added: " You hear tonight a commitment that they will be done." According to Paul Reavis, BRA assistant director for Engineering and Design, the contract bids will appear in newspapers and associated contractor's newsletters "around the holidays," the best time of the
year to attract the best companies at competitive pri ces, he said. The contract to reconstruct the Mead Street stairs (40 Flights) will also be advertised at the same time, he said, but under a separate advertisement. This work, he stated, should also start in the spring.
The $\$ 4.1$ million contract will include the replacement of water and sewer lines; catch basins and curbs will be reset; and sidewalks and roadways re constructed. The streets included in the original contracts are:

- Essex Street between Rutherford Avenue and Lyndeboro Street;

essential resources for gen erations of future Bostonians, the beautification will embellish our city:"

No major work has been done on the building since its completion almost 100 years ago in 1894. The initial phase of the project is already underway and is expected to take about two years.

In addition to his BFD
duties, Father Mahoney has served as Chaplain to the Professional Firefighters of Massachusetts and to Bunker Hill Council No. 62 , Knights of Columbus.

As Father Mahoney thanked his parishoners for

cost also placed restrictions on the ownership, including the procedure that must be followed when the unit is resold.
This affordable housing complex, known as the Charlestown Navy Yard Rowhouses, states in its master deed that the resale of any unit must first be offered to persons within the same income bracket established for the original owner and that the sale price must be kept in the affordable price range.
The first advertisement for the $\$ 89,000$ unit asked for $\$ 125,000$, well above the annual 5 percent allowed in the master deed. The price of the unit dropped to $\$ 110,000$ when the real estate agent was notified by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA). The second unit was also placed on the market for $\$ 106,000$.
According to BRA Deputy Director Bob Rush, the maximum price that can be requested for the units is $\$ 97,000$. "If higher," he stated, "the deed cannot be cleared when the property is to be sold:
BRA Neighborhood Housing and Development Specialist Joan Smith added: "The units cannot be put beyond the affordable reach. Limitations are stated in the deed as to increases allowed from the original price." She added that both the homeowner and the real estate agent should be aware of these limitations.
Smith said that anyone interested in obtaining additional information on these units can call her at 722-4300, ext. 4280 .
The number of affordable units available to the community is and will remain limited. Both the BRA and members of the community who have been involved in bringing these units to the neighborhood have voiced their determination to keep a watchful eye on the disposition of each and every unit to ensure their continued existence.

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## FLU SHOTS

The flu season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins. We will start giving flu shots the week of Oct. 28.
Influenza or flu is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days.

Everyone feels sick with influenza but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that as many as 10,000 Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza that is expected to be around in a given year. The vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza. Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot have gotten an unrelated illness not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reac tion to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot. There is no risk of getting Guillain-Barre syndrome, the illness sometimes associated with the 1976 swine flu vaccine.
If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should seriously consider getting a flu shot. FREE flu shots are available by calling the Bunker Hill Health Center at 242-5758 for an appointment
