Some of the Specialized Home Care Program's parents want to be home with their children. Others are women who have been at home, raising children, and now find that they have the time and energy to care for others. They are women who really enjoy nurturing others and seeing them grow.

Congregate Lodge On Perkins Street Will Open In The Spring
by Lynn Peters The congregate lodge for 14 adults with mental illnesses is scheduled to fill its rooms in Charlestown's Perkins Street neighborhood sometime in the spring. Since Erich Lindemann Mental Health Center representatives presented the program to neighbors last month, neighbors have resisted. At a fourth community meeting with De partment of Mental Health (DMH) professionals December 8, residents still do not want a home for the mentally ill in their neighborhood.
They doubt the success of such a program, worry about their property values going down and resent the state's process of barging into their neighborhood without their consent. Last week, neighbors gathered inside the home for yet another presentation attended by Lindemann Center's area director, community relations spokesperson and clinical director and North Suffolk Mental Health Association representatives.
City Councillor Robert Travaglini and Life Focus Center Director Jack Millerick criticized DMH for creating confusion among neighbors who have questioned the straightforwardness of the state's process.

It's obvious to me that there's been a lack of communication," Travaglini said. "This leads to heightened emotion, and when that happens, what inevitably arises is confusion." Although he spoke out on behalf of the neighbors, Travaglini commended North Suffolk, the nonprofit vendor awarded the contract to run the program, saying he knew it to be a
qualified agency and ${ }^{4 / 4}$ was happy to hear about it. Millerick said he was disappointed in the way DMH announced its arrival in Charlestown because "the neighborhood got a bad stereotype and it leaves neigh bors in a bad light" when they respond negatively. In November Gerry Morrissey, director of DMH's Metro Boston region, publicly announced the state's plans to the Charlestown Neighborhood Council to lease the three-story home at 71 Perkins Street and operate a treatment program for mentally ill adults trying to return to their own communities and live independently. The home was purchased by private real estate investor Ken Cunningham who retained the house's properly zoned rooming house license and offered DMH the lease. The council then set up a subcommittee and scheduled two public meetings so that Steve Gulla, Lindemann Center's area director, could discuss the program with concerned abutters. This congregate lodge is the third of its kind in Boston and a first for Charlestown.
Previously a rooming house for psychiatrically and medically disabled veterans run by William and Dorothy Charbonnier, 71 Perkins Street will serve recovering mental patients with 24 -hour supervision and a 1-7 staff-to-client ratio. The clients, who will include eligible patients from Charlestown, will typically be manic depressive or recovering from breakdowns. According to Gulla, no criminally insane clients, or those with histories

of sexual, alcohol or drug abuse will live in the house. Somerville Senator Salvatore Albano also attended the meeting as a Mt. Vernon Street neighbor impacted by the Charlestown lodge.
"Somerville has established many halfway houses, and they have worked so well," said Albano, who has served on DMH and Department of Mental Retardation commissions. "They've worked beyond anyone's expectations and it doesn't serve a purpose, or in (DMH's) best
interest, not to run a good program."
A small neighborhood committee has been set up with Lindemann Center's community relations person community relations perso Peggy McNeil to continue communication. Abutters will be encouraged to visit other properties leased by the state around the city, meet with staff members when North Suffolk hires them and follow the proces in an effort to minimize neighborhood concerns about, and resistance to, their incoming neighbors this spring.

After serving two years on the Neighborhood Council, I thought I'd seen enough foolishness to last me awhile However, I feel I must comment on the recent council controversy about the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) Mitigation Committee.
My experience of the recently deposed MWRA mitigation chairman, Moe Gillen, is that he is a decent, conscien tious man who has a mind of his own and Charlestown in his heart. These are evidently qualities valued by others in Charlestown whose votes allowed Moe to top the ticket in he last council election by a decisive margin. I do not think that Moe deserves to be treated with such disrespect as to be stripped of his chairmanship in absentia.
I suspect that the scapegoating of Moe Gillen serves the deeper purpose of distracting the town from what's really going on with the MWRA process. Whether Mr. Gillen or Mr. Galvin chairs the committee ultimately does not make a huge difference.
Why should the MWRA pay Charlestown hundreds of thousands of dollars for 50 trucks a day going down Medford Street when the majority of the council is falling all over itself to encourage the overdevelopment of the Navy Yard? Even before figuring in 10,000 visitors a day from the aquarium, at least 8,000 vehicle trips a day are projected for the Navy Yard, 20 percent ( 1,600 plus) of which are expected to use Gate 5 and Terminal and Medford Streets. Fifty MWRA trucks a day will be a real nuisance to the Medford Street neighborhood, but nothing to compare with the traffic from the Navy Yard. By its continuing actions in the Navy Yard, the council has let the MWRA off the

## I Love The City

I have been a resident of Boston for 10 years and have lived in Charlestown for the last five. Like many other residents I have become very attached to the community.
It has been very exciting to see the continuing improvements to our neighborhood develop over the last few years. Fortunately, this has made Charlestown a place where many others want to live and visit.
One reason why I decided to live in Charlestown was it's convenient proximity to downitown. Until about two years ago there were very few retail services available in Charlestown and I looked forward to the day when there would be more of a variety of local restaurants and retail shops.
Although these services create some more traffic and can use more parking spaces, most of us agree that overall they contribute more to our quality of life.
It is very disappointing to see that some members of the community have a difficult time accepting change and vouch that they are very concerned that these changes are a REAL problem
Recently, Jamason's Restaurant has approached the community for support in obtaining a Beer and Wine license so they may upgrade the quality of service in their establishment. Just what many of us have long waited for.
These so-called concerned citizens are now worried about property value declining and lack of parking. I see this improvement nothing but positive for the community. I offer two very straightforward arguments that this is not a major problem.
It is my understanding that these type of dining restaurants have a lower turnover of patrons since they tend to dine leisurely, often for more than one hour. In addition, they don't cater to take out business which increases customer capacity over and above the maximum seating available.
As far as property values are concerned, I know of many people who will not buy property in Charlestown because of the lack of shops and restaurants and, instead, buy in the Back Bay, Beacon Hill or Cambridge. Isn't it interesting how the most expensive property tends to be those buildings located closest to the neighborhood services?

These residents should not live here. They will find happiness in a garden apartment in the suburbs with plenty of parking and no restaurants in walking distance.
