Birmingham To Appear On 'The Cronkite Report'

Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham will share his views on legalized gambling on "The Cronkite Report," which will air Monday, March 21 from 8 to 9 p.m. and again at 11 p.m. on The Discovery Channel.

The quarterly program, hosted by Walter Cronkite, will focus on the controversy surrounding state-sponsored gambling. Birmingham will discuss his legislation to distribute lottery funds based upon what each community spends on the lottery. He has called the current distribution formula 'Robin Hood in reverse," since poorer communities get less of a return on each

dollar spent than do wealthier communities.

The program takes viewers from Las Vegas to Tenn. to Ledyard, Conn. to Mass. Birmingham's hometown of Chelsea is one of the Mass. communities featured. NEW TAX LAW PRESENTS MANY REFUND OPPORTUNITIES

Many of the changes made by the recent tax act were retroactive. But with these retroactive provisions come special opportunities. You may qualify for a refund if you fit into one of the categories below:

- You are self-employed and incurred health insurance costs after July 1, 1992, and filed your tax return without claiming the 25% deduction that was retroactively reinstated to July
- · You were an employee who received certain employerprovided educational assistance between June 30, 1992, and December 31, 1992, that was included in your income. The exclusion for up to \$5,250 of such benefits was retroactively
- · You donated appreciated art works or other tangible personal property to charity between June 30, 1992, and December 31, 1992, and treated the appreciation as a tax preference item for purposes of the Alternative Minimum Tax.
- You invested in low-income housing. The credit was retroactively reinstated to June 30, 1992, along with several modifications.
- · Your principal residence or personal belongings were damaged as a result of a casualty in a presidentially-declared disaster area on or after September 1, 1991. You may now qualify for additional tax benefits where insurance proceeds had created a taxable gain.
- You paid the 10% luxury tax on an airplane costing more than \$250,000, a boat costing more than \$100,000, or jewelry/furs costing more than \$10,000 on or after January 1, 1993. You are entitled to a refund. Contact the merchant who sold you the item.
- · You are an employer who paid wages to workers who were members of certain disadvantaged groups between June 30, 1992, and December 31, 1992. The targeted jobs tax credit was reinstated. You may qualify for the credit (40% of wages up to \$6,000; \$3,000 for summer youth workers.)

CHAD TEAM chairperson Peter Looney says, "CHAD is being widely accepted in the community and is becoming one of the leaders in addressing the drug and alcohol problems in the neighborhood."

The surveys, written in six languages, were conducted in 16 Boston neighborhoods as part of a needs assessment for Boston Against Drugs (B.A.D.). B.A.D. is a coalition of local government, Boston businesses and concerned neighborhood residents working together with individual communities to fight the abuse of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. There are 16 neighborhood TEAMs, comprised of residents, teachers, police,

health care providers, clergy and business people who develop specific strategies to educate, build awareness and prevent substance abuse in the commu-

Along with the neighborhood TEAMs, 16 local business partners help support the TEAM efforts by providing administrative assistance, funding and other inkind services. In the Charlestown neighborhood, the business partner is the Raymond Group, represented by Maureen Donahue.

The survey was developed and analyzed by Denise Dodds, the independent evaluation director for B.A.D., from the Institute for Urban Health Policy and Research. The results of the Charlestown TEAM survey have been submitted

to B.A.D. as part of its yearly plan for drug prevention activities in 1994.

The highlights from the community survey are as

- · Young adults, 22 to 40 years, were seen as having the most serious drug and alcohol problems.
- · Cocaine/crack was most frequently listed as the biggest drug problem, followed by marijuana and angel dust.
- · Most of the respondents (58 percent) said they either 'always' or 'usually' thought of alcohol as a
- · A somewhat higher percentage of respondents said they knew where to get help with an alcohol problem (65 percent) than with a drug problem (58 per-
- · Fifty-five percent of respondents said they were either 'very' or 'somewhat' familiar with CHAD.
- · Eighty-nine percent of the respondents rated CHAD as 'very' or 'somewhat' effective.

· Ninety-four percent of the respondents said they thought that the TEAM should place at least some focus on the prevention of tobacco use.

·Religious leaders and parents were rated as the most effective group in reducing the abuse of alcohol and other drugs. Business and politicians were rated as least effective.

· Seventy percent of the respondents said that 'parents' should take the lead in drug prevention.

· The largest number of suggestions for drug prevention activities were 'police/court' related, followed by 'activities.'

· Compared to other age groups, a much higher percentage (40 percent) of younger adults said they would be willing to volunteer their time on drug prevention activities.

Miller cited Malone's 20



City Square Park And Health Issues On Neighborhood Council Agenda

March may have roared in like a lion, but the March 2 Charlestown Neighborhood Council meeting came through the Knights of Columbus lower hall like a lamb. Sixteen of the 21 council members attended, and the meeting only lasted

The council heard presentations of a neighborhood effort to reduce smoking and the design plans for a City Square Park.

Present were: Chairman Peter Looney, First Vice-Chair Tom Cunha, Second Vice-Chair Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, and members Moe Gillen, Marty O'Brien, Dan Kovacevic, Ken Stone, Bill Galvin, Jim Conway, Jeanne Davis, Edna Kelly, Judy Brennan, Kate McDonough and Robert Scalli.

Dr. Randy Stafford of the Bunker Hill Health Center, and a representative of the Healthy Charlestown Coalition (HCC), compared a recent community needs assessment which identified health and lifestyle issues as important to residents to existing findings that Charlestown has a much higher rate of cancer and heart disease than other areas of Boston.


Stafford said that the needs assessment, which is now included in an HCC public report, confirmed what people were thinking in Charlestown. The clinic will survey households in Charlestown to identify how many people smoke, how many smokers have smoke-related illnesses and what services people would find helpful to address this community issue.

Council members Brennan and Galvin raised issues about the health effects of secondhand smoke, deleading, air pollution and power plants. Stafford said that the clinic's survey will be short and focus on smoking, but larger studies have already suggested connections between cancer, heart disease and other illnesses with any one of these urban-life issues. Stafford also said that the clinic and HCC support efforts are ready to expand smokingcessation programs and asked the council for its support in any way that it could provide.

Looney, a successful graduate of the clinic's Non-Smoker for Life Smoking Cessation Program, said it worked for him, and he supported its efforts.

Later in the council meeting, Brennan asked the council to support a motion to prohibit smoking during future council and committee meetings. Her suggestion was taken, though not unanimously, and residents can now plan to attend smoke-free council meetings. Smokers, you'll be accommodated during a break.

Council members and re-



sidents praised the plans and the process used to develop the City Square Park between residents, the design firm, Halvorson and Co., and the state Department of Environmental Management (DEM).

"The process says more for Charlestown," said Brennan. "Getting a park out of it is just the icing on the cake.'

Polk Street resident Don Haska described the proposed park as "a great showplace for Charlestown." Galvin echoed the predominant sentiment that the coordinated planning produced the "finest community process ever and a great design." Galvin noted it as an "example of how the community and agencies can work together."

Describing the park as a "green oasis," DEM's Cynthia Smith and Sandi Wolchansky presented the design, which would include green space, landscaping, seating and pedestrianfriendly pathways. The proposed City Square Park is also designed to become part of the neighborhood and pay tribute to Charlestown as an important historical community in the city.

Somerville bronze sculptor David Phillips's work will celebrate City Square as the site of of the beginning of the early American judicial system. This twodimensional sculpture will depict an early version of Charlestown and the theme of liberty and the scales of justice.

Historical sites will be honored by this City Square Park. The Paul Revere steps will be returned to their closest historical location. The Great House, the structure built for Gov. John Winthrop in City Square for his arrival from England, and its development into the Three Cranes Tavern, an historical political hot spot, are hailed with foundation stones saved from the square's archaeological dig. The World War II monument that currently stands in a dark corner of the John Harvard Mall will be m ed to a more visible place-







- Elderly A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older by Jan. 1, 1994 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Organization An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown
- Public Servant A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of
- New Resident A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life.
- Unsung Hero A Charlestown resident whose deed/ deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.

Save \$7.00 per month or more on your phone bill, if you're receiving certain kinds of public assistance.

Massachusetts residents can receive help in paying for their telephone service under two federal low-income assistance programs administered by NYNEX. The two programs are called Lifeline Telephone Assistance and Link-Up America.

Under the Lifeline program, eligible residential customers receive a monthly discount of \$7.00 on their telephone bill.

Only one telephone line per household is eligible.




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Saint Patrick

Many ask, "Why the great to-do over St. Patrick's Day?" The answer is a rather complicated one. First of all, Patrick was not born in Ireland. He became Irish by adoption. The saint was born in France, England or Italy. He had been a prisoner in Ireland for several years. Having escaped, he went to France and there completed studies for the priesthood. Eventually he was named bishop and sent to Ireland to evangelize those pagan people. The Irish were deeply superstitious and they were led by Druid priests. Patrick received permission to preach to the people and soon countless numbers were brought into the Church and baptized. Patrick died in Ireland on 17 March 493.

The repercussions of Patrick's preaching were heard throughout the known world. Ireland itself became Christian. Monasteries were formed, schools were established and this little island became a center for spirituality and learning. After Europe was overrun by barbarian hordes of the Huns, Vandals, Suevi, Goths and Visigoths, it was the Irish monks who came across the channel to Europe and again established schools, universities and monasteries.

In the 11th century, Ireland was invaded by the English. Monasteries were ransacked, thousands of monks were put to death and it was forbidden to speak the Gaelic language or attend school or hear Mass. Irish youths went to Spain to study theology. They were ordained priests there and returned in secret to minister to their countrymen. Many were found out and hanged. The tenacity and capacity for pain and suffering of the Irish was greatly underestimated. No matter how severely they were punished or how many of their number were murdered, they refused to renounce their faith or lose their identity as a nation. Many of the Irish youths had to flee their homeland and seek a new life in America and Australia. Always they brought with them the tenacity and capacity for suffering that they learned from their parents. They gathered in enclaves, built their churches, supported one another and built their own schools and colleges so that their children would not lose their faith. They adopted the land of their exile as their own and became

" prominent in every facet of civic activity.

In 1775, several hundred of the colonial troops who fought at Bunker Hill were of Irish heritage. Among other notable Irishmen who achieved fame was John Barry who came from Ireland in 1760 and is considered by many to be the father of the U.S. Navy. Bernado O'Higgins is considered the Liberator of Chile. He was the son of an Irish immigrant who became the Spanish Governor of Chile. Another was John Boyle O'Reilly, an exile from Ireland in 1870. He lived in Charlestown and was first editor of the Pilot. The following is a classic example of the ability of the Irish to overcome adversity and utilize their God-given talents.

In the Irish disorders of 1884, nine young Irishmen were condemned to die for treason against Queen Victoria. Protests from around the world forced Queen Victoria to commute the sentences from death to exile in faraway Australia. Thirty years later, Queen Victoria heard that Sir Arthur Duffy, Prime Minister of Australia, was one of the condemned. She inquired about the fate of the others. This is what she discovered. Thomas Meagher became governor of Montana. Terrence McManus was a brigadier general in the U.S. Army. Patrick Donahue also was a brigadier general in the U.S. Army. Richard O'Gorman was governor general of Newfoundland. Morrie Lyene was the attorney general of Australia. Michael Ireland succeeded Lyene in that office. Thomas D'Arcy McGee became a member of the Canadian Parliament. John Mitchell became a prominent New York politician whose son was the mayor of New York when World War I broke out.

"Why the great to-do over St. Patrick's Day?" This is a day when the Irish take a break in their daily routine to honor their forebearers who manifested such an indomitable spirit over the centuries. They do this with a parade, High Mass in church and a family gathering.




