## Clark To Speak At BHCC

Joe Clark, the man who maintained order at Paterson, N.J.'s Eastside High with a bullhorn in one hand and a baseball bat in the other, will be the speaker in the A-300 auditorium at Bunker Hill Community College in Charlestown on Tuesday, March 1 at 12:40 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Clark's appearance is being sponsored by the Student Activities and Athle tics office at BHCC.

Clark took over as principal of the school in September of 1982, one year after a stabbing had marred the first day of classes. Things were different when Clark took over. After only two years of his leadership the formerly raucous East side High was declared a model school by N.J.'s governor. Clark was named one of the nation's 10 "Principals of Leadership in 1986. He brought Eastside High from disgrace to amazing grace. He resigned in 1989.

Clark also won national acclaim for his achievements in a Time Magazine
cover story, a 60 Minutes profile and appearances on Nightline and Donahue. President Reagan named him model educator and he was the subject of the film "Lean on Me," starring Oscar nominee Morgan Freeman as Joe Clark.
In his first week at Eastside, Clark expelled 300 students for fighting, vandalism, drug possession, profanity or abusing teachers. He explains, "If there is no discipline, no leaming can take place. Without discipline there is anarchy. Good citizenship demands Good citizenship demands
attention to responsibilities as well as rights."
A former Army drill instructor, Joe Clark sees education as a mission.
Today, through his book "Laying Down the Law," his speeches and his consulting, Clark shares his beliefs, strategies and success with teachers, school boards, parents, businessmen and students around the country

Contributions to a spousal IRA for 1993 can be made up to the due date of your 1993 return, not including extensions. For most people, this will be April 15, 1994.

\section*{Abduction Prevention A Checklist For Parents}

In light of the recent reports of attempted abductions throughout the city of Boston and surrounding communities, including several in Charlestown last October and one in early February the Children's ebruary, the Childrens Trust Fund offers a checklist for parents and
to review together.
Parents need to be caln and reassuring when talking to their children. It is re commended that the follow ing steps be taken:

Role play and practice with your children as chil dren learn by doing. Prac ice what to do if a stranger approaches, choose real life situations that your children face such as walking to school and help your chil dren think of several responses to any given situation
- Routinely practice with your children and have your children practice what they would say and do if they feel threatened. For instance, children should learn to yell in a loud voice, "This person is trying to take me. I need help." Skills need to be reinforced to be effective.
- Teach children to use the buddy system for children should learn that it is safer with a "buddy" than alone.
- Teach children to check with you first before changing his or her plans.

It should be emphasized that you be told if the children are going anywhere, even with adults the children know.
- Help your children identify trusted adults to whom they would go for help. An example might be the person using a cash register in a mall or store, or a neighbor.
- Instruct your children to stay an arm's reach away. This is the length of a grown-up's arm plus another step.
- Tell your children that if they feel something is wrong, they should back up four steps, then turn around, run and do anything to attract attention.

Parents should remember that children can feel less fearful if they are given skills and information.

The Boston Police Department asks residents whose child has reported an attempted abduction to call its Hotline at 343-5500 or call 343-4712.

The Children's Trust Fund provides a curriculum that teaches children abuse prevention and safety skills. Called "Kids \& Company: Together for Safety," it is offered at no cost to public and private elementary schools. Success in America is dependent on the ability to read and write well. A recent literacy study conducted by the U.S. government indicated that nearly half of all adult Americans do not have the basic reading and writing skills needed to obtain a decent paying job. According to Mary Jordan of the Washington Post business leaders have raised concerns regarding this ow level of literacy and its direct threat to the U.S. economy.
This year, the Speech and Language Department of the MGH Bunker Hill Health Center was awarded a grant through the Bio-Medical Research Corp. to fund a reading and writing program. Twenty Charles own children who were having difficulties with their reading and writing skills, benefitted from this comprehensive written language program.
The speech-language pathologists used a variety of multi-sensory strategies to improve decoding, reading, comprehension, oral expression and written narrative skills. However, the most notable difference was seen in the area of self-esteem. One child in particular demonstrated so much progress in her reading skills and attitude toward school that she was awarded a \(\$ 500\) grant by her school. This award was based partly on academic achievement and school participation.
It is this speech-language pathologist's hope that success stories like this one continue to fuel the interest in supporting literacy programs. It is only through achieving literacy that a person will be able to attain a worthwhile occupation that provides stimulation and secures financial success - "The American Dream." \section*{Birmingham Announces Senate Passage Of Welfare Reform}

Sen. Thomas Birming ham announced that the state Senate last week passed a sweeping welfare reform bill that targets welfare dependency and provides the tools necessary to ensure that welfare recipients are able to move from the dole to the payroll.
"This bill will help us end chronic reliance on welfare instead of a job," said Birmingham. "We focus on those most vulnerable to chronic welfare dependency - teen parents. A recent study shows that 86 percent of teen mothers are unwed. By keeping these young mothers in school and living at home, we can nip welfare dependency in the bud."

This bill doesn't just talk about welfare recipients getting jobs, it provides that he jobs will be there," he continued.
When fully funded the
egislation ultimately would require every adult recipient to either: 1) work par time; 2) enroll in a job training or education pro gram; 3) work for a community service organization; or 4) work full time for an employer through the newly created Full Employment Program, as a condition of receiving benefits. The degree of implementation of the bill will depend upon future federal waivers and financial participation, as well as appropriations. Birmingham's bill earned praise from various parties, including the Alliance for Young Families, which re presents thousands of youth across the state. "We are delighted to see that you are willing to give priority status to teen parents and recognize they represent the possibility of giving the Commonwealth the greatest return on its invest

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ment,' " the organization wrote to Birmingham.

Birmingham criticized the governor's approach to welfare reform as "demagogic." He said, "The Repubgic." He said, "The Repubican bill relies on cost savings that have nothing to do with their welfare reform proposal. It makes promises that simply cannot be kept."

Birmingham referred specifically to the governor's contention that welfare recipients will be able to find 24,000 jobs in the next year. "Half of those on welfare do not have a high chool diploma and a third have no job experience. We annot expect market forces
to simply absorb them into he workforce, not at a time when more then 100,000 with recent job experience are collecting unemployment and actively seeking work. To say we can do so gives new meaning to the erm 'welfare fraud.
The bill that Birmingham drafted for the Senate Ways and Means Committee and has passed the Senate offers tax credit to businesses that hire welfare recipients and other incentives for employers to provide new jobs for them. It also enhances welfare fraud detection and limits many welfare recipients to a maximum of two years of benefits.
