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About 50 community residents, the principal, teachers, students and well-wishers joined together on Sept. 21 for the Warren-Prescott Community Playground build day. In nine hours the group erected tons of playground equipment on the site of the Warren-Prescott School playground on Pearl Street.
"It was a marvelous thing to see happen," said Pat Simpson, the School Site Council chairperson who organized the event. "It wasn't just seeing the structure but the work of so many wonderful people working together. Besides that, it was a lot of fun."
The equipment was provided by Playground Environments Inc., one of the most respected provi-
ders in the industry with contracting done by Your Space Landscaping Inc.

Pitching in was Mayor Thomas M. Menino who helped raise the playground roof.
"Playground demonstrates what can happen when the community and the city work together. This project was a true partnership," said Menino.
"Everyone is here to help - the school people, city workers, the parents, community people and even former students of the Warren-Prescott. That's a real community effort and something of which we can all be proud.
"This whole effort has been a catalyst for ongoing development at the War-ren-Prescott, both inside and out," said Warren-

Prescott School Principal Dr. Domenic Amara. "We see it as expanding the learning environment for students."
Simpson said that the planning group has now tumed its eyes to further improvement of the grounds around the War-ren-Prescott School not only for aesthetics but for learning programs as well. Both Simpson and Amara emphasized that the playground was a faciity for both the community and school. They said that with such shared use and shared ownership there would be greater incentives to keep the site clean and safe for everyone.
The tentative date for the official opening of the playground is set for Saturday, Nov. 2 at 12:30 p.m.

IF THE PRICE ISN'T RIGHT
A Realtor has shown you a house that you like a lot. There's only one problem. You think the price is too high. If you run into this situation, you should consider making an offer at less than the asking price.

The Realtor cannot tell you how much to offer, but he or she can give you information about sales prices for similar homes in the area. After you make an offer, the agent will present it to the sellers. They will have three choices: They can reject it outright, they can counter it at more than youve offered but less than they are asking, or they might accept it. If the house is newly listed or if your offer is very low, they may decide to hold out for something better. Often, however, sellers build at least a little bargaining room into the asking price. Prices that are not negotiable at the beginning of a listing period may become increasingly flexible as time goes on. The only way to test the sellers' flexibility is to put an offer in writing and see what happens.

Hundreds Pack K. Of C. Hall For Voke Charity Night

John "Sugar" Whelan acted as master of ceremonies, noting that Voke's six charity nights will have turned $\$ 20,000$ back to local organizations. He stated that Voke was a man "who took a shot a few months back and bounced back stronger." He praised the Representative, noting that "whatever he decides to do, he will be successful."

Whelan went on to say that he would like to see Voke in public service or elective office as he is "a dedicated, compassionate person."

It was then Voke's opportunity to thank some of his friends after recognizing his family and members of his staff. He called Catherine and Marty O'Brien to
center stage as this evening marked their 48th wedding anniversary. He presented Catherine with flowers and gave a citation to Marty. An anniversary cake was brought out decorated with the names of the couple's 10 children and the Bunker Hill Monument.

Voke called his former Chief of Staff Jay Ash to the microphone. He related a story or two of Ash as he began his career with the Representative in 1984 and praised him for his loyalty and public service. Voke presented him with a framed copy of an editorial from the "Chelsea Record," commending Ash as the best choice for the position of Community Development Director for the city of Chelsea, to which he was recently named.

Ash praised Voke as his "mentor and teacher," adding his thanks for Voke's good work and dedicated service.

A large delegation of state Representatives from throughout the Commonwealth along with various elected officials were on hand to greet Voke. Among the officials were state Auditor Joe DeNucci, Suffolk County District Attorney Ralph Martin, Boston City Councillor Diane Modica and Governor's Councillor Dorothy Kelly-Gay.

Voke called his fellow Representatives by name to join him at the front of the hall, and called on Congressman Joseph Ken-

## Constitution's First Sail Since 1881



## Crew And Guests Join In Hoisting The First Sail For 'Old Ironsides'

A small piece of history unfolded on Sept. 20 in the Charlestown Navy Yard as the first sail to fly from the USS Constitution in over 50 years was hoisted 80 feet up her rigging. The ship has not sailed in 115 years.

This mizzen topsail is the first of six sails that will be purchased through funds collected in the "Old Ironsides" Pennies Campaign. This fund-raising effort will allow the Constitution to sail out into Boston Harbor under her own sail power on July 21, 1997 as part of the twoyear celebration of her 200 th anniversary.

This first sail had been made by Nathaniel Wilson Sailmakers in East Boothbay, Maine and the compa-
ny's president, Nat Wilson, was on hand at the Navy Yard to watch the crew hoist the 500 -pound sail aloft.

Constitution came out of drydock early this past spring having undergone $\$ 12$ million in restoration and refurbishing. She was guided out into the harbor by tugboats. Volunteers took this opportunity to announce the Pennies Campaign that would see the dream of her commanding officer, Cmdr. Michael Beck, USN, to bring the ship to life on the occasion of her bicentennial by sailing her out into the harbor as a living part of American history.

Beck believes strongly in the principles laid out in the document, the United

States Constitution. He has expressed the idea that sailing Old Ironsides will send a message to the country's children on the importance of these principles along with the idea that difficult things can still be accomplished.
The cost of making the six sails and rigging, etc. is said to be $\$ 500,000$, which can be translated into 50 million pennies.
Cmdr. Robert L. Gillen, USN (Ret.) of Charlestown is chairing the Pennies Campaign committee. Gillen has more than a Navy man's interest in the ship as he served as her 59th commanding officer. Gillen has been working with the USS Constitution Museum and is coordinating a drive to obtain support from school children across the country, similar o the drive to save the ship that was conducted sorme 70 years ago.
Gillen is being assisted by Charlestown resident James W. Conway, Past National Historian of The American Legion. The first donation toward the sail fund was from Bunker Hill Post 26 here in Charlestown with the presentation of $\$ 1,000$. The state Legion organization followed with $\$ 1,000$ and the word has gone out nationally by way of two articles in its national publications, and financial support and offers of help are beginning to come in.
As part of a cooperative effort, the Charlestown

Cooperative Bank is acting as the financial agent with no administrative charges. Bank Vice President Jackie Latta, who has been directing the financial end of the Pennies Campaign,
was onboard the ship as the sail was hoisted.

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## Saint Mary's And The Walshes

His name was Maurice. He was tall, sported a moustache, stuffed his pipe with Edgeworth tobacco, and the ale of his choice was Pickwick.

He was my grandfather.
He arrived in this country from Ireland, and, along with his wife Annie, raised seven children. Tom, the eldest, was a news writer for a local radio station before moving to Portland, Maine, to pursue similar endeavors. He passed away several years ago. Next was Peg. For more than sixty years she has been a nun in the order of St. Joseph. Helen, mother of the McGonagle clan, followed, and Kitty moved to Wilmington from Elm Street many years ago to raise her family. Mary, the youngest of the Walsh girls, still resides in the second floor apartment in my parents' house on Elm Street. Johnny, whom we will meet later in this piece, has lived in the same house on Bartlett Street for much of his life, and the late Jim, known to most as "Pa," passed away a little over a year ago. He was a former seminarian who worked until retirement with the federal government.

Maurice's journey to this country from Ireland brought him first to the Decatur Street area and then to the house on Bartlett Street, the house still occupied by John and his wife Mae.

I do not know how Maurice first became associated with Saint Mary's Church, but I do know the year was 1930 He would continue in his capacity as church sexton until he passed his eightieth birthday.

As his duties at the church slowly began to exceed his great strength, Maurice introduced his son, John, to the chores which kept Saint Mary's school, church, convent and rectory functioning properly. With time, Maurice slowly placed more and more responsibility upon the shoulders of his son, and when the proper time came, John assumed command.

When my own contemporaries recall their days at Saint Mary's, it is John and not my grandfather who is most often remembered.
Although John "retired" from his duties at Saint Mary's several years ago, it seems now that the retirement was but a formality, for he can still be found performing his everyday tasks at the church. A quick bit of arithmetic will show that a Walsh has been closely associated with Saint Mary's Church for the past sixty years.

It is true that the name of John Walsh has, over the years, become synonymous with Saint Mary's, but one story, conceming Maurice, lives on in family folklore.

It was no secret that Maurice was fervent toward his religion and passionate toward Saint Mary's. It was not unusual for him to walk quickly down the aisle smack dab in the middle of a Sunday Mass to quiet a talkative youngster and, if that youngster persisted in carrying on the conversation with a friend, it was not unusual

for Maurice to remove the culprit from one pew and have him or her sit in another.

On one particular occasion, a young girl's conversation with a friend caught my grandfather's attention, and he hurried down the aisle to quiet her. Not too many minutes later, Maurice spotted her continuing the conversation in spite of his waming. A second trip up the aisle resulted in her being moved to a distant pew, one, as fate would have it, that was occupied by another friend of the talkative young miss.

Within a very short period of time, the girl began to carry on a conversation with her new churchmate. Seeing this, Maurice became irate and walked quickly in her direction.
"Come on young lady," he spouted sternly through his deep Irish brogue, "it's time for you to leave."

In tears, the girl protested. It was immediately apparent that attendance at Sunday Mass was very important, at least to the girl's family. She certainly did not want to go home with the news that she had been evicted from Mass for poor behavior.
Maurice would have none of it, though, and through her tearful protests, he removed her from the church. As things turned out, the girl's family was friendly with the Walshes, and the following story
soon got back to my grandfather.
The girl returmed home that Sunday morning, her eyes puffed from tears. It was not difficult for her parents to realize that something had happened to upset their daughter.
"What is the problem, dear? Why are you crying?"

The girl, sensing she was in trouble with her very religious parents, at first said nothing.
"Come on dear, tell us what is wrong," they persisted.
"Jesus with the moustache kicked me out of church," she blurted.

## FINANCIAL MISTAKES

## YOU SHOULD AVOID - PART 2

Sometimes the worst mistakes are not the things we do, but things we don't do. Here are four examples.
Not starting to save early enough. It's never too soon to start saving for your retirement. As soon as you begin to earn a regular paycheck, set aside some percentage, however small, as savings. Even if it's only a small amount, the power of compounding will have longer to work and you'll be surprised how it grows. The later you start, the tougher it becomes.
Not taking advantage of a 401k plan or an IRA. One of your best investment options is your 401 k plan at work, especially if your company matches your contributions. Invest the maximum you can afford to set aside, and enjoy tax-deferred savings for your retirement. If you reach the maximum in your 401 k and can still afford to save more, contribute to an IRA too. Even though the contribution may not be tax-deductible, the earnings will grow sheltered from tax. And if you're not eligible for a 401 k plan, put all you can into an IRA.
Not understanding what "guaranteed" means. If you buy a guaranteed investment, know what kind of guarantee you are buying. For example, bonds may be insured against default. But that doesn't mean their value won't fall below your purchase price during the life of the bonds. If you sell before maturity, you could sell at a loss.
Not preparing or updating a will. All your careful planning can be wiped out if you don't have a will or fail to keep it updated. Estate planning doesn't just minimize estate taxes - it makes sure that your assets are left to the people you choose. This mistake can have a huge dollar impact, yet it's relatively easy and inexpensive to avoid.
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
