Rutherford Avenue Corridor Transportation Study

## Begins Series Of Public Meetings

Some 45 residents and almost as many agency representatives met at the K. of C. Hall on May 5 to begin the process of looking at Rutherford Avenue from City Square up to and including Sullivan Square and the roadways that connect to those squares from within Charlestown as well as Somerville, Cambridge and Everett.

Vineet Gupta of the city of Boston Transportation Department (BTD) led the discussion. He stated that the study will be a partnership between the Charlestown community, the city of Boston and the Mass. Highway Department (MHD). He added abutting cities and concerned state agencies will also be involved.

Gupta stated that open public meetings will be held at key project milestones, with more to be scheduled if they are felt to be needed. He added that every effort will be made, through mailings and newspaper advertisements, to involve the residents, businesses and institutions of the impacted communities.

According to Gupta, a working group will be established with participation by the community, city and state. Asked for a recommendation for a chairman, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) named member

Ken Stone to chair this working group. Stone co-chaired the North Area Task Force which worked on behalf of the community with the CANA project.
Gupta went on to say that now the study has been funded, an RFP has been issued for a consultant to work on this project, which is anticipated to last about 15 months. He said he hoped the consultant would be selected to be or board as of July. He added that there would be a community resident on the selection panel.
MHD's Mike Lewis told the group that the success of the study will be determined by the community's involvement in the public processto look at a roadway, Rutherford Avenue, "designed for a bygone era."

Asked if there is anything that can't be considered in the study, Lewis said there wasn't and it should include all forms of transportation from pedestrian, to bike, to cars, to trucks, etc. He added that the goal of the study should be a reconstruction project and so cost factors would be considered in developing plans.
Lewis said that at its completion, the study would be reviewed and a contruction plan devised. He said he would bring the steps for the over three-year process working toward reconstruction
to the next meeting. Gupta added that it is crucial to have a conceptional design for Rutherford Avenue in order to secure construction funding.

Resident Tom King spoke of the Charles River Crossing project where there will be 14 lanes of traffic crossing he river. He added that he hoped commuters would "stay on the main line." He stated that the objective of the study should be to look at the needs and the raffic, determining what could be torm down, built or changed to make Charlestown "more livable" and not have Rutherford Avenue as a superhighway.

Residents brought up a "wish list" of ideas ranging from short-term solutions of changing the timing of the traffic light at the end of the Gilmore Bridge to ease traffic back-ups and posting 20 MPH speed limits on Charlestown streets to more creative suggestions such as allocating $\$ 300,000$ to the CNC to hire Charlestown's own traffic consultant.
Lewis said that this is the opportunity to improve Rutherford Avenue, and "the state has no preconceived ideas." He encouraged residents to come meet "with open minds and work with and not against one another."

## CHAMP Holds Candlelight Vigil

"if their song is to continue, we must do the singing' seaces

Relatives, friends and neighbors gathered at St. Catherine of Siena Church in Hayes Square on a recent Sunday afternoon to remember those who have lost their lives to violence.

They were greeted by Colleen Hoell and Erin McCallum with a program listing those in this community who have died violently during the past 29 years, along with a green cama tion and a white candle Outside the church, the haunting music of the bagpipe of Pat McClellan filled the air.

This is the annual Can dlelight Vigil, sponsored by the CHarlestown After Murder Program (CHAMP), and is an opportunity for people to come together, share their grief and gather strength from those present.

Jo Stone opened the service, welcoming the gathering, and reading the poem, "I Am Free!" Sandy King and Terry Titcomb extended greetings on behalf of CHAMP, and Joyful Noise from North Quincy filled the church with inspirational music.

Father Daniel Mahoney, pastor of St. Francis de Sales, offered a prayer asking God to "give us grace to live in harmony with one another." Readings were delivered by Debra Maher and Pam Enos with a responsorial psalm by Helen Kerns.
Doris McGoff spoke of her and Trudy Brennan's long relationship with the family of Sandy King. She said that the pain from the loss of a dear friend changed the priorities in her life. She talked of the King children growing up and how Sandy reaches out to others despite her pain at the loss of her two sons Chris and Jay.

McGoff went on to say that "we don't know what the future will bring," adding, "as parents we thank you for being here and
praying for peace. Meaghan McGoff and Kaityn Nadeau then read an essay written by Danny McGoff, a fifth-grade student at St. Clement's School, called, "If I Were Elected President."

The essay began, "If I were elected president, I would try to prevent violence because it is one of the biggest problems in America today. Violence causes sadness, anger, fear and more violence." It then went on to tell of the deaths went on to tell of the deaths
of King's sons. of King's sons.
It continued, "Violence changed her [King's] life. She gets really sad and angry when she hears about angry when she hears about violence. She started a
group called Charlestown After Murder Program to help her deal with her sad and angry feelings.
"There is also a lot of violence in my town. At least three or four people are murdered each year and many times the police don't catch the murderer. Be cause I watch the news and read the newspaper, I know this violence exists all over the United States and a lot of people are afraid.
"I would follow Sandy's example to solve the problem. I would get groups of concerned people together to talk about violence. We would share our ideas, and then try to come up with a plan to prevent violence. First I would push to have handguns and automatic weapons banned. I would make violent criminals spend a longer time in jail.
"While they were in jail, they would have to take classes about how to prevent violence. I would make them work in jail and then make them give that money to the victim or their families. I would focus on kids because violent kids can grow up to be violent adults. Education is very important to violence prevention. Violence prevention programs would teach kids to prevent and deal with violence."

The essay then went on to talk about violence pre-
vention programs, noting. "Maybe if everyone could see how people suffer from violence they would try harder to prevent it." It concluded, "As president, I would make everyone in the United States think and care about violence. If the American people work together, we can solve this terrible problem."

Boston Police Capt. Ron Conway of Area A and Officer Jim McNamara introduced the three essay contest winners - John Murphy, Chad Titcomb and Kristen Gomperts - and after they read their entries, presented them with awards. Conway noted that the selection was made by a group from South Boston as there had been so many outstanding entries.

Michael McDonald and representatives of the South Boston Vigil group thanked CHAMP for its support, noting there are 150 names on their list - names of those who died too young.

Father Jim DiPerri, pastor of St. Catherine's, stated, "Jesus died for peace." He asked all to join him in praying the "Our Father."

The audience was then invited to come forward to light their candles and pause at the altar to say the name of the loved one being remembered. As each name was read, Matthew King tolled the brass school bell. All went outside to the front of the church as bouquets of balloons were released into the late afternoon sky, each carrying the name of a victim of violence.

At the conclusion of the service, the gathering was invited to the church hall where first and second grade students at Charlestown Catholic had made angels for each person at the ceremony to take home. Among those present were Boston City Councillors Diane Modica and Peggy Davis-Mullen; and Charlestown Neighborhood Council and CHarlestown Against Drugs Chairman Against Drug
Peter Looney.

## Modica Gets Go Ahead Signal For Cambridge Street Traffic Light

## May Brings More Development Issues For CNC

(continued from page one) town's 400th birthday precedes Boston's by two years.
"We'll let you know how it went," Stone and Conway joked.
Charlie Euchner of Boston 400 explained that a series of Town meetings will be held in the city's neighborhoods with Boston Redevelopment Authority planners throughout 1997 to discuss the public spaces and urban amenities that make Boston a livable city. Council members agreed to set up Charlestown-specific Town Meetings in possibly June or September.
Charlestown residents were also invited to attend a slide show and discussion led by Alex Krieger of the Harvard University Graduate School of Design and Chan Krieger \& Associates on "Public Spaces and the Livable City." Krieger will appear May 21 at the Dorothy Quincy Suite of the Old John Hancock Building, 180 Berkeley St., Boston at 6:30 p.m.
Charlestown Inter-Agency and Charlestown Healthy Aging representative Zelma Lacey sought support from the council to respond to the need to create assisted-living housing units for the elderly, which has "been on the back burner too long." According to latest census figures, more than 4,000 men and women over 65 years old live in Charlestown, many of whom are living alone without care supports. Lacey, whose work with Charlestown's elderly serving groups and organizations realized recent senior housing on Ferrin Street and in the Navy Yard, said that 115 frail and ill elderly Charlestown residents had been interviewed.
"They strongly stated their need for affordable assisted living." Lacey said.
Citing assisted-living programs for elderly in South Boston, Brookline and Chelsea, Lacey said, "Why can't we do it here for our elderly who have lived in Charlestown all their lives?"'
"It is time for the council to step forward for guidance," said Council Chairman Peter Looney. "We can push the issue and determine the need with experts."
Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha said that community planning meetings could be scheduled for those interested in assisted-living housing to outline the need. A public meeting facilitated by the council's Development Committee is expected to be scheduled in the near future.

Precinct 7 residents who abut 32 Spice St. and Clinton Place can expect to discuss development plans for two public parking projects at these sites at a June meeting with Atty. Edward Gottlieb, who represents his brother, the properties' owner

Gottlieb said that he would like to begin dialogue with the neighbors. According to the attomey, Clinton Place could be developed for parking as a matter or right, and Spice Street would require a zoning variance.
"We can't do either without your assistance or at least your acquiescence," Gottlieb said.

Looney explained that abutters were already frustrated with plans for Clinton Place. "There's a history around the work at Clinton Place regarding a lack of public process," he told Gottlieb. "The BRA changed the zoning at Spice Street to force you to come to the community at this time."
Looney said that plans for Clinton Place and 32 Spice St. will be major issues for area residents who are already upset with the process. "They've been angry with an unknown enemy who's before us tonight", he said.

Cunha will facilitate a public meeting as the council's Precinct 7 elected representative. "What I want to ask you right away is: what good is this for the neighborhood?", Cunha asked Gottlieb. "Parking lots do not breed a neighborhood atmosphere."

Representatives for the proposed Admiralty rental development on the Navy Yard's Parcel 4 presented the council with revised plans. The property, which is located at the Yard's End area between First Avenue and 16th Street, is owned by Constitution Quarters and the Shipyard Quarters Marina and was originally proposed to support a large hotel

Marty Oliner, president of Constitution Quarters, said that the proposal has since been scaled down to a 230 -unit reasonably priced apartment development with parking. It was the issue of parking that raised the most concern for council members, who told Oliner that Charlestown requires two parking spaces for each new housing unit built. In early designs, Oliner said that 168 parking spaces were projected, "which we know to be inadequate." Since then an additional eight have been identified, and the parent Constitution Quarters rents approximately 40 of its spaces in the Navy Yard to the Mass. Water Resources Authority.

Council members, however, implied
that the developer could expect to be held to Charlestown's parking requirements. Issues were also raised around the building's height, which Oliner compared to Flagship Wharf located between Pier 3 and Constitution Quarters on Eighth Street. Referred to the Development Committee for public discussions, Cunha also mentioned shadow studies and traffic flow, which he said would impact the entire community beyond the wall of the Navy Yard. The meeting on this proposal has been set for 7 p.m. on Thursday, May 29 at the American Legion Hall, 23 Adams St.

While council member Billy Galvin noted Constitution Quarters and Shipyard Quarters Marina as good neighbors who have donated money and volunteers to several Charlestown community activities, events and organizations, he said that the building seemed too big and "not particularly attractive."

Oliner also commented that the company will most likely act on its right to extend the marina sometime in the near future. Resident Ivey St. John asked the council to consider asking the developer to supply a master plan for all of its Navy Yard properties at the community meeting to discuss Parcel 4.
"We want the site cleared by September or October," Oliner said. "We think this is realistic, and we're acting on the assumption that we can work out the details with the community. The financing is in place, and we're ready to go ahead with the project."

Public Safety Committee: Co-chair man Bill McCabe reported that the committee's April 8 meeting was completely unattended by residents. Monthly statistics for the community showed a relatively high rate of motor vehicle violations, he said.

Basic Services Committee: Chairman Billy Galvin reported on an April 29 meeting to discuss the application of C \& D Bunker Hill Realty Trust to expand the number of seats at the proposed Kippo's Restaurant at 106-108 Bunker Hill St. Galvin said that approximately 22 residents attended, with most speaking in favor, and the committee recommended endorsing the application. The council approved the committee's recommendation.

Development Committee: Chairman Tom Cunha reported that following March 27 and May 1 presentations of the Boys \& Girls Club plans to redevelop its High

Street facility, the committee voted 8-1 to support the proposed project and continue to facilitate the design-review process.
"I can think of no developments as important to the community as this one," Cunha said. "We have made a statement that youth and their future is our most important priority, and that this is an opportunity to be on the cutting edge to give our youth the best."

The council approved the committee's recommendation, with one member opposed and the Boys \& Girls Club CNC representative, John lacoi, abstaining.

CANA Committee: Chairman Ken Stone reported that residents were upset about a lack of public process at an April 15 meeting to discuss the proposed I-93 Cambridge Street on-ramp. Stone noted that another meeting had been scheduled that same night to discuss highway deck replacements in Sullivan Square, a meeting that he and other residents had no knowledge of. Also, Stone was appointed as the CNC liaison to attend upcoming meetings on the Urban Ring, a proposed transit system serving Cambridge Street, Rutherford Avenue and the new North Point development across the Gilmore Bridge.

In other business, council members supported the Downtown North Association, which wrote asking for a letter from the council opposing the addition of a new restaurant and bar, Hooters, on Portland Street near North Station. The council also agreed to write a support letter for putting liquor licensing in the control of the city.

Other Business: Massport's Charles town Community Liaison Dorothy Steele announced that information conceming the Tobin Bridge public hearing on the proposed increase in tolls is available at the Charlestown Branch Library or by calling 973 4505 to have a copy sent to your home. The public hearing is set for 7 p.m. on Tuesday, May 27 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St. Steele said that resident stickers for reduced 30 -cent Tobin Bridge toll costs are available to Charlestown residents for \$5. A Logan Airport Tenant Job Fair is scheduled for early June to provide access to employment opportunities available to airport-serv ing companies.

The next full meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will be Tuesday, June 3 at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School St., at 7 p.m.

## SOME MEDICAID PLANNING

 IS NOW ILLEGALBeginning in 1997, an asset transfer may result in criminal penalties if the purpose of the transfer is to qualify for Medicaid payment of nursing home costs.

Only those individuals with minimal disposable income and minimal "nonexempt" assets qualify for Medicaid. Therefore, a common strategy for preserving the family estate while having Medicaid foot a nursing home bill has been for ill and/or elderly family members to give nonexempt assets to other family members, while retaining "exempt" assets. Exempt assets typically include a principal residence, about $\$ 70,000$ of a spouse's assets and, within limits, an automobile and personal effects.

Federal law had already contained provisions which disqualified from eligibility individuals who gifted assets within 36 months of applying for Medicaid ( 60 months for transfers of certain trusts). The disqualification could even be longer, as illustrated by the following example: Harry gives $\$ 500,000$ to his children. Thirty months later, he applies to Medicaid for payment of his nursing home costs, which in his state are reimbursed at $\$ 4,000$ per month. Harry's eligibility period will be 125 months from the time he made the gift $\$ 500,000 / \$ 4,000$ ). If Harry had waited an additional six months to apply for Medicaid, he could have been eligible immediately.
Under the new law, it is a criminal offense to knowingly and willingly transfer assets to qualify for Medicaid if application is made for benefits during a period of disqualification, as described above. The penalty ranges up to a $\$ 25,000$ fine and/or five years in prison. But asset transfers made before the 36-(60-) month "look-back" period, regardless of the motive, still won't subject an applicant to criminal sanctions or disqualify an applicant from eligibility.

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## Massport Continues Tobin Bridge <br> Residential Permit Program

The Tobin Bridge Residential Permit Program (formerly the Residential Sticker Program) continues to be available to the residents of Charlestown and Chelsea.

The cost of the permit is $\$ 5$ and it allows the residents to pay only 30 cents for passage over the Tobin Bridge into Boston. The sticker will be valid for discount tolls for as long as the vehicle is registered in Charlestown or Chelsea.
"Massport is not going to raise tolls for our neighbors in Charlestown and Chelsea. We are keeping the existing Residential Permit Program intact," said Massport Executive Director and CEO Peter Blute. "That translates to a
$70 \%$ discount for permit holders who have passenger cars registered in those communities."

Any Charlestown or Chelsea resident with a private passenger vehicle who does not have a permit yet can come to either the Bridge Administrative Office in Charlestown, located at the end of Chelsea Street (bear right at the fenced-in yard - the bridge entrance will be on your left) between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.; or the Bridge Maintenance Garage at 62 Broadway in Chelsea, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday to purchase a permit.
In order to qualify, you must bring the following with you:

- your vehicle;
- your vehicle registration listing a Charlestown or Chelsea address;
- your driver's license; - an additional proof of residence, such as a recent utility bill, credit card bill or bank statement; and - your lease agreement if your car is leased.
A Massport employee will affix the permit to the windshield of the vehicle at the time of purchase. Each vehicle owner will be responsible for removing the old sticker as required by Massport and the Registry of Motor Vehicles.
