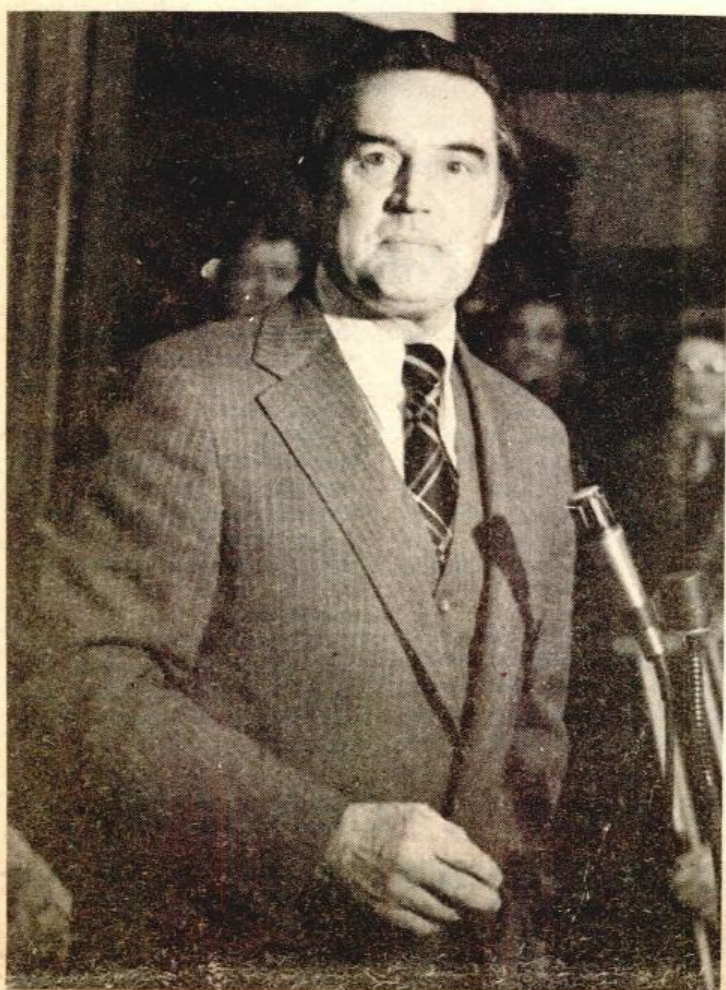


Governor King Presides At Opening



Governor Edward J. King (shown at left) presided over dedication ceremonies for the new Community Services Mall in Charlestown last Thursday.

The Governor said, "The Charlestown Community Service Mall is an outstanding example of how private industry and local citizen groups can work together to revitalize urban areas without the use of public funds. I hope that other communities will undertake similar projects. My administration will encourage and support those efforts."

The mall, which houses both commercial enterprises and public service agencies, gives new life to a local landmark. The five-story, 103-year-old Victorian Gothic structure is located at One Thompson Square. The building was once the headquarters of the Charlestown Savings Bank.

The project is a joint effort between the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation and the Charlestown Savings Bank. The development corporation, a subsidiary of the Kennedy Family Service Center, administered the renovation work and rental of the property. The bank sold the building to the corporation and financed the renovation.

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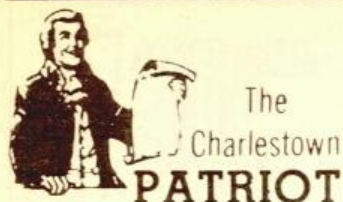

Charlestown Youth Renovate City Square Police Station

In the basement of Boston Police Station 15, in City Square, Charlestown, there's a community meeting room that wouldn't be there if it weren't for a group of Charlestown youth enrolled in Project YES, the

city's youth employment program.

The enrollees took a musty, unused room in the basement and made it functional again by removing old, surplus lockers and cleaning and painting the room. The room is now used for teen counselling, meetings between police and community agencies, and other gatherings of local groups. "You wouldn't believe how the room looked before," said Brian Fenn, the youths' supervisor, praising the enrollees' work.

"Project YES is providing valuable work experience to many Boston youths who in turn are doing useful projects for the community," Mayor Kevin H. White said. Part of the Mayor's Boston Plan, Project YES provides part-time jobs to eligible Charlestown youth, 16 to 19, who are in school or willing to return.

Currently, five Project YES enrollees are working at Station 15. Kevin Millerick, Jim Lyons, and Cecil Jones do maintenance and renovation work there, while

Karen Fidler and Virginia Pierce work at the station answering phones, typing and doing other clerical tasks.

"Having this room has helped the police interact more with the community," Police Sgt. Dan Flynn, of Station 15, said. Thanks to the Project YES enrollees' efforts, community groups have a new place to meet in Charlestown.

Any neighborhood group can apply to use the new community room. Just contact Police Captain William P. MacDonald of Station 15.

We would like to thank Bob Gillen, Commander of the U.S.S. Constitution, for taking time out from his busy schedule to visit the Teen Center. On February 13th, he spoke to a full house of local teenagers about his duties as Commander and provided the youth with a film strip. The Commander's visit was part of our Youth Enrichment Program which attempts to allow teenagers to become more familiar with public figures who have an effect on their community. It also attempts to show Charlestown youth the variety of job opportunities available to them.

This past Saturday, February 24th, a group from the Teen Center accepted Sheriff Dennis

Kearney's invitation to visit the Charles Street Jail. They were taken on a tour of the 130 year old facility by two of the guards. 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Charlestown Residents Receive On-The-Job Training

When Copley Pharmaceutical of South Boston needed skilled workers who weren't available in the Boston area, the company turned to the City of Boston's on-the-job training program to hire and train unemployed Boston residents in manufacturing

pharmaceuticals. Bob Celata, of Bunker Hill Street, Charlestown, was the first of five employees at Copley Pharmaceutical to receive on-the-job training through the City's employment program. Mr. Celata was trained to operate

machinery that produces and packages tablets. He is now a supervisor. Charlestown resident Herb Stone, of O'Reilly Way, also completed on-the-job training at Copley Pharmaceutical.

"There are jobs in Boston," said Mayor Kevin H. White, "but, too often, those most in need of employment don't have the skills for the job--that's why on-the-job training is so important, and why Boston's on-the-job training program is helping employers provide that training."

The City's Employment and Economic Policy Administration (EEPA) administers the on-the-job training program which is funded through the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). EEPA reimburses the employer 50 percent of each trainee's wages during the six months or more of training. "The trainees start at a higher wage than we could pay them," said Donna Haggett, a vice president of Copley Pharmaceutical, because the cost is split with the City.

Now with 20 employees, Copley Pharmaceutical has expanded its product line and its research lab since it began manufacturing in 1974. And, Mr. Celata and Mr. Stone have learned skilled jobs in a growing company.

- D. Your oil dealer will only deliver on a cash-on-delivery basis

You need:

- Proof of income
- Shut-off notice from fuel company
- Letter from oil company stating you are on a C.O.D. basis
- If you receive public assistance: Letter from Dept. of Welfare stating you are not eligible for emergency assistance

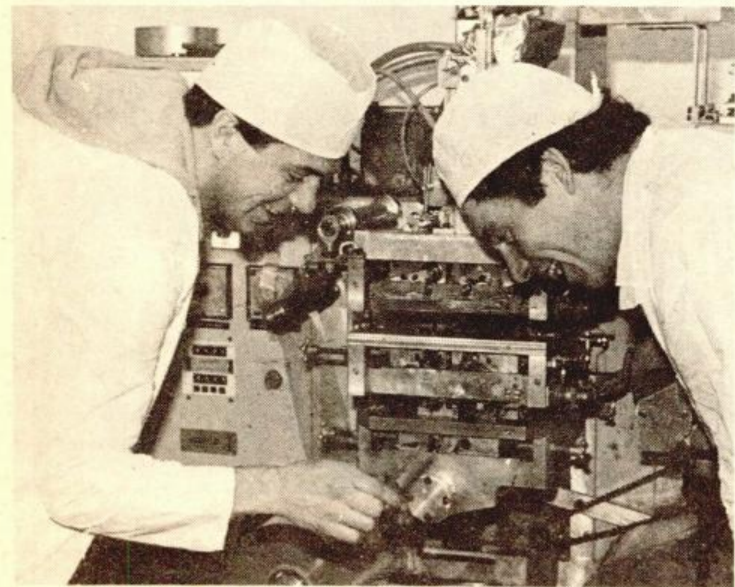
How To Survive With Your Teenagers

We, in Charlestown, always seem to be trying to survive something whether it's the snow, flooding, urban renewal or the inability of the Red Sox, Patriots and Celtics to make it to or through the playoffs. We've become strong survivors.

One arena where survival is most critical and most difficult is with our teenagers. The transition from childhood to adult life has never been easy for teenagers or parents. Communication is often very difficult and seems at times to be impossible. In all families there are times when communications are counterproductive or absent.

During confrontation, parents and teenagers manipulate each other into stances in which neither can feel good about the outcome. This difficulty to survive the adolescent years is so common that it has been the subject of much recent study. Experts in many fields now agree that there are many things that can be done to encourage healthier and more supportive interaction between parents and teenagers. This will be the topic of a program at the Charlestown Community Center, "How to Survive With Your Teenagers", beginning Thursday March 15 from 9:30 to 11:00 A.M. and running for six weeks.

This program will enable parents of teenagers and parent who want to know what it will be like when their children are teenagers to explore the stages of adolescent development, the ways for parents to have more energy and time for their teenagers, parents' expectations of themselves and their teens and new and exciting ways to improve upon communication. 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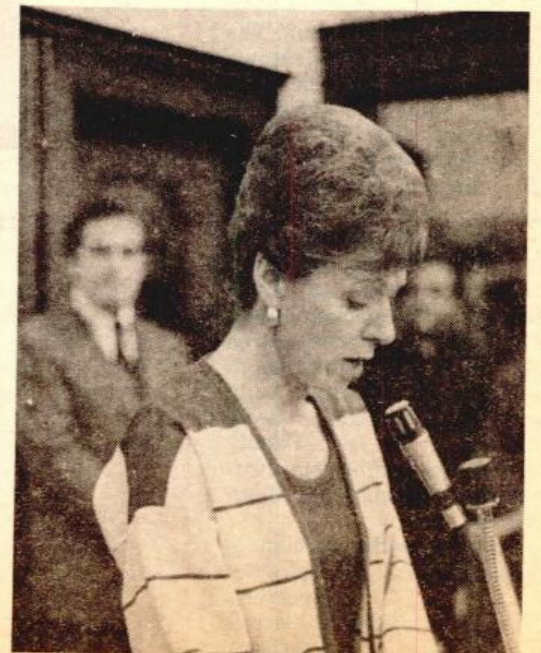
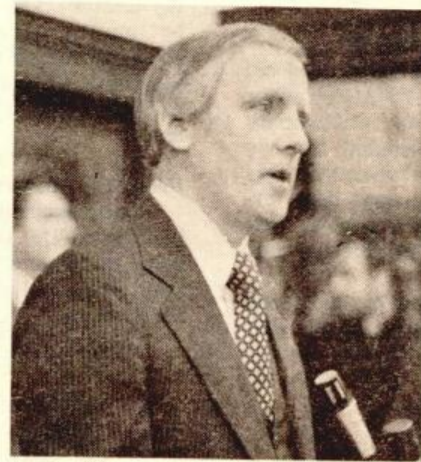

Boys' Club News

Gone virtually unnoticed by our hockey happy little community was the outstanding success of Charlestown's "A" Division Pop Warner Football Team of last fall.

For sure, the first of March is probably a bit late to be reporting on the outcome of a fall football season, but only recently has the team begun to be feted in the manner due a champion.

Dubbed "The Little Professionals" by those who followed their progress, the story of Charlestown's Pop Warner "A" Team was a three year Odyssey, each step of which was carefully planned by John Murphy, the squad's young head coach.

In his first year of involvement with the Pop Warner Program, John was a twenty year old young man who had played his football at Charlestown High School, with the Town Team, and with the Plymouth Rocks, a semi-professional team coached by his close friend, Rick Cash, formerly of the L.A. Rams and Patriots.

At each new level of competition, John listened, and learned his lessons well. When he felt he had accumulated enough knowledge of the game to benefit a youth program, he approached the adult leaders of the local Pop Warner Program, asking if he might coach at the lowest level. His plan, as he outlined it, was to take a group of youngsters at the "C" level, bring them up through "B", and eventually to the "A" Division Championship. He did not promise instant success, but he did promise he would eventually make winners out of the group, if not champions.

The focal point of each season, it was decided, would be the Malden Game. Why Malden? Well, Malden has long been the local hotbed of Pop Warner Football. Annually more than five hundred youngsters vie for the one hundred or so positions on the three divisional squads. The program operates on a budget

that runs into the thousands of dollars.

John and his assistants Mike Stillman and Charlie Doe felt the Malden Program would provide the perfect yardstick against which they could measure their own Program's growth.

The first season as "C" performers was very difficult for the coaching staff. The youngsters, not used to the disciplined routines of Coach Murphy, found it hard to adjust. Many didn't, and left the squad. The Malden Game that year was disastrous and embarrassing, but as the year progressed so did the team. Even in defeat, the kids that 'stuck it out' began to feel something special was on the horizon for them.

In their second season as "B" performers, things began to click. The moves taught by Coach Murphy were becoming more instinctive, the blocks more accurate, the tackles more effective. Anticipation filled the air as the Malden Game approached. The kids had tasted victory and were hungry for more.

Coach Murphy had promised his boys victory if they played to their potential, but his nervousness outweighed his optimism. The day before the Big Game he found himself lying awake at five thirty in the morning, unable to sleep. He called Charlie Doe, one of his assistants, and asked if he could drop by. Charlie, who doesn't make it a habit of entertaining at such an early hour, was not sleeping either.

The two men were not as concerned about losing the game as they were about losing the trust of the players. They had made a promise to the kids. They just had to keep it.

Malden won the game by two touchdowns, one of which was scored late in the game after Charlestown had just failed in an

attempt to tie the score. Disappointment lined the faces of the coaching staff as they marched solemnly back toward the dressing room. Coach Murphy noticed the players did not seem to share his disappointment. Initially he was disturbed. "Aren't you guys feeling badly about losing this game?" he asked as the usual post game horseplay and bantering filled the locker room. For a moment everything stopped. The heavy silence was finally broken as one of the players, dirtied from combat, raised his eyes toward Murphy and said through a wide smile, "You were right Coach, They ain't no better than us. Next year we'll kick their butts."

Right then Coach Murphy knew two things. First, the kids were with him one hundred percent, and secondly, they would beat Malden next year.

When the "A" season rolled around last fall, they were ready. Not only did they take it to Malden, but they shut them out, and in the process they won the Divisional "A" Championship.

Hobart Willis and Ernie Roche, proprietors of the New Deal Restaurant near the Market Area, where the coaching staff would often stop after games and practice sessions, were so impressed with the enthusiasm the adults had for the Pop Warner Program that they invited the entire Championship Team, Coaches included, to the New Deal for dinner on the house!

Hobart and Ernie fed 'em all, and the food just kept coming. When the meal was over, Mr. Willis told the coaches that he had just had the pleasure of meeting the best behaved group of kids anywhere. To prove he was not just talking a good ballgame, Hobart Willis promised to pick up the tab for brand new game jerseys for next year's "A" Division Team.

As a way of saying "Thanks" to

Hobart Willis and Ernie Roche, the Pop Warner Championship Trophy is displayed proudly at the New Deal Restaurant. In addition, Mr. Willis has been invited to be a head table guest at Charlestown's Annual Pop Warner Banquet to be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall Friday evening, March 9.

Incidentally, Coach Murphy has decided to undertake another three year journey. Rather than basking in the glory of Division "A" Ball, he has decided to step back into Division "C" with the hope of developing another champion.

Probably the most meaningful tribute of all came after the last game of the season, when Coach Murphy was approached by a parent whose son had been part of the three year growing process.

"John, thanks for giving me and my boy three years of sharing. I'm just sorry to see it end."

Join the Charlestown community in feting the 1978 Pop Warner Division "A" Champions, and their Coaches John Murphy, Mike Stillman, Charlie Doe, Joe Gryzleck, and Tony Peluzo, at the Knights of Columbus Hall next Friday evening. There will be many celebrities in attendance, but the real stars will be the boys themselves. Congratulations!

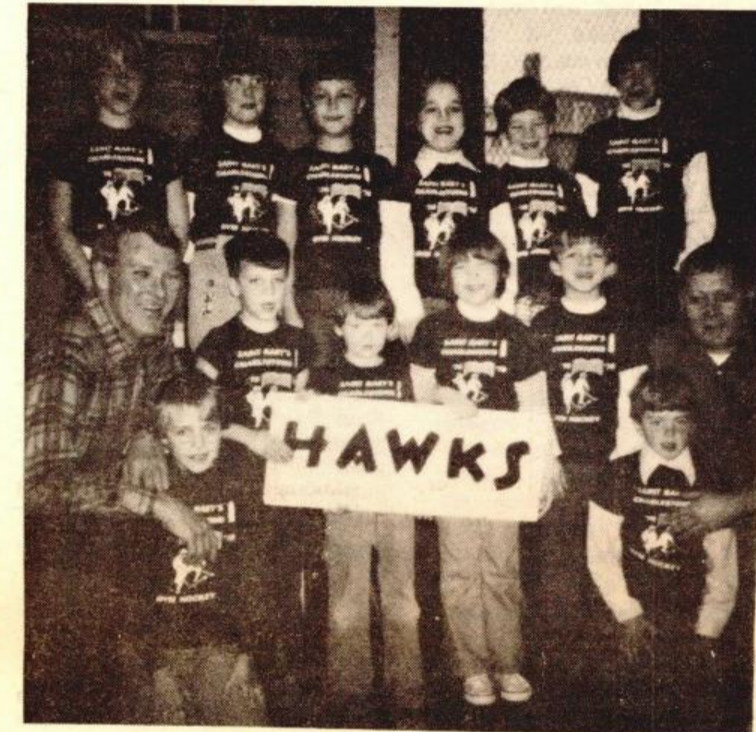
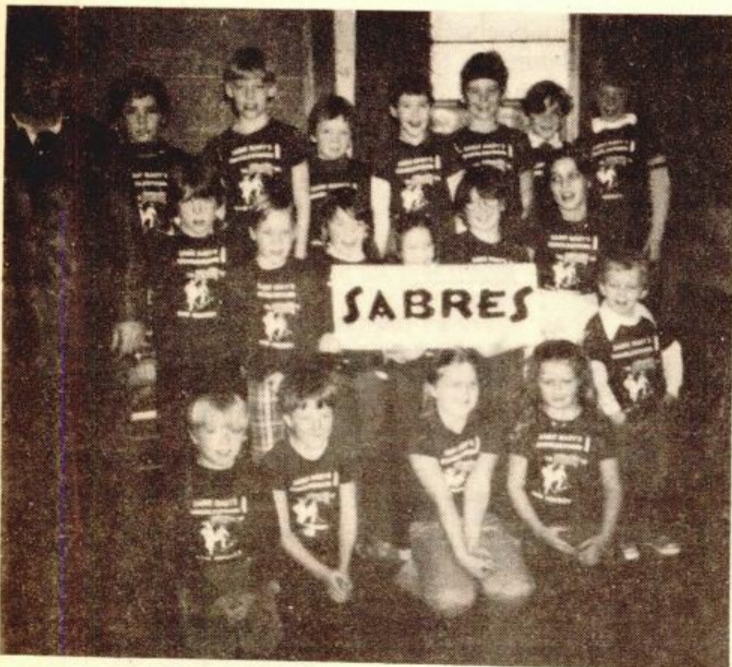

Southie Continues To Say "Never"

Last Sunday, South Boston held its fourth Annual Men's March Against Forced Busing. Starting from Andrew Square, the march led to South Boston High School, a focal point of Southie's resistance to court ordered school desegregation. There, a veiled woman dressed in black, stepped from a black limousine to lay flowers near a tombstone placed at the school.

This year the South Boston Marshalls, sponsors of the march, held their anti-busing rally inside the Patrick F. Gavin school where the ranks swelled to some 500 attendees.

Introducing the speakers was James Kelly, head of the South Boston Information Center. He asked for a moment of silence in memory of two staunch anti-busers who are no longer with us, Boston police patrolman Timmy Linehan and Bob Green, a Boston firefighter.

After congratulating Edward Studley, chief of the South Boston Marshalls for a fine job in organizing the march, Kelly took on Arthur Flemming of the United States Civil Rights Commission.

Referring to the recent report of the U.S.C.R.C. on the desegregation program and Boston in particular, Kelly cited the things that were not mentioned, such as the loss of 35,000 students. "Nor did they discuss", Kelly said, "that of the 145 schools in Boston, the number of those racially imbalanced has gone from 18 in 1974 to 115 today. They did not discuss either, that there were more assaults, more stabbings, more racial incidents and extortions (which are rampant throughout the schools), in one year than during all the years between 1964 and 1974."

Kelly's message was clear. We must continue to resist and say "never". He urged everyone who was not already a member to join the National Association for Neighborhood Schools (NANS). (NANS, 338 E St., So. Boston, Mass. 02127...268-1858.)

At the rally, Boston City Councillor Raymond Flynn related that when he was contacted last month by a California radio talk show host, he was asked by callers how his anti-busing legislation got passed in supposedly 'liberal'

Massachusetts. Flynn said "busing was tried and tested in the city of Boston and proved to be a dismal failure. What's happening is, that people are becoming aware of what government is doing to them and are starting to make their voices clear "Nationwide".

Always one to speak his mind, Albert "Dapper" O'Neil, another Boston City Councillor, said "there's a man in the federal courts, and I've said this publicly on the floor of the City Council. He is lonesome, he's ill and mentally unbalanced. There was a man in the United Nations, Nikita Khrushchev, who said; 'We will bury the country (U.S.), without firing a shot.' "Dapper" asked, "doesn't anybody in authority realize what is happening to the American youth?—that this is part of a communist movement to destroy the minds and bodies of our children—doesn't anybody care anymore?" "Dapper" said, "regardless of what the press does to me, I will keep on...and on...and on."

Sharing the platform were Quincy City Councillor Joseph Brett and Joseph Lee, Commander of the South Boston Allied War Veterans Council. Both have always been strong in their support against busing.

Last, but not least to speak, was Attorney Robert Emmet Dinsmore, who has defended the many protestors in Boston throughout the busing years. He brought the audience up to date on the progress being made to protect their civil rights.

He lauded the quickly formed 'Shamrock Moving Company' that moved 11 homeless South Boston fire victims into vacant Boston Housing apartments. "Not only that", the attorney asserted, "But they also painted, wired and fixed up, from oblivion, apartments that had been abandoned. Charges were brought against three of those people", Dinsmore said, "and they were brought before a jury. The evidence disclosed through one of your people, James Michael Kelly, and other people connected with the housing, that the statement had been made that if those people were black, they would have been moved in immediately. The jury weighed the evidence, and after it was all

in, the jury said: South Boston—not guilty, NOT GUILTY!

Dinsmore added, "in the middle of that trial, when we were representing South Boston, a letter was written to the judge by the people bringing the suit, inviting him to dinner. Why wasn't that ever reported? We've got the transcript." He said that 275 criminal complaints brought against the Boston Housing Authority after the trial, because of intolerable living conditions had a rippling effect on Charlestown and other areas with apartments beginning to be repaired.

A Family March directed against forced busing, housing and hiring is being organized to be held in May.

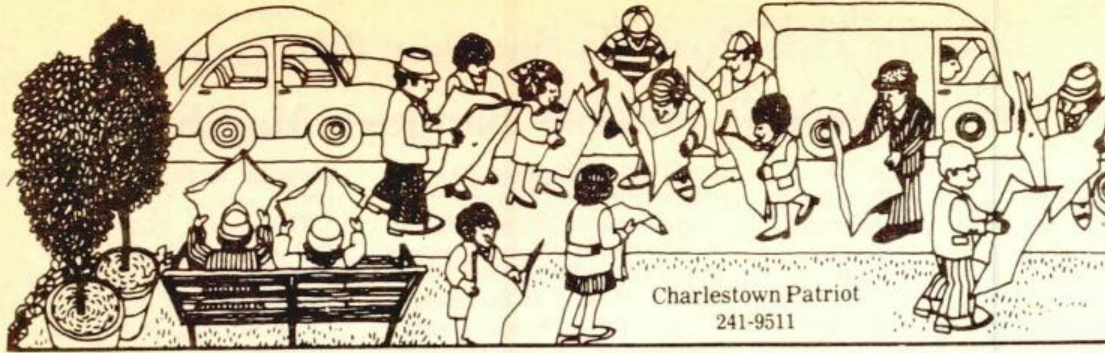

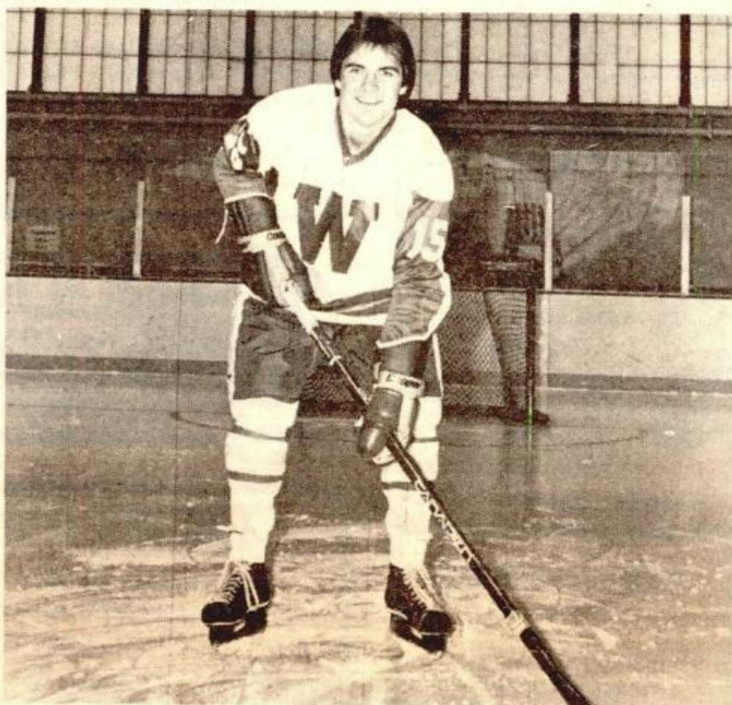

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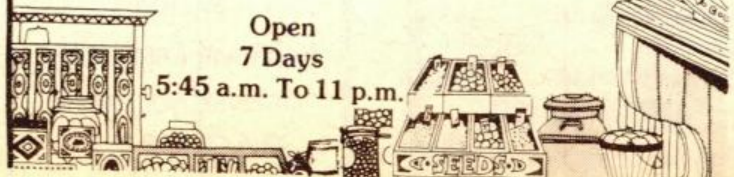
