

How to get here

Bedford is easy to reach by car, bike and public transport.

By car:

Bedford is located between the A1 and M1 and is well served by the A421 dual carriageway which links the two major roads as well as the A6 and A428. On Saturday, take advantage of two hours' free parking in one of the town centre's council-owned car parks. Parking is free on Sundays.

By train:

Bedford train station is served by Thameslink, East Midlands Trains and the Marston Vale Line. St John's station is also served by the Marston Vale Line. Timetables are available at nationalrail.co.uk

By bus:

A Park & Ride service operates from the junction of the A6 and A421 at Elstow, providing regular services to Bedford town centre. Bedford is also centrally located on the X5 Stagecoach route, linking Oxford and Cambridge. Timetables of all buses which serve Bedford Borough are available on the Council website: bedford.gov.uk/businfo

By bike:

Bedford is situated on Route 51. For full details visit: sustrans.org.uk















Take a cruise down the River Great Ouse, explore one of Bedford's museums or historic sites, see a show, join a guided tour or simply relax in the town's beautiful parks and gardens.

All of the town's family-friendly spaces are within a short walk of each other, so why not spend a day or weekend discovering Bedford.

Bedford loves to party and there are many **festivals** and celebrations throughout the year. The Bedford International Kite Festival, Bedfringe, Bedford Regatta, the Big High Street Showcase, Booktastic Children's Book Festival, Taste Bedford, Bromham Apple Day, the Multi-Cultural Parade and the bi-annual River Festival are all essential dates for the diary.



John Bunyan Museum



John Bunyan Museum tells the story of the Bedford man who wrote The Pilgrim's Progress, one of the greatest novels in the English language. During his life Bunyan was a soldier, tinker, preacher, dissenter, and spent 12 years in Bedford prison for illegal preaching.

Bunyan Meeting Church



An active independent church, Bunyan Meeting was built in 1850, and stands on the site of Bunyan's original church where he was minister from 1671 to 1688. Scenes from *The Pilgrim's Progress* can be found on the bronze entrance doors and stunning stained glass windows.

Panacea Museum



The museum tells the story of the Panacea Society a remarkable religious community formed in the early 20th century. The museum is in 'Castleside', a beautiful Victorian house and gardens that were part of the community's headquarters.

Quarry Theatre



The Quarry Theatre is a performing arts facility for Bedford School and the town. In 2015, St. Luke's Church was converted to house a theatre and fully licensed bar. The programme includes professional productions, comedy, music and NTLive screenings.


Bedford Swan Hotel

Ridgmont Station Heritage Centre



Opened in 2013 following extensive restoration work, Ridgmont Station Heritage Centre is a hidden gem on the Marston Vale Community Rail line.
