





Executive summary



Topline Findings

The fear of contracting the virus remains high and has increased in level-3 advanced. The fears coincide with the increased positive cases in the country. Personal agency remains high, and many feel that it is their personal responsibility to take care of their own health, they are committed to social isolation and playing their part to prevent the spread of the virus. Fears of contracting the virus are high amongst those who have underlying conditions. Additionally, social distress levels have stablised with high levels of distress in Mpumalanga, also a province with lower levels of preventative measure adoption.

Citizens mostly claim to wear masks to protect themselves from contracting the virus, then to protect others. Masks are mostly worn in public spaces, when visiting the store and using public transport. Factors that inhibit mask wearing include the feeling of not being able to breath. Many citizens claim that they would continue wearing a mask and washing their hands or sanitising surfaces even when no one is watching, possibly pointing to entrenched behaviours. Only 41% of citizens will however continue using the elbow greeting, and the need for socialisation is high. Social media fulfils this need during the lockdown as most people use it to stay in touch with loved ones.

Most citizens feel that the government is taking appropriate steps to prevent the spread of the virus. 74% of respondents feel that the Government should increase educational efforts to prevent the spread of the virus. Furthermore citizens want to receive regular communication from leaders at least once a week, especially from President Ramaphosa and Min. Mkhize. Although trust levels may be lower for leaders such as Min. Motsheka, citizens still want to receive frequent communication. Trust in the mainstream media has also increased as compared to the start of level 3.





Overall distress is stabilizing at 32 index points. Distress remains the highest in the North West (37), Eastern Cape (35) and Mpumalanga (34). The distress is not directly linked to number of COVID cases per province.








Emotional wellbeing



Anxiety and fear remain high amongst South Africans and only 24% are managing even in advanced level 3.



As citizens become more irritable and depressed, lockdown level 3-advanced has shown some decreases in the mental state of management.

During lock-down level 5, citizens showed high levels of fortitude in the face of the Covid-19 pandemic- the highest levels were in Limpopo and KwaZulu-Natal.

In **level 4**, this declined significantly, especially in for Limpopo, North West, Mpumalanga and KwaZulu-Natal.

Since the country has moved into **level 3**, levels of managing have again increased, with more people in Gauteng, Free State and Western Cape showing resilience.

Since moving to **level 3-advanced**, a similar decrease in managing is seen to level 4. KwaZulu-Natal and the North West are however showing increased fortitude.



Food Security



Although showing an improvement since level 5, food insecurity has remained high, with half of respondents being concerned about the amount of food in their homes. And a further 23% of children going to bed hungry. Many adults are still reducing portion sizes and meal frequencies due to a lack of food in the home.

Distribution of food parcels are declining slightly. Only 12% of respondents who experience food insecurity received a food parcel, leaving many distressed citizens without resources to maintain their basic wellbeing.













Communication frequency from **President Ramaphosa**





President Ramaphosa is regarded as authentic, transparent and a true public servant, working for the people. The older generations are more likely to see the President as transparent.












Trust in Minister Cele is declining, and fewer respondents believe that he is authentic, transparent and works for the people of South Africa than in the previous week.

























































Mask wearing behaviour during COVID-19




Mask-wearing has increased over lockdown. This is especially due to citizens wanting to protect themselves and others from contracting the virus.







The majority of respondents have received an SMS from Government on COVID-19 related messaging.


Have you seen, read or heard of any COVID-19 related communication from Government on social media platforms, instant messaging sites or received an SMS? COVID-19: Advanced Level 3

Satisfaction with Government communication are high.


Upper and middle income groups are significantly less satisfied with the Government's COVID-19 communication than lower income groups.






Because of the lockdown, half of respondents have adjusted their living and working conditions so that they can spend more time with family.



Two in three citizens in advanced level 3 mention that their employers are affected by the lockdown.


