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resource accessible for visitors and more travel efficient for our regional transportation network," stated Voke.
"Extending service to the Navy Yard has certainly been a top priority of ours," said Birmingham. "I am pleased the T has finally concurred with our long-stated arguments as to why such service is so vital for local residents."

Modica stated, "As chairperson of the council's Committee on Commerce and Transportation, I am pleased that the public hearings held in Charlestown gave the residents an opportunity to make their case for expanded bus service to the MBTA." She added, "This service is long overdue and will serve to improve the trans-
portation network for Charlestown residents and workers."

According to a T source, ridership levels will be the key to increasing further service to and from the Navy Yard. Echoing this, Voke said, "The more people ride, the more service we can hope to receive.

Added Birmingham, "We will continue to press for additional service, but ridership will be the real key to future service expansion.'

According to the T's Haley, a limited number of trips along First Avenue within the Navy Yard will be added to the 93 Route beginning sometime in the spring. The T expects to have four trips from Haymarket in the morning rush, six round-
trips during the day, and then five trips heading to Haymarket in the evening.
"We believe that this (schedule) will provide the employers with the service they desire, as well as meet the needs of the elderly who wish to get out during the day. Also, it should not disrupt the commuting patterns of the many residents of Charlestown who rely on Route 93, in its present configuration, to get to work," communicated Ha ley to Charlestown's elected officials.

The exact trips which go into the Navy Yard are expected to be listed on the T's spring schedule card for the 93 bus. Those schedules will be avail able several weeks before the new service starts.

$\star$ Police Community Relations/CNC Public Safety Meeting . . . Area A of the Boston Police Department Community Service Officer Bill Smith and members of the CNC Public Safety committee met with residents on Jan. 10 at Bishop Lawton Hall.

The attendance was about double that of last month with the presence of members of the CHarlestown After Murder Program (CHAMP).

Some of the same problems brought up last month were at the forefront this month.

CNC committee member John Dillon once again related the problems caused by cars parking in the rotary at Sullivan Square impeding the vision of motorists in the rotary. Officer Smith said that this problem should be resolved within a couple of weeks as the rotary will be posted for "no parking" and vehicles in violation will be tagged.

Residents also asked if a stop sign could be installed where the ineffectual yield sign now stands to direct vehicles coming from Everett into the Sulivan Square area. Smith stated that the yield sign was correct for that area of roadway.

The area around the C.R. Edwards School was discussed. Residents noted that the sensor lights in
the rear of the school were better than nothing but many felt better lighting would decrease the activity around the building, particularly in the "pit." Principal Charles McAfee was going to be contacted and this issue discussed with him.

Dillon mentioned that officers taking their calls for three to four hours in one area resulted in a decrease in criminal activity at that site. He suggested that such a procedure might be utilized in the vicinity of the Edwards School.

Complaints of commuters parking in the town and taking the bus led to the advantages of resident parking. While commuter parking is most often thought of in the City and Thompson squares area, Committee member Bill McCabe related stories of commuters circling the blocks off Bunker Hill Street seeking parking. It was noted that CNC meetings, beginning with Precinct One, get underway at the end of this month focusing on resident parking. This may not be the ideal means of solving parking problems for all as the vehicle must be registered in Charlestown.

Complaints continue on speeding, particularly on Main and Bunker Hill streets. Committee member Edna Kelly told of the difficulty pedestrians have in cros-
sing Main Street at Thompson Square, especially with motorists failing to abide by the stop sign at Main and Austin streets.

A suggestion at the meeting by Officer Smith was that residents who have found a breaking and entering at their property should request that an officer visit the scene and not just report the incident on the telephone.

* Recycling In Boston. . The Boston Public Works Department Curbside Recycling Program is ongoing for residents who live in a building of six units or less.

You now can recycle each week on your regular trash day. Materials to be put in the blue box are glass bottles (any color) metal and tin cans, plastic bottles with the number 1 or 2 on the bottom and empty aerosol cans. Rinse out all containers.
The paper recycling program collects newspapers, magazines, phone book and corrugated cardboard. All paper products should be put in a brown paper bag or tied with string and placed outside of the box.

All items should be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on trash day. Place paper materials outside of the box and all other materials inside the box.

Becoming a part of the team to help USS Constiution prepare to celebrate her 200th birthday upon her return to the fleet in 1997, the naval reservist Seabees had to demonstrate their talents first by building camels. Leading the naval reservists repair

efforts at the deck plate of the naval reserves ever level is the Leading Petty Officer of MCU 2610, BU1 Ernest Trombley. "We proved to the USS Constitution and the Na tional Park Service that we could perform by constructing three camels in one and a half days" said Trombley. The camels, used as bumbers between a ship and a dock, are being utilized today.

With 23 years of combined active and reserve service, Trombley is no stranger to Seabee projects. After serving two tours in Vietnam, Trombley returned stateside where he has been a part
since.

Continuing to save the Navy thousands of dollars the MCU 2610 Unit is carrying on the Seabee tradition of providing quality building and construction expertise. Because the ship's hull, frames and longitudinals are all made of wood, preservation and selective replacement of many of her structural members is periodically required, while at the same time, preservation of as much of the original content as possible is the goal.
"This ship is a part of history, now I am a part of history," remarked CNCM

Chris Elias, one of the unit's newest members. He and other unit members have been busy since taking on the project. Painting, preservation and the removal of wooden decking are just a few of the tasks that MCU 2610 are performing.

Whether they are rebuilding the oldest commissioned naval vessel or constructing an airstrip in the middle of the desert, today's Naval Reserve Seabees are building a better Navy for tomorrow.

## Don't Forget To Tell The IRS

When moving, most people inform the Postal Service of their forwarding address. This gets their mail forwarded to them for a limited period of time. "However, taxpayers should send the IRS a forwarding address too," said Francine Crowley, Boston Internal Revenue Service (IRS) district director.

The mail is still the most common way that most people deal with the IRS, therefore, there are numerous reasons why taxpayers would want the IRS to know of their address change.
Each year, the IRS sends out millions of tax refund checks, some of which go undelivered. "One of the reasons for this is taxpayers move after submitting their return and fail to notify us of their new address," said

Taxpayers receive a tax package each year just prior to the tax filing season that contains tax forms and instructions. This package is generally mailed to the taxpayer's last known tax filing address.
Finally, being out of touch and not receiving a notice of additional tax due can be expensive for a taxpayer. Even though you may not receive an additional IRS notice about owed taxes, the penalties and interest on your tax debt continue to grow.
The IRS Form 8822, "Change of Address," is a simple one-page form that can be used by individuals and businesses to alert the IRS to a new address. The form can be ordered by calling toll-free $1-800$ 829-3676.

## Charlestown High School Sports News

On the way to its best season since a $10-10$ campaign in 1991-92, the Charlestown High School boys basketball team has gotten out of the box with a 6-1 record. And a big part of that turnaround is due to coach, Jack O'Brien.

O'Brien, in his second season as coach at Charlestown High, was a perennial winner in his nine seasons as boys head coach at Salem High School. In addition to winning a state title in 1990, O'Brien sent several prospects to bigtime colleges, including Rick Brunson, who is now a senior at Temple University.

So far, the Townies have impressed many, coming away as the winner of the Arlington Catholic Christmas Classic, beating Arlington $60-56$ in the first round and handing Burlington a $62-33$ setback. Townie point guard Shawn Brown, also an allcity quarterback, was named tourney MVP.
"Shawn has played steady all year for us," O'Brien said in an interview last week. "He's our floor general out there. This is his first year play-
ing varsity though, and he's still learning."

O'Brien has many firstyear varsity players. Out of 12 varsity athletes, only two returned from last year, those being Harrison Bush and Charlie Robinson. Both are tri-captains, along with Brown. "Harrison has done a great job," O'Brien said. "Last year he would show up at $6: 30$ a.m. to work on his game. Some of the other kids saw that and they started to follow his lead.
"He's also a great kid. He's an honor roll student. He went to the ABA (Academic and Basketball Awareness) Camp at Merrimack College this summer and won the student/ athlete award. He's been the glue to hold this team together," O'Brien concluded.

Bush currently ranks fourth in the Boston North and fifth in the city in scoring with an 18.0 average (points per game).

Another player who has impressed O'Brien is center Damien Finkley. "He's only six-feet tall," said O'Brien, "but he's held his own out there. And he's only a first-year (varsity) player. He's done a great
job for us."
O'Brien has, in his second season, made progress in his plan to tum the program around. "You always have to try to implement things that make the kids feel important," O'Brien noted. "This year we were able to purchase new jerseys. We also played a night game at home against Arlington which drew a large crowd. We made calendars and distributed them around the communiy and the school.
"We also have mandatory study hall after school and I'm there too. We're trying to make the kids feels important, have them develop some pride."

Entering Tuesday's tilt at South Boston, Charlestown's only loss came at Latin Academy. The Hormets defeated the Townies 75-72. Due to that loss, Charlestown stands in a three-way tie for last place in the Boston North League with an 0-1 mark.

After facing off with South Boston, Charlestown travels to Brighton on Jan. 17, before hosting Madison Park on Jan. 19 at 3:30 p.m.
Local Townies suiting up for the varsity squad are
senior Tom McDonough and sophomore guard Ian Urquhart.

The girls basketball squad at Charlestown High School entered the week with a 2-2 overall 10 Boston North League mark, good enough for a share of first place in the league.

The team was hurt early on when, in a game with Latin Academy, sophomore Nicole Matson went down with a knee injury. The Lady Townies went on to drop their next two games in the Boston Girls Basketball Christmas Festival at English High and at Madison Park.
The Charlestown girls will host Brighton Tuesday before traveling to Madison Park next Thursday.

The CHS hockey team is currently $2-1-0$ after defeating Madison Park 5-0.

## Tax Packages Arriving

The tax season is here again and tax packages are beginning to show up in the mail. Taxpayers who used professional tax preparers last year will receive IRS postcards, giving them the option of requesting a tax package from the IRS or using tax forms supplied by their preparer.

This year the IRS is continuing its efforts in three major areas:

- improving customer service for taxpayers;
encouraging eligible low income workers to claim the earned income tax credit; and
- taking additional steps to combat tax filing fraud.
"While there are not many tax law changes for taxpayers to deal with this year, the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) has been significantly changed," said Francine Crowley, Boston IRS district director. "For 1994, more low income workers will qualify for the credit and the credit is easier to claim. Also, for the first time, childless workers aged 25 to 64 may now qualify for the credit," added Crowley.

Another significant change for this year is the taxability of social security benefits. Beginning in

1994, up to $85 \%$ of social security benefits and equivalent tier 1 railroad retirement benefits may be taxable.

Each year the filing requirements, personal exemptions, standard deduction and earned income credit amounts are adjusted for inflation. This year, all of the amounts have increased.
"This filing season, it will be very important for taxpayers to ensure they enter correct social security numbers for themselves and their dependents on their tax returns. We are increasing the screening and review of tax returns during processing to identify and stop fraud attempts," said Crowley. The IRS will delay refunds on returns with incorrect or missing social security numbers to allow time to verify that the taxpayers are entitled to the refunds they claim.

Remember to hold onto your tax package this year. It contains valuable information to assist you in preparing your return. But, if you still have questions after reading your package, visit your local IRS walk-in office or call the IRS toll-free taxpayer assistance line at 1-800-8291040.

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## 1995 TAX DEADLINES

Mark your calendar if any of these upcoming tax deadlines apply to you or your business.

- Jan. 17 - Due date for the fourth and final installment of 1994 estimated tax.
- Jan. 31 - Employers must furnish W-2 statements to employees. 1099 information statements must be furnished to payees by banks, brokers and other payers.
- Jan. 31 - Employers must file 1994 federal unemployment tax returns and pay any tax due.
- Feb. 28 - Payers must file information returns (such as 1099s) with the IRS; employers must send W-2 copies to the Social Security Administration.
- March 1 - Farmers and fishermen who did not make 1994 estimated tax payments must file 1994 tax returns and pay taxes in full.
- March 15-1994 calendar-year corporation income tax returns are due.
- April 17 - Individual income tax returns for 1994 are due unless you file for an automatic extension.
- April 17-1994 partnership information returns are due.
- April 17 - Deadline for making your 1994 IRA contribution.
- April 17-1994 annual gift tax returns are due.
- April 17 - First installment of 1995 individual estimated tax is due.
- April 17 - Second payment is due for taxpayers paying 1993 tax increase in three annual installments.
- June 15 - Second installment of 1995 individual estimated tax is due.
- Sept. 15 - Third installment of 1995 individual estimated tax is due.
