

Dear Friends,

The air was cold and crisp this morning, a sign that the season has changed and Autumn is upon us. With the coming of Fall, Sunday School is up and running again in our building, the choir is back live and in person each Sunday. We have coffee hour each week after worship. Small group participation continues to be strong, and worship attendance is slowly coming back, and we are experiencing new visitors just about every Sunday. Though the live-stream views are down from when we were totally virtual, we are still averaging about 190 views per week reaching people at all different times of the day and night, something that we're not able to do when we are limited to just Sunday mornings.

In other words, I have great optimism for the ministry of Sparta United Methodist Church and what we can continue to do to transform people's lives after the example of Jesus Christ. In looking ahead, there are several things that are in the planning stages for the next few months. While some are waiting for the leaves to change and drop, I see the vibrancy of color as a perfect metaphor for what God has in store for us in the church. After a somewhat challenging two years.

I see some great opportunities for us to re-engage with one another, even if it is a bit different than it was before. If there is anything we need, and crave, in this time is one another. Even with the rise in the Delta variant, so many have learned how to care for themselves and one another safely, and coming together is far more possible.

Over the past four to six weeks, we have experienced an increase in visitors who are looking for a welcoming, open church for themselves and their families. Some have felt harmed and hurt by some arm of the church, and they are expressing a sense of acceptance and welcome at Sparta UMC that brings blessing to them. We will be receiving new members in the month of November, and anyone interested in church membership should contact me as soon as possible.

A highly successful Earthkeepers program that was held in our pavilion brought about 60 children and helpers to learn about God's world and God's word, and has led us to start in person Sunday School in September, with youth programming coming along soon. This will be assisted by a new team of folks who have committed themselves to form a Children's and Youth Committee/Team/Task Force (you get to choose the name) that will be focusing on bringing our youth program to a new level.

The desk in my office faces the windows, and I keep the curtains open at all times so that I can see the wonder of God's creation at just about any moment. I also can see the outdoor chapel and the labyrinth, and I thank God that regularly, I see people coming to our church to use both -a sign that there is a yearning to connect with the Divine presence, with the Spirit of God that dwells with us each day. That alone is a sign that even though the days are growing shorter, that winter will be upon us soon, that leaves will need to be raked, and we are all a little-bit worn out by COVID, there is still life -it is abundant -and it is God's gift to us.

Welcoming and Supporting Newly Arriving Afghan Refugees

In late August, we watched with heavy hearts on TV, crowds of desperate Afghan people, many with babies in their arms and little children tagging behind them, rushing through the airport gates hoping to board a plane to leave Kabul. They were leaving their homeland for fear they would be killed by the Taliban if they stayed behind because they had worked with the US military during the last 20 years the Americans were fighting the Taliban in Afghanistan. They are people without a country, home, neighbors, friends, or relatives. They have no possessions, other than the clothes they wore when they left Afghanistan.

Those who came to the US are housed temporarily, until they are vetted by the US government, at military bases in Virginia, Wisconsin, Texas, New Mexico, and the Fort Dix military base in New Jersey.

There are an estimated 156,400 Afghan refugees in the US, with about 9,500 in New Jersey.

How you can help:

UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) is primary partner of **CWS** (Church World Service) in refugee resettlement. CWS staff have been deployed to designated military bases to assist with immediate processing of refugees. A CWS nationwide network is preparing to support Afghan families with housing, legal assistance, case management, mental health support, medical care, and school enrollment. Decorate a plain canvas tote for the collection of candy.

<u>PUMPKINS</u>: They have usefulness beyond the jack-o-lantern.



Roast and eat the pumpkin seeds. It's nourishing and easy to do.



Utilize the flesh of the pumpkin. Many recipes exist on line for pies, muffins, soups, etc.



Carve, don't paint! Carved pumpkins can be composted; painted ones cannot.


