



Ten Things to Consider When Choosing a Power Drill

Choosing a power drill can be a difficult process, as there are many different factors you will have to consider. Use our guide to find your perfect choice.

1. Usage

The first thing you will need to consider is how and where you will use your power drill. This will help you to work out what type you need, and to make the right decision about several other key considerations.

2. Where to Buy

You also need to think about where to buy your new power drill. Buying online is usually the most convenient and more affordable option.

3. Brand

Brand is a key consideration. Choosing items that come from well-known makers of [hand tools](#) is a better way to be sure you are getting a good-quality drill. That said, some lesser-known brands are often up to the job. If you see a price you like then check out reviews for the model online and you may get a bargain.

4. Model

You should be able to choose a few options based on your requirements and once again, it is worth checking out reviews. Everyone's requirements differ but if noise level is a key issue for you, then you can check for comments on which are noisy models. Similarly, weight might be an important consideration for you.

5. Power Source

You can get corded, mains-powered or battery-powered cordless ones. Corded ones are almost universally more powerful, but cordless ones can be taken anywhere.

6. Battery Life

If choosing a cordless drill, you will probably want to consider the battery life. This is rated in mAh, and higher numbers denote longer-lasting batteries. If you are likely to need the drill in a hurry, then look at charging times too.

7. Power

You will need to consider how powerful the drill is, as heavy-duty uses will require more powerful drills. For cordless drills, higher voltage denotes a more powerful item. For corded ones, you instead want to look for more amps.

8. Accessories

Consider whether you want to buy any accessories along with your drill. You may be able to benefit from a multi-buy deal, but even if not, it is best to have everything you need from the start. This may be as simple as getting the appropriate bits, or a second battery so you can use one while the other is charging.

9. Price

Price is of course an important consideration. Don't make the mistake of thinking you necessarily have to spend more on getting the very best drill when a cheaper one would be adequate for your needs. But don't base your purchase on price alone - if you need a higher output then you will soon wish you had bought a better model.

10. Personal Taste

Always allow for your own personal tastes. Things like the weight of a drill or the way it feels in your hand aren't always deal-breakers, but there are some features you will feel more strongly about.
