Wheeler Hosts NOVA In 'Haunted Cry Of A Long Gone Bird'

On June 3 1844, two museum collectors came ashore on a remote island off Iceland and strangled the last surviving pair of a magnificent flightless bird called the great auk. They also smashed the last egg.

A cousin of the penguin, the auk was once so abundant that no one could imagine that it would ever disappear, but eventually it did - from exploitation for food, feathers and (as did that final pair) to satisfy the desire of educated people to own a stuffed specimen of an increasingly rare thing.

NOVA explores the legacy of the great auk via a 1,500-mile journey retracing its migratory route with educator, naturalist and expert kayaker Richard Wheeler of Charlestown - in "Haunted Cry of a Long Gone Bird," airing Tuesday, Oct. 25 at 8 p.m. on WGBH / Channel 2. It will repeat on Sunday, Oct. 30 at 7 p.m. on WGBX / Channel 44.

After graduating from Harvard University in 1952, Richard C. Wheeler served for two years as a U. S. Navy "Frogman."

Wheeler said: "At Harvard, I majored in English Literature and minored in swimming; in the Navy, I

majored in swimming and minored in kayaking.'

MONITORING CASH FLOW IN YOUR BUSINESS - PART 1

Any business owner who has fended off calls from unpaid creditors or has wondered how to meet the next payroll knows the importance of cash flow - and the frustration of being distracted by a cash shortage just when sales are booming. Yet, ironically enough, business success and cash shortages often go together. If those skyrocketing sales are on credit, they create a huge accounts receivable, which your company is funding. Your income statement may show a hefty profit, but profit doesn't pay bills - cash does! Profit is just an accounting measurement. Cash is reality. That's why understanding and controlling the cash flow in your business is so important.

There are three elements to cash-flow management: collecting cash as fast as possible, paying out cash as slowly as possible, and making the best use of the cash held in your business. You should understand the way cash flows through these three stages and the timing associated with each.

In every business, the major focus of the first stage must be monitoring the collection of receivables. This includes understanding the impact of factors such as the credit terms you offer and your approach to delinquent accounts.

The two keys to managing cash outflows are controlling your accounts payable and, more important, controlling inventory levels. Remember that every item held in inventory is tying up dollars that could be used elsewhere.

Finally, monitor the cash sitting idle in your bank accounts. Put any excess to work earning interest. Your goal should be to have cash available when you need it, but not before.



* "Stop Payment" Put On Check Cashing Businesses . . . Boston's Zoning Commission voted to amend existing zoning laws to prevent future check cashing businesses from being able to open in Boston's neighborhoods without prior community review and approval by the Zoning Board of Appeal. Mayor Thomas M. Menino praised the commission's actions as he signed the amendment, which will take effect immediate-

Check cashing businesses would not be permitted in residential areas, in the smaller business districts, or in certain other areas where this use is inappropriate. In districts where new check cashing businesses may be acceptable, each business will be required to obtain a conditional use permit. Before issuing this permit, the Board of Appeal can require parking adequate to serve a high volume of customers, as well as mitigation of other impacts as appropriate to each site.

This zoning change responds to community concerns about the impacts of check cashing operations in the smaller business districts and in residential districts. Neighborhood associations indicated that check cashing businesses generally conduct a high volume of short transactions, often at late hours and with inadequate parking facilities.

Wheeler Hosts NOVA In 'Haunted Cry of a Long Gone Bird'

Wheeler returned to Harvard for a Master of Arts in
Teaching degree which he
received in 1955 and began a 25-year career as
teacher, coach and administrator at all three levels:
elementary, secondary and
university.

Awarded a Master Teacher Fellowship by Harvard in 1968-69, Wheeler went on to become the education and fisheries technical representative for the U. S. Peace Corps in the South Pacific. Wheeler noted: "I needed something to balance my "War Corps" experience." He also spent a total of 15 years as headmaster of independent schools in Maine, California and Virginia.

Wheeler's most recent responsibility was a stint of over six years as director of the USS Constitution Museum in Charlestown.

Wheeler, now in his 60s, undertook a solo voyage from Newfoundland to Cape Cod that was both a tribute to the vanished bird and a campaign to increase awareness of mo-

dern-day marine species threatened with extinction. Parts of the trip are filmed as Wheeler's personal journal, recorded by a camera mounted on the kayak's bow - just behind a figurehead sculpture of the late, great auk.

His starting point was Funk Island, the scene of the auk's last stand on this side of the Atlantic. A sea-swept rock 40 miles from the northern coast of Newfoundland, Funk Island was home to the largest breeding colony of great auks in the world. There, the bird's annual cycle would start with thousands of pairs crawling out of the frigid water to lay and care for their single eggs.

The great auk was an even better swimmer than its close relatives, the murre and puffin. However, it could not fly and was awkward and vulnerable on land, and hence easy prey to early sailing ships that found it a convenient form of fast food.

After a harrowing crossing from Funk Island to Newfoundland, Wheeler did not have to paddle far to come face-to-face with a peril remarkably like that of the auk's. In village after village, he learned that the legendary fish stocks of Newfoundland's Grand Banks had never been lower.

Sailors who crossed to the banks from Europe in the 16th century were able to harvest fish by simply scooping baskets over the side. "But now," notes Wheeler, "you look down through the water and see nothing. It's beautiful, but where's the fish life?"

Gone to fiendishly effective harvesting methods, it happens. Grand Banks fishermen until recently, could earn a steady living using centuries-old methods, along with a few contemporary improvements. "Catches were good," Wheeler recalls from personal experience, since he himself fished the Grand Banks aboard a trawler in 1951.

But that was before "draggers" - massive factory trawlers that "drag" nets 1,000 feet underwater and work areas never

fished before. Cod gathering for their annual spawning had always been protected by the sea ice and the great depth, "but now they are easy targets," says Wheeler.

Fine-mesh nets used by such vessels capture young and old of all species, with little discrimination. Satellite navigation and electronic fish-finding equipment further stack the deck against the fish. "The catches have been large and profitable, just like the harvest of auks from Funk Island - I hope we can learn from our old mistakes. That must be why the great auk keeps whispering warnings in my ear."

Wheeler states: "Celebrating the history of Old Ironsides was a great experience, but I'm far more comfortable as a kayaking naturalist than I was as a desk-bound naval historian.

"The Great Auk Project combines all of the things that make me 'tick;' creative educational programming; my need for a worthwhile mission; and ocean kayaking.

"The good fortune of having Chris Knight agree to be the filmmaker for the Great Auk expedition virtually guarantees that our footage will result in an interesting and powerful documentary film."

Now celebrating its 21st season on public television, NOVA is produced for PBS by the WGBH Science Unit and is made possible by grants from Merck, Lockheed, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting and public television viewers. 

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CNC Looks From Beautification To Billboards

Charlestown Preservation Society member Ivy St. John made a presentation before the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) on Oct. 4 about a plan to beautify Austin Street and the area around the Community College stop on the Orange Line.

St. John said that she received a mailing in the spring from the Mass. Historical Commission which included an article about Interstate Transportation Enhancement Act (Ice Tea Legislation). This act includes a "significant" amount of money which will be available in 1996 and 1997 "to enhance and beautify transportation related areas". Funding can be provided for bike paths, sidewalks, historic preservation, historic signage and landscaping.

The Charlestown Preservation Society started a sub-committee, met twice with the abutters of Austin Street and submitted their plans for an estimated \$500,000 in redesign to the Metro Area Planning Council. The plans include plans to forest Austin Street, widen the curbs, install gas lamps, put up signs to local historical and retail spots, install a tourist kiosk, relandscape the college plaza along with the pedestrian walkway and clean up the area around the skating rink, including New and Old Rutherford avenues.

Funding for a joint traffic study of the Gilmore Bridge to revise the timing of the lights to help with the traffic problem is also included in the proposal. A second plan also includes the building of a median strip with greenery for Austin Street. In addition, Bunker Hill

Community College is already spending \$25,000 by having students and their custodial landscaping team working on the two plazas when one comes out of the subway.

St. John noted that public agencies including the Boston Parks Department, the Boston Transportation Department and the MDC have been "very responsive". She added that these agencies are needed because the Ice Tea funds do not cover planning or design. She also said that they have to spend the next year "persuading public agencies" to help out.

At the end of her presentation, St. John asked for and received a unanimous decision by the council for a letter in support of the plans. There will also be future abutters' meetings on these plans and the date will be advertised in the Patriot.

Members Present

Gardens For Charlestown

Kevin Burke from Gardens for Charlestown spoke before the CNC regarding the land on which the garden has been located for 18 years. This land has recently been recognized as open space and the garden group is trying to obtain the deed of ownership from the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA). In addition, the land will be advertised shortly and they will have 30 days from that date to present a proposal to the BRA outlining the work they have done on the garden and

projecting their plans over the next five years.

Burke pointed out that in 1986 the CNC voted to keep the garden. He asked for a "recommittal" from the council along with a letter to the BRA indicating their support of the garden in their attempt to obtain the deed.

The council voted to support the garden.

Public Safety

Stillman reported that the committee met last month in the community room at Mishawum Park with Boston Police Department Area A Community Service Officer Joe McNulty. They discussed the slowing down of house break-ins and the fact that a couple of arrests had been made.

However, there has been a new rash of car break-ins where the windows of automobiles have been smashed and property has been taken. Stillman advised people to put possessions in the trunk or house rather than leaving them in the car. McNulty said police presence will be intensified.

Stillman also reported that the police have been clearing the teenagers off of Main Street and the residents of Mishawum say that it is "terrific". The police have also been successful at clearing out Eden Street Park.

McNulty stated that the Boston Police will also be visible at all of Charlestown Pop Warner home football games.

Modica's Message

Looney reported that a letter was sent from Boston City Councillor Diane Modica's office to Police Commissioner Paul Evans calling to his attention the issues of residents of Area A.

The letter described concerns such as a police facility, increase of police presence and citizen interaction in Charlestown.

She also mentioned the staffing levels in Charlestown as one "Rapid-Response" patrol unit, two single officer units, two detectives, but noted that there are currently no motorcycles or wagons units assigned to the area. In addition, officers assigned from downtown are done so on availability. Modica called for an "ongoing in-depth relationship between police and residents in order to develop a trusting and effective approach to problem solving and community policing demands."

Basic Services

The Basic Services committee received a presentation from Diane Ford on Sept. 19, regarding her proposed "Beer of the Month" Club. The committee voted to support the retail liquor application with the proviso that no retail sales take place at the site. The council sent a letter to the licensing board stating their support.

The CNC received two letters from the YMCA stating their plans to startphasing out the transitional housing program first on the fourth floor by April 1, 1995. YMCA will keep the council updated on the plans.

Elections

The date for the elections for the seven at-large members of the CNC will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Oct. 29 at the Knights of Columbus Hall.

Mansfield To Receive Award

Council member Mc-Donough announced at the meeting that fellow member Jim Mansfield will receive a community service award from Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) on Oct. 21 at the Sheraton Hotel. Mansfield was the nominee from the Kennedy Center for the award.

Update On The McLaughlin House

CNC member Conway reported that the first two clients for the Dennis Mc-Laughlin House will enter the program in mid- October. One of the clients is from Charlestown and there is one Charlestown resident on the waiting list.

Massport Update

Dorothy Steele, the Massport Community Liaison, will be planning a meeting with residents and council members to discuss the demolition of buildings at the Revere Sugar site on Medford Street. The date of this meeting will be Wednesday, Oct. 26.

Billboard Meeting

On Oct. 5, CNC billboard committee members met with residents for a presentation from Randell Bartlett of Barlo Signs concerning two proposed billboards at 50 Brighton St.

Bartlett stated that Barlo Signs is a family business started by his parents which is trying to expand into the Boston business market. His company is renting a space in the building for storage of repair materials and a small site for a salesman. A crane would come in once in the morning, every day, to load up and go out to make repairs on their signs.

Bartlett wants to advertise his business by erecting two 186 square feet (31' x 6') signs to be on the sides of the buildings facing the north and south routes of interstate 93. This size is nearly half of the 300-square-feet signs that he had originally proposed to the zoning board.

He insisted that the signs, which would read "1-800 BARLO SIGNS," would be lit up until midnight, but would not face the neighborhood. Bartlett also offered to clean-

up the sides of the building by taking down all other unnecessary signs.

Residents of Brighton and Perkins streets expressed their concerns that this operation would cause more debris, traffic and noise in an already congested neighborhood. Therefore Bartlett agreed to not bring the crane into Charlestown, and only use the space for a one-man office. In addition, he offered to put up only one sign and reduce the size again to 155 square feet (31' x 5'). In his closing statement, Bartlett asked that he be given a chance and not looked upon as "the existing problem". He was going before the zoning board of appeal on Oct. 11.

The billboard committee and residents agreed to support the billboard with the following conditions: there be one sign; the sign be 31' x 5'; no crane or trucks; removal of signs and clean-up of building by Oct. 11; use space for office not storage: no sign above the roof; the sign can not be rented out or leased to another company; the sign remains only as long as Barlo signs is a tenant in the building; and there is a review of the site in one year.

The restrictions of the residents were approved by the Executive Committee of the CNC were put in letter form and sent to Richard Dennis of the Board of Appeal. After discussion by the board with support by the CNC, the Charlestown Preservation Society and Amy Chardavoyne from Modica's office, and a recommendation for denial from the BRA, the board deferred a decision on the matter until Nov. 28. ****
