In many ways, Boston is my extended family, and moving to Rome feels almost like I am moving away from my family. Although I am moving to Rome, my true home will always remain among the people who have always embraced me, and to whom I am forever grateful.

I have long said that you can't run a city from City Hall. For more than 20 years of public service, my office has been of the streets of the city. Whether as Mayor or City Councillor, I have always taken the greatest pleasure in walking the streets and meeting with people, hearing their concerns and sharing some good times.

Kyle Fitzpatrick, the son of Bobby and Cindy (Venezia) Fitzpatrick, has leukemia. Kyle just turned a year old last month, and his only hope for survival is to find a compatible donor who can give him a small amount of healthy marrow, the "Living Gift Of Life."

The recruiting and testing of potential donors for Kyle is being organized by Friends of Baby Kyle in conjunction with the HLA Registry Foundation Inc., a not-for-profit organization and member of the National Marrow Donor Program. All test results from the donor drives will be entered into the HLA Registry data base and made available to Kyle and the other 9,000 victims of blood disease in search of a "miracle match."

Though each donor drive builds hope, it also creates bills. Initial blood tests for potential donors are expensive, costing \$50 each. The total cost for this drive could run as high as \$100,000. The Friends need to raise money to cover the cost of the drive through fund raisers and donations. The momentum and spirit of this effort has been wonderful to date and the family and friends are most grateful. It is hoped that the effort can be kept



Christiane Noll (Ellen), born into a musical family, began her career at age 4. touring the country with her



Late Night Gathering Of Teens Main Complaint At Public Safety Meeting

Hot summer nights with groups of teens gathering, talking and yelling into the early morning hours was the complaint of numerous residents of Mishawum Park at a combined Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) and Mishawum Park Tenants Association Public Safety Committee meeting on July 13.

The meeting was chaired by CNC member and committee co-chairman Edna Kelly. Area A Community Service Officer Joe McNulty represented the Boston Police Department. Among those present was Michael Travaglini, candidate for Boston City Council At-Large.

One Main Street resident told McNulty that "this is the worse summer" she has ever experienced. She told the story of a recent night when a gang of about 75 boys and girls ages 14 and 15 gathered on Main Street. The police were called and moved them, but five minutes later they were back. She added that they even turned the one-way signs around and so cars were traveling in the wrong direction. She said "the problem is getting worse, not better.'

Another resident noted that the Eden Street Park closes at 11 p.m. and the teens are not ready to go home on these hot nights. They stated that most of these teens do not live in Mishawum but they know where to hide, adding that "they are very destructive, writing on the buildings and tearing off the siding."

McNulty said that when the police concentrate on one area, the problem "crops up in another." He said the Mishawum area has been put on a priority patrol list and gang units have been assigned, adding that these units patrol at random times and will be targeting the Main Street area.

According to McNulty, the police are going to continue to make arrests for public drinking "with no second chances." He added that Judge Peter Agnes of the Charlestown District Court has been working cooperatively with the police. In fact, McNulty said, he will be fining the parents as well as the juveniles who are arrested for public drinking.

Peter Looney, chairman of the CNC and Mishawum Park resident, spoke of the ongoing summer program for teens. He said the best that the community can do is offer the programs, adding that the teens can't be made to participate.

keeping the Eden Street Park open later on hot nights but McNulty noted that the residents around the park are also entitled to sleep. CNC member John Dillon said that maybe if there was a place for the teens to go, they would keep off the street corners. Mc-Nulty asked about the Ryan Field in Sullivan Square which is some distance

He stressed that items such as golf clubs and briefcases should not be left in cars, nor should bicycles be left attached to a vehicle. McNulty went on to say that people roam the streets just looking for something to steal and once they spot something of value in a car, they quickly smash a window, grab the item and are

McNulty also reported on the theft of a sailboat and the setting on fire of another boat at the Schrafft Sailing Center. He added that it is a shame that persons would destroy the property of this program which provides free sailing lessons to Charlestown youths.

The recurring concern of the speeding traffic on Main Street was brought up. In fact several residents reported to McNulty that it was so bad that persons are unable to cross the street at the crosswalks. Looney noted that the installation of a traffic light at Eden and Main streets is scheduled to begin this month.

One resident suggested that the crosswalks should be repainted. The group also asked McNulty to look into "Yield to pedestrians on crosswalk" signs.

Concerns were raised on the locating of a check cashing store on Main Street which, according to residents, is expected to open next month. Looney said that his sources have informed him that such a business does not require city or state permits so it doesn't have to go before the CNC. McNulty said that he would check to see if there are any restrictions or licensing on such a store. Kelly stated that unless urgent matters arise during August, the next CNC Public Safety meeting would be






