Development Committee Meeting On Boys & Girls Club Renovation

Chairman Tom Cunha has announced that the Development Committee will meet tonight, Thursday, May 1, at 7 p.m. on the planned renovations of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club.

The meeting will be held at the club's High Street facility. The committee is scheduled to vote on the proposal following an update by the club and questions from residents being answered.

Rutherford Avenue Corridor

Transportation Study

The council will meet at 7 p.m. on Monday, May 5 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St. to discuss the Rutherford Avenue Corridor Transportation Study. Vineet Gupta of the city of Boston Transportation Department will lead the dis-

cussion.

In addition to Rutherford Avenue, the Transportation Study will focus on Sullivan Square, City Square and the roadways that connect to those squares from within Charlestown as well as Somerville, Cambridge and Everett.

From its initiation, the study will be managed as an equal partnership between the community, city and state. The study will be developed through an open public process. It will provide an opportunity for the community to participate in an envisioning process leading to neighborhood enhancing plans as we move toward the next century.

The purpose of the Transportation Study is to develop conceptual plans for the construction of transportation-related improvements in the study area, especially at Sullivan Square and along Rutherford Avenue. Pedestrian and bicycle connections,

highway and street networks, rail and transit service will all be studied.

George Schlichte Dies Following Long Illness

George A. Schlichte, a retired manager of community affairs for Blue Shield of Mass., died April 23 at his home in Charlestown after a long illness. Before joining Blue Shield, Schlichte had distinguished careers in the U.S. Navy, the Roman Catholic Church and as a college president. He was 75.

A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in 1942, Schlichte served aboard the USS Philadelphia from 1942 until 1945. After the war he entered St. John's Seminary in Brighton; he continued studies at Gregorian University in Rome and was ordained in 1951.

Following service as assistant pastor of St. Mary's Parish in Charlestown, he served as vice rector of the North American College in Rome from 1953 until 1961. Returning to Boston in 1961, he was appointed vice chancellor of the Archdiocese of Boston and in 1963 was appointed founding president and rector of Pope John XXIII Seminary in Weston by Richard Cardinal Cushing.

The then Monsignor



GEORGE A. SCHLICHTE Schlichte was inspired and energized by Vatican II. As rector, Schlichte entered into the public theological debate, questioning and often disagreeing openly with church positions such as those on birth control and celibacy and on the role of the priesthood itself.

Schlichte believed that "the priesthood is conferred at baptism on all Christians. Ordination delegates an individual to function in the name of the people as their delegate to God." He saw the role of priest as "a drum major for peace and justice - a change agent in society who challenges the conscience of people to help overcome selfishness, which, after all, is the only

sin in the world." The controversial rector got the attention of the hierarchy in Rome. Schlichte resigned as rector in Weston and later he resigned from the priesthood itself.

After completing a doctoral program in business administration at the University of Mass., Schlichte accepted the position of president of Belknap College in Center Harbor, N.H. He joined Blue Shield in 1974.

Schlichte had been past chair of the Mass. Economic Education Council and the Charlestown Community Center; Treasurer of the Chinese American Civic Association; past board member of the Cambridge Community Art Center, the Mass. Health Council and the United Community Planning Corporation; and as a founding director of the South Cove Manor Nursing Home.

Following his retirement, Schlichte took great pleasure in tending to his gardens in Cataumet and writing. In 1993, he published his first book, Politics in the Purple Kingdom, a discourse on the theme of displacement of organizational goals through unquestioning adherence to rules - a theme played out in his life experiences in the Navy and with the Catholic Church. In the words of one reviewer, the book is also "a tale of courage and resistance that takes the reader into the inner sanctum of the church as it moved through the tumultuous time just prior to and after Vatican II ... a good story, told by a good man." Schlichte was working on essays on Charisma at the time of his death.

He leaves his wife, tribute will be held at a later date.


The seminars are designed for interested members of neighborhood crime watch groups, merchants associations, civic groups, local churches and citizens concerned with keeping crime in their community on the decline. "Because it is the mission of my administration to provide swift justice," said Martin, "I believe it is critical to reach out beyond the courtroom and work with the citizens of Suffolk County on anti-crime solutions."

Besides giving an overview of local initiatives in the office, most of the emphasis of the two-hour session will be on the use of the Community Impact Statement (CIS). "This is a valuable tool that allows citizens to let the court know how harmful behaviors of chronic offenders affect quality of life," Martin continued.

"This is an important opportunity to share with concerned citizens the functions and services of the district attorney's office," Martin explained. "I hope this will begin ongoing dialogue with my staff and will provide people with information and access."

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

NEW 'CHECK THE BOX' REGULATIONS ISSUED

The IRS recently issued new regulations which should be of interest to anyone associated with an unincorporated business.

In recent years, a number of states have allowed new forms of business such as limited liability companies and limited liability partnerships, which seek to combine the liability protection of a corporation with the favorable "pass through" tax treatment of a partnership or sole proprietorship. However, determining the status of such entities for federal tax purposes is sometimes complicated. Whether or not an entity is taxed as a corporation depends on how it matches a set of established criteria, and the answer is not always clear. It has sometimes been necessary to go through convoluted steps to make sure that a business will not be taxed under the less favorable corporate rules.

The IRS has now replaced this formula-driven approach with an elective system. Unincorporated businesses (i.e. those not set up as traditional corporations) can now choose whether they want to be taxed as corporations or as partnerships by simply "checking the box" on a form. Newly-formed entities will automatically be placed in certain default categories unless they elect otherwise.

You should view these new regulations as a tax planning opportunity. Existing partnerships and limited liability companies should review their tax status to see whether it needs to be changed or clarified. It should now be much easier to achieve favorable tax treatment while preserving limited liability. This is especially true for the single-person limited liability companies allowed by some states. The regulations also provide guidance on the tax treatment of foreign entities, which could be important for companies involved in foreign joint ventures, for example.

It would take some of the heavy traffic away from Green Street, providing a safe alternate route from the town's stores to the Bunker Hill and Medford Street neighborhoods. And since it would simply reverse the pattern (counterclockwise instead of clockwise) around the school, it wouldn't make traffic any more dangerous for children.

Community Health Workers From The MGH-Charlestown HealthCare Center

If the women in the photo look familiar to you, it is probably because they spend a great deal of time in the community, meeting with agencies and organizations, talking to local merchants and walking around town distributing flyers and pamphlets about the many health promotion programs offered at the MGH-Charlestown Health-Care Center.

The programs they currently represent are the Pack It In Smoking Cessation and Prevention Program, the Breast and Cervical Cancer Initiative, the Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC) and The Children's Medical Security Plan.

The Pack It In Program offers workshops and presentations to schools, community organizations and businesses on the health effects of smoking/chewing tobacco and how to quit successfully. Pack It In also participates in health fairs and community events. Eileen O'Brien facilitates a five-week smoking cessation course on Wednesday nights from 5:45 to 6:45 p.m. and Tuesday mornings from 10 to 11 a.m. at MGH-Charlestown. The course is free of charge and space is limited. Please call 485-6210 for more information or to register for a course.

The Breast and Cervical Cancer Initiative (BCCI) offers free mammograms, pap tests and physical examinations to eligible women 40 years and older who are uninsured or underinsured. Janette Benitez and Lily Prek are the Community Health Workers for this program. For more information or to make an appointment, please call 485-6215.

WIC is a supplemental nutrition program for women, infants and children. Marisol Santiago works with the community agencies such as Head Start and the Kennedy Center that serve young children and their mothers. Another target group in her outreach efforts is pregnant and parenting teenagers. Please call the MGH-Charlestown WIC office at 724-8198 for more information.

The Children's Medical Security Plan (CMSP) is a state health insurance plan
