October Council Meeting Moves Briskly

Even with 17 of the 21member body in attendance, the Charlestown Neighborhood Council breezed through its business at its Oct. 1 monthly meeting.

Attending the public session were Chairman Peter Looney, Vice-Chairman Torh Cunha, Second Vice-Chairman Mel Stillman, Secretary Jim Mansfield, Treasurer Nancy Keyes, and members Edna Kelly, David Whelan, Judy Brennan, John Iacoi, Jim Conway, John Dillon, Don Haska, Marty O'Brien, Bill McCabe, Billy Galvin, Peg Bradley and Kate Mc-Donough.

Seven at-large seats are open for election this year. Nomination papers with

signatures of 25 residents 18 and older are due Friday, Oct. 25. The election will be held Saturday, Nov. 2 at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 W. School St., between 10 a.m. and 2

In the only presentation heard by the council, representatives for H.P. Hood described the company's plans to lease out the Rutherford Avenue site of the former dairy plant.

According to Steve Kaneb of Catamount Management Corp., Hood will not sell the land but instead be landlord to several commercial-industrial tenants at the Charlestown site, "the flagship of Hood for many years.

Kaneb said that the presentation was meant to be an informational hearing, and no plans have been finalized.

Presenter Og Honeywell said the general plans are to remain consistent with the site's original uses. The dairy plant will be decommissioned and retain its shell, he said, as will the landmark brick stack.

Through landscaping, window treatments, and contained parking, the site would be "softened" and have a "business-park feel" to it. Improvements are intended to draw minimum five-year leases with potential businesses, such as distributors, assemblers and auxiliary retailers. Honeywell said he could see employment opportu-

Steele Appointed Deputy Superintendent At Boston National Historical Park

Superintendent John Burchill has announced the appointment of Peter Steele as deputy superintendent at Boston National Historical Park. "Peter Steele brings a wealth of experience and expertise to the park's deputy superintendent position," said Burchill.

Prior to this appointment, Steele was assistant superintendent at Boston National Historical Park, where he has directed the park's planning, cultural resources, and development programs since 1987. This work included the Freedom Trail Study and the restoration of Faneuil Hall, Old State House, Old South Meeting House, African Meeting House, Abiel Smith School, Dor-

Steele has been with the park since 1976, when he became the park's first museum curator. In this capacity, he oversaw the development of the park's museum collections, exhibits, curatorial staff and curatorial programs. He acquired the

World War II destroyer USS Cassin Young and oversaw the ship's restoration.

Prior to working at Boston National Historical Park, Steele worked at a variety of National Park Service historic sites around New York City, such as the Statue of Liberty, Sagamore Hill National Historic Site and Federal Hall. In this capacity, he directed curatorial programs and was involved in public art projects, educational programs and interpretive operations.

Steele earned a master's degree in History Museum Studies from the Copperstown Graduate Program and a bachelor of arts degree in American Studies from Yale University.

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Education Focus Of 'Life In The City' Lecture

The "Life in the City" lecture series continues on Sunday, Oct. 20 at 12:30 p.m. at the Charlestown Armed Services YMCA, 150 Second Ave. in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Three distinguished educators will present their views on education in the Boston Public Schools.

Dr. Thomas Payzant was appointed superintendent of the Boston Public Schools in 1995. His goal for Boston schools is 123 schools of excellence with quality teaching and high expectations in learning for every student.

Payzant was born in Boston and attended schools in Quincy, graduated from Williams College and from the Harvard School of Education, with both master and doctorate degrees. He began his teaching career at Belmont High School in 1963. His career as a superintendent began in 1969 and he served in increasingly larger school systems until 1982 when he became superintendent of the San Diego Unified School

After 11 years in that position, he was asked by President Clinton to become Assistant Secretary of Elementary and Secondary Education. As such, he led the fight for the reauthorization of the 1965 act which provided significant federal support to the schools and for the President's Goals 2000 Program which will stress school and work initiatives and school safety.

In his presentation, Payzant will discuss how these national programs will effect Boston and what his goals are for the Boston

Charles McAfee was appointed headmaster of the Clarence R. Edwards Middle School five years ago and has a much-deserved reputation in the community for his caring and energetic style. He has just been appointed cluster leader for Charlestown and East Boston, a position in which he will act as mentor and guide for the schools in his area. As part of his presentation, he will describe more fully what the goals and purposes are for cluster leaders.

A graduate of Dorchester High School, McAfee has worked in the Boston Public Schools for 20 years as a classroom teacher of math, art and science; as coordinator of Project Promise at the Timilty Middle School; and as the administrative assistant to the North Zone area superintendent. During his tenure in this position, the North Zone Management Team won a Boston Management Consortium Award which recognized the creative delivery of services to the community.

In the coming year, Mc-Afee is hoping to make the Edwards Middle School an integral part of Charlestown. He wants his building to be seen not just as a school which effectively meets the academic needs of its students, but as a participating and responsive organization for children and parents and the community.

Marilyn Hurwitz was appointed headmaster of Charlestown High School in 1995, and brings a dynamic and energetic ap-

proach to the students and parents. Her most immediate concern is the re-accreditation of the school, using the motto "Rights, Respect, Responsibility and Accountability" as a symbol of the way to achieve that goal.

She came to Charlestown from an activist background with 16 years of experience as a teacher at South Boston High School, 10 years as administrator of various social and academic programs and as assistant headmaster at Hyde Park High School and at an alternative Boston high school, Another Course to College.

Hurwitz brings demonstrated skills in leadership and organization, as well as the ability to convert new ideas into viable education programs. With solid experience in school-based management and in motivating and evaluating educators, Hurwitz will contribute much to enriching the community.

domestic violence and law enforcement professionals to share information, identify problems, propose solutions and enhance interagency communication and coordination.

"Our hope," said Martin, "is that with these roundtables and expanded outreach to neighborhood organizations, we can educate the public and put an end to the scourge of domestic violence. Domestic violence isn't just a law enforcement problem, it's a community problem."

Heroes Of USS Cassin Young To Be Honored On Saturday

Real heroes remain heroes even more than a halfcentury after their deeds!

On April 12 and July 30, 1945, 23 crew members of the destroyer USS Cassin Young (DD-793) were killed in kamikaze attacks near Okinawa. Relatives of these gallant men have been invited by Boston National Historical Park (BNHP) and the Navy to take part in a special ceremony dedicating a plaque for the ship with each name inscribed on it.

Memorial ceremonies, part of the Cassin Young's 11th annual Commemorative Sea Trial, will take place on Pier One at the Charlestown Navy Yard starting at 9 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 12. The 376-foot, Fletcher-class destroyer will then be tugged into Boston Harbor for a two-hour "invitation only" cruise. Only about a dozen relatives of those men honored could be located by the National Park Service and Naval records. Family members will be passengers with former Congressional Medal of Honor winners, active duty Naval personnel, Cassin Young tour volunteers and special guests.

The rain date is Sunday, Oct. 13.

"These people will be extremely special guests for us to have aboard ship," said BNHP Superintendent John Burchill. "Their husbands, fathers and uncles

paid the ultimate price in defending this ship and the freedom we enjoy today. Their toll contributed toward allowing our generation to transform this Navy Yard into a national park instead of it still being a place for building warships," he

Commissioned in 1943, the vessel served proudly in both World War II and the Korean conflict. From August 1944 through August 1945, she plucked hundreds of survivors out of the Pacific who were fleeing from her less fortunate sister-ships. She guarded carriers and engaged in numerous battles. Decommissioned a second time (April 1960), after being called into service during the Korean conflict, Cassin Young was moth-balled in Philadelphia for 18 years before becoming a floating monument and exhibit at the Charlestown Navy Yard in 1981. Built in San Pedro, Calif., her first Boston connection was when she spent the last months of 1952 in the then Boston Naval

Shipyard for repairs.

When commissioned, ships are given a "sea trial" to test their seaworthiness. The Cassin Young has been taken out for a "commemorative" trial each of the last 10 years in conjunction with ceremonies recognizing the many people who are affiliated with the ship's great history and preservation.

The destroyer is named for Pearl Harbor hero Captain Cassin Young, who won the Congressional Medal of Honor for his efforts there in December 1941. He was killed less than a year later at Guadalcanal when his light cruiser, the San Francisco, was ravaged by enemy fire. Cassin Young shares Pier One space with the Navy's grande dame, the USS Constitution.

Together they illustrate and commemorate 174 years of the shipyard's building and repair work and the thousands of people whose skills kept our varying naval defense forces battle ready.







Another meeting is expected to be scheduled on plans for Bunker Hill Street's reconstruction, including an anticipated street-lighting debate.

October Council Meeting Moves Briskly

Committee on November's ballot, Vote No on Question 2 representatives, were asked by the council not to speak on their side of the political issue since proponents were unavailable to provide a balanced presentation. Bill McCabe said he would invite both sides to the Public Safety Committee's Oct. 8 meeting.

In committee reports, Public Safety Committee Co-chairman Bill McCabe informed the council of rollerblade damage and vandalism to the Korean Veterans War Memorial in the Navy Yard and the dangerous crane diving by local young people this summer. Lowney Way speeding and unclear lane lines on that street were also mentioned.

The council discussed strategies on how to go about posting "no rollerblading" signs in the memorial's Shipyard Park location and how enforcement would be accomplished. Council members also discussed how to slow and guide traffic along Lowney, especially having the Boston Transportation Department clarify whether Lowney Way was officially changed from being a one-way street.

Looney said that speeding through Charlestown has gone beyond just Lowney Way, that the town's main streets have become a quick detour for downtown commuters avoiding rush-hour jams in and out of the city.

Public Safety Committee Co-chairman John Dillon reported that "it does pay to go to the council," as he updated fellow members on the quick response to Harvard-Kent School abutters' issues with drinking and drug-dealing on the property. Dillon said since the committee's Sept. 24 meeting, trees have been trimmed to deter covert activity and nearly 20 young people using the schoolyard improperly have been picked up by police.

In the numbers of types of crimes committed in Charlestown, Dillon reported that last month there were 24 larcenies, 11 drug arrests, 11 recovered stolen cars, 8 burglaries and attempts, 8 car accidents, 7 robberies and attempts, and 5 assaults. Topping Charlestown's complaints were 86 reports of such incidents as harassing telephone calls and neighbor disputes.

Environmental Committee Chairman Judy Brennan reported that a November meeting with Mass. Water Resources Authority representatives on the Combined Sewer Overflow project is expected to inform the neighborhood that no screening and disinfection facilities will be necessary in Charlestown.

In new business, Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha announced updates on two Medford Street properties, the development of the former Brockway-Smith building and the demolition of Domino Sugar structures, at a single meeting on Thursday, Oct. 17 at 7 p.m. at Bishop Lawton Hall, St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill St.

Looney announced that the council has written Massport requesting information on the activities, current tenants and future plans for the former Revere Sugar site on Medford Street.

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

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Remembering The Charlestown High School Class Of 1955

It was called the CHIP, and it was an acronym for Charlestown High In Print. The "Chipettes," as they were then known, were in charge of its publication. Mary Carroll, Nancy Curtis, Nancy Kearns, Doris "Chickie" Flanagan and Virginia Harkins staffed the CHIP, and each edition was eagerly awaited by the student body. Even in those days of the fifties the CHIP was considered a sort of no-holds-barred type of school newspaper, one in which the subject of an article might be praised or panned. It was all done in good taste, however, and most felt a certain degree of pride in being mentioned, for whatever the reason might be, in the CHIP.

The student leaders for CHS Class of 1955 were President Matt Twomey; Vice President, Bill O'Donnell; Treasurer, Alice Kirk; and Secretary, Virginia Harkins.

The yearbook was headed by Editor-in-Chief Ellen Maher, and her very capable staff of fourteen seniors produced a book well worth saving.

Mr. Louis "Louie" Welch was the headmaster, Mr. William "Bill" Cunningham, headed the business department, Miss Mary Bartick reigned supreme in the guid-

ance office, Major James "Maj" Stewart led the boys in military drill, Mr. Francis "Frank" Power was a young math teacher whose coaching abilities were quickly coming to the forefront, Mr. Robert "Bob" Hayes was an instructor in the business department, Miss Barbara Johnson handled the girls physical education program and the cheerleading staff as well, Mrs. Rosamond "Ros" DeSuze was a greatly admired member of the history department, and

Miss Katherine Foley was a much respected English instructor.

Coaches Frank Power, Jack Tyrell, Jeff Keating and Tom Meagher led the boys to athletic battle, while Barbara Johnson showed the way for the girls basketball and cheerleading squads.

Team captains that year included Bob Harty, track; Matt Twomey, basketball; Jacqueline Auffrey, girls basketball; cocaptains Billy O'Donnell and Fran Doherty, hockey; co-captains Louise Curtis and Barbara Tobin, cheerleading; cocaptains Matt Twomey and Dave Walter, football; and co-captains Billy O'Donnell, Ken Miller and Roy Paulsen, baseball.

The CHS Class of 1955 offered a fond "goodbye" to faculty members Mr. Dallas, Mr. Marchant, Mr. Perry and Miss Mc-Cormick and wished them the very best in their years of retirement.

The Glee Club during that long ago school year

was filled with the melodious female voices of Jane Kiely, Carol Murphy, Barbara Tobin, Jane Porter, Rosemary Houghton, Nancy Kearns, Virginia Harkins, Rita O'Neil, Alice Kirk and Pat McLaughlin.

One of the social highlights of the school year came when Miss Barbara Johnson chaperoned a group of CHS girls on a ski weekend. Connie Fiore, Rosemary Houghton, Peggy Connors, Nancy Carroll, "Chickie" Flanagan, Kay Leahy, Kay Maguire, Marilyn Porter, Sissy Auffrey, Rita O'Neil, Louise Curtis, Marilyn Curran, Arline O'Leary, Betty Sutherland, Mary Hayes, Clare Murphy, Theresa Curran and Barbs Tobin dressed warmly for the occasion and, from all reports, had one heck of a time.

The CHS Class of 1955 began its countdown toward graduation at the senior prom and concluded their years at Charlestown High School when they were awarded diplomas on a warm June evening at Faneuil

In a poignant letter addressed to the class of 1955, Ms. Sylvia Donegan's last year at CHS, a teacher's true feelings for her students was clearly evident. Her missive was dated, June 1955, and in it she

I am retiring from teaching this June. I join you all in bidding a fond goodbye to Charlestown High School. For twenty-six years it has been my happiness to have known so many wonderful boys and girls in my English classes.

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

It was a day of mixed feelings when I was recruited to go shopping with Mama down Main Street. It seemed like the walk from Sullivan Square was ever so long. But it did have its good points.

It started to get a bit interesting once we passed Lola Daley's Dance Studio, the Warren Chambers and Cotton Hall. (My two sisters, Marion and Ann, used to go dancing there during the jitterbug days).

After we passed the 40 Flights and DaPrato's statues, it was a breeze. There was a drugstore on the corner of Sullivan Street that had a keg of Hires Root Beer right on the counter and for five cents, you could get a nice cold mug with that refreshing foam floating on the top. I can almost taste it, just thinking about it.

I'm always thinking of food and by this time I would be thinking of those taffy apples in Raftell's, especially the ones with coconut. Sometimes we would go in Gordon's. Mama liked that store because they had Buster Brown socks, four for a dollar. We might even go in Austin's too, (if they were having a sale).

When we needed shoes, it would be Kaye's Cancellation Shoes. I remember all the hoopla when they got a new x-ray machine. You could actually slide your feet in and look through a window to see if your toes had enough room. It was a novelty that certainly got a lot of attention.

There was a paint and wallpaper store

that Mama liked too. She got so excited the year they had a new item to sell. It was called Trimz. It was wallpaper that had glue on the back and all you had to do was wet it down and hang it on the wall. Then shortly after that came another new item called Kem-Tone. It was a special kind of paint that let you paint right over wallpaper. Seems to me she went in that store a lot just a few weeks before the "17th." That was when we would start getting ready for the house full of company and the big celebration.

Passing by Irene's Pastry Shop with all its mouth-watering goodies was a fantasy to be lost in. There I go again with food on

Going by McClellan's 5 & 10 automatically made me think of our favorite store for Christmas shopping. One year in particular has left a mark in my memory of family treasures. Aunt Anne always gave each one of us a dollar to do our Christmas shopping. The perfect gift for Mama was a bottle of "Evening In Paris" perfume; Daddy, a pair of black shoelaces; and brother Tom, a Dick Tracy or Popeye Big-Little Book. But this one particular year, my sister Regina bought Daddy a bottle of Fitch's Shampoo. What did she do, but take a \$3.95 sticker off a box of Whitman's Chocolates and put it on the bottle of shampoo. Needless to say, Daddy was thrilled with his very expensive gift.

Of course we had to go in Kennedy's for some tub butter and peanut butter. Oh how I loved that smell of fresh ground coffee as

soon as I walked in the door.

I've heard that there was a dance hall during World Was II, for the boys in the service to go to. I believe it was organized by a man named Kelly, and it was across the street from the 5 & 10 on the second floor.

Carroll's Cut-Rate sometimes had something we needed, if not, we would walk on, past the Hippie and see what movie was playing. After that, we would continue on down to Donovan & Fallon's to pay the electric bill, then go to the Post Office before heading back.

For sure, there was no shortage of bar-

rooms, for it seemed that there was one in every block. The Pilsen Garden, the Alibi, the Gem, the Union, J.J. McCarthy's, Devlin's, and across from Schrafft's was Driscoll's 544. There was the El-View Ballroom on the second floor of Driscoll's, but Daddy had laid down the law that none of his girls could go dancing there.

If we had a lot of bundles, we would take the streetcar to Sullivan Square for five cents. Then as I ate my taffy apple, with its sweet coconut, chewy taffy and crunchy apple, I would be in my glory, riding home "Under The El."

FLU SHOTS

The "flu" season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins.

Influenza or flu is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days

Everyone feels sick with influenza, but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema, may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that amany as 10,000 Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older.

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza that is expected to be around in a given year. The vaccine is prepared from inactivated influenza virus, and a new vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza. Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot, have gotten an unrelated illness; not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reaction to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot.

If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should seriously consider getting a flu shot.

If you have an appointment with your health care provider between now and Nov. 30, the flu shot will be automatically offered to you the day of your appointment.
