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**A LOOK BACK:
THE POSTAL SAVING SYSTEM**

There are a lot of people today who are completely unaware that for over 50 years in this century, our postal system also doubled as a banking system.

The Postal Savings System was born in 1910, at a time when numerous bank failures had soured much of the population's image of banks and bankers. The public demanded something safer than banks: government savings accounts. People had no faith in banks, but they did have confidence in the government.

The Postal Savings System was fashioned after the European postal savings schemes that immigrants from Europe were accustomed to using. At a time when banks were paying five to seven percent interest, the post office only paid two percent. But savers — especially those with very modest saving programs — did flock to the post office. In a sense, the post office served as the poor man's bank.

The stock market crash in 1929 and the subsequent bank holidays contributed greatly to the success of postal savings. In 1933, the post office had nearly \$1.2 billion on deposit, more than 7.5 times the amount it had in 1929. And, by 1947, Americans held \$3.4 billion in postal savings deposits.

By the 1960s, with other forms of government savings and federally insured bank accounts offering more interest, the system no longer was needed. Postal savings ended in the United States because there was a plentiful supply of depositories, plus the fact that the government was interested in promoting its savings bonds as an alternative.

It wasn't until 1966, however, that the U.S. Post Office finally stopped accepting deposits. The Postal Savings System had outlived its usefulness after more than 50 years of service.

Mary MacInnes, chairperson of the BHTTF, praised Voke and Padula for their interest and concern. She said that she was "thrilled" with the news of the grant and is pleased at "any opportunity to do more for the kids."

Martin then announced that a \$7,000 grant was being awarded to the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club under funds realized from the Drug Forfeiture Program. He explained that 10 percent of the money realized under this program is returned to the county where the case is prosecuted and a committee has been established to award the grants. He added that the money is being allocated to hire a social worker to focus on young people most at-risk with drugs and alcohol.

Clubhouse Director Jerry Steimel stated that the grant "will make a great impact, namely the Smart Moves program."

The BHTTF members took the opportunity to share their thoughts and concerns with those present, which included representatives from the BHA, Father Ron Coyne and Anthony Guerra from Sen. Tom Birmingham's office.

For over an hour, the residents talked about the young people of the community, the importance of their education and the impact the Boston media had on the events of the previous week. MacInnes and

her board stressed that they want the kids to listen and to know there are people in the community who are there for them.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Voke stated: "Violence among youth is a nation-wide problem. It's both a public safety issue and a

public health issue. Public policy makers must address this epidemic today because there won't be a tomorrow for many of these kids.

"This summit allowed the BHTTF to tell the state's top housing officials and the district attorney what type of help they need to keep

the peace. Working together, with a strong line of communication, we will continue our vigilance for peace," concluded Voke.

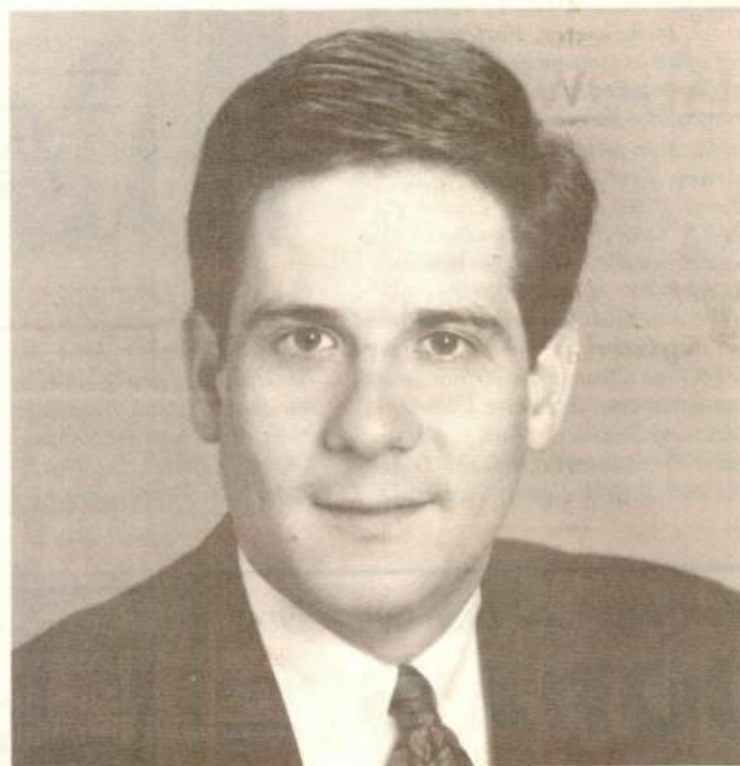

Upon the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776, John Adams wrote, "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated as the great anniversary festival. by John Adams, as well as several other great leaders of our country, the week began with Thanksgiving and devotion at a concelebrated Mass with priests from St. Mary's, St. Francis de Sales and St. Catherine's churches assisting. Students in Sister Barbara Hallisey's fifth grade prepared songs, readings and prayers, as well as a beautiful portrayal of the Marriage Feast of Cana, performed as Father Ron Coyne read St. Luke's gospel: 2:1-10.

In A Democracy, One Vote Matters In The End . . .

The city of Boston has within it over 200,000 registered voters. However it is both alarming and frightening that fewer and fewer eligible voters exercise their right to vote or pay attention to the issues or who is running for office. How many times have we heard someone say, "My one vote won't matter, so I just didn't bother."

For eight years, I was a Democratic state committee woman for the Suffolk and Middlesex District. I've supported a number of candidates and even ran for state senate twice. I think participation in the democratic process is important. Individual votes do matter. Many of us remember an election for state representative over 20 years ago which was decided by two voters.

Since **The Charlestown Patriot** is the cornerstone of our public life — keeping us informed and up to date, I quote the following from a newspaper column with the hope that it will be read by many people. Perhaps after reading this article, people will realize how important one vote can be. Just imagine if our right to vote in a free election were taken away! We would subject ourselves to tyranny, as history shows us.

How important is one vote?

- In 1645, one vote gave Oliver Cromwell control of England;
- In 1694, one vote caused Charles I of England to be executed;
- In 1776, one vote gave America the English language instead of German;
- In 1845, one vote brought Texas into the Union;
- In 1868, one vote saved President Andrew Johnson from impeachment;
- In 1875, one vote changed France from a monarchy to a republic;
- In 1876, one vote gave Rutherford B. Hayes the presidency of the United States;
- In 1923, one vote gave Adolf Hitler leadership of the Nazi Party; and
- In 1941, one vote saved Selective Service — just weeks before Pearl Harbor was attacked.

Yes, one vote makes a difference. So next week, as we go out to elect a new mayor and new members of the city council, please get out and vote. It matters!

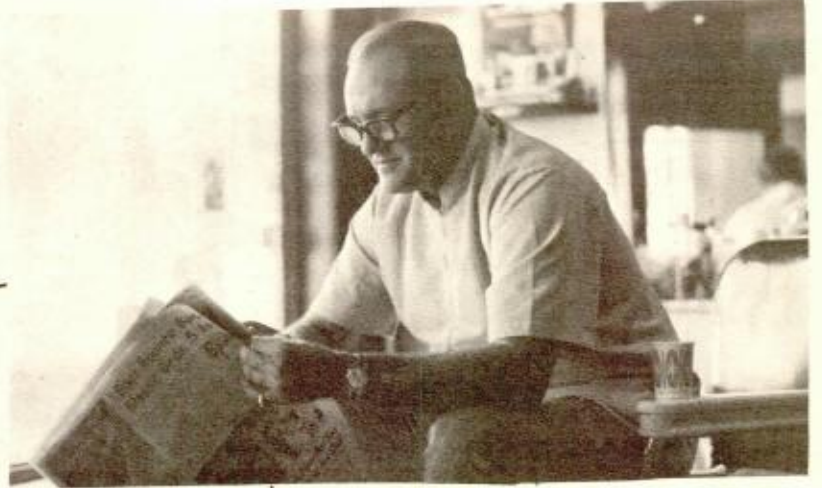

Ecumenical Service Calls For Peace And Understanding

The Charity Ball is held annually so that the councils throughout the state may turn in the receipts from their annual Tootsie Roll Drive.

"Let there be peace on earth . . . and let it begin with me" was the hymn that filled the sanctuary of St. Catherine's Church as residents were joined by people from throughout the city at an ecumenical service on Oct. 24. Father Ron Coyne, pastor of St. Catherine's, welcomed the gathering. He spoke of the drawing together of residents, clergy, the police, business persons and elected officials during the previous week following an attack on three Charlestown teens by Hispanic youths from outside the community and the subsequent violent acts. He asked God to instill respect in ourselves and for all.

Minister Don Muhamed of the Nation of Islam asked those present to stand up to hatred and bigotry, and reach out to those who need help.

Rev. Dr. Charles R. Stith of the Union Methodist Church in the South End said that prayers go out to the young people and their families who were involved in the altercation. He went on to say that the service was a demonstration that it is possible for people from different races and cultures to sit together under one roof. He said responsible adults, representing any station and any status, should tell young people that they shouldn't turn on one another. He went on to say that unemployment is a serious problem and when anger, frustration and race is added, what results is a "formula for trouble." He concluded by stating that if the city wants peace, there has to be opportunities for all young people, no matter what race, no matter what district of the city.

Suffolk County District Attorney Ralph Mar-

tin stated that the city has come a long way since busing in the 1970s for now when there is a threat to the common good, the people rise up and stand together.

Mayoral candidate Rep. James Brett praised the Charlestown community for coming together. He spoke of the need for jobs and expanded recreation programs, and for expending more on prevention than prosecution.

Acting Mayor Tom Menino said that violence would not be tolerated in the city and noted that Boston must be a city working together for the common good.

House Majority Leader Rep. Richard Voke pointed out the care Charlestown takes of her people, noting it is a good and kind town. He said it's not a race question but the result of putting all of God's poor people in one place. He said priorities are feeding the children, education, intervention for health care and job opportunities, and there is a failure of the system to respond to the needs of the people. Voke praised Mary MacInnes for being there for her people.

Other speakers included Rev. Pablo Diaz of the United Church of Christ, Rev. Michale Thomas of the Charles Street AME Church and Rev. Charlotte Randolph of the Andover-Newton School of Theology who offered the concluding prayer asking that "peace be shared not only in Charlestown but in every community to which we will return."

The congregation then joined together in reciting the "Prayer For Boston."

What Is The Problem?

What is the problem? That's the question I've heard over and over again and yes, there is a problem here in Charlestown. Was the very near riot on Tuesday, Oct. 19, racially motivated? Was the cross-burning, an abomination in itself on Wednesday, Oct. 20, or the "molotov cocktail" in the hall racially motivated incidents? Let's talk about it.

Some say the problem started in 1973 when the federal government implemented forced busing. When will it end? Most people who were put on school buses and sent to places like Roxbury, South Boston, Dorchester and Charlestown are among the 30-something age group now. Many have gone on to higher education, the work force and parenthood. But there are also some that still have the same mentality, hostility, frustration and confusion that was borne out of a sense of fear. That fear being change and diversity.

It is a fact of life that sooner or later, everything must change. I believe the steadfast resistance to change is part of the problem here in Charlestown. This resistance has taken the form of a perpetual cycle of hatred. For the most part, those who were forced into diversity 20 years ago were frustrated, confused, afraid and very angry. These persons who knew nothing about people who were different, had learned to mistrust, suspect and yes, hate them. Unfortunately, many passed this lesson on to their children, thus creating a cycle.

When I moved to the Bunker Hill Housing Development in July 1992, my 6-year-old was subjected to racial slurs for the first time in his life. The individual spouting this racism was a 4-year-old. I believe that it is a sin to teach a small, innocent child to hate those who are different, but this is the only way to perpetuate the cycle. Nobody really wants to admit that they were raised to hate anyone who is different, but this is a reality and those who are teaching their young to fear, mistrust and hate anyone that is different, are not preparing them to live in a world that is nothing if not diverse. There isn't anywhere in today's society that is all black or all white, and for those who cannot or will not accept this fact, it will be the most difficult.

I do not have the answer to the question of how to solve the problem, but I strongly believe the solution begins with our children. Because children do live what they learn, it is long past time to start teaching some new lessons.
