The Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council held the third in its schedule of four public meetings on June 29 to further discuss a proposal to build a pirate musuem in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The Whydah Pirate Complex Development and Management Inc. (WPC) proposes to construct the museum on Parcel 5/Dry Dock 5 at the Yard's End portion of the Navy Yard.

### FOUR DAYS OF FUN SCHEDULED TO CELEBRATE THE FOURTH OF JULY!

Boston Harborfest is celebrating it's 11th anniversary in honor of the 216th birthday of America. Over 120 attractions, in 45 locations throughout the city, will run through Sunday, July 5.

Band concerts, tours, parades, historic reenactments and the 11th annual Chowdafest will be highlighted by the traditional Charles River fireworks display on July 4. In addition, the First Annual Wingfest, a competition for the "Best Buffalo Wings in Boston '92" will be featured as a new, and surely to become popular contest.

Wingfest '92 will be held on Friday, July 3 on City Hall Plaza between 4 and 8 p.m. This new addition to the Harborfest activities is expected to attract more than 5,000 people to taste Boston's best Buffalo Wings.

The 11th Annual Chowdafest will take place on Sunday, July 5 on City Hall Plaza from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. The clam chowder contest, sponsored by BayBank, will feature 12 of Boston's best restaurants competing for the title of "Best Chowder in Boston '92."

The Fourth of July celebration in Charlestown will hold special significance with the annual turnaround cruise of USS Constitution. "Old Ironsides" will be placed in drydock later this year and unavailable for this yearly tribute to America's birthday for an estimated two years. The cruise will depart from Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard at 10 a.m. and return at 2 p.m. The official 21-cannon salute to the nation by the ship will take place at noon off Castle Island.

A free "Rhythm of the World" concert will be held on Pier 1 on Saturday, July 4 featuring Up With People, an international cast of more than 120 young people. The

event, sponsored by H.P. Hood, will take place between 7 and 9 p.m. Concert goers are asked to bring a contribution for the Greater Boston Food Bank with them. Any donation of nonperishable canned goods will be accepted. Also, it's best to bring either a lawn chair or a blanket to sit on.

The traditional Fourth of July Boston Pops Concert at the Hatch Shell on the Esplanade will kick off at 8 p.m., followed by a holiday fireworks display.

Boston Harborfest has been named one of The Top 100 Events in North America" by the American Bar Association for the past eight years.



### Voke Says Plan Adds \$100K For New Police In Charlestown


The Massachusetts House has introduced a plan to bring new reforms to the state's auto insurance industry. In addition to premium savings for motorists, Rep. Richard Voke says Boston stands to get a \$100,000 grant for the hiring of new police officers in Charlestown.

"Our reform plan recognizes local police must have the resources to help limit auto insurance fraud and car theft. With this in mind, Charlestown will get additional officers whose primary responsibilities will be dedicated to our reform goal," stated Voke, who, as Majority Leader, has had a major role in crafting the particulars of the municipality police support plan.

Voke stresses the fraud package is as tough as any law in the land. "In addition to funding more police officers in cities with high auto theft and fraud rates, we will grant the Attorney General and every district attorney more money to prosecute fraud and theft cases on a full-time basis, change the statute to make it a felony for anyone convicted in attempting to defraud an insurance company, suspend for five years the license of anyone convicted of auto theft and get tough on any doctors or lawyers who involve themselves in fraudulent claims," revealed Voke.

The reform plan aims at making a basic insurance policy less expensive by bringing Massachusetts in line with other states and by halting the costly abuse of the insurance system. In addition to being tough on illegal activities, the bill seeks to curb lawsuits and makes private health insurance the source of first recourse for those injured in an accident.

"There is sure to be a great deal of debate on this bill, as professional lobbies and insurance companies will try to limit the benefits we seek to deliver to motorists. While the debate goes on, though, I will be sure to maintain my advocacy for the 'average guy' and for our town by continuing to press for relief for the insured as well as more criminal justice professionals on the streets," concluded Voke.



★ City Square . . . The Boston Landmarks Commission voted on June 23 to designate the City Square Historical and Archaeological Site in City Square (Petition No. 129.87) a Boston Landmark under the provisions of Chapter 772 of the Acts of 1975 as amended.

The designation must now be approved by the Mayor, after which the City Council has 30 days during which it can override an approved designation by a two-thirds vote.

\* Trapped In The Tower . . . Tourists visiting the Bunker Hill Monument found themselves locked in the tower last Friday, June 26.

When the National Park Service Ranger locked the Monument door at 5 p.m., he thought the 221-foot obelisk was empty. What he didn't know was that a couple from Huntsville, Ala. were still at the top taking pictures and enjoying the panoramic views.

The couple descended the 294 granite steps in almost total darkness with only the occasional light from the Monument's few slit windows. When they reached the bottom, they found themselves in darkness behind an unyielding heavy metal door.

Visitors from Calif. and Texas, arriving at the Monument at 5:10 p.m., heard shouts coming from behind the metal door. They rang the fire alarm and found a telephone to alert the Park Service.

The whole ordeal took only 15 minutes before help came and released the captives from their "tourist trap!"

\* City Square Billboard . . . The CNC Billboard Committee met last week to listen to a proposal by Ackerley Communications to extend the lease on its billboard located on top of Roughan's Hall in City Square. Ken Stone chaired the meeting, and members present included Bob Wallace, Bill Galvin and Mel Stillman. Lou Nickinello, president of Ackerley, spoke on behalf of the company.

Nickinello asked the committee to approve an extension of the lease for the billboard for two more years, while construction continues in the City Square area. In exchange for Management Inc. to construct a museum on this extension, he offered the community an Parcel 5 in the Yard's End section of the increase in the summer job grant money for Charlestown Navy Yard with a meeting on local youths from \$5,000 to \$7,000, providing Monday, July 6 at 7 p.m. at the K. of C. seven jobs during the summer of 1993, and

removing the billboard on Chestnut Street by December 1992. He also stated that he would not return to the community again for another extension on the lease.

The general concensus of the residents and business people at the meeting was that the billboard should be removed when its present lease expires. Some expressed the opinion that money should go to community benefits rather than summer jobs, while others said that the billboard should be worth more in benefits, and others simply want the billboard removed.

The committee subsequently voted that the billboard should be taken down in December when the company's lease expires.

Since that meeting, Nickineho has made a modified proposal to Stone that the renewal of the billboard lease be for one year and the summer job grant be increased to \$10,000, providing 10 summer jobs.

The committee report will be considered by the full council at its July 7 meeting.

\* Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . According to Ralph Cunningham, resident engineer with Bryant Associates, work on Chestnut Street last week included the adjustment of door steps, the installation of the concrete sidewalks and the replacement of existing signs.

The contractor, the John Mahoney Con-

struction Company, started the water main installation on Concord Street by tying into the main on Bunker Hill Street and laying new main up the hill toward Monument Square.

The contractor also finished off the sidewalks on Adams Street. New light bases were put in on Ellwood Street while the contractor was finishing the new drainage on Russell Street and excavating the road down to the sub-base for the street rebuilding.

A major effort last week was concentrated in the Old Rutherford Avenue-Washington Street area where curb and grading work was done and new utility castings installed. Pavement and cobblestones were stripped on Washington Street from Union Street to Rutherford Avenue. The gas company installed its new main on Devens Street and is currently working on Old Rutherford Avenue and Russell Street.

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### A Report On Sail Boston '92

Sail Boston '92 is expected to bring 3.5 million visitors to Boston between July 11 and July 16. Crowds are anticipated to be the heaviest during the weekend of July 11 and 12. The neighborhoods that will be mostly heavily impacted by the event include Charlestown, South Boston, East Boston and the North End/ Waterfront.

While the excitement of the arrival of this vast fleet of Tall Ships tugs at the heart of the sea-lover and conjures up images of the adventurous and romantic life on the high seas, there are various aspects of this spectacular event that residents of this community need to be aware of as the city prepares for the enormous influx of visitors.

#### **Passenger** Automobile Restrictions

In order to maintain public safety and eliminate vehicular grid-lock on neighborhood streets, the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) has announced a contingency transportation plan that will close Boston's waterfront neighborhoods to private passenger automobiles. In Charlestown, these restrictions will be in place on Saturday, July 11 from 5:30 a.m. until approximately 7 p.m. and on Sunday, July 12 from 5:30

a.m. to approximately midnight. These restrictions will be lifted at midnight on July 12. Access into and out of Charlestown will not be limited on July 13 through July 16.

The transportation plan will stop all vehicles from entering Charlestown during these hours with only the following exceptions: tour buses, high occupancy vehicles (10 or more passengers), MBTA shuttle buses, public safety vehicles, credentialed Sail Boston and/or media vehicles and some delivery and commercial vehicles. Commercial vehicles, bearing proper commercial identification, will be allowed into Charlestown for time-sensitive deliveries only.

The BTD has offered no guarantee that residents, employers or employees outside Charlestown when the 5:30 a.m. blockade takes effect on July 11 and 12 will be allowed to enter the community. Although proper identification such as a driver's license or car registration showing a Charlestown address might gain the vehicle's entry. motorists must be advised that they will most likely be sitting in bumper-to-bumper traffic for over an hour on streets leading into Charlestown before they reach a police officer to re-

#### quest entry.

**Public Transportation** The use of public transportation is strongly advised to anyone wishing to take advantage of the splendor of the visit by the Tall Ships, but this is especially important for residents, their guests, employers and employees trying to enter the community on July 11 and 12.

Increased bus service on Main and Bunker Hill streets will depart and return to Sullivan Square throughout the weekend. Thses bus routes, 92 and 93, will not take passengers downtown, but will transport them to Sullivan Square to make connections on the Orange Line. The 92 and 93 buses will make a "loop" through Charlestown that will include a bus stop at the Charlestown Navy Yard, one of the Boston Harbor viewing points for Sail Boston.

#### Vehicles Within The Community

Residential vehicles already within the boundaries of the neighborhood at 5:30 a.m. on July and 11 and 12 will have complete access within the community with the exception of the Charlestown Navy Yard. Residents with vehicles wishing to leave the neighborhood will have to exit through a designated "checkpoint"

and receive a pass authorizing them to gain re-entry. The pass will have to be produced as the resident reenters the community.

#### **Parking Regulations**

Parking regulations within Charlestown will be strictly enforced. Cars parked in violation of the city's public safety regulations, such as double parked, parked too close to a hydrant, on crosswalks, etc., will be towed. Owners of these vehicles will be charged for the price of the parking violation plus a towing fee.

#### Street Cleaning

Street cleaning regulations during the July 11 to 16 period will be suspended to permit residents the maximum number of available parking spaces.

#### **Public Safety**

All of Boston's public safety departments will be fully staffed throughout the festivities. Outside emergency units will be brought in to cover Sail Boston events so that the public safety capacity in the neighborhoods will not be diminished.

The Health and Hospitals Department ambulance stationed at Sullivan Square will be available during its already established hours of operation. In addition, medical units, including

ambulances, will be stationed at the Charlestown Navy Yard and will respond within the community in the event of an emergency.

Charlestown fire stations at Sullivan Square and Winthrop Street will be fully equipped and staffed during the July 11-12 weekend. Police coverage will be on a routine weekend schedule with addition police visibility in the community, especially noticeable at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

#### **Exiting And Entering** The Community

The Charlestown "checkpoints" where vehicles will be allowed to exit or enter the community will be located at: City Square, Sullivan Square (at The Schrafft Center) and on Rutherford Avenue at Austin Street (the Gilmore Bridge). No traffic will be allowed to enter or exit the Tobin Bridge in Charlestown during the blockade.

Navy Yard Residents A separate pass will be distributed to residents of the Charlestown Navy Yard who wish to drive out of that area. The pass would have to be produced to gain re-entry into the Yard. All other private vehicles, including those belonging to Charlestown residents, will not be allowed to drive into the Navy Yard.

#### Streets Closed To Traffic

Streets that will be closed to traffic to prevent outside vehicles from entering the community are all located off New Rutherford Avenue. They are: Mishawum Street (across from the Sullivan Square fire station), Baldwin, Essex and West School streets, Old Rutherford Avenue and City Square.

Traffic outside the Charlestown boundaries will be allowed to use New Rutherford Avenue, the North Washington Street Bridge and the streets round the rotary in Sullivan Square.

#### Survival Suggestions

· Residents who expect company on July 11 and 12 should inform them of the vehicle blockade and urge them to use public transportation.

· Elderly/shut-ins who usually have a family member or friend come from outside the community to do their errands on the weekend should make other arrangements, such as having them come on Thursday or Friday evening to do the needed shopping.

· Residents returning from vacation on that weekend should plan to leave their vacation spot later in the day or stop for something to eat on their way home (continued on page 20)



The first showing was a job well done at the Doherty Playground when several hundred youngsters gathered and were entertained by the characters.



### Whydah Museum Developers Outline Landscaping Plans

(continued from page one)

With the aid of a slide show, Schwarz described a landscaping scheme for the three acres of open space that would surround the facility. He stated that his firm, David M. Schwarz Architectural Services, P.C., had as its first goal to respond to the guidelines set down in the Navy Yard Master Plan. To achieve this goal, the firm examined existing landscaping schemes elsewhere in the Navy Yard and along the Boston Harborwalk.

According to Schwarz, plantings would be accompanied by nautical flags, brick and stone walkways and a wooden boardwalk. The boardwalk would house pushcarts, benches, and tables and chairs, bordered by a double row of street trees. Shrubs and varying grasses would compliment the groundcover. Ballards with connecting chains would line the boardwalk at the water's edge.

Schwarz outlined the types of plantings that are being considered for use at the waterfront site. They include:

Street trees - Norway Maple, Honeylocust, London Planetree "Liberty," Japanese Scholar tree and Silver Linden.

**Evergreen trees** - American Holly, Chinese Juniper, Austrian Pine, Japanese Black Pine and Arborvitae.

Small flowering trees -Lavalle Hawthorn, Russian Olive and Crab Apple.

Shrubs - Bearberry, Rockspray Cotoneaster, Heath, Inkberry, Bar Har-

For the second year, the Kennedy Center will be sponsoring the City Farmstand, from July through October in the schoolyard of the Old Kent School at bor Juniper, Honeysuckle, Bayberry, Sumac, Lilac and Arrowwood.

Grasses - Blue Wild Rye, Deer Tongue, Ribbon and Spodiopogon.

Perennials - Yarrow, Spikenard, Thrift, Astilbe, Bugbane, Daylily, Purple Loosestrife, Beebalm, Catmint, Poppy and Sedum.

Schwarz explained that the site is open to the harbor, making it necessary for the plantings to be salttolerant. Plantings would be subject to easterly winter winds and realize predominantly afternoon shade. He also stated that plants will be placed on a structured pier with approximately 3to 3½-feet of soil.

In response to questions from committee members and community residents, Schwarz made the following statements:

• The garden created by WPC and surrounding Harborwalk would be open to the public 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

• Adequate lighting would compliment existing lighting in the Navy Yard. It would include overhead and ground light fixtures.

• Oak trees would be considered for planting because of the historical connection to the construction of the Whydah ship.

• The WPC restaurant would be accessible to the public not visiting the museum.

• Benches, chairs and tables would be permanent fixtures on the pier/Harborwalk, usable by pedestrians when the museum is not open.

The landscaping scheme would be finalized at the tentative designation presentation before the BRA Board, possibly in mid-July.

Cunha asked Schwarz to consider utilizing the expertise of the members of the Charlestown Community Gardens in maintaining the landscaping at the WPC. Betts replied that it could be discussed as part of the community benefits package.

The remaining portion of the meeting was set aside to address questions raised at the previous WPC meeting on traffic and parking schemes.

Natale presented a packet that contained answers to concerns raised at that meeting, including graphics and maps backing up the consultant's findings. He explained that the document did not "rehash" the numbers used in studies for the New England Aquarium originally proposed for that site, but said that they "researched to come up with our own numbers specific to the WPC."

Natale said that 85 percent of the traffic generated by WPC visitors would travel through City Square with 15 percent going on neighborhood streets to reach the facility. Gate 5 and the new Gate 6 at the end of the Yard would be used to access the museum. Parking in Building 199 and the use of a BRA parking lot at the Little Mystic Channel would accommodate all of the parking needs for the facility, he stated.

The establishment of the Haul Road, the Medford Street bypass road, was agreed to be a crucial component to the success of a viable traffic plan for the build-out of the Navy Yard. WPC addressed the Haul Road in the traffic packet, stating: "The Whydah principals will work with the Charlestown community and the BRA to secure a commitment from the state for the funding of the project."

Barrett, in a letter dated June 26, 1992 to Richard Taylor, secretary of the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction, requested the state to assume the cost of constructing the roadway. The letter stated: "The requested funding is not only an investment in the regional transportation network serving Eastern Massachusetts, Metropolitan Boston and Charlestown, but also an investment in a Commonwealth of Massachusetts Designated Port Area (DPA) and a Boston Maritime Economy Reserve (MER) Zone."

Barrett outlined the economic benefits derived from the Whydah Complex as being sufficient to reimburse the state's initial cost to construct the road.

Other concerns raised included a structured fee system for WPC visitors in Building 199 that would nake the cost of parking less expensive, thus eliminating vehicles from parking on residential streets. Betts stated that this item







On June 14, the 24th running of the Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race was held. Each year the number of runners participating has grown and this year was no different with nearly 600 registered runners in the 8K and nearly 100 registered runners in the two-mile Novice Race.

Particularly exciting is the increasing number of Charlestown residents running. This year there were 137 local runners in the 8K. which is more than double the number from four years ago. Also of note is the fact that there were runners from 14 different states running the streets of Charlestown this year, including representatives from as far away as Texas, Ore., Ill. and Okla

The day began in a very special way as Pauline Benoit Davis, who had run this race for so many years, acted as the honorary starter for the two-mile Novice Race. Just over 90 runners. most of whom where young members of the Boys & Girls Club, bolted from the starting line in the Navy Yard, many of whom quickly found out that two miles can be a long way when you're running the hills of Charlestown. Because of Pauline's involvement in this race for so many years, this year's race committee decided to permanently name the first-place female trophy the Pauline Benoit Davis Award, and it was an exciting moment for everyone when Pauline's niece, Lynn Anthony, crossed the line first.

The 8K race again attracted some of the top runners from the Boston area and this years top male was from Houston, Texas running the course in a record 25 minutes flat. The top female was Charlestown's own Molly Tyson who just nipped Kara Molloy of Westford at the tape by three seconds, finishing in 32:08. Molly was also running for Marathon Tours who captured this year's Merchant's Challenge Cup just nipping McCarthy's Liquors by one minute and 53 seconds.

Other Charlestown runners of note were Kay Mc-Donald who finished second in the Female Masters Division, Sarah Hatch-Wright, third in the Female (ages 18-39) Group. Top Boys & Girls Club finishers were Jennifer Fiata and John Kelly, All proceeds from the road race are to benefit the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club and the programs they offer the young people of Charlestown. It is only with the help of a lot of people that this race is possible, and the Boys & Girls Clubs biggest thanks go out to Constitution Quarters and the Raymond Group for again sponsoring the race this year. 


